



least, controversial. A proposal to distribute condoms on
campus would have been met with a great deal of resistance, as evidenced by several senators' complaints
against a simple feasibility study.

In the end, SGA senators were sandbagged into believing that some large, detailed study into alternative means
of preventing STDs is going to take place.

The U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop has already
said that condoms are the most effective way, besides
abstinence, to prevent the transmission of STDs.

No SGA study will tell us otherwise, and they know it.
What will happen is that six weeks from now, a proposal will come back to the senate floor asking for the distribution of condoms on campus. rived from it.






