SG's resolution to fix clocks is simply unnecessary

The Student Government Senate ended its year by passing yet another resolution urging UK's administration to do something it won't — and shouldn't — do.

Apparently, some of the clocks on campus are not synchronized with each other. That's what one would normally expect on a 670-acre campus with dozens of buildings. But SG executive cabinet member Richie Holmes saw an injustice in the situation.

"I was shocked to hear that students were being penalized for being late to class because clocks on one side of campus," Holmes said in a Kernel story last week. There are about 1,000 clocks on There are about 1,000 clocks on There are about 1,000 clocks on The are are about 1,000 clocks on the students were being penalized for time than clocks on the other side of campus," So when Holmes and other SG officials found out that SG couldn't afford to spend \$100,000 — about a quarter of its annual budget — on new clocks, they decided to ask UK to do it for them. At its final meeting of the school year last week, the SG Senate unanimously passed a resolution requesting that UK deal with the purported clock situation.

It is implausible that clock troubes are causing academic problems for a significant amount of students. First, most students carry cellular phones, all of which are equipped with time-elling technology. Students wourred about temporal inconsistencies can look at their own phones in order to orient themselves.

Second, if there are truly students who are being penalized for lateness that is caused by clock problems, the right response is to explain the problem to both instructors—and to go to the ombudsman if necessary. It is not necessary to precisely synchronize all the clocks on campus when a simple discussion will often suffice to resolve the issue.


