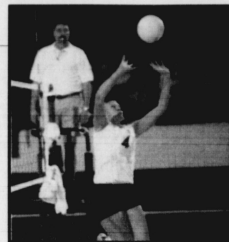

## Accident raises concerns over pedestrian safety

UK Police: Students on foot seldom cross at crosswalks, but pedestrians don't always have the right-of-way

After an accident on South Limestone Street left a pedestrian injured last Tuesday, drivers and pedestrians are taking note.

The accident did not surprise those who witness UK's traffic, by foot or car, on a daily basis, but some are looking for a safer change.

"We're so used to driving up Rose Street and (pedestrians) not crossing at cross-

walks," said Cmdr. Travis Manley of UK Police Communications and Information Services. "It's an uncontrollable thing on this campus."

Police simply do not have the resources to enforce pedestrian ordinances around campus, he said. "Traditionally, we have not (enforced them), because if we try to do that, 30 officers would be walking around all day giving tickets," Manley said.

Since pedestrian traffic cannot be fully controlled, UK

is seeking a safety solution — for both pedestrians and drivers.

"Student Affairs is looking into an overpass that would connect each side of South Limestone so that (pedestrians) won't have to walk through the street, but would walk over the traffic," said Rachel Watts, Student Government president.

On a rainy day last week, UK student Colin Grant Inman accidentally hit Tracy L. Ryan, also a UK student, with his car as she was jaywalking. Ryan, 43, had minor injuries. No charges were brought

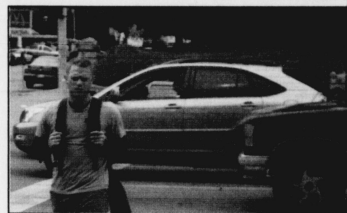
against Inman, 19.

The accident reminded Watts of a time when she was crossing that same street in nearly the same conditions.

"Last year, I almost got hit by a car when I was crossing South Limestone and it was raining and dark," Watts said. "It's going to be a lot safer to plan an overpass."

With a lengthy walk to class — sometimes in harsh conditions — some pedestrians think they are entitled to the right-of-way.

"I'm walking in the heat and they're in their car where

## Uneventful win gives Cats base for successful season

No one will remember this game.

There were no spectacular highlights or memorable scenes. There was no intrigue, no violent explosion by a UK coach and no fantastic finish. There was, however, a needed win for the Cats.

UK did its job against Murray State Saturday — and not much more. The Cats played well enough to win comfortably, even setting a few records along the way. This game was not a classic, but it wasn't supposed to be.

The football season is an endurance test. Twelve long games stretch across three

months. Every game matters, but some just aren't as exciting as the others.

Following an emotional game against Louisville, everyone had a letdown on Saturday. Players, coaches, fans and even the officials looked flat.

"It's harder to get up for games that aren't publicized as being big," said senior defensive end Jeremy Castull.

For the majority of the game, Commonwealth Stadium was lifeless. However, for a short stretch there was some excitement. In one five-minute period, Jared Lorenzen threw three touchdowns and UK's defense notched a safety. In that same period, Lorenzen became the all-time leading passer at UK and Derek Abney broke records for all-purpose yards and kickoff return yards.

All of Jared Lorenzen's career, he has looked up to Tim Couch, the measuring stick of greatness for a UK quarterback. Lorenzen doesn't have to look up to Couch any longer.

Lorenzen became UK's new measuring stick with 13:10 left in the second quarter against Murray State. After pulling the defense off-sides, Lorenzen took advantage and lobbed a pass over the Racer defense to Chris

## Write-in candidates look for recognition in gubernatorial race

Candidates banned from debates, some rallies; say they will play a legitimate role in race

FRANKFORT — In a political sense, Jeff Hillebrand and Stacy Abner are rugged individualists. Both stand virtually alone in trying to topple gubernatorial candidates Ben Chandler and Ernie Fletcher.

