# Businesswomen come to area

Conference promotes women in the workplace: Over 250 people expected at the Women Mean Business Conference

These women mean business.

And business is exactly what they will talk about Wednesday at the eighth annual Women Mean Business Conference at the Radisson Plaza Hotel. Keynote speakers Mary Hunt, Marcia Rosen, Pamela Graber and UK Chancellor Elisabeth Zinser will speak about opportunities for women in the business arena.

Debbie McKnight, the conference coordinator, said the event offers opportunities primarily to entrepreneurs and also offers great incentives to aspiring business students.

"If you're thinking about starting a business and you need an opportunity to meet with other women, then this will be a great opportunity to do so," McKnight said.

Two of the keynote speakers have written books about women and business. Rosen is the author of "The

Women's Business Therapist: Eliminate the Mindblocks and Roadblocks to Success." Hunt is the author of several books on money management, including "The Financially Confident Woman."

McKnight said the conference, sponsored by the Kentucky Small Business Development Center and the Center for Entrepreneurship at the UK Gatton College of Business and Economics, should attract around 250 people, including UK faculty

members and employees from other departments.

Becky Naugle, state director for KSBDC, said the keynote speakers will provide beneficial information to students.

"Hunt would be an excellent speaker for anyone who is concerned about personal finances," Naugle said. "She has good advice on personal credit and credit worthiness."

Naugle said the rising number of women in the business market is an important aspect for UK students to understand.

"Women are the largest growing segment of starting businesses in the country,"

Naugle said. "It's a good niche market."

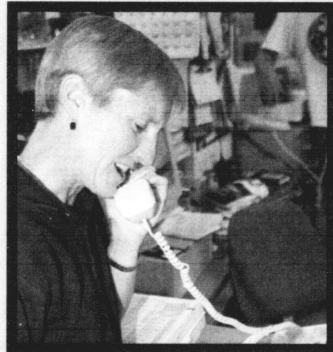
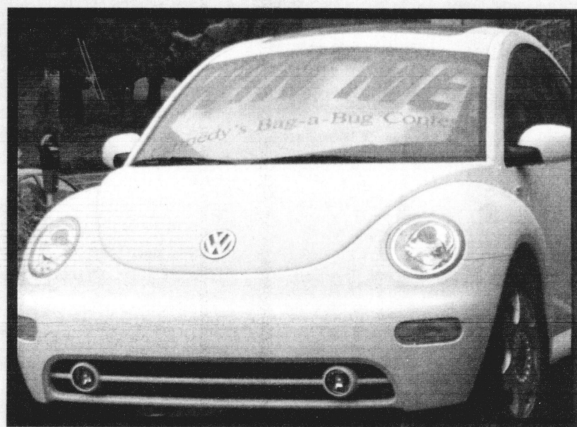
Even though the conference is aimed at the women's business market, McKnight said that some of the speakers are male and several men will be in attendance.

# Activists look to improve shelters

'Something had to be done': Activists prefer "no-kill" to government-run animal shelters

JAMESTOWN, Ky. (AP) — Activists in Kentucky have joined a nationwide effort to establish private or "no-kill" animal shelters as an alternative to underfunded, government-run shelters.

No-kill shelters have been established in several counties, including Anderson, Elliott and Martin. More are planned for Bracken, Casey and Russell counties, among others.

Critics have a long list of complaints about county animal shelters and dog wardens, mostly in rural areas. Most complaints center on the conditions of the shelters, the lack of training among the wardens and a lack of requirements at many shelters to spay or neuter the few dogs that are adopted, continuing the overpopulation problem.

In Russell County, activist Wilma Hopper began visiting the dog pound this year with food, cleaning supplies and a video camera because of her concern over the conditions.

"A lot of times there was no water, no food," said Hopper, the president of a fledgling animal welfare league.

In June, she shot a video of a dead dog lying in watering pans at the pound, with another small dog drinking near the paws of the dead one as flies buzzed around.

