choices we make every day without intervention from others. Now consider how many we take for granted.

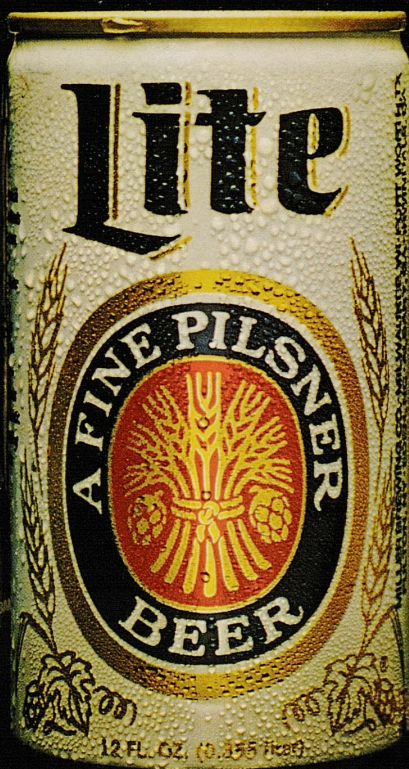

Back at his Old Kentucky Home

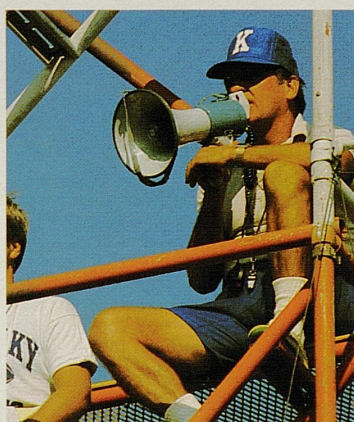
When the head football coach's job became vacant for the first time in 10 years last December, a blue-ribbon committee was assembled to find a man who would bring a positive, new outlook to the University of Kentucky.

The group poured over resumes and interviewed a number of candidates in order to come up with the ideal man.

Their overwhelming choice: home-grown Jerry Claiborne.

Claiborne not only brought along a ledger gushing with wins and bowl invites, included in his baggage was a reputation cleaner than clean.

A devout churchman, the 54-year-old product of Hopkinsville



impresses everyone as just what he is: solid as a rock.

It made the transition much

easier that Claiborne was a son of the Commonwealth and a successful alumnus of the University.

Claiborne was a multi-sport standout at Hopkinsville and went on to UK to play for Paul "Bear" Bryant, playing end on offense and safety on defense. He set a school record with nine pass interceptions on the 1949 Orange Bowl team.

He served his coaching apprenticeship at Augusta Military Academy, UK, Texas A&M, Missouri and Alabama before landing his first head coaching job in 1961 at Virginia Tech.

All he did at VPI in 10 seasons was compile a won-lost record of 61-39-2 and give the Gobblers their first Southern Conference championship in the history of the school.

He spent one year as an assistant at Colorado before tackling another delicate operation at Maryland, victim of seven straight losing campaigns when Claiborne arrived in 1972.

His first Terrapin squad finished square (5-5-1) and then the fun began. At the end of the Claiborne decade at College Park, the tally read 77-37-3 and three Atlantic Coast Conference trophies had been added to the shelf.

Three times Claiborne was named ACC Coach of the Year at Maryland and in 1974, the **Sporting News** honored him as National Coach of the Year.

He had 38 players named all-conference in his 10 seasons and developed All-America selections Paul Vellano, Randy White, Joe Campbell, Steve Mike-Mayer and Dale Castro.

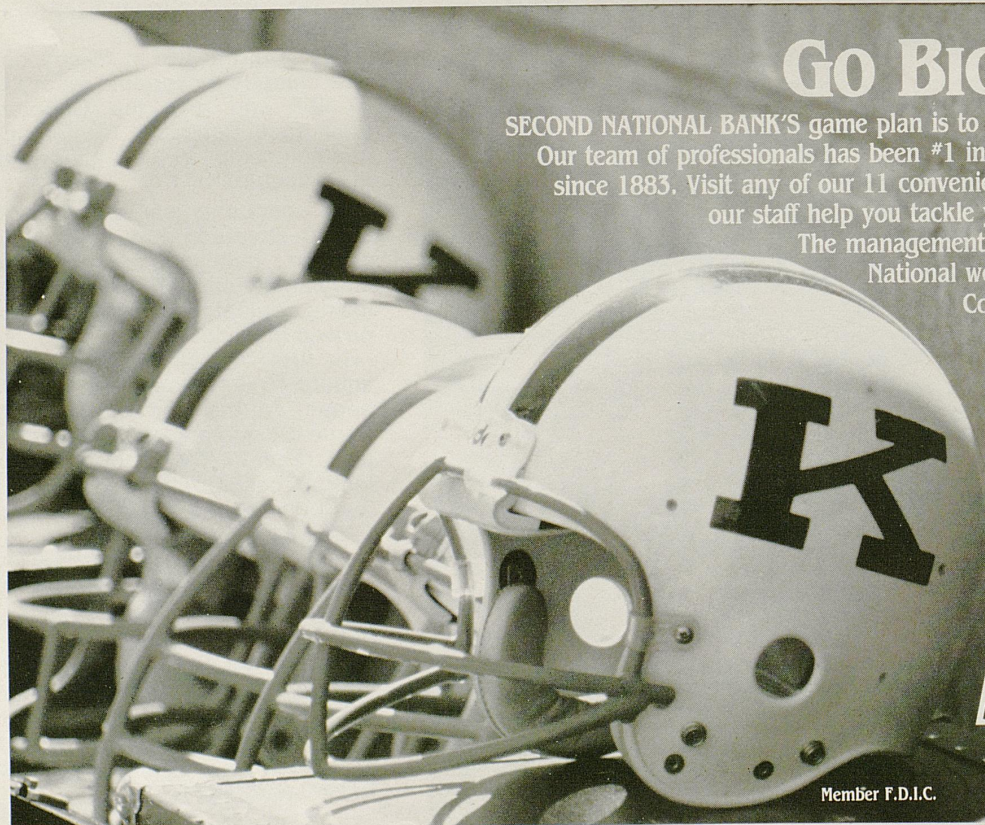
In addition to serving as president of the Football Coaches Association (1980), Claiborne found time to participate in coaching activities from Ramstein, Germany to Tokyo, Japan, conducting various clinics and coaching in all-star games.

