Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees, University of Kentucky, Tuesday, December 14, 1971

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met pursuant to KRS 164.170 in a regular statutory quarterly meeting at 2:00 p.m. (Eastern Standard Time), on Tuesday, December 14, 1971, in Room E on the 18th floor of the Patterson Office Tower on the campus of the University with the following members present: Mr. Albert G. Clay, Mr. Jesse M. Alverson, Mr. Thomas P. Bell, Mrs. Rexford S. Blazer, former Governor A. B. Chandler, Mr. Richard E. Cooper, Mr. George W. Griffin, Mrs. Robert O. Clark, Mr. Eugene Goss, Dr. N. N. Nicholas, Mr. James H. Pence, Mr. Floyd H. Wright; nonvoting faculty members, Professor Paul Oberst and Professor Paul Sears; and non-voting student member, Mr. Scott Wendelsdorf. Absent from the meeting were: Governor Wendell Ford, Mr. Wendell P. Butler, and Mr. J. Robert Miller. Members of the administration present were: President Otis A. Singletary, Vice Presidents Alvin L. Morris, Lewis Cochran, A. D. Albright, Stanley Wall, Robert Zumwinkle, Peter P. Bosomworth, and L. E. Forgy; Dr. Donald B. Clapp, Director of Budget; and Mr. John C. Darsie, Legal Counsel; and Mr. Jack Hall, Dean of Students. Representatives of the various news media were also in attendance.

A. Meeting Opened

Mr. Clay as Vice Chairman called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m. The invocation was pronounced by Mr. Clay. The Secretary reported a quorum present, and the meeting was declared officially open for the conduct of business at 2:03 p.m.

B. Minutes Approved

On motion by Mr. Bell, seconded by Mrs. Blazer, and passed, the reading of the Minutes for the November 15, 1971 meeting of the Board of Trustees was dispensed with and the Minutes were approved as published.

C. Tribute Paid to Albert Dennis Kirwan

Mr. Clay asked those present at the meeting to stand for a moment of silent prayer in memory of Dr. A. D. Kirwan, seventh President of the University of Kentucky, who died on November 30, 1971, following which Mr. Pence read a memorial tribute to Dr. Kirwan. On motion duly made, seconded, and carried, it was ordered that the tribute be spread upon the Minutes of the meeting and copies sent to President Kirwan's family. A copy of the tribute is appended at the end of the Minutes.

D. Announcement Relative to Senate Reception

President Singletary reminded the members of the Board that the annual reception in honor of the Board of Trustees which is hosted by the University Senate was scheduled from 4:00 to 8:00 o'clock, following the meeting and urged as many members of the Board to attend as could do so.

E. President's Report to the Trustees

President Singletary called attention to his monthly report on University activities since the last meeting of the Board of Trustees. The report was accepted with thanks and ordered filed.

F. Recommendations of the President (PR 2)

The items in PR 2 being routine in nature and there being no questions, on motion duly made, seconded, and carried, PR 2, Recommendations of the President, was approved as a whole and ordered made an official part of the Minutes of the meeting. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

G. Supplemental Recommendations of the President (PR 3)

President Singletary explained that the recommendations in PR 3 would permit early payment of the supplemental compensation under the Physicians' Service Plan already approved by the Board of Trustees and recommended approval. Without discussion, on motion by Governor Chandler, seconded, and passed, it was so ordered. (See PR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

H. Resolution Authorizing, Ratifying and Approving All Action Taken by the Board at the November 15, 1971, Meeting with Reference to the Plan of Financing a New Stadium, Parking Areas to be Used in Connection Therewith and Other Necessary Appurtenances

Mr. Darsie explained that bond counsel had suggested that all of the action taken by the Board at the meeting on November 15, 1971, with reference to financing a new stadium, parking areas to be used in connection therewith and other necessary appurtenances be authorized, ratified and approved at a statutory regular meeting of the Board. Thereupon, Mr. Alverson introduced, caused to be read and moved the immediate adoption of a resolution entitled:

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING, RATIFYING AND APPROVING ALL ACTION TAKEN BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY AT THE MEETING ON NOVEMBER 15, 1971, WITH REFERENCE TO FINANCING A NEW STADIUM, PARKING AREAS TO BE USED IN CONNECTION THEREWITH AND OTHER NECESSARY APPURTENANCES.

a true copy of which was presented to the meeting at which such resolution was proposed and a true copy of which is attached to these Minutes. The motion for the adoption of such resolution was seconded by Mrs. Blazer. After full discussion the Vice Chairman put the question, and upon call of the roll, the vote was recorded as follows:

Voting "Aye": Mr. Clay, Mr. Alverson, Mr. Bell, Mrs. Blazer, Mr. Chandler, Mr. Cooper, Mr. Griffin, Mrs. Clark, Mr. Goss, Dr. Nicholas, Mr. Pence, and Mr. Wright.

Voting "Nay": None.

I. Budget Revisions for 1971-72 (PR 4)

There being no questions relative to budget revisions for 1971-72 as recommended in PR 4, on motion made, seconded, and passed, PR 4 was approved. (See PR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

J. Changes in Organization of Biological Sciences (PR 5)

Following a brief discussion of the reasons for the recommended changes in the organization of Biological Sciences, on motion by Dr. Nicholas, seconded by Mrs. Clark, and passed, the recommendation in PR 5 was approved. (See PR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

K. Proposed Amendments of the Governing Regulations (PR 6)

President Singletary explained that it was necessary for any amendment to the Governing Regulations to lie upon the table for a month prior to adoption. He, therefore, recommended that the proposed changes to the Governing Regulations presented in PR 6 be accepted for study and action at the next meeting of the Board. On motion, and second, with all members assenting, the proposed amendments were received for consideration and action at the next meeting. (See PR 6 at the end of the Minutes.)

L. Resolution Committee Appointed

Mr. Clay appointed Mr. Richard E. Cooper, Professor Paul Sears and Mrs. Robert O. Clark as a committee to draft resolutions for Governor Nunn and those members of the Board whose terms expire on December 31, 1971.

M. Interim Financial Report (FCR 1)

On motion by Mr. Griffin, seconded by Mrs. Blazer, and passed, the

interim financial report for the period ending October 31, 1971 was received and ordered made a matter of record. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

N. Audit Reports Accepted (FCR 2)

Having had an opportunity to examine the financial statements submitted by the firm of Peat, Marwick, Mitchell and Company covering the affiliated corporations of the University and there being no questions, on motion by Mr. Griffin, seconded, and passed, the financial statements of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation, University of Kentucky Athletic Association, and The Fund for Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center were accepted. (See FCR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

O. Acquisition of Property Through Condemnation Proceedings Approved (FCR 3)

After a brief explanation by Mr. Forgy of the reasons why it was necessary for the University to exercise its right of eminent domain in connection with acquisition of real property owned by the Borden Company, on motion by Mr. Alverson, seconded by Mrs. Blazer, and passed without dissent, the President was authorized to proceed with the necessary steps to acquire the aforementioned property at fair market value. (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

P. Sale of Property (FCR 4)

Mr. Forgy explained that certain property owned by the University in Muhlenberg County was no longer necessary for the purposes of the University. Without discussion, on motion and second, the recommendation in FCR 4 relative to the Muhlenberg County property was approved. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

Q. Adjustment of Room and Board Rates (FCR 5)

Noting that the proposed increase of approximately 4.3 percent in room and board rates was necessitated by increased costs, Mr. Forgy recommended approval of FCR 5. On motion by Governor Chandler, seconded by Dr. Nicholas, and passed without dissent, the recommended adjustment in room and board rates was approved to become effective on the dates recommended in FCR 5. (See FCR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

R. Proposed Amendment to Student Code

Mr. Wendelsdorf withdrew his proposed amendment to the Student Code in compliance to the Board's wish that it be referred to the Student Code Revision

Committee for consideration, along with other suggested changes in the Student Code.