Neither has raised any noticeable campaign money. Neither has a paid campaign staff. Their name recognition is low, to say the least.

Neither seriously expects to win in November, which seems a safe bet, since neither man's name is even on the ballot. Hillebrand, of Manchester, and Abner, of McKee, are independent write-in candidates.

After years of working at different odd jobs, Abner, 30, has been a paramedic in southeastern Kentucky for four years. He has an associate's degree in emergency medical care from Eastern Kentucky University.

In his spare time, Abner campaigns for governor. He said he often passes out his card to people while standing in line at fast food restaurants.

"It's hard for a little guy like myself to get some attention," Abner said. "I realize the chances are very slim. I am the quintessential David vs. Goliath, except I'm facing two Goliaths."

Hillebrand, 55, a retired federal corrections officer, campaigns on what he says is essentially \$200 worth of spending money each week. He has a bachelor's degree in police administration from EKU.

Hillebrand registered as a member of the Reform Party. He said he thinks voters should have more choices for governor. His wife, Margarita Nancy Hillebrand, is also his running mate.

"Basically, I knew going into this I had a very small chance of winning as an independent, and even less of a chance as a write-in," Hillebrand said. "In any case we just feel like the people of Kentucky deserve a choice and not have to choose between the worst of two evils."

Both men complained about lack of face time with voters. As write-ins, they are excluded from most candidate forums, including those on KET.

Both attended the political picnic at Fancy Farm this year and were introduced but not afforded speaking time.

Despite the odds against him, Abner envisions himself as a sort of "Happy Gilmore" of Kentucky's political scene.

"Will I win? I'd say I'd probably have a better chance of winning the Powerball," Abner said. "But stranger things have happened."

Hillebrand is aiming a bit higher. He said 12,000 votes is a "realistic" goal. "If we don't win the election we will still have an input in the election," Hillebrand said. "I figure if I do win, it'll be an act of God."

Hillebrand, who ran and lost an election for jailer in Clay County has some strongly held beliefs. He is against gun control, abortion and U.S. involvement in the United Nations. Hillebrand also said he believes strongly that the Ten Commandments should be displayed in all public buildings.

Hillebrand, who said he normally carries a .32-caliber six-shot pistol, is "absolutely positively pro-

## Bush reveals plan for post-war Iraq

WASHINGTON — President Bush said Sunday night he will ask Congress for \$87 billion to fight terrorism in Iraq and Afghanistan, appealing for troops and money from other countries, even those who opposed the U.S.-led war.

Bush, in a 15-minute nationally televised speech from the Cabinet Room, said the United States would not be intimidated into retreat by violence.

"The terrorists have cited the examples of Beirut and Somalia, claiming that if you inflict harm on Americans we will run from a challenge," Bush said. "In this they are mistaken."

Bush spoke just four days before the anniversary of the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001. Seeking support for his policy, he said, "The surest way to avoid attacks on our own people is to engage the enemy where he lives and plans."

"We are fighting that enemy in Iraq and Afghanistan today so that we do not meet him again on our own streets, in our own cities."

Bush addressed the nation from the Cabinet Room in his first major speech on Iraq since May 1 when he stood on the deck of the aircraft carrier Abraham Lincoln and declared an end to major combat operations. Since then, more Americans have died in Iraq than were killed during the war. The overall death count is 287 — 149 since May 1.

The violence — including four major bombing attacks in a month — has raised alarms about Bush's handling of Iraq. Republicans and Democrats alike have urged Bush to change course and seek more troops and money from other countries.

Questions also have been fueled by the administration's failure to find any of Saddam Hussein's alleged illegal weapons or Saddam himself.

Bush said Iraq and the Middle East are critical to winning the global war on terror. Bush's plan for Mideast plan appeared to be unraveling after Saturday's resignation of Mahmoud Abbas, the U.S.-backed Palestinian prime minister.

Bush described Iraq as the central front in the war against terror and said that "enemies of freedom are making a desperate stand there, and there they must be defeated."