The county paid for a concrete floor for the pound last summer and installed water. Jeff Bryant, the county dog warden, said he goes to the pound twice a day to feed and water the dogs and clean up. He described Hopper as a "troublemaker" who "wants a big-time facility built."

Counties often plead poverty, but shelter and animal-control programs can generate money to offset the costs, said Prestonsburg lawyer Ned Pillersdorf.

"It's not expensive to operate an animal shelter," Pillersdorf said. He is married to state Supreme Court Justice Janet Stumbo, and the two started the Dewey Dam Dog and Cat Protection Society in Floyd County, which now operates the animal shelter.

Teresa Ousley, who keeps books for the shelter, said Floyd County provides \$24,000 a year to operate it, and Prestonsburg gives \$2,400. Annual operating costs are more than \$30,000, Ousley estimated. Donations and adoption fees help cover costs.

The people trying to develop private shelters also are reacting to high killing rates at some county facilities.

Linda Smith of Bracken County said she started trying to establish a no-kill shelter this year after learning that nearly all the dogs at the county shelter get euthanized.

"It was the most heartbreaking thing," Smith said. "I knew something had to be done."

The 110 members of the UK Kappa Sigma fraternity have a reason to boast this semester.

After a three-day Kappa Sigma National Leadership Conference Program, the Beta Nu chapter received five awards. With a chapter GPA of around 2.89, Kappa Sigma received two scholar-

ship awards for beating the all-Greek and all-male averages.

"We had a successful year last year as a fraternity. We stepped up and got stuff done and I feel really good about that," said Will Price, an education junior.

Ward Ballerstedt, a business management and political science sophomore, said winning the awards shows the fraternity has made great strides in many

areas.

"Basically this means a lot to us as a chapter. It shows we are excelling academically and that we're setting an example on campus and nationally as a chapter that's successful. It should serve as an example for other chapters from our fraternity to follow," Ballerstedt said.

Kappa Sigma received two silver scroll awards for two \$5,000

alumni donations to the National Kappa Sigma Endowment Fund. They also received a recruitment award for both the fall and spring semesters last year. With 21 pledges for fall and 38 for spring, these pledge classes were among the largest on campus last year.

"Getting recognition for our achievements gives us a sense of pride and accomplishment," Ballerstedt said.

The Kappa Sigmas are not riding on last year's accomplishments to see them through. They participated in the Gameball Run for the UK vs. U of L game this se-

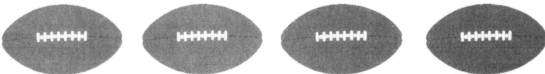

# (Bob) Knight's latest grab proved to be the last straw

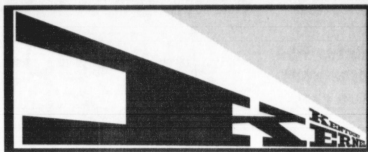
**Call me "The General": Knight's firing gives life lesson on presidents, protests and punks**

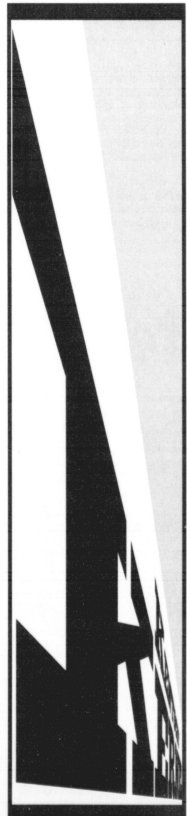

## Photos find homegrown drug crop

LaPORTE, Ind. (AP) — Smile for the camera. You're busted! A man who had snapshots taken of himself with plants he had grown in his house allegedly made the mistake of taking the film to a developer who recognized the indoor garden as marijuana.

The processor alerted authorities, who then tracked down the man. Brian Davis, 38, pleaded guilty Friday in LaPorte Circuit Court to a Class D felony of maintaining a common nuisance. If the plea bargain is accepted, charges of dealing in marijuana and possession of marijuana will be dropped and he will be placed on two years of probation.