S. Independent Status of Kernel Noted

President Singletary introduced Mike Wines, Editor of the Kernel, who distributed copies of the final edition of the Kernel as a campus newspaper. The Kernel has incorporated independently and separately and future issues will be published off campus.

Governor Chandler commended the "new look" of the Kernel and gave Mr. Wines credit for its improvement. He also took the opportunity to commend Scott Wendelsdorf for his cooperative attitude as the non-voting student member of the Board of Trustees.

T. Meeting Adjourned

There being no further business to come before the meeting on motion duly made, seconded and carried, the meeting adjourned at 2:32 p.m.

In Memoriam

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky notes with deep sorrow the death of

ALBERT DENNIS KIRWAN

seventh president of the University of Kentucky, on Tuesday, November 30, 1971.

As each individual is diminished by another's death, so an institution is diminished by the death of one of its members. When that individual is a person of Dr. Kirwan's stature, the diminishment is painfully apparent. Others will teach his classes and carry on his research but no one will ever replace him for he was unique and few men possess all those traits of character which set him apart from and a little above his fellowman.

A scholar and a gentleman in the truest meaning of those words, Dr. Kirwan followed well the precept that "we are here to add what we can to life, not to get what we can from it". He gave generously of himself at all times and the Board of Trustees recognizes the personal sacrifices which he made when he assumed the presidency of the University of Kentucky in 1968 at the Board's request. He filled an urgent need at that time and, to quote him, he "held the fort" well.

Rochefoucauld could have been describing President Kirwan when he wrote, "It is only persons of firmness that can have real gentleness". Ab Kirwan was a kind and gentle man yet a man of strong convictions and quiet courage. He accepted his own physical frailty without complaint and never used it as a means of shunning responsibility.

A man with a wry sense of humor and a raconteur par excellence, President Kirwan drew people to him from every walk of life. He was respected and esteemed by all segments of the University community and his absence from this institution he loved so well and to which he gave so much will be keenly felt by all those whose lives he touched.

Modest and unassuming, Ab Kirwan always deprecated the importance of his many roles at the University but the long shadow which he cast will linger always to remind those he has left behind that a great man lived and worked here.

Therefore, in recognition of the great debt which this institution owes to a beloved man, the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky meeting in statutory session on Tuesday, December 14, 1971 orders that this memorial to Dr. Kirwan be spread upon the Minutes of the meeting and copies thereof sent to Dr. Kirwan's family.

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PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES

December 14, 1971

1. HONORS PROGRAM, IN 12TH YEAR, HAS 398 STUDENTS

The Honors Program is in its 12th year, and its administrators feel that a 1959 mandate from the Board of Trustees, "to provide the best possible training for highly talented young people," has been successful. Beginning as a pilot program in 1960 with approximately 40 freshmen, 398 students presently are in the program; although 75 per cent have better than a 3.0 grade average, and half of those are above 3.5, they must fill certain requirements beyond securing a high grade point standing. Most important is participation in independent work. For example, one chemistry student is engaged in a research project at Argonne Laboratory in Chicago. Another, in music, has composed a "substantial mass." An architectural student has built a house. They are in nine different colleges, and the history of the program reflects its University-wide coverage. The first director was from the College of Agriculture, his successor from engineering. The present director is Dr. R. O. Evans, professor of English. A major success of the program has been its attraction to good students to attend the University. Operating on the principle that all Honors students should perform well, the program's administrators have never been disappointed. Students almost are never dismissed because of poor grade performance. What mortality exists has been because of marriage, or the student has transferred to another institu-Some have dropped out because their interests developed in different directions. The majority of Honors students enter graduate or professional schools. At the present, a husband and wife, both Honors students, are graduating from Harvard with a Ph.D and a degree in law. All students who have stayed in the pre-medical course have been accepted by medical schools, and none have graduated below the middle of their classes.

2. PERSONNEL CONDUCTS TRAINING SESSIONS FOR NEW SECRETARIES

All new secretaries at the University now participate in a secretarial training program, conducted by the Personnel office and consisting of ten two-hour sessions. The program, according to its director, Martin D. May, is designed to outline procedures "unique to an institution of this kind." He said the training sessions stress courtesy and telephone practices. There are information sessions on the library, the research foundation, public relations and data processing. Sessions are held twice a week, for five weeks, in the White Hall Classroom Building. May said an effort also is made to conduct training sessions for older secretaries, "to bring them up to date on procedure changes." Often, he said, outside specialists are brought in to conduct sessions on the operation of new equipment. He said "our emphasis is on telephone and business machine techniques, and proper attitudes."

3. ROMANIAN AMBASSADOR VISITS UNIVERSITY

The Romanian ambassador to the U.S., Corneliu Bogdan, spent three days here last month as guest of the University. Highlight of his visit was a public lecture on November 30, discussing "Romania in the Concert of Nations." The invitation originated in a class that is quite knowledgeable about Romania: College of Arts and Sciences 300, which was set up to offer courses relevant to students' interests and crosses academic disciplines. A current series is called "East European Nations in Profile." Dr. Joseph A, Kessler of the history department is in charge of the course, together with Dr. Michael Impey, instructor in Italian who specializes in Romanian literature, since both Romanian and Italian are Romance languages. Dr. Impey also offers a full-year course in the Romanian language, the first at the University. In-depth lectures are being presented in the course by Dr. Ernest Yanarella of the political science department, Dr. Curtis E. Harvey of the College of Business and Economics, Dr. Walter Abbott of the sociology department, and Miss Linda Mikel of the geography department. Guest lecturers have included a Greek Orthodox priest in Lexington who lived in Romania until 1950, and a top Romanian economist who spoke on Romania's planned economy. Mr. Bogdan spoke to the class.

4. BERRY DELIVERS ANNUAL DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR LECTURE

Wendell E. Berry, distinguished professor of the College of Arts and Sciences, presented the annual Distinguished Professor of the Year lecture on November 17 in Memorial Hall. Title of Prof. Berry's address was "Discipline and Hope: Some Notes Toward a Definition of a New Middle." He was elected by his fellow faculty members in the college last winter and as recipient of the award was released from his duties during the Spring semester. He is the 27th winner of the coveted award, established in 1944 as a means of recognizing academic achievement. In his address, he said: "The only life we may hope to live is here. It seems likely that if we are to reach the earthly paradise at all, we will reach it only when we have ceased to strive and hurry so to get there. There is no 'there.' We can only wait here where we are, in the world, obedient to its processes, patient in its taking away, faithful to its returns. And as much as we may know, and all that we deserve, of earthly paradise will come to us."