"This will take time and require sacrifice," he said. "Yet we will do what is necessary, we will spend what is necessary, to achieve this essential victory in the war on terror, to promote freedom and to make our own nation more secure."

Bush said the current number of U.S. troops in Iraq — 130,000 — is sufficient but

that more foreign troops are needed. He said two multinational divisions, led by Britain and Poland, are serving alongside the United States, and that American commanders have requested a third multinational division.

Some countries have asked for an explicit U.N. peacekeeping authorization, and Bush said Secretary of State Colin Powell would seek a Security Council resolution to authorize deployment of new forces.

Referring to France, Germany and Russia, Bush said that "not all of our friends agreed with our decision (to) ... remove Saddam Hussein from power. Yet we cannot let past differences interfere with present duties."

Pressed by Democrats and Republicans alike for a pricetag for Iraq, Bush said he would ask Congress for \$87 billion for the next fiscal year. Of that amount, he said, \$66 billion would be earmarked for military and intelligence operations in Iraq, Afghanistan and elsewhere.

While the United States has shouldered the burden of the effort in Iraq, Bush said other nations will be asked to help. He said Powell would meet with representatives of many countries later this month to seek contributions for rebuilding Afghanistan. Next month, Powell will hold a similar funding conference for Iraq.

Sen. Carl Levin of Michigan, the senior Democrat on the Senate Armed Services Committee, said Congress will approve the money needed to support U.S. troops, but that lawmakers want the president to tell them what his "exit strategy" is from Iraq.

Defense Department officials have said U.S. operations are costing about \$3.9 billion monthly. That figure excludes indirect expenses such as replacing damaged equipment and munitions expended in combat.

# New video shows World Trade Center crash

Only known footage of both planes hitting towers taken by Czech immigrant, could help explain collapse

NEW YORK — Federal officials investigating the destruction of the World Trade Center said Sunday they hope a newly surfaced videotape showing both hijacked planes hitting the towers will shed light on why the north tower collapsed.

"You could use it to determine the speed of the plane as it approached the building," said Michael Newman, a spokesman for the National Institute of Standards and Technology, the

agency investigating the collapse of the 110-story towers. "That gives us information that we can use to determine a number of different factors."

The tape's existence was reported by The New York Times on Sunday, nearly two years after the terrorist attack felled the twin towers on Sept. 11, 2001.

It is the only videotape known to have captured images of both planes hitting the trade center. And while numerous videos and photos

have provided details on the high-speed impact into the south tower, it is only the second showing the first strike, into the north tower.

The tape was shot by a Czech immigrant construction worker, whose young son at one point came close to accidentally erasing it.

Newman said NIST is trying to obtain a copy of the hour-long tape, parts of which aired on ABC Sunday.

"Any visual documentation we can get of the events of 9-11 is valuable," Newman said.

Walter Karling, a freelance photographer who is acting as an agent for the

man who shot the footage, Pavel Hlava, said Sunday he could not comment on whether the tape would be turned over to investigators.

NIST investigators have compiled a database of more than 5,600 photographs and 4,600 video clips shot both by professionals and amateurs.

The only other known footage of the first plane striking the north tower came from a French film crew that was making a documentary about a firefighter.

The Times and ABC both said they did not pay for the tape. Karling refused to comment.

it's air conditioned," said Chris French, a finance junior. "I should have the right of way."

"It seems that (pedestrians) usually don't worry about the drivers," he said. "Usually drivers are responsible, but pedestrians just need to make sure they're more cautious."

gun." Convicted felons should be allowed to own shotguns for hunting and qualified people should be allowed to carry concealed weapons anywhere in the state, he said.

"It really ticks me off when I go into public places, and they tell me I can't carry my concealed deadly weapon, when there's a state law that says I can," Hillebrandt said.

He thinks that one day U.S. citizens may be involved

in hand-to-hand combat with United Nations soldiers.

"Someday in the future, maybe not before I die, there will be Americans fighting the United Nations soldiers trying to take their guns away," Hillebrandt said.

