Streamlining administrative structure, relying less on teaching assistants and making advising more consistent are among areas UK needs to improve, according to the report of the reaccreditation committee that visited campus in the fall.

From the documents they gathered and interviews they conducted, committee members developed more than 20 recommendations and several suggestions on how UK can be more effective.

UK had to provide the committee with written responses for each recommendation, but not for the suggestions.

UK released the committee's report and the University's responses on Friday to the Kentucky Kernel.

One of the committee's concerns was the organization of UK's administration. UK's decentralized system divides the institution into

three parts — Lexington Campus, Albert B. Chandler Medical Center and community colleges.

Because each sector has its own administration, the structure can be confusing and overly bureaucratic, the committee reported.

"The sector concept promotes additional layers of administration and, indeed, many believe that administrative duplication and 'over administration' are widespread and The committee suggested that UK hire an external consultant to review the administrative structure, and for the University to study its setup "with an objective of streamlining decision making and getting work out of the system."

UK President Charles Wething-ton said the University has been looking at its organization during its own realignment and restructur-ing process.

"That's exactly what we've been doing the last six months," he said.

Cincinnati civil rights activist Rev. Fred L. Shuttlesworth led the peace march, which started at Heri-tage Hall and filled Vine Street be-fore turning on Rose Street to go back through downtown on Main Street and end at the Lexington Civ-

Shuttlesworth, who was an asso-ciate of King's, made a special trip to meet personally with UK partici-pants at Blazer cafeteria earlier that morning.

"I was really glad to meet him — someone who worked with Dr. King," said Cecil Ausby, a psychol-

ogy freshman. "It's good to see he hasn't lost his enthusiasm." Referring to the marches he had been in with King, Shuttlesworth advised those gathering for the pa-rade, "if we're going to march, let's make it look like a march."

U.S. leads daylight bombing raids on Iraq

WASHINGTON — American-ed warplanes thundered into Iraq in WASHINGTON — American-led warplanes thundered into Iraq in daylight bombing raids yesterday as President Bush devoted his final hours in office to a tense showdown with Saddam Hussein that strained the solidarity of the Gulf War coali-

"We did the right thing." President-elect Clinton expressed support for Bush's action but there was pointed criticism from Arab nations that once supported military action against Iraq. The Cairo-based Arab League called on the United Nations "to adopt a policy of self-restraint and use the language of dialogue." The Russian government deliv-ered a note to the State Department admonishing the Bush administra-tion not to act militarily without the

curity Council.

The message, from Foreign Minister Andrei V. Kozyrev, said,

"There are casualties among civilian populations which is especially regrettable."

The Pentagon acknowledged that a cruise missile fired from a Navy ship Sunday had struck a Baghdad hotel.

Iraq said two civilians were killed. The Pentagon said the missile was knocked off course by Iraqi fire.

"These attacks could proceed without further warning," Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams said.

Cope's Jehovahkill a feast of paganistic trance music

If you've ever thought to your-self, "Boy, there certainly seems to be a shortage of pagan trance music around these days," I am happy to report that Julian Cope has arrived to correct this appalling deficiency. With his brand-new album, Jeho-pothelil Core aliase for the Act 20

vahkill, Cope gives us more than 70 minutes of delightfully weird music, proving that he is, by far, the most entertaining pagan alive to-

suc, portugations and successful pagan alive unday,
Jehovahkill is a very subdued album. You'll find none of the raging guitar anthems that populated his previous work, Peggy Suicide. That isn't to say that this album is devoid of inicy pop hooks and solid chord isn to say mat mis aboum is devoid of juicy pop hooks and solid chord progressions, but none of these songs are drop-kick rockers that would make you jump around and

Many of the cuts are acoustically based. Others are eerie, epic-scaled adventures like Pink Floyd used to make, with swirling keyboards bouncing in and out, tape loops and backwards-recorded instruments equiting a histogre canyas.