5. DEBATE TEAMS WINNING AWARDS

University debate teams won six awards at the University of South Carolina Debate Tournament at Columbia. Dr. J. W. Patterson, director of forensics and debate coach, said the teams took first place in the Junior Varsity Division, with a two-man team composed of Jim Flegle, Bardwell, and Carl Merchant, Barbourville. Flegle also received the top speaker award and Merchant the second-place speaker award in the division; second place in the Varsity Division was a team composed of Carl Brown and Jeff Langford, both of Louisville. Brown received the second place trophy and Langford the eighth place speaker trophy in that division. Dr. Patterson said the tournament director told him the University teams had the top record in the tournament, although no trophy was given.

6. GEOGRAPHERS HAVE SUCCESSFUL MEETING

Dr. P. P. Karan, Department of Geography chairman ϵ reports a successful district meeting held in Lexington, and hosted by the department. The geographers-members of the Association of American Geographers Southeast Division -- read numerous papers at the convention held November 22-23, and prior to the meetings they were taken on an all-day tour of the Blue Grass, at which time they visited rural Negro hamlets, studied pollution problems, urbanization of the horse farms, and new industrial locations. The tour was arranged for the geographers by Prof. Karl Raitz of the geography department. The Fayette County Geographical Society, in collaboration with the geography department, published an 84-page tour guide of the Blue Grass for the visiting geographers. The convention dealt with a wide range of matters, such as drought perception, plantation agriculture, urban gardening, Black community, air pollution and respiratory deaths, highway environmental impact, analysis of work trips, models of inter-city automobile travel, political participation in Latin America, origin and diffusion of the parking meter, log houses in Mexico, geography of human hair, and a political geography of the U.S. in the year 2,000.

7. SERVICE TO SMALL BUSINESS EXPANDED

A former advertising executive and business manager has been named by the Office of Business Development and Government Services to assist small business firms in 18 Kentucky counties. James M. Miller, Danville, has been assigned to help businessmen in Bell, Harlan, Knox, Laurel, Whitley, Clay, Jackson, Rockcastle, Casey, Green, Taylor, Adair, Russell, Pulaski, Cumberland, Clinton, Wayne and McCreary counties. The appointee formerly was president of Beaumont Inn Foods, Inc., Harrodsburg, vice president of Staples Advertising Co., Louisville, advertising manager of Federal Chemical Corp., Louisville, and assistant manager of the industrial department of Peaslee-Gaulbert Corp., also of Louisville. He is a graduate of Northwestern University, with a degree in economics, and has completed additional work in management development at the University of Louisville. Consultation is available to small business firms without charge on quality control, engineering, management controls, finances, taxes and other specialized fields of management. Where extended study is required and agreed upon, the businessman will be advised of any charge before the work is undertaken.

8. ADVISORS VISIT PHYSICS DEPARTMENT

An advisory council, whose members represent various industrial organizations, visited the Department of Physics on November 12. Dr. Ben Gossick, department chairman, said the council toured the facilities, met with students and faculty, and were briefed on curriculum and research. After returning home, the advisors will prepare recommendations on how the department might improve to keep in step with the needs of industrial firms that hire physicists, Dr. Gossick said.

9. NEMATODES COMMITTEE TO MEET HERE

The Southern Regional Technical Committee S-76, Plant Parasitic Nematodes, is holding its annual meeting at the College of Agriculture December 13-15. The Department of Plant Pathology is host. The committee is composed of representatives from 13 southern states. They all are plant nematologists working in their respective states on nematode diseases of plants. The S-76 committee currently is concerned with the depredations of a family of nematodes that is widespread throughout the region. The two major members of this family, root-knot and cyst nematodes, account for a large share of the crop damage incited by nematodes. Virtually every important plant growing in the Southern region is attacked by species of one or both groups.

10. VOLUNTEERS GIVEN CREDIT FOR FIELD SERVICE

The University has been selected as one of 31 schools to initiate a federally-funded, volunteer program in which the students will receive academic credit for work in rural or urban poverty areas. program will begin in January. Selected students will do field work in anti-poverty settings for a year and will be given college credit for their two semesters of volunteer service. The "field workers" also will receive a small salary for their services, which will be appropriated by the federal government. Final plans must be submitted to Washington by mid-December, at which time choice of work areas and student volunteers will be reviewed. If the final plan is satisfactory, the participating students will be trained for specific volunteer tasks. Acting as director of the program is Dr. John Stephenson, dean of undergraduate studies. Stephenson commented on the interest already shown by students, noting that over 300 have inquired about the 60 available openings. "It's the greatest thing which has happened to the University," he said. The goals of the program are to show some measurable impact on poverty areas. He added that if the prescribed goals are reached this year the program "will undoubtedly continue. This will bring expansion and be a real service to povertystricken areas of the U.S."

11. DENTAL STUDENTS, STAFF WORK IN ISRAEL

During the past five summers, students and faculty members from the Department of Pedodontics have treated over 1,000 children in Wolfe county and this summer two professors and two dental students got a rare educational opportunity, a chance to learn and render dental services to children in Israel. Dr. John Mink, chairman of the department, noted the similarity of the two areas, pointing out that problems of the Israeli children treated, like those of some of the children in Wolfe county, were "typical of any child in the U.S. living in a non-fluoride area." Accompanying Dr. Mink to Israel were Dr. Robert Spedding, associate professor of pedodontics, Darrel Sheets, Anchorage, and Munro Steckler, Cincinnati, both third-year students. They worked with some 60 to 70 dentists, dental students and volunteers from across the U.S. Dr. Mink explains that the main purpose of the project, as with the Wolfe county program, was "to take dentistry to children in those areas where there wasn't adequate dental care."

12. PHARMACY IS TRAINING 'SOCIOPHARMACISTS'

The College of Pharmacy is turning out graduates experienced in sociopharmacy--the ability to function as professionals in comprehensive, community health care and the new curriculum rapidly is becoming a model for pharmacy schools in the nation, largely because it bridges the gap between academic training and professional practice in real life settings. Students are being exposed to hospital bed patients, outpatients, patients in nursing homes, and their physicians, nurses and dentists. The faculties of several other schools have visited Lexington during the past year to learn more about the operation. Dean Joseph V. Swintosky and other faculty members describe in recent pharmaceutical publications how a patient-oriented attitude is being developed in senior students during the clerkship training. In 1969, the clerkship course became a requirement for all students in their third year. Explaining the new curriculum, Dr. Swintosky said, "This higher attainment requires a better understanding of sickness and disease, of the machinery of the human body, of what is needed to make it function and what can happen to make it malfunction."

13. ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT SURVEYING TRAFFIC PATTERNS

A travel study, currently underway in the Department of Civil Engineering, seeks to identify travel patterns of spectators to football games. Such knowledge is essential in estimating future travel to and from the new football stadium. The researchers hope to identify and evaluate various methods for accommodating pedestrian and vehicular traffic at the new stadium. Most of the data was gathered during the Virginia Tech homecoming game on October 30. Each spectator was asked, by means of a self-administered questionnaire, to identify the origin and destination of his trips to and from the game and to state his primary means of travel. A second questionnaire was distributed to a sample of about 1500 spectators. Its primary purpose was to gather data on parking, walking distances, and travel times for trips away from the game. This questionnaire was to be returned by mail.