He is also "pro-smoking" and considers any laws to limit public smoking as unconstitutional. Hillebrandt is also "anti-illegal immigrant," he said. "I would go around the state and collect any illegal immigrant that I could find and if the INS didn't do anything with them, I would load them on a bus and release them in Washington,"

he said. Abner's views are more temperate.

He said he believes education could be improved. Rather than place unruly students into separate classrooms, Abner said he supports corporal punishment.

Abner said he would strive to improve race relations, health care and economic conditions in the state.

Improving the state's economic conditions would help fight drug abuse by boosting people's outlook on life, he said. Instead of attracting new jobs to Kentucky, Abner said he would look for ways to

boost peoples' salaries and help lower the cost of health care.

Unlike himself, Chandler and Fletcher cannot relate to the average Kentuckian, Abner said.

"In my opinion, Fletcher and Chandler live in never-never land. They never have to worry about making their rent payment or whether or not they have to choose between paying their car insurance over putting food on their table," Abner said. "There's just so many problems that Fletcher and Chandler are clueless to because they live in never-never land."

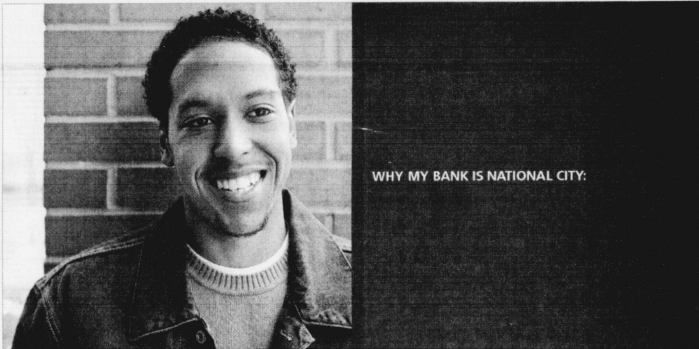

## Cats rout Murray State en route to records

Typically, winning a game by 31 points would be enough cause for excitement.

But staying ahead of Murray State didn't excite UK players as much as head coach Rich Brooks would have liked.

Even though UK handled the Racers 37-6 Saturday night in Commonwealth Stadium, Brooks said his team wasn't having enough fun out there.

"I just asked my players, 'Obviously I'm doing something wrong because it didn't look like we wanted to go out and have a lot of fun playing the game,'" Brooks said. "I have to do a better job at getting my team emotionally ready to play. It didn't appear to me that we played with a lot of adrenaline and we have to do a better job with that."

On a night when Jared Lorenzen would become UK's all-time leading passer and when wide receiver Derek Abney would become UK's career leader for all-purpose yardage and kickoff return yardage, the Cats had many things to be joyful about.

Anthony Thornton punted five times for UK, averaging 39.2 yards per punt. And UK's defense created two turnovers and one safety.

After a slow first quarter, the Cats set the tone — this was Abney and Lorenzen's night.

With 22 seconds left in the quarter Lorenzen found Abney over two Murray defenders in the end zone to give UK a 6-0 lead.

Several minutes later Lorenzen threw a 60-yard

touchdown pass to Chris Bernard to break Tim Couch's school passing mark and to pace UK's rout.

On the kickoff, UK defensive back Claude Sagaille narrowly missed tackling MSU running back Chad Cook for a safety. But on the first play of Murray's drive Vincent "Sweet Pea" Burns sacked quarterback Stewart Childress in the end zone for the safety to give UK a 16-0 lead.

Lorenzen sat in the pocket comfortably all night long as he spotted open receivers. He went 14-for-21 passing for four TD passes and 197 yards.

"Jared Lorenzen is a hell of a quarterback," Murray head coach Joe Panunzio said. "I don't know how a kid that big can move like that."

Up 23-6 early in the second half, UK ended any idea of a Murray rally when linebacker Raymond Fontaine recovered a fumble. Lorenzen threw a touchdown pass to Alexis Bwenge four plays later.