He has contributed his support to many charity drives, serving in Maryland as Chairman of the Prince George's County Cancer Crusade and while at VPI he was state chairman of the Virginia Cancer Crusade. He is an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and has served as a deacon in the Baptist Church.

Mrs. Claiborne, the former Faye Hooks of Hopkinsville, is also a UK grad. The Claibornes have two sons, David and Jonathan, and two daughters, Katie and Eileen. Claiborne was born August 26, 1928.

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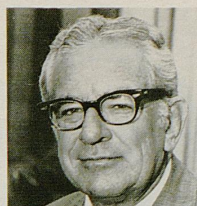

The University of Kentucky has made great strides toward academic excellence since **Dr. Otis A. Singletary** assumed the office of president in August, 1969.

Two professional schools—dentistry and pharmacy—have been ranked among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history and mathematics have gained national attention. The UK library now ranks among the best in the Southeast and a large portion of the worldwide research related to tobacco and health is now done at UK.

Dr. Singletary had previously served as chancellor at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, executive vice chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas system and director for the Job Corps for the Office of Economic Opportunity. He holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 12 years he has been president, the University has grown to more than 23,400 students on the Lexington campus and about 21,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.



A native of Gulfport, Miss., Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa Senate.

He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

The hiring of new football coach Jerry Claiborne and presentation



of a record budget of \$6,397,685 to the UK Athletics Association Board of Directors are two of the most recent developments in the career of **Cliff Hagan**, now in his eighth year as Wildcat athletics director.

Continued growth in practically all phases of UK athletics has been a hallmark of Hagan's seven-year reign as UK's athletics director, with outstanding attendance at football and basketball games, increased attendance at Lady Kat basketball and men's baseball, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

Hagan, one of the great basketball players in UK history, joined the athletics staff in 1972 as an assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and became heavily involved in raising funds for Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. Hagan replaced Lancaster in July, 1975 as athletics director.

He also enjoyed a fine pro basketball career, playing with the St. Louis Hawks for 10 years and then the Dallas Chapparals.

He is married to the former Martha Milton. They have four children: Mrs. Barry "Lisa" Thaxton of Lexington, Mrs. Jim "Laurie" Hill of West Liberty, and Amy and Kip, both of Lexington. Hagan and his wife are natives of Owensboro.

The University of Kentucky now has three chancellors—the result of a major reorganization of the University.

They are:

—**Art Gallaher**, former UK vice president for academic affairs, is the new chancellor for the Lexington campus;

—**Peter Bosomworth**, former vice president for the Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, is the new chancellor of the Medical Center; and

—**Charles Wethington**, former vice president of the UK Community College System, is the new chancellor of the system.

The three chancellors report to UK President Otis Singletary.

“Our basic objective in this reorganization is to focus more clearly the responsibility and authority for the day-to-day administration of the three academic sectors on the chancellors,” said Singletary.

The UK chancellors’ responsibilities in their areas will include academic program planning, budgeting, student policies, business services and personnel program administration.

After holding tenured teaching posts at the universities of Houston and Nebraska, Gallaher came to UK in 1963. He has been chairman of the UK anthropology department and acting director and deputy director of the UK Center for Developmental Change.

In 1972, Dr. Gallaher was named dean of the UK College of Arts and Sciences, a post he held until 1980 when he was appointed UK vice president for academic affairs.

Dr. Bosomworth came to UK in 1962 as professor and chairman of the new department of anesthesiology in the UK College of Medicine. He has served on numerous medical boards and councils throughout Kentucky and the U. S. He was named vice president of the UK Medical Cen-

ter in 1970.

Dr. Wethington began his career at UK in 1964 as an instructor of educational psychology. He was acting director of UK’s Lexington Technical Institute in 1966-67 and was named the first di-

rector of the Maysville Community College in 1967.

In 1971, Dr. Wethington began a nine-year term as assistant vice president for the UK Community College System and was promoted to vice president in 1980.

Home games in caps

Frustration is the operative word this afternoon as Florida and Kentucky meet in a Southeastern Conference battle.

The Gators were emphatically embarrassed in the twilight of Jacksonville's Gator Bowl by Georgia last week, 44-0. It didn't help that America witnessed the whipping on television.