14. UNIVERSITY EMPLOYEES TOP UW GOAL

Employees of the University exceeded the University's goal of \$55,000 in the United Way campaign by more than \$1,000, Ernest F. Witte, chairman of the campus drive, announced. The amount assigned the University represented a six per cent increase over an amount attained in the previous campaign. To date, Dr. Witte said, pledges turned in amount to \$55,113.09, with some areas reporting but not tabulated. When these are counted, he added, "we will have gifts totaling \$56,000 or more from over 2,139 individual contributors." Dr. Witte said that "although this is not a large goal for an organization of this size, it is a significant achievement since the University is one of a very few units to reach its 1972 goal as yet." He said the "mop-up" would continue and he hopes to turn in a final report in the next few weeks.

15. ACTIVITIES IN COMMUNITY COLLEGES

A follow-up study at Ashland Community College has revealed that since1963, a number of students have entered health-related professional schools: medicine, 23; dentistry, eight; pharmacy, 23; and physical therapy, two. Four of six students who have gone directly into the College of Dentistry from a two-year institution have come from Ashland.

Hopkinsville Community College is meeting the problems of a shortage of high school level athletic officials by offering a class in sports officiating. The teacher, Eldridge Rogers, says the course is divided according to the different seasons: football, basketball, and baseball. One of the requirements of the course is that students make an application to the Kentucky High School Athletic Association to become registered as officials.

Community use of the facilities at Hazard is increasing rapidly. During the first four months of the academic year, more than 2,200 people representing 14 separate groups have utilized the facilities.

A Speaker's Bureau has been established at Henderson, involving administrators, faculty, and students. The Bureau provides speakers at no cost to interested groups in the community. Topics generally deal with contemporary issues, fields in which faculty members are teaching, and points of view presented by the students. Six speaking engagements were filled during November, and four engagements are scheduled for December.

16. RESEARCH TO PROBE FUNGUS-CAUSED DISEASES

The new mycology building, located on the Poultry Farm on Viley Road, has been completed. The structure is regarded as a step forward in the battle for control of a new order of fungus-caused diseases, the most important of which is histoplasmosis. Research being conducted in the new facility is under the direction of Dr. Michael L. Furcolow, professor of epidemiology. Dr. Furcolow has devoted more than 25 years to the study of histoplasmosis and is regarded as one of the nation's leading authorities on pinpointing its source. Histoplasmosis is referred to as "the great masquerader" because it is one of the most mysterious but most common infections known in the country. It mimics other diseases; it fools the X-rays; few diseases have been mislabeled as often. Histoplasmosis most often is mistaken for tuberculosis, but also has been thought to be lung cancer, influenza, virus pneumonia and even leukemia. The disease is caused by a type of fungus that closely resembles bread mold. The excreta of chickens, birds and bats contain a fertilizing substance that stimulates the growth of the fungus, enabling it to survive in the soil. Pigeon and starling droppings around trees of old courthouses are a good example of ideal conditions.

17. UKRF GRANTS SINCE JULY IS \$75 MILLION

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AN APPLICATION TO BE MADE TO THE STATE PROPERTY AND BUILDINGS COMMISSION OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY FOR SUCH COMMIS-SION TO AUTHORIZE, ISSUE, SELL AND DELIVER \$9,000,000 OF ITS REVENUE BONDS AND IN ANTICIPATION THEREOF TO AUTHORIZE, ISSUE, SELL AND DELIVER \$9,000,000 OF NOTES, ALL IN ACCORDANCE WITH A RESOLUTION ALREADY ADOPTED BY SUCH COMMISSION ON NOVEMBER 11, 1971, AP-PROVING THE TERMS OF SUCH RESOLUTION OF SUCH COM-MISSION, AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF A LEASE OF THE PROPERTIES BEING FINANCED BY THE PROVISIONS OF SUCH RESOLUTION, AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF AN AGREE-MENT WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF A DEED BY THE BOARD TO SUCH COMMISSION OF THE PROPERTIES CONSTITUTING THE PROJECT WHICH WILL BE FINANCED BY THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH BONDS AND NOTES.

That in anticipation of the issuance of such bonds the application of the Board to the Commission to authorize, issue, sell and deliver Notes in anticipation of the issuance of such bonds is authorized, ratified and approved. That the resolution heretofore adopted by the Commission on November 11, 1971, with reference to the foregoing is hereby authorized, ratified and approved.

Section 3. That the previous actions of the Board authorizing the Chairman or Vice Chairman and the Secretary to execute the Lease referred to in the resolution adopted on November 15, 1971, the deed referred to in such resolution and the agreement between the Board and the University of Kentucky Athletic Association are hereby ratified and approved, or said deed may be executed only by the Vice President - Business Affairs and Treasurer.

Section 4. That the action of the Board in furnishing the Commission with a certified copy of such resolution adopted on November 15, 1971, as an application of the Board to the Commission for action to be taken as requested in the resolution of the Board is hereby authorized, ratified and approved.

Section 5. That this resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

CHANGES IN ORGANIZATION OF BIOLOGICAL SCIENCES

Recommendations: (1) that the action of the Board of Trustees on May 4, 1966 establishing parallel, but never activated, departments of Biochemistry, Cell Biology, and Physiology and Biophysics in the College of Arts and Sciences be rescinded; (2) that approval be given for withdrawing the policy statement of February 13, 1967 from the Office of the President concerning the organization of biological sciences in the University; (3) that the Departments of Botany, Microbiology, and Zoology be dissolved and that the Thomas Hunt Morgan School of Biological Sciences be designated as the basic educational unit for the personnel, courses, and programs from these three departments; and (4) that the role and scope of the Thomas Hunt Morgan School of Biological Sciences be redefined such that the school shall have the responsibility for courses and programs appropriate for general studies and also for undergraduate and graduate courses and programs in biology in the College of Arts and Sciences.

Background: After five years under the present organizational structure, it has been determined that the role and scope of the Thomas Hunt Morgan School of Biological Sciences should be redefined in terms of the changes recommended above. These recommended changes have the approval of the faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences, the University Senate, and the University Administration and are forwarded to the Board of Trustees for final approval.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO GOVERNING REGULATIONS

Recommendation: that the Board of Trustees accept for consideration and action at the next meeting the amendments to the Governing Regulations of the University of Kentucky (September 1971) as proposed on the following pages.