"We came out and got the turnover and I think that set the tempo," UK defensive coordinator Mike Archer said. "We have to be more positive in creating turnovers and that was encouraging."

Brooks hopes that Saturday will be more fun for the Cats as they play at Alabama.

"We only have 10 opportunities left this year, so we better start having some fun," Brooks said.

## UK Football Notebook

Hold your tissues for UK running back Drank Davis. Davis suffered the most unusual injury so far this season Thursday night while blowing his nose. A blood vessel ruptured in Davis' eye causing the eye to close.

UK head coach Rich Brooks said Davis went to the emergency room where doctors told Davis there was no serious damage to his eye. Brooks said Davis did not look like himself before Saturday night's game with Murray State.

"I've never seen anything like that in my life, where you blow your nose and have your eye swell shut," Brooks said. "He looked like he came out on the bad end of a pugilistic endeavor."

Swollen eye and all, Davis rushed for 18 yards on 10 carries against Murray State.

OTHER INJURIES

While running in the

end zone celebrating a 27-yard touchdown run by Shane Boyd in the fourth quarter, tight end Jeremiah Drobney suffered an ankle injury. Brooks said that someone went low on him but that the injury doesn't look to be serious.

Wide receiver Derek Abney came out of the Murray game feeling much better than after last week's game against Louisville, Brooks said.

PUNTING PROBLEM FIXED?

After last week's disaster in the punting game against Louisville, UK was more consistent in the punting game Saturday night. Junior Anthony Thornton made his first career start punting in place of Sevin Sucurovic against the Racers. Thornton punted five times with an average of 39.2 yards per punt.

"The other good news is that we functioned in the punting game," Brooks said. Brooks pulled Sucurovic and Thornton aside Friday and told them they would both probably punt, but

Thornton would be the starter. Brooks has not named Thornton the permanent starter.

"As far as I know the job is open every week," Thornton said.

THE NUMBERS DON'T LIE

An experienced Racer linebacker corps held the UK rushing game in check. UK rushed 29 times for 103 yards. Quarterback Shane Boyd was the Cats' leading rusher with 57 yards and one touchdown on five carries.

"You have got to have a running game in the SEC to win," quarterback Jared Lorenzen said. "That is why we were successful last year."

Both teams committed numerous penalties. Murray St. committed six penalties for 43 yards. UK committed 13 penalties, including four personal fouls, resulting in 119 yards in penalty yards. Four consecutive plays were penalized late in the first half.

## Women's soccer goes 0-1-1 against ranked opponents

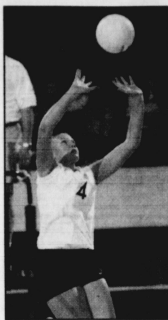

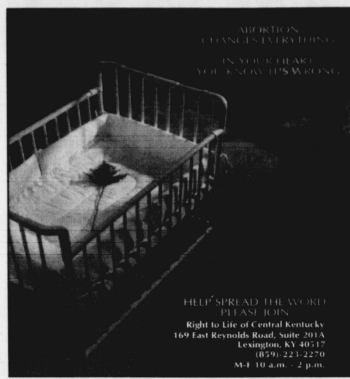

Bernard, who ran 60 yards for the record-breaking score.

"I wanted this one just because of the record itself," Lorenzen said. "I'm honored to have the record, but no matter how many records you break, you're never going to be as good as Tim Couch."

After the play many of Lorenzen's teammates did not know that he had just rewritten the record book.

"I looked up at the big (screen) and saw it and all I could really think of was to go over there and shake his hand," center Nick Seitze said. Like Seitze, Lorenzen had other things on his mind.

"I've been here long enough that that is the last thing I need to worry about,"

Lorenzen said. "I really don't care. I've had a fun and glorious ride while I was here."

Even though he has the record, Lorenzen sees Couch as the benchmark at UK.