"They were pretty telling photographs," said LaPorte Metro Operations Unit Officer Bonnie Outley. "It was a pretty big indoor grow."

Outley said authorities confiscated 39 nearly mature marijuana plants. They weighed 2.7 pounds after drying. According to court documents, the film processor at Martin's Supermarket in South Bend contacted authorities in April because the freshly developed pictures showed what appeared to be a marijuana growing operation.

## Radium and wine not so very fine

DETROIT (AP) — Tony Ventura was looking for something to hold his homemade wine. So he stopped by an antique shop in his hometown of Almont Township, about 40 miles north of Detroit. He found a \$50 crock that was perfect. Or so he thought. Now Ventura knows that drinking wine or anything else out of the large jug could have been deadly. Its sides are lined with radium 226.

"This thing is in excellent shape, not a chip or a mark on it," Ventura said Friday. "Unfortunately, it's something that killed people in the '20s and '30s."

Ventura bought the crock, replete with a pouring spigot, late last month. After discovering the word "Revigator," on the bottom, he decided to do some investigating. An internet search revealed the item's danger. The Revigator was once promoted as a cure-all. During its heyday in the 1920s, the Revigator jug was advertised as a healthy way to drink fluids — a "radioactive water crock."

But drinking water from the Revigator leads to tumors in the jaw, said Dave Minnar, Chief of the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality's Radiological Protection Section.

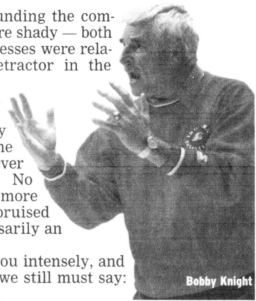

## Is society choosing to segregate?

During the spring semester, my first at UK, I fell into a routine between my morning classes. I would stroll into UK's food court and order a cholesterol-laden breakfast.

We're not really that far-removed from institutionalized discrimination. So it seems only natural in a sense that those whose forefathers suffered the abuses of discrimination should have a tendency to cling together.

This is especially true when they are often still victims of discrimination themselves, albeit in a more subtle form, which makes it even more difficult to overcome.

While our laws may have changed, allowing for more freedoms and opportunities than in the past, our media and corporate establishments still encourage racial division.

Any movie or television show that has a predominantly black cast, is, we're told, meant for a black audience. At the opposite end of the spectrum, how many shows or movies have an

exclusively white cast? Not many, because the token black is still alive and well in Hollywood.

Personally, I think it's far more racist to have a particular character included because of his or her skin color than because of what he or she adds to the story.

This is particularly obvious in television commercials. I won't even get into the general ethnic stereotyping that runs rampant in television advertising. Why not have three black characters and three white characters, or four black and

## Sanctions hurt Iraq

The majority of Americans support the use of economic sanctions against Iraq as a tool of foreign policy, a recent poll showed.

Yet, the distortions imposed by the mainstream media obscure the overwhelming devastation of unjust sanctions: widespread malnutrition, poverty, little or no healthcare and increasing illiteracy in Iraq.

Iraq, a country with a remarkable 6,000 years of civilization and a unique culture and values, is portrayed as either a strategic "rogue state" or even as synonymous with "Saddam Hussein."

Indeed, its grounds have become an arcade game used for testing high-tech weapons by "our men and women," although essentially no armed conflict exists between the United States and Iraq.

Undeniably, Saddam Hussein and his dreadful regime have brought disaster to his country. He continually takes initiatives to provoke neighboring countries as well as the United States. He invaded Kuwait. He may have been trying to rebuild a new arsenal of weapons of mass destruction (which were originally supplied by the west in the '80s in support against Iran) and continues to tyrannize his people.

But, aren't the sanctions another weapon of mass destruction? It is inexplicable to me why innocent civilians have to continue paying the price for his malfesaance.

President Clinton is likely to leave this headache for the next administration to resolve. This is presently embodied by the amount of aid that Israel receives that is paid by public taxes.