Background: The Governing Regulations require that amendments be received for study and consideration one month prior to action. The amendments which are proposed are concerned with the following:

- (1) Clarification of X-C-7 as it applies to political activities of faculty members,
- (2) Incorporation of changes pertaining to the Community College System programs and organization, and
- (3) Amplification of Part XII-A relative to equal employment opportunities.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS, PART X, C, 7

Change third literal paragraph to read:

"Like other citizens, faculty members are free to engage in political activities so far as they are able to do so within the law consistently with their obligations as teachers and scholars. When necessary, leaves of absence without pay may be given for the duration of an election campaign or a term of office provided that there has been timely application for leave, and that the requested leave is limited to a reasonable period of time. A faculty member shall not under any circumstances become a candidate in any party primary election, or enter any election as the nominee of any political party, nor enter any election campaign for any statewide or federal office without either severing his connection with the University or making application for a leave of absence without pay as provided herein. The terms of a leave of absence for this purpose shall be set forth in writing. The leave shall not affect unfavorably the tenure status of a faculty member except that the time spent on such leave from academic duties will not count as probationary service unless otherwise agreed to."

Change to read:

B. Community College Advisory Boards

The community college advisory boards advise on matters of the two-year professional-technical programs and local community educational needs. The statute under which these advisory boards were established follows:

164.600 ADVISORY BOARD; MEMBERSHIP; EXPENSES.

- (1) There shall be a local advisory board for each community college. Each local advisory board shall serve in an advisory capacity to the board and the head of the community college on the operation of the community college.
- (2) Each local advisory board shall consist of nine members, seven of whom shall be appointed by the Governor. The other two local advisory board members shall be one non-voting member of the teaching faculty and one non-voting member of the student body. An appointed member's term is four years; however, when appointing the initial members of the local advisory boards, the Governor may appoint some members for terms of less than four years.
- (3) The faculty member shall be on the teaching or research faculty of the community college. He shall be elected by secret ballot of all full-time faculty members of the community college. Faculty members shall serve for terms of three years and until their successors are elected and qualified. Faculty members shall be eligible for re-election, but they shall be ineligible to continue to serve as members of the local advisory boards if they cease to be members of the teaching staff of the community college. Elections to fill vacancies shall be for the unexpired term in the same manner as provided for original election.
- (4) The student member shall be the president of the student body of the community college. If the president of the student body is not a full-time student who maintains permanent residency in the Commonwealth of Kentucky, a special election shall be held to select a full-time student who does maintain permanent residency in this Commonwealth as the student member.
- (5) Local advisory board members shall receive no compensation for their services, but shall be paid for their actual and necessary expenses. (1970, c. 140, § 1)

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS, PART V

Revise Part V to read as follows:

PART V

SENATE OF THE COMMUNITY COLLEGE SYSTEM

The Senate of the Community College System shall be composed of elected, ex officio and appointed members.

The elected faculty membership shall consist of and represent proportionately the full-time faculty in the various community colleges and technical institutes, except that no college or technical institute shall have fewer than three senators. In addition each community college and technical institute shall elect an additional senator for each twenty-five (or major fraction thereof) full-time faculty members above the first twenty-five. At least one of the three senators must have responsibility in the occupational program area and at least one must have responsibility in the general education area, except for the senators from a technical institute. The faculty of each community college and technical institute shall nominate candidates for senator(s) and elect the senator(s) by secret ballot during the month of April preceding the term of office beginning on August 15. The term of office for an elected senator shall be two years and he shall be eligible for reelection, except that he may not serve more than two consecutive terms After serving two terms, an elected senator shall be ineligible for election or appointment to the Senate for a period of one year.

The ex officio membership shall include the Vice President for the Community College System, the Assistant Vice President for the Community College System, the chairman of each advisory committee to the Senate, and the president of the student body at each community college and technical institute. The term of office for a student member shall be one year. An advisory committee chairman's term as senator shall be conterminous with his term as chairman of the committee. Ex officio members shall enjoy all the privileges of the elected membership.

The appointed membership shall consist of three community college or technical institute directors and three other administrators, each of whom shall be appointed by the Vice President for the Community College System. In addition any member of the Community College Council appointed by the Vice President for the Community College System to correct an imbalance in the elected senators in terms of professional areas of specialization shall be a member of the Senate. The term of office for an appointed senator shall be the same as the term for an elected senator. Appointed members shall enjoy all the privileges of the elected membership.

In order that there be a continuity of membership, the present members of the Community College Council shall serve as senators until the expiration of their current terms. The Vice President for the Community College System shall establish a procedure for initially electing or appointing some senators for other than two-year terms so that the terms of approximately one-half of the senators will expire during each succeeding year.

A vacancy in an unexpired term on the Senate shall be filled in a manner consistent with the original selection process applicable to that member's category. Service of one year or more in an unexpired term shall constitute a full term.

Consistent with these regulations, the Senate of the Community College System is authorized to develop regulations for the conduct of its functions, which shall be known as the Rules of the Senate of the Community College System. Copies of these regulations shall be furnished the President and the Board of Trustees. It may perform its functions directly; through the Community College Council; or through standing, special, or advisory committees which it may appoint or authorize for appointment. The Vice President for the Community College System shall appoint the members of standing committees from the eligible members of the Senate; i.e., those not also serving on the Community College Council. The advisory committees to the Senate of the Community College System (other than the Committee on Privilege and Tenure) shall be appointed by the co-chairmen of the Community College Council.

The Community College Council shall be composed of one duly elected senator from each college or technical institute to serve a two-year term; two students elected by and from the student senators to serve a one-year term; one director designated by and from the directors who have been appointed to the Senate, for a one-year term; the Vice President for the Community College System and the Assistant Vice President for the Community College System, who shall serve as ex officio members; and the chairmen of the standing committees, who shall serve as ex officio members. All Council members must be taken from the membership of the Senate. A Council member's term may not exceed his term as a senator. In the event there is an imbalance in the duly elected senators in terms of professional area of specialization, the Vice President for the Community College System is authorized to appoint a maximum of three additional faculty members to the Community College Council, who shall become members of the Senate.

The Vice President for the Community College System and a person elected from and by the membership of the Community College Council shall serve as co-chairmen of the Community College Council.

The Vice President for the Community College System shall be chairman of the Senate of the Community College System. He shall serve as presiding officer for all meetings except as he may delegate this function.

The Senate shall meet annually in regular session at a time and place designated in a call by the Vice President for the Community College System. Special sessions may be called by the President, by the Vice President for the Community College System, or by a petition from at least fifteen (15) senators to the Vice President for the Community College System.

Full-time and part-time faculty, advisory board members, Community College System staff members, and the Community College System students may attend Senate and/or Council meetings and may request the privilege of the floor. They shall not have the right to vote.

The functions of the Senate of the Community College System shall include the following:

Approving academic policies and curricula for the Community College System

Approving courses and other academic offerings in the Community College System not offered in the University System

Approving policies and regulations governing admission, classification, probation, and dismissal of Community College System students

Approving an academic calendar generally consistent with the University System calendar

Recommending to the University Senate on courses offered in the Community College System which are also offered in the University System

Recommending to the Vice President for the Community College System on criteria for faculty appointments, reappointments, promotions, and tenure in the Community College System

Recommending to the President all candidates for degrees and certificates from the community colleges and technical institutes

Beyond those listed above, the Senate of the Community College System shall have no management or administrative functions either in itself or through the instrumentality of its committees.

The Senate of the Community College System may address the Vice President for the Community College System, through him the President of the University, and through the Vice President and the President, the Board of Trustees, respecting any matter of concern to the University.