A season that started beautifully for the Gators has gone sour. September wins over Miami (Fla.), Southern Cal and Mississippi State made a preseason magazine's national title prediction look good, but Florida has gone 2-3 since and still has Florida State to tangle with.

Florida is still bowl material. The Gators will end up with a respectable record against a demanding slate of teams and quarterback **Wayne Peace** and friends are an exciting offense.

Kentucky's frustration runs much deeper. The Cats have no September high to dwell on. Each

of the eight losses have stung. Even the 13-13 tie with Kansas was pretty miserable.

Wildcat coach **Jerry Claiborne** has kept a stiff upper lip through it all. His comments after last week's loss to Vanderbilt were typical. He took the blame and protected his players.

"I told the players I'll work harder than I ever had this week," he said.

In light of everything else happening around him, **George Adams'** performance this year merits special mention. The Lexington sophomore had 135 yards rushing last week against Vandy. Kentucky netted 134 as a team.

The Wildcat offensive line played a good second half against the Commodores last week. Adams had some good gaps to run through.

There is some sunshine peaking through the clouds of an 0-8-1 season for Kentucky. Freshman walk-on kicker **Chris Caudell** is

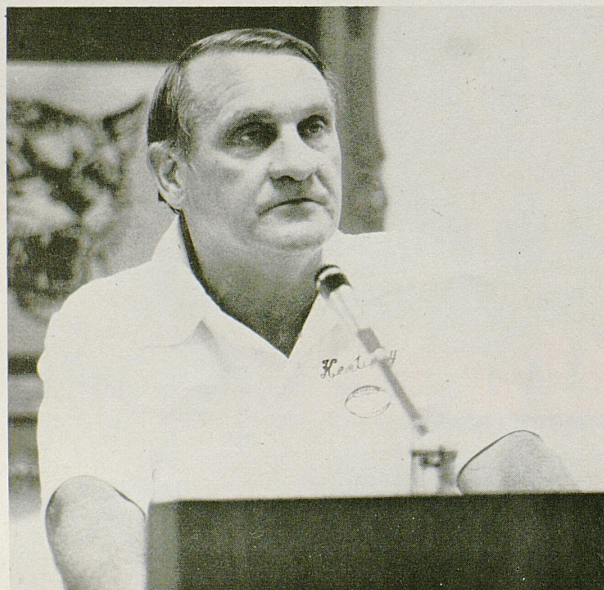
still perfect after four field goal tries. He hit a 41-yard fielder against the Commodores.

UK's receivers made some good catches against Vandy. Sophomore **Joe "Joker" Phillips** ran a good route and made a good catch for an 11-yard touchdown last week. Senior **Todd Shadowen** made a couple of grabs in traffic, as did **Rob Mangas**.

The Kentucky defense has shown a lot of character under trying circumstances and times could become more trying today. Florida has superb athletes, especially on offense.

Fullback **James Jones** will play some kind of professional football and Peace is a winning quarterback.

On defense, the Gators of head coach **Charley Pell** are quick but vulnerable to the pass. Injuries have made it tough to muster a pass rush. UF is last in the league in pass defense.

SERIES HISTORY: Florida has evened the series at 16-all with wins the last two years. Kentucky gained the upper hand with a 52-0 win in the inaugural meeting in 1917. The Wildcats held a 12-4 advantage through 1956, but UF has won 12 out of 17 games since.

The two teams have met every year since 1967.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 14, 1981 at Gainesville—Florida took control in the first quarter after Kentucky missed a field goal en route to a 33-12 win.

James Jones capped a 76-yard march with a two-yard touchdown plunge and scored again in the third quarter on a three-yard jaunt.

The Gators added to their lead as **Ivory Curry** intercepted **Tom Boyle**, and set up a 39-yard pass from Peace to **Dwayne Dixon** to the one-yard line. **Lorenzo Hampton** carried for the TD.

Peace hooked up with **Bee Lang** for a 24-yard touchdown to ice the win. Kentucky got on the board late in the third quarter after a UF fumble. **Randy Jenkins** hit **Henry Parks** with a one-yard scoring pass.

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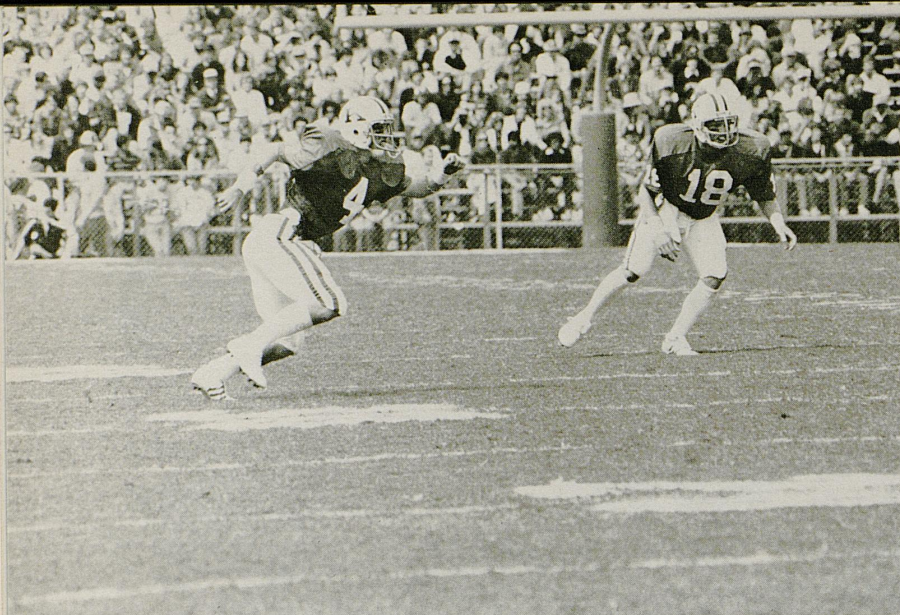

