

Minutes of the University Senate, May 3, 1967 (con't)

Dr. Lewis W. Cochran, Provost, announced to the Senate that the Board of Trustees, at its meeting of May 2, 1967, had established a Faculty Memorial Scholarship for the children of deceased full-time faculty members; that it will provide tuition and fees for all undergraduate students who might presently be in the University, for those presently below collegiate age, and for those who may be presently enrolled in another institution who are academically admissible and transfer to this institution. He stated that the President's Office had collected several names of such children and that it solicited the faculty's help in identifying children of deceased faculty.

He further reported that the Scholarship provided for enrichment through private gifts; that some monies have already been given; and that while gifts may not be designated for a particular family or child, they may be given as a memorial to a particular profession.

The Recording Secretary read to the Senate notes of appreciation from the families of Doctors Silvio O. Navarro and Richard S. Schweet, deceased.

President Oswald was warmly welcomed to the first meeting of the University Senate this year. He commented briefly on the status of three amendments to the Governing Regulations which were forwarded to the President and the Board of Trustees following the April 10, 1967 meeting of the University Senate.

The first of these related to the membership on the Board of Trustees of two non-voting members of the faculty who are elected for three-year terms. The amendment provided that in the event of a vacancy by reason of an administrative appointment, the Senate Council appoint that eligible faculty member who at the last election received the largest vote without being elected; and that if the replaced member becomes eligible to serve before the expiration of his term, he shall resume his seat. The President explained that this was not consonant with the Statutes of the State of Kentucky which require that to fill any vacancy on the Board of Trustees the same election procedures must be followed as in the case of the original appointment. Hence, on advice of the Senate Council, this was not presented to the Board of Trustees.

The second recommendation, that of filling unexpired vacancies in the University Senate, was presented to the Board of Trustees and approved at its meeting of August 17, 1967 for incorporation into the Governing Regulations.

The third recommendation was an amendment to permit only elected members of the University Senate and the three student members to vote. The President stated that rather than present a recommendation which only partly covered the whole question of the composition and makeup of the Senate, he had asked that the committee which he had appointed, at the direction of the Senate, to consider the entire matter of the membership of the Senate, also to consider the matter of voting.

President Oswald then presented the over-all philosophy and organizational proposal for University-wide extension in the University. He spoke of the three basic functions of a University--teaching, research, service--and the emphasis in the years ahead which will be placed on teaching and research versus service; that groups of our faculty or people within the University's responsibility are faced daily with an increasing demand for service of an applied nature and for service in the area of direct action; that the Agricultural Extension Service is being asked to fulfill varying kinds of service, many of which are very far from what may be considered strictly agricultural kinds of activity and the resources for which may not be in the College of Agriculture but perhaps rest in other colleges of the University; that to develop and prepare a maximum coordinated service to the people of the state the University has evolved an outline for an over-all extension program, anchored in the colleges where it belongs. This program will consist of an office whose principal responsibility will be the development of an extension program, drawing closely upon the research and other programs of the college. Within this office will be established, in a staff relationship, a University-wide extension officer whose responsibility will be the coordination of the various programs in the various colleges and the development of an over-all priority in relationship to the funds that will be available for extension, etc.

He reported that in relationship to the state the College of Agriculture had moved, in great part, from consideration of each county as a separate entity, to thinking in terms of grouping several counties together that have common problems; that the Agricultural Extension Service has divided the state into 14 different districts with some six to seven counties in each district having common problems that perhaps can be met with a common approach; that in each district there is now an Agricultural Program Director who is responsible to the College of Agriculture in trying to bring together all of their services to bear on the particular problems of that district. He reported that, in addition, these 14 areas have been officially adopted by the State, thus enabling the Office of Economic Opportunity, the State Departments of Commerce, Welfare, and others, to develop, on the spot, the best over-all program for a particular area. He stated that the University's thinking, in relationship to the outline for organization of extension within the institution, is to designate University geographic service areas for the state, corresponding essentially to the geographic areas established by the state government for governmental services, so that each college, as it thinks about and as it plans its particular extension programs, can relate them to these

primary geographic areas where there will be some commonality of problems. In the process, the county agents in each of the counties in these areas will be divided up so that there will be specialists in each of the areas; thus a county agent, instead of working only in his own county, will work in all of the six or seven counties constituting an area. The President pointed out that a unique part of this over-all plan is that in 12 of the 14 areas that have been designated there exists a University of Kentucky Community College which represents a focus through which the faculty of that community college can be of assistance on a particular problem and through which faculty can be housed in the process of doing a certain work if they are assigned to a particular area. This, in turn, will enable the University to obtain better faculty to come into an academic setting to teach and serve as a resource person, particularly in the technical programs.

Following a brief question and answer period President Oswald was extended sincere appreciation for his very informative presentation.

Dr. Schwert, Secretary of the University Senate Council, presented a report of the activities of that body since the last Senate meeting as follows:

1. Approved limitless numbers of course changes;
2. considered waiver of the two-drop rule for student petitioners in several cases, approving some and failing to approve others;
3. received the report on copyright policies and recommended this to the President for favorable action along with the suggestion of a few minor changes;
4. inquired of the University administration about the possibility of health coverage for University students during the calendar year rather than during the period when the University is in formal academic session. To date, there has been no response;
5. elected Dr. Morris Cierley Vice Chairman of the Senate Council;
6. recommended to the President that Dr. Diachun continue to serve as one of the non-voting faculty members to the Board of Trustees during the coming year even though he is on special assignment in the Department of Plant Pathology at the University of Wisconsin. In view of the fact that continuity of service in this role is an important piece of the faculty member's relationship, this seemed the rational proposal, particularly in view of the fact that Dr. Diachun plans to make several trips back to Lexington and anticipates being able to attend most of the meetings of the Board of Trustees;
7. in the absence of Doctors Diachun and Reeves from the campus, appointed Doctors Garrigus and Ogletree to the Senate Council to serve until the next election since they were runners-up in the last election to that body;
8. recommended to the President slates of nominees to fill vacancies on the Area Committees in the Social and Biological Sciences;
9. received a report from Dr. Willis Griffin on the activities and programs now under way or in active planning in the International Education Program. Dr. Griffin will be asked to discuss these with the Senate at a future meeting;
10. appointed a Program Committee for the Senate with Dr. Morris Cierley, Chairman, Dr. Tom Whyne, Dr. Maurice Hatch, Dr. Aubrey Brown, and Dr. L. Randolph McGee, members;

11. met with President Oswald to hear his thoughts on the campaign which is being waged to prevent the purchase of Maine Chance Farm by the University. At a subsequent meeting, the Senate Council, acting independently of the Senate, passed the following Resolution:

RESOLUTION OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE COUNCIL  
OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY RELATING TO  
THE ACQUISITION OF MAINE CHANCE FARM

The University Senate Council expresses its confidence in the judgment and integrity of the President and of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky. The foresight of these responsible officials and of the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation in acquiring Maine Chance Farm as a facility for the continued growth of the University is wholeheartedly commended.

The Commonwealth has every right to expect continually increasing education services from the University. It is the clear duty of the University administration to equip the University to provide these services. This duty requires the rare talents of careful planning and decisive action. The purchase of Maine Chance Farm quite evidently resulted from wholly appropriate use of these talents.