Change:

"The basic educational units of the Community College System shall be the individual community colleges and the Lexington Technical Institute. The chief administrative officer of a community college shall be a director. Divisions or departments may be established in a college with the chief administrative officer being a chairman."

To Read:

"The basic organization of the educational units of the Community College System shall be divisions and colleges.

The unit of the Community College System for instruction and community service in related fields of learning is the division. The chief administrative officer of a division is a chairman.

The individual community colleges and the Lexington Technical Institute are the major educational units of the Community College System. The chief administrative officer of a community college or the Lexington Technical Institute is a director."

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS, PART VII, A, 2 Change to Read:

2. Academic Ranks

Academic ranks in the University System shall consist of instructor, assistant professor, associate professor and professor, and of other ranks that are fully or partially equivalent to these recognized ranks.

Academic ranks in the Community College System shall include Instructor in the Community College System, Assistant Professor in the Community College System, Associate Professor in the Community College System, and Professor in the Community College System, and other ranks that are fully or partially equivalent to these recognized ranks.

Ranks and special titles and a description of the qualifications for each shall be established by the President after consultation with appropriate administrative and faculty groups including the Senate Council and/or the Community College Council. Likewise, emeritus ranks for retired administrative and academic personnel and the rights of holders of emeritus titles shall be as established by the President after consultation with the Senate Council and/or the Community College Council. The establishment of new ranks and major changes in criteria for ranks shall have the approval of the Board of Trustees.

Change: Faculty Organization in the Community Colleges (Community College System)

The community college faculties shall be composed of all instructional, library and administrative personnel. Each community college faculty shall perform, under the leadership of its director or chairman, the usual academic and administrative functions necessary to the functioning of the college.

Each community college may organize itself as a Faculty Assembly for the purpose of performing the functions delegated to it by the Senate of the Community College System and for the purpose of making recommendations relating to any phase of the academic program of the college or of the Community College System and to the professional welfare of its members. It shall prepare a set of rules which shall describe its organization and procedures for the performance of its functions.

The rules must be consistent with the Rules of the Senate of the Community College System and with the Administrative Regulations, and must be adequate to allow the Assembly to perform all of the responsibilities delegated to it. The Rules of the Faculty Assembly of a community college should be submitted to the director of the college, the Community College Council and the Vice President for the Community College System for review before being made operational.

Representatives designated by the student body organization may be included in meetings of the faculty and the Faculty Assembly and may be members of appropriate administrative advisory committees or of faculty Assembly committees.

To Read: Faculty Organization in the Community College System

a. Faculty of Colleges

The faculty of a community college shall consist of all professional, instructional, library, and administrative personnel. An individual may have joint appointment to more than one faculty. In this instance, one assignment shall be designated by the Vice President for the Community College System as the primary one. The director of the college shall serve as chairman of the faculty.

The faculty shall hold regularly scheduled meetings. In addition, it shall meet in special session on the call of the President, the Vice President for the Community College System, the director of the college, or at the request of a prescribed number of its membership. Each college faculty shall establish the quorum for the transaction of business. Copies of minutes of college faculty meetings shall be made available to all members of the faculty of the college.

Within the limits established by the Governing Regulations and the Rules of the Senate of the Community College System, the faculty of a college shall determine the educational policies of that college. It shall make recommendations to the Senate of the Community College System on such matters as require the approval of that body and it may make recommendations on other matters to the Senate of the Community College System, to the Vice President for the Community College System, or to the President.

b. Faculty Assemblies

Each community college may organize itself as a Faculty Assembly for the purpose of making recommendations relating to any phase of the academic program of the college or of the Community College System and to the professional welfare of its members. It shall prepare a set of rules which shall describe its organization and procedures for the performance of its functions.

The rules must be consistent with these regulations, the Administrative Regulations and the Rules of the Senate of the Community College System, and must be adequate to allow the Assembly to perform its responsibilities. The Rules of the Faculty Assembly of a community college should be submitted to the director of the college, the Community College Council and the Vice President for the Community College System for review before being made operational.

c. Divisional Faculty

The faculty of a division shall consist of a chairman and the members of the division who are members of the faculty of the community college.

The divisional faculty has responsibility with the approval of the director, and the Vice President for the Community College System for the internal policies of the division, insofar as these policies do not conflict with those of other divisions or the Rules of the Senate of the Community College System. It should hold regularly scheduled meetings and is authorized to establish rules for procedure and a committee structure to deal with matters for which it has responsibility. It should establish with the division chairman and the director of the college procedures to be used within the division in advising on the appointment of new members of the division, promotions, reappointments, terminal appointments, decisions not to reappoint, postretirement appointments (X-C-8) and the granting of tenure, and the procedures to be used on the divisional level in its performance evaluations of division members and the preparation of budget requests.

The division chairman shall preside over all divisional faculty meetings, except as he may delegate this function, and shall be an ex officio member of all divisional committees. Copies of minutes of all divisional faculty meetings shall be made available to all members of the faculty of the division and the director of the college.

Change:

"Under the general direction of the Vice President for the Community College System, the director of a community college is charged with general responsibility for the overall administration of his particular college. Along with his faculty he is responsible for the development and implementation of an academic program commensurate with the purposes of a comprehensive community college. He is responsible for the quality of instruction in the college and shall utilize through the office of the Vice President for the Community College System the provisions for liaison with colleges and departments of the University System for advisory assistance and services relating to curricula, faculty and academic standards. He is further responsible for recruitment, initial screening and recommendation of candidates for instructional positions after consultation with the faculty of his college whenever feasible and the chief administrative officer of the appropriate educational unit of the University System.

With regard to the students, the director is charged with the duty of administering the requirements and regulations of the University concerning the admission, probation and dismissal of students.

The director is responsible for the business and financial operations of the college, either assumed or delegated, and for the maintenance and operation of the physical plant of the college."

To Read:

"The director of a community college is the chief administrative officer of his college. Under the general direction of the Vice President for the Community College System, the director is charged with general responsibility for the overall administration of his college. It is his function to see that these regulations, the Administrative Regulations, and the Rules of the Senate of the Community College System are enforced. He is the chairman of his college faculty and is an ex officio member of all college committees. Along with his faculty, he is responsible for the development and implementation of an instructional program commensurate with the purposes of a comprehensive community college. He is responsible for the curricula of his college, for the quality of instruction given therein, for the assignment of duties to all persons and for the service rendered by the faculty of his college individually and as a whole. He shall utilize through the office of the Vice President for the Community College System the provisions for liaison with colleges and departments of the University System for advisory assistance and services relating to the instructional program. He shall review and finalize the performance evaluations submitted by the division chairman or members of his college. He shall be responsible for recommendations on salaries, salary changes, appointments, reappointments, terminal appointments, decisions not to reappoint, post-retirement appointments (X - C - 8), promotions and granting of tenure for members of his college or for ultimate action whereon when such authority has been delegated to him by the Vice President for the Community College System or the President.

With regard to students, the director is charged with the duty of administering the requirements and regulations of the community college concerning the admission, probation and dismissal of students.