And how about the gutsy showing against Alabama last season or this year's courageous defensive struggle at Auburn where the Wildcats held time after time, denying the Tigers a single touchdown.

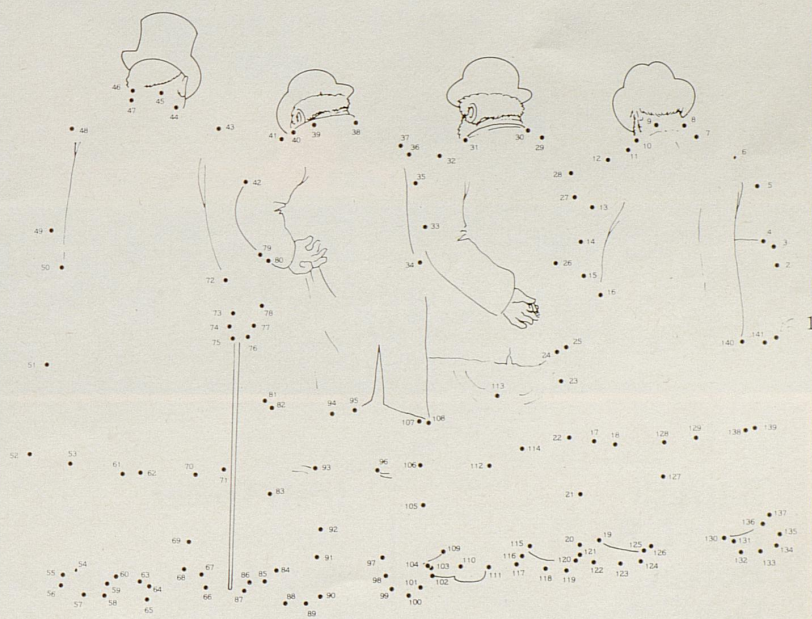
Buzz Meers won't soon forget

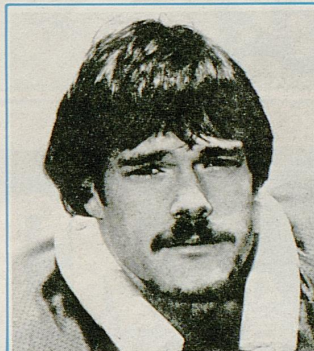
George Adams

Since its consolidation with the Florida Agricultural College in 1906, the University of Florida at Gainesville has grown from an initial enrollment of 102 to more than 33,000, largest in the state and 18th largest in the nation.

A land-grant university with a distinguished record of developing Florida agriculture into a national leader through research and extension services, the University of Florida is among the nation's 51 leading research universities, as categorized by the Carnegie Commission on Higher Education.

Dr. Robert Q. Marston, the seventh president of the University of Florida, has spent his professional life in medicine and education.

Dr. Marston was Associate Director of the National Institutes of Health and Director of the Division of Regional Medical Programs, 1966-68. He was director of the National Institutes of Health and is a former Dean of the College of Medicine and Vice Chancellor at the University of Mississippi.

He was educated in the Virginia Military Institute, Medical College of Virginia and is a Rhodes Scholar

at Oxford University.

He came to the University of Florida in August, 1974, from positions as scholar-in-residence at the University of Virginia and as a distinguished fellow at the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences.

Bill Carr assumed the duties of Director of Athletics at Florida on March 15, 1979 and quickly initiated an operational plan designed to improve the Gator athletic program in every area.

His program is on schedule in all areas and well ahead in many. Florida can point with pride to

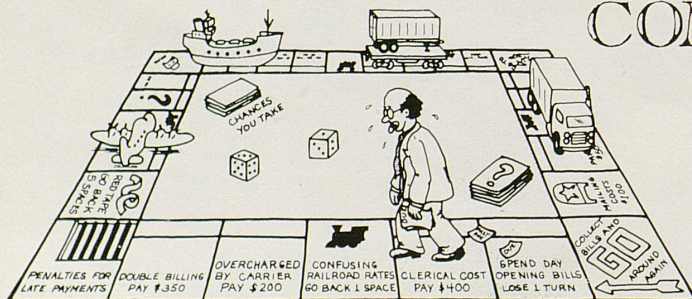
vastly improved athletic facilities, increased funding of athletics from private sources, coaching changes resulting in positive growth, an organized Gator Club support group to promote academics and athletic interests, and, in general, an uplifting of the entire process by which the program is operated.

Carr, the driving force behind all of these developments, saw his latest project become reality this season with the completion of the new south stands at Florida Field, the Gators' on-campus football stadium.



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CHARLEY PELL

Charles Byron (Charley) Pell was named head football coach at Florida on December 4, 1978, bringing with him a reputation as a coach who turns ailing collegiate programs around quickly.