"He is definitely the guy you look up to when you play football," Lorenzen said. "I'm thankful to have it, but at the same time he's still the guy that you look up to."

Lorenzen continued to praise his teammates for helping him to achieve such a prestigious award.

"It was nice to sit in the pocket and find receivers down field," Lorenzen said. "The receivers did a phenomenal job catching and blocking."

From 1986 until departing for the NFL after the 1986 season, Couch passed for 8,435 yards.

Lorenzen passed for 236 yards on 18-for-31 passing in UK's 37-6 win over Murray St. He now sits atop UK's all-time

passing list with 8,536 career yards passing. He needs 2,635 yards to pass Peyton Manning as the all-time leading passer in the SEC.

After the game, UK head coach Rich Brooks was excited that Lorenzen had broken the record.

"Hey, let's have some fun with that," Brooks said. "Heck of a deal."

**WEEK IN REVIEW**

**MONDAY**

UK announced changes in the hours that permits would be required for parking in most UK lots. Many lots, which allow non-permit parking after 4:30 p.m., will have that time pushed back to 7:30 p.m. Parking and Services Director Don Thornton said anyone who already owns an evening permit will still be allowed to park in the affected lots after the old 4:30 p.m. time.

Thornton said the purpose of the change is to raise extra funds for new parking structures around campus. Thornton estimated that the revenue generated from the extra three hours of permit-only parking will amount to less than \$30,000, while the cost of a new parking structure would run into the millions.

**TUESDAY**

Alltel resumed negotiations with its striking workers union in an effort to end the two month work stoppage resulting from labor disputes between the two sides.

The union claims that Alltel failed to live up to the terms of employment workers enjoyed before Alltel purchased the infrastructure of Verizon, the company with which they were previously employed. Laborers say that Alltel's contracts would overcharge union workers for medical benefits and that the company would offer too much work to private, non-union contractors.

**WEDNESDAY**

Rachel Watts, the Student Government president, is focusing on restoring SG's credibility with students after former President Tim Robinson's resignation and guilty plea in a voter registration case last year, the Kernel reported Wednesday.

Watts said her agenda includes monthly meetings with Mayor Teresa Isaac and meeting with Councilman Dick DeCamp, whose district includes UK and surrounding neighborhoods.

Other issues that Watts wants to address and hear from students on include extending the bar closing time to 2 a.m., and using better spending practices to avoid a repeat of last year's \$10,000 deficit in SG accounts.

**THURSDAY**

It was reported by the Associated Press that the recording industry plans to offer amnesty to filesharers who pledge to change their ways. The Recording Industry Association of America plans to promise not to sue people who admit they illegally share music files across the Internet if they promise to delete the files from their computers.

In order to take advantage of the RIAA's offer, downloaders would have to complete a notarized amnesty form including pledges to no longer participate in illegal file-sharing.

**FRIDAY**

The Lexington Herald-Leader reported that a Columbus, Ohio developer, represented by former Lexington Mayor Jim Amato, is seeking to demolish two warehouses near Foreman Avenue to make way for an apartment complex and parking lot to serve UK students.

According to Amato, the complex, which would surround some existing businesses and homes, could house nearly 900 UK students and would allow residents parking for class, as the site is well within walking distance of UK.

**Violence contradicts values of anti-abortion movement**

Violence at abortion clinics has recently been garnering media attention, prompted by the recent execution of former minister Paul Hill, who killed an abortionist and his escort in 1994. As a strong opponent of abortion, such events sadden me deeply — not only because of the heinous and unjustified acts of violence themselves, but because of the damage they do to the pro-life movement.

In covering these events, the media tend to group all abortion opponents with such criminals by using terms such as "abortion foes." Rarely mentioned is the fact that major pro-life organizations across the country have spoken out against Paul Hill's actions and similar violence.

According to American Life League President Jim Sedlak, "Pro-life means that you think that every life is created by God and it is sacred because it was created by God, so we wouldn't advocate the killing of anybody, regardless of what they had done."