The director shall be responsible for the preparation of the budget request for his college and is responsible for the business and financial operation of the college either assumed or delegated and for the maintenance and operation of the physical plant of the college.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS, SECTION VII, B add:

9. Division Chairmen (Community College System)

The division chairman serves as chairman of the divisional faculty in the development by the division of policies in regard to such matters as the implementation and revision of programs and courses. He assists the director or his designate in the preparation of the class and teaching schedule for the division. He presides over all divisional meetings, except as he may delegate this function, and is an ex officio member of all divisional committees. He has administrative responsibility for implementing the division's program within the limits established by the regulations of the University, the Community College System, policies of the Senate of the Community College System and the rules and regulations of his community college.

The division chairman shall be responsible for advising the director or his designate on the appointment of new members of the division, promotions, reappointments, terminal appointments, decisions not to reappoint, post-retirement appointments and the granting of tenure, following consultation with the tenured and senior faculty of the division. Procedures and criteria used for such advice shall be those established by the University, the Community College System and by the community college and divisional faculties.

The divisional chairman shall be responsible for the periodic evaluation of members of the division by procedures and criteria established by the University, the Community College System and the community college and divisional faculties.

The divisional chairman shall be responsible for preparing for the Director or his designate the budget request for his division. He is responsible for advising the director or his designate as to salaries and salary changes for members of his division.

In connection with the major administrative functions of the division chairman, he must seek the advice of members of the division, individually or as a group, or of advisory committees that he may appoint.

The divisional chairman is the spokesman for the division. In the event that he feels it necessary to depart from the opinion of the division faculty, he must communicate the division opinion as well as his own, stating his reasons for differing from the division opinion and notifying the division of his action.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS, PART VIII, A, 1

Change: "The vice presidents, the Dean of the Graduate School, the deans of the colleges, the directors of the community colleges, the chairmen of the departments and every administrative officer of the University who is to report directly to the President or whose initial salary is in excess of \$15,000 per annum shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees, acting upon the recommendation of the President."...

To Read: "The vice presidents, the Dean of the Graduate School, the deans of the colleges, the directors of the community colleges, the chairmen of departments (University System), the chairmen of divisions (Community College System) and every administrative officer of the University who is to report directly to the President or whose initial salary is in excess of \$15,000 per annum shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees, acting upon the recommendation of the President."...

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS, PART VIII, A, 3

Add as 8th paragraph:

Search committees for chairmen of divisions in community colleges shall be appointed by the director of the college after consultation with tenured and senior members of the faculty.

Change last sentence, last paragraph, page 28, to read:

Recommendations on the appointment of chairmen of academic departments or divisions shall be accompanied by written statements from at least the tenured members of the department or division.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS, PART VIII, A, 4 add:

c. <u>Division Chairmen</u> (Community College System)

The term of a division chairman's appointment shall be three years and he normally shall serve for no more than two consecutive terms. Reappointment beyond the second term may occur under exceptional circumstances when it is deemed to be in the best interest of the community college and has been recommended by the faculty advisory committee appointed to review the work of the division (Part IX).

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS, PART IX

Change: "Includes departments, schools, institutes, interdisciplinary units, colleges, the Community College System and the individual community colleges."

To Read: "1 Includes departments, schools, institutes, interdisciplinary units, colleges, the Community College System, the individual community colleges and the Lexington Technical Institute, and divisions."

Change "academic departments" in line 3 to read "educational units".

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS, PART X, C, 3, a

Change:

During their annual employment period (either ten or twelve months), faculty and research staff members are expected to serve the University. It is assumed that all persons on the academic staff will be interested primarily in the work of their respective departments, giving their chief efforts to the promotion of that work.

A member of the University's academic staff shall be permitted to engage, as an expert, in professional work outside the University and to receive pay for his endeavors, provided that such does not interfere with the proper performance of University assignments. Each faculty member shall be expected to exercise sound judgment in requesting approval of outside assignments, keeping in mind with utmost care the matter of conflict of interest. In considering such requests, department chairmen and deans will be guided by criteria through which performance of duty within a faculty member's rank is judged, as well as by the relevant terms of employment.

In general, any outside assignment demanding more than purely spare-time effort must be substantially justified in terms of the contribution its performance can bring to the faculty member's pursuit of teaching, research and service.

All proposals to undertake outside assignments will be made in writing to department chairmen, whose recommendations shall be forwarded to the respective deans and thence to the appropriate vice president for final action. Such proposals shall indicate the nature of the work to be performed, the estimated amount of time involved, the duration of the assignment, and the scale of reimbursement. These proposals shall become a matter of record by the appropriate vice president who shall transmit quarterly to the President of the University full information about those that have received approval and those that have been denied. The President, in turn, will report periodically to the Board of Trustees.

To Read:

During their annual employment period (either ten or twelve months), faculty and research staff members are expected to serve the University. It is assumed that all persons on the academic staff will be interested primarily in the work of their respective education units, giving their chief efforts to the promotion of that work.

A member of the University's academic staff shall be permitted to engage, as an expert, in professional work outside the University and to receive pay for his endeavors, provided that such does not interfere with the proper performance of University assignments. Each faculty member shall be expected to exercise sound judgment in requesting approval of outside assignments, keeping in mind with utmost care the matter of conflict of interest. In considering such requests, the chief administrative officers of the educational units will be guided by criteria through which performance of duty within a faculty member's rank is judged, as well as by the relevant terms of employment.

In general, any outside assignment demanding more than purely spare-time effort must be substantially justified in terms of the contribution its performance can bring to the faculty member's pursuit of teaching, research and service.

All proposals to undertake outside assignments will be made in writing to the chairmen whose recommendations shall be forwarded to the respective deans or directors and thence to the appropriate vice president for final action. Such proposals shall indicate the nature of the work to be performed, the estimated amount of time involved, the duration of the assignment, and the scale of reimbursement. These proposals shall become a matter of record by the appropriate vice president who shall transmit quarterly to the President of the University full information about those that have received approval and those that have been denied. The President, in turn, will report periodically to the Board of Trustees.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS, PART XI, B

Change:

"The non-academic relationships between students and the University are covered in the document entitled, "Student Rights and Responsibilities.

Part I. Code of Student Conduct: Rules, Procedures, Rights and Responsibilities Governing Non-Academic Relationships", which has been adopted by the Board of Trustees and may be amended only by that body.

The academic relationships between students and the University are incorporated in the document entitled, "Student Rights and Responsibilities.

Part II. Selected Rules of the University Senate Governing Academic Relationships". The rules in Part II have been adopted and may be amended by the University Senate.

Copies of the document, "Student Rights and Responsibilities. Parts I and II", shall be made available to all students. Registration by the student constitutes acceptance of these student-University relationships. In no case, however, shall this preclude legitimate efforts to obtain amendments to this basic document covering these relationships."

To Read:

"The non-academic relationships between students and the University System are covered in the document entitled, "Student Rights and Responsibilities. Part I. Code of Student Conduct: Rules, Procedures, Rights and Responsibilities Governing Non-Academic Relationships", which has been adopted by the Board of Trustees and may be amended only by that body.

The academic relationships between students and the University System are incorporated in the document entitled, "Student Rights and Responsibilities. Part II. Selected Rules of the University Senate Governing Academic Relationships". The rules in Part II have been adopted and may be amended by the University Senate.