His last two teams at Florida have gone to bowls, sure indication that Pell's reputation is well-deserved.

The 1981 Gators, one of the nation's youngest teams with only two seniors among the 22 starters, finished 7-4, losing on a last-second field goal in two games.

Pell's 1980 Gator team also finished 7-4 and won the Tangerine Bowl. Pell was named SEC Coach of the Year by both AP and UPI, the third time in four years of Division I coaching that he was so honored.

The 41-year-old native of Albertville, Ala., was Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year in both 1977 and 1978 while coaching Clemson to 8-2-1 and 10-1 records.

He played offensive and defensive tackle for Paul "Bear" Bryant at Alabama (1960-62) and was a member of the Crimson Tide's 1961 national championship team.

He served as a grad assistant at Alabama (1964) and was defensive line coach at Kentucky (1965-68) before getting the head coaching job at Jacksonville State in 1969.

Pell was assistant head coach at Virginia Tech (1974-75) and at Clemson in 1976 before he took control of the Tiger program in 1977.

Pell holds a Bachelor of Science Degree from Alabama (1964). He

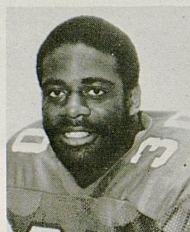


Florida head coach **Charley Pell** has rebuilt the Gator football program around a high-technology offense that utilizes a wide variety of formations.

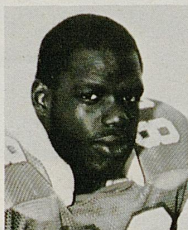

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The Gators have exceptional quickness on defense and a dynamic duo in outside linebacker **Wilber Marshall** (6-1, 230) and inside 'backer **Fernando Jackson** (5-11, 218).

"Pound for pound, there isn't a better linebacker in the country," says Pell of Jackson.

Florida's defensive interior line has been hit hard by the injury bugaboo but **Tim Newton** (6-0, 285) is a scrapper at tackle.

The secondary is talented with junior safety **Tony Lilly** the stand-out. The 6-0, 198-pounder is a rarity on the Gator squad—an out-of-state recruit from Woodbridge, Va. Lilly was All-SEC last season and is having another excellent season.

Senior **Ivory Curry** is a good cornerback and one of the league's best return men.

Freshman **Ray Criswell** has done a good job punting for Florida. He was considered the finest prep punter in Florida a year ago. Senior **Jim Gainey** walked-on and won a scholarship as understudy to all-star **Brian Clark** and has filled Clark's shoes capably. Gainey kicked a 42-yarder to beat Auburn two weeks ago.

The number of persons who have become UK Fellows is fast approaching the 1,000 mark, a fact that makes hard-working volunteers like Robert McCowan of Ashland justly proud.

"Yes, indeed, I'm very proud to be a part of a program that has raised more than \$22 million for the University of Kentucky," said McCowan, a UK graduate (class of 1951 in commerce).

McCowan heads up the Fellows Committee, a part of the UK Development Council, which just this weekend met in Lexington to hear glowing reports on activities of all the volunteers.

"I know what private contributions mean to the University and I want to encourage all alumni and friends to support UK," McCowan says.

That's pretty much the attitude an spirit of the entire UK Development Council, made up of alumni and friends of the University.

The UK Fellows program is designed to encourage substantial private giving to the University and to recognize donors for the generous support. That recognition this year came last night at a glittering black-tie dinner at which a record number of new Fellows was introduced to the crowd of more than 400.

Fellows membership is accorded to individuals who give or pledge \$10,000 to the University or formally signify their intention to give \$25,000 through a bequest, life insurance or trust arrangement.

McCowan pointed out that all contributors, regardless of the amount given, can designate their gifts for a specific purpose within the University. Donors can designate their gift to benefit any UK college, department or academic or extra-curricular program of interest to them.

UK Fellows, as well as other contributors, he added, frequently make undesigned gifts. These

funds are used by the University where they are needed most, usually for programs that depend wholly or in part on the generosity of alumni and friends.

The University is assisted in its quest for private gifts by the UK Development Council, made up of volunteers like Bob McCowan. The Council includes more than 200 alumni and friends of UK dedicated to helping the University raise private dollars. Each volunteer serves on a committee charged with a specific fundraising activity.

Tommy Bell of Lexington heads up the Alumni Annual Giving Fund. Dan Ewing of Louisville is chairman of the Corporations and Foundations committee. Robert E. Lee of Lexington heads up the deferred giving committee. Dr. Wil-