As an officer in the UK Students for Life group, I can say that we strongly oppose the use of violence by anyone. Our mission is to educate the UK community about abortion and its alternatives, and we believe that the only way to open minds is through understanding and compassion, not through insults or violence.

Paul Hill and others like him in no way represent the pro-life movement. Their extremist views and radical actions do nothing to advance the causes in which they believe. Killing to defend life is an absurd logical contradiction. Paul Hill is a murderer, not a martyr.

## Students need ways to cross street safely

Last week's accident and injury of a pedestrian on South Limestone Street should serve as a reminder to students, UK administration and motorists of our own human frailty.

Tracy L. Ryan sustained minor injuries Sept. 2 after crossing Limestone and being struck by a car. Witnesses said Ryan, 43, a part-time student, was jaywalking. Colin Grant Inman, 19, was driving the car.

Here's the rub, if stating the obvious can be excused: traffic around campus is dangerous, and everyone can do more to ensure safety and prevent accidents.

Looking right, then left, before crossing the street might be a good plan to start when it comes to comporting oneself safely about town.

But pedestrians also shouldn't assume that drivers can see them and will stop. Anyone crossing the street should make the effort to use crosswalks and wait for crosswalk signals to change.

Such advice may seem condescending, but according to UK Police, jaywalking is prevalent on campus.

"We're so used to driving up Rose Street and (pedestrians) not crossing at crosswalks," Cmdr. Travis Manley of UK Police Communi-

cations and Information Services told a Kernel reporter.

While state law prohibits crossing outside of a crosswalk and ignoring traffic control devices, police don't have the resources to enforce jaywalking laws on campus, Manley said.

The flip side to pedestrians' obligations in ensuring their own safety is that motorists should also be careful and mindful of pedestrians, especially around campus. Many UK students know the experience of being struck by a car, at the fault of the driver.

UK Administration also has some available options that they should strongly consider.

"Student Affairs is looking into an overpass that would connect each side of South Limestone," Student Government President Rachel Watts told a Kernel reporter. SG also brought up the issue of an overpass last year.

While the financial expense of such an overpass might turn out to be high, it would seem like nothing compared to the cost of a fatal accident in mid-morning traffic.

A more inexpensive alternative to an overpass would be painting more crosswalks on streets. While students frequently don't bother with using crosswalks, it may be that they only do so when it's convenient — and it often isn't.

I made several phone calls, was given the runaround, and I found nobody who was really willing to answer my questions about the parking situation. I was instead directed to the parking Web page to look at the annual reports there. I found some interesting numbers that were fun to crunch.

During the '00-'01 parking calendar there were a reported 3,460 K-lot spaces and 4,706 K-lot passes sold by Dec. 31 for a 36 percent over-sale of the lot. During the '01-'02 parking calendar there were again 3,460 K-lot spaces and 5,130 passes sold by December for a 48 percent over-sale of the lot.

In the '02-'03 parking calendar year K-lot spaces for students were cut by 681 down to 2,779, while 5,659 K-lot passes were issued by December. This represents a 103 percent over-sale of the lot. No one would give me the numbers for the passes sold this year, but they are planning on selling more.

If we look at the average increase in passes sold over the last three years, we see about a 10 percent increase per year. They have also recently changed the hours of control around campus to increase the number of permits sold.

If we assume a modest 12 percent increase in K-lot passes sold this year, we come up with a number around 6,338 passes sold by December for a whopping 128 percent over-sale.

On the parking website, if you search around long enough, it clearly states that a parking permit does not guarantee a parking space. Paying \$152 for a parking permit that allows me to park in a lot a mile from my classes may not guarantee me a space, but it should guarantee that most of the time I should have no trouble finding a place to park. This has not been the case.

It may be the first weeks of school and things may be settling down, but it seems to be an unacceptable situation. I called and tried to get both sides of the story, but I guess if they want to let the student population know what's going on, they can always write their own editorials.