Copies of the document, "Student Rights and Responsibilities. Parts I and II", shall be made available to all students in the University System. Registration by the student constitutes acceptance of these student-University System relationships. In no case, however, shall this preclude legitimate efforts to obtain amendments to this basic document covering these relationships.

The non-academic relationships between students and the Community College System are covered in the document entitled, "Code of Student Conduct: Rules, Procedures, and Responsibilities", which has been adopted by the Board of Trustees and may be amended only by that body.

The academic relationships between students and the Community College System are defined in the Rules of the Senate of the Community College System (Section I, Student Academic Affairs). These rules have been adopted and may be amended by the Senate of the Community College System. Copies of the above documents shall be made available to all students in the Community College System. Registration by the student constitutes acceptance of these student-Community College System relationships. In no case, however, shall this preclude legitimate efforts to obtain amendments to these documents covering these relationships.

Maximum efforts should be made by administrative officers, student government organizations, the University Senate and the Senate of the Community College System to maintain liaison through advisory and coordinating committees concerning student-University relationships.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS, PART XII, G

Change:

"All members of the faculty and staff of the University shall have full rights of communication with administrative officers of the University and the Board of Trustees through established administrative channels. Official recommendations and communications from any member of the University faculty or staff shall be sent by him to his immediate superior, i.e., by a member of a department to the chairman thereof, by the chairman of a department to the chief administrative officer of his school or college, etc. The superior administrative officer shall, when so requested, transmit such recommendations or communications, with his own comments and recommendations thereon, to the next higher officer."

To Read:

"All members of the faculty and staff of the University shall have full rights of communication with administrative officers of the University and the Board of Trustees through established administrative channels. Official recommendations and communications from any member of the University faculty or staff shall be sent by him to his immediate superior. The superior administrative officer shall, when so requesed, transmit such recommendations or communications, with his own comments and recommendations thereon, to the next higher officer."

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE GOVERNING REGULATIONS, PART XII

Revise Part XII, A to read as follows:

A. Equal Opportunity

Equal opportunities shall be provided for all persons throughout the University in recruitment, appointment, promotion, payment, training and other employment practices without regard to race, ethnic origin, sex, color, creed, religion, age, or national origin.

The President is designated responsibility for the development of an affirmative action program by which full implementation of this policy can be effected in the University.

The purposes of this policy are to promote and assure fair and equitable treatment of all persons now employed, being considered for employment, or entering employment by the University; and to effect full compliance with existing statutes and orders including Executive Order 11375, the Equal Pay Act of 1963, Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and the Guidelines of the United States Department of Labor, Part 60-20 pursuant to Executive Order 11375.

AUTHORIZATION FOR SALE OF PROPERTY

Recommendation: (1) that the Board find, in accordance with the provisions of KRS 164.270 and KRS 45.360 (7), that the property of the University located in Muhlenberg County, Kentucky and more particularly described in the deeds recorded in Deed Book 85, Page 363, Deed Book 90, Page 218, and Deed Book 90, Page 219 in the Muhlenberg County Court Clerk's Office, is no longer necessary for the purpose of the University; (2) that the Board authorize and direct the President and other appropriate officials of the University to take the necessary actions and execute the necessary documents to dispose of the said property in accordance with the restrictions contained in the deeds conveying the property to the University and the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Background: This property, totaling approximately twenty one and one-half acres, has been used for field work by the Agricultural Experiment Station since 1912. Tightening budgetary conditions associated with high costs of labor and equipment have necessitated consolidation of the intensive studies into a centralized location at the Western Kentucky Station in Princeton and the conduct of diversified field trials in cooperation with private land owners. Accordingly, research at this location has been phased out.

I. Adjustment of Room and Board Rates--Undergraduate Residence Halls--Regular Semester

Recommendation: That the semester room and board rates be adjusted to \$537.00 for the three meal plan, to \$473.00 for the two meal plan of breakfast and dinner, and to \$501.00 for the two meal plan of breakfast or lunch and dinner effective the Fall Semester 1972.

The aforementioned rates are established subject to the condition that they are determined not to be in violation of the Phase II price guidelines as established by the Price Commission.

Background: The present room and board rate (\$515.00 for the three meal plan, \$458.00 for the breakfast and dinner plan, and \$488.00 for the breakfast or lunch and dinner plan) is insufficient to meet the higher operating costs and financial demands of the Housing and Dining System. The proposed adjustment results primarily from increased labor and food costs. These rates cover debt service, all operating costs, and funds for replacement of furniture and equipment.

The proviso concerning Phase II of the wage-price freeze was added at the suggestion of legal counsel, who advises that a Price Commission ruling should be obtained as to any increase in rates regardless of the amount thereof.

II. Adjustment of Room Rates--Undergraduate Residence Halls--Summer School

Recommendation: That the Summer School room rates be adjusted to \$135.00 for double occupancy and \$170.00 for single occupancy effective the 1972 summer session.

The aforementioned rates are established subject to the condition that they are determined not to be in violation of the Phase II price guidelines as established by the Price Commission.

Background: The present room rate is \$130.00 for double occupancy and \$165.00 for single occupancy. The summer rate is based upon the same weekly rate as the regular semester, with the single rate being 125% of the double occupancy rate. The calculation is based upon a 16 week semester and an eight week summer session.

The proviso concerning Phase II of the wage-price freeze was added at the suggestion of legal counsel, who advises that a Price Commission ruling should be obtained as to any increase in rates regardless of the amount thereof.

III. Adjustment of Room Rates -- Professional Building

Recommendation: That the semester single room rates for students residing in the professional building be adjusted to \$537.00 for the Fall Semester, 1972, and that the double occupancy room rates be adjusted to \$268.50.

The aforementioned rates are established subject to the condition that they are determined not to be in violation of the Phase II price guidelines as established by the Price Commission.

Background: The present room rate which is \$514.00 for single occupancy and \$257.00 for double occupancy has not been changed for the past two years. The new rate is the same as the new rate that will be charged for undergraduate room only.

AMENDMENT TO CODE OF STUDENT CONDUCT SECTION 3.316

<u>Proposal</u>: that section 3.316 of the Code of Student Conduct be amended. That section now reads:

The accused shall enjoy the right to have the assistance of an advisor of his choice and shall be informed of his right in all processes of the University Judicial System.

The motion is to amend this section so that after amendment it would read:

All students shall enjoy the right to have the assistance of an advisor of their choice in all processes of the University Judicial System and during any counseling, interrogation, or investigation by University personnel concerning or arising out of suspected violations of the Code of Student Conduct or federal, state, or local law. The student shall be informed of this right.

Background: Because of the ambiguities in the present wording of section 3.316, students are being denied their right to counsel during counseling, interrogations, and investigations concerning or arising out of suspected violations of the Code of Student Conduct. These are situations where students are asked to incriminate themselves, or in which they may incriminate themselves, and where the need for advice concerning the student's rights and obligations under the Code is just as acute as where the student has been formally charged. This amendment has been drafted to clarify section 3.316 and to more nearly reflect the Board's intention that any student involved in a suspected violation of the student code has the right to an advisor of his or her choice.