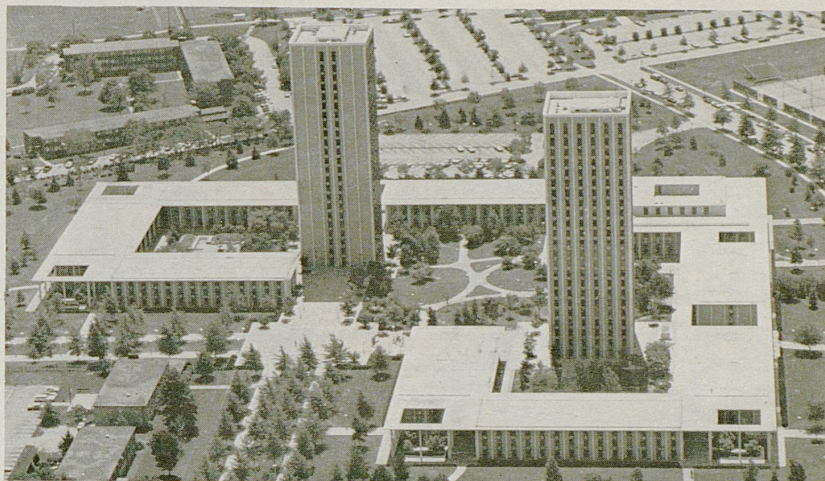

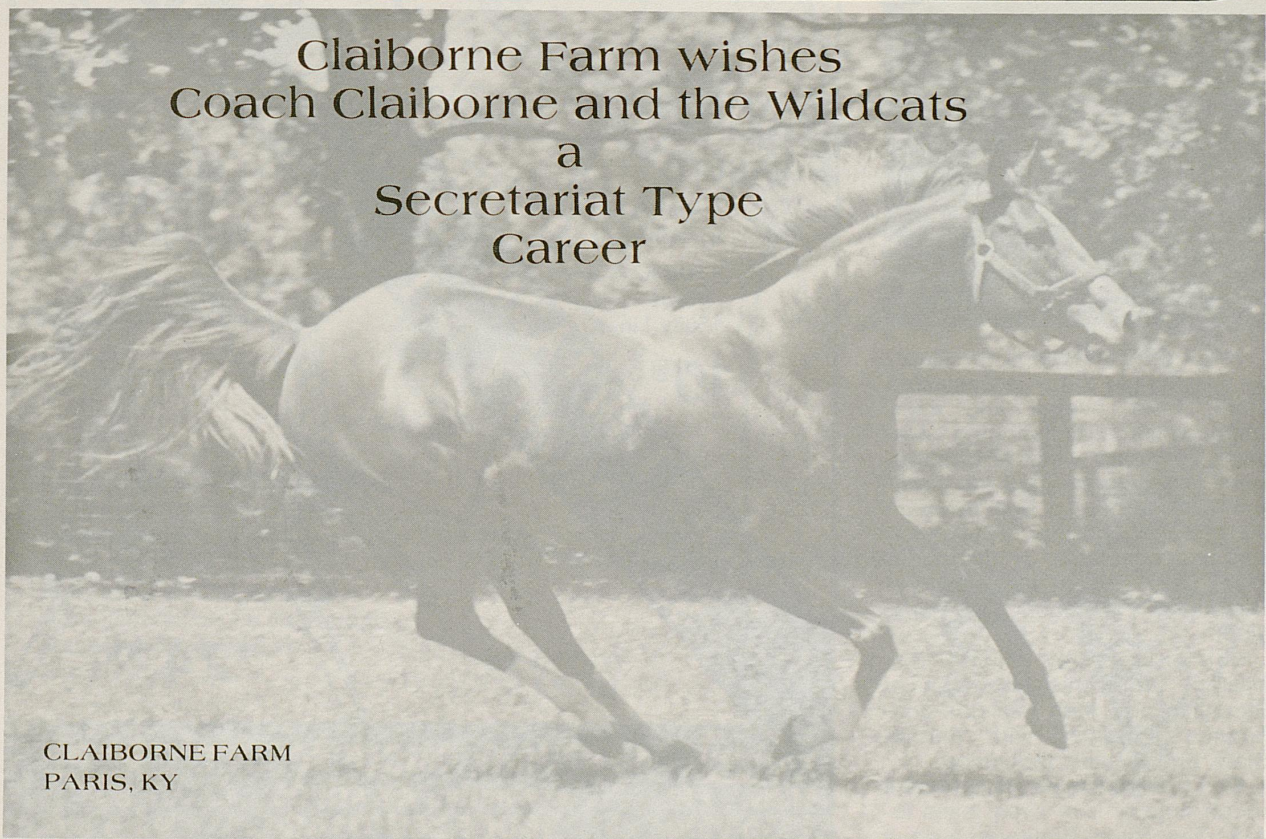




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SEC Roundup

Topsy-turvy Tennessee must beat Ole Miss at Jackson today to keep its bowl hopes breathing.

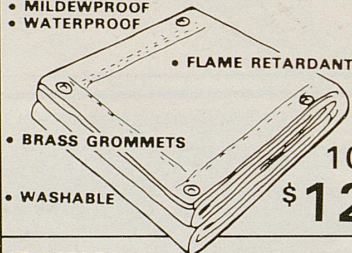

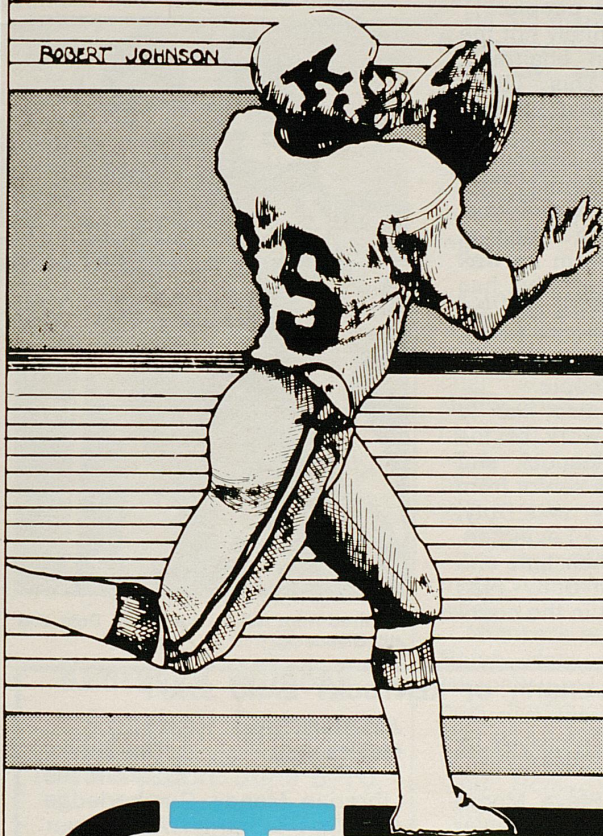
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WILDCAT BAND

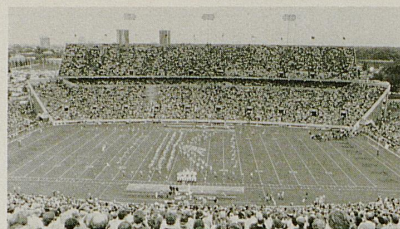

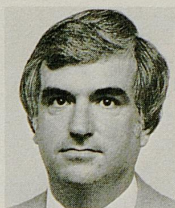

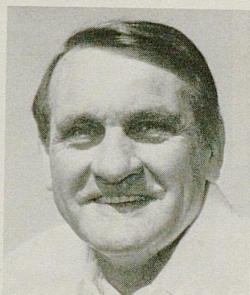
SUSAN FEAMSTER Assistant Director of Athletics

Somehow you know that McCowan is right. And there are plenty of UK friends around to help make him right.

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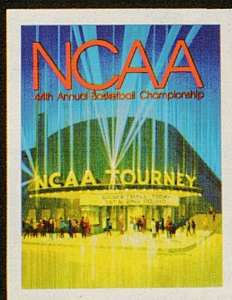
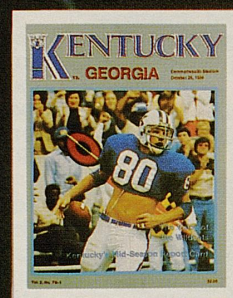
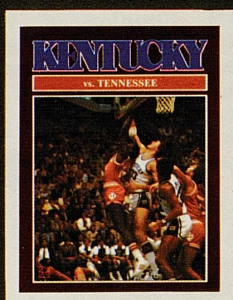
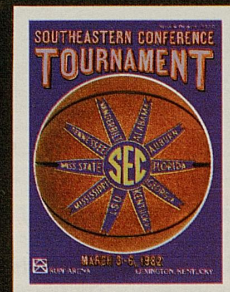
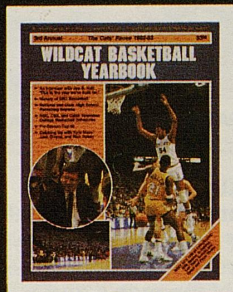
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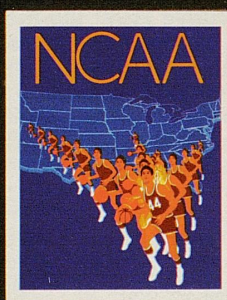
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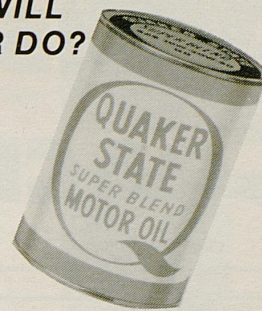
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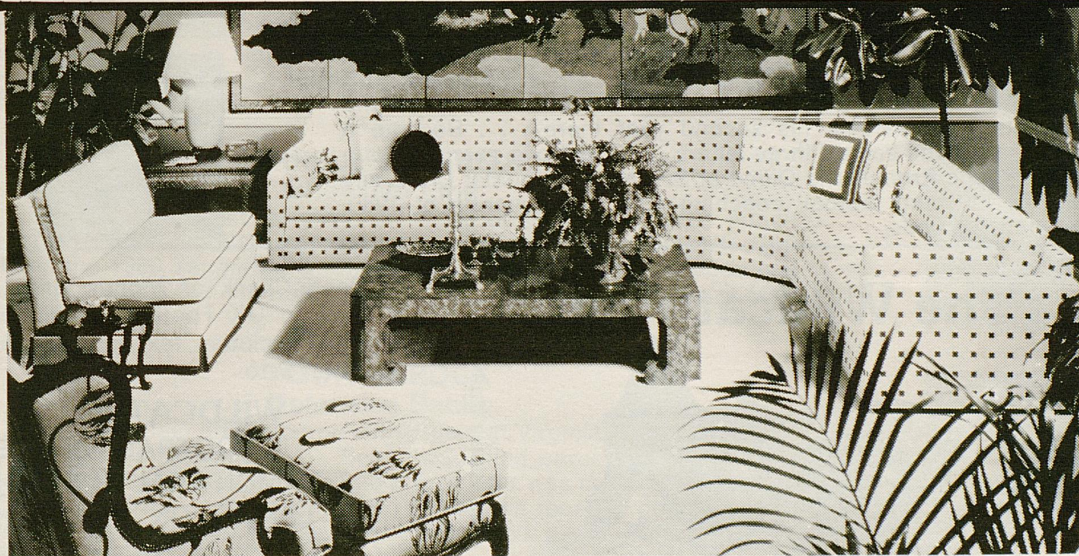

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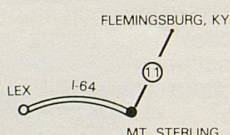
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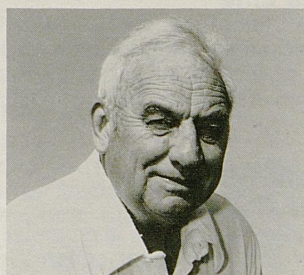
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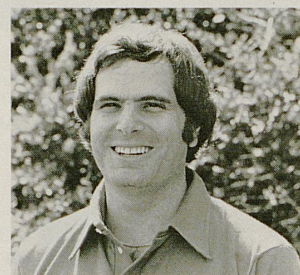


DICK REDDING

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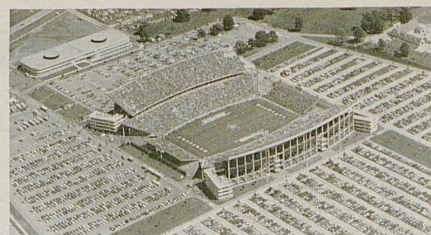
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STADIUM INFORMATION



First Aid—The University of Kentucky provides, for your convenience and welfare, First Aid Stations on the ground level on both sides of the stadium. On the West side is Room 156, the East side, Room 172. An ambulance is available at each corner of the stadium. Twenty doctors on duty are spotted in each section and are easily accessible to Boy Scouts and ushers. Two golf cart ambulances are equipped for immediate aid and located on the second level on each side of the stadium. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at either First Aid station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to the nearest Boy Scout or usher.

Cardiac Care—In cooperation with the University Medical Services, the University of Kentucky

provides a cardiac resuscitation program.

Crowd Noise Penalty—Uncontrolled crowd noise can result in a five-yard penalty against your team. Please observe quarterback and official's signals for quiet.

No Horns—Horns are not permitted in Commonwealth Stadium and will be picked up at the gates. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume.

Liquors—Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the stadium as are all food and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type—bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chests and any object related to above. Gate personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

Signs—Signs and barriers are restricted for Commonwealth Stadium in accordance with University regulations and policies established by the Public Safety Division.

A HISTORY

Commonwealth Stadium, the University of Kentucky's football facility, is located on an 86-acre tract on the Kentucky Experimental Station Farm grounds south of the main campus.

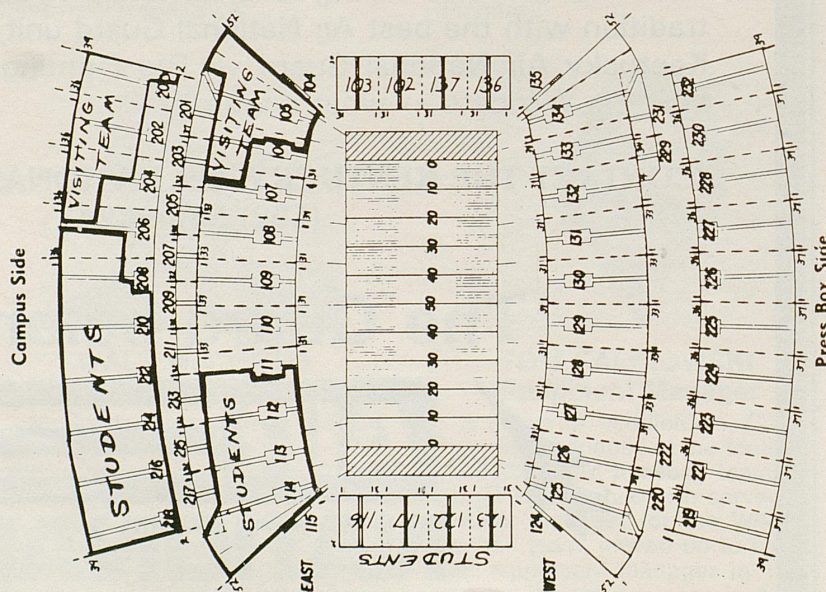
Completed in 1973, the concrete and steel cantilevered structure replaced Stoll Field, where Wildcat football teams had played since their beginning.

Constructed by Huber, Hunt and Nichols, Inc., the facility has a capacity of 50,000 sideline seats, with end zone bleachers swelling the total to 58,000.

This is Kentucky's 10th season at Commonwealth. The Wildcats beat Virginia Tech 31-26 in the first game in their new facility on Sept. 15, 1973.

General Ticket Policy for Stadium

- All persons must have a ticket.
- No pass out checks permitted at any gate.
- All sales final.
- Tickets cannot be refunded or replaced if lost, stolen or destroyed.
- The University of Kentucky Athletics Association reserves the right to revoke tickets by refund of purchase price.
- Holder of tickets to University of Kentucky athletic events agrees to abide by stadium and University policies.
- Tickets may not be sold on UK premises (parking lots, stadium grounds, etc.) except by authorized personnel.