Phase I, which is dependably en-

Phase I, which is dependably engaging though not wildly brilliant, is slow and quiet, led off by the solid "Soul Desert" and "No Hard Shoulder To Cry On."

The weird third song of Phase I, "Akhenaten," reveals Cope's obsession with the Christian cross. The song's title is also noteworthy; Akhenaten was an Egyptian pharaoh who, like Cope, was a religious troublemaker who sought to tear down the popular beliefs of the day.

down the popular beliefs of the day.

Phase II has its moments, but is nonetheless uneven. "Necropolis," a fast-moving instrumental, is one of those moments. Two others, "Slow Rider" and "Julian H. Cope," are short, jerky numbers that benefit from Rooster Cosby's neculiar necrusision.

This phase also contains the most annoying song on the album (annoying and *long*, at 6:22), "Poet Is Priest ..."

Priest ... "
Phase III is the strongest part of the album. The first cut, "The Subtle Energies Commission," is a

sprawling, eight-minute odyssey in which understated bass lines and keyboard flourishes are woven into a thumping drum track. Following its "Fa-Fa-Fa-Fine," a nice, compact pop treat, and "Fear Loves This Place," the most stirring song on the album.

I like this song especially because, at 4:15, it's long enough to be entertaining, but short enough to keep from stretching too far. Cope managed to resist his tendency to take a good song of four or five minutes and expand it into a mediocres ong of nine or 10 minutes.

I was afraid that unnecessary expansion would doom "The Tower," which is all of 10 minutes long, but that, fortunately, was not the case. Here, it ins' t a matter of repeating the same riff over and over until it's been run into the dirt, a crime of many songs of this length are guilty. Cope is trying to tell a rather complex story in "The Tower," so he has an excuse to use a lot of time.

Still, Cope could have shaved at least two minutes off the song and not hurt the story a bit.

If you though that a title like Jehovahkil! implied anti-Christian sentiment, you're right. Make sure you purchase this album legitimate! by — don't cropy it — because the encloses booklet. Cope takes some acid-tongued potshors at Caristianity. Yes, you can revel in his unflatering religious broadsides even as you groove to his tunes. Here's a sample: "Yet, by the middle of last century, the temple had been almost obliterated by destructive simbosessed, small-minded do-gooders in the name of the Christian God."

Whether you agree with Cope's agan the loggy is irrelevant. Jeho-vankill is a good piece of music no matter what you believe.



Bush evaluation reveals many victories abroad, lack of clear direction

Tomorrow George Bush will no longer be president of the

world's largest superpower.

As he leaves his desk in the Oval Office, an evaluation of his administration reveals both victories

and defeats.

The strongest link for the Bush administration involves dealings in

and dereats.

The strongest link for the Bush administration involves dealings in foreign policy.

While the United States under Bush was more active than ever in world affairs, he lacked a real, consistent direction in his world adventures. He never identified an ideology that was truly his own, a fault of his presidency overall.

In both Iraq and Somalia, Bush espoused human rights as a reason for U.S. involvement. Whenever human rights is cited, it's usually a smokescreen for the true motive behind a mission.

One of the best victories for Bush came from his efforts to reduce nuclear arsenals both at home and in the former Soviet Union with the new START treaty. This document, signed by Bush, once approved by Congress, will reduce in record numbers the quantity of nuclear weapons in the two nations.

While foreign policy endeavors in the Middle East led to Bush's high popularity ranking, he lost his bid for re-election because of his lack of a clear domestic agenda.

Support at home is just as important as victories abroad. He never admitted there was a recession in our nation, and this denial separated Bush from the American people. Many will say Bush never had the opportunity to implement his domestic plan because of gridlock between him and Congress. Compromise is a vital part of politics, and Bush, a veteran politician, failed to exercise this option — except when signing a certain tax increase.

Talk about controlling the deficit and providing tax breaks for the middle class gave President-elect Bill Clinton the boost he needed to win. Bush failed to do either of these things during his tenure.

Bush re-emphasized American strength abroad. Now it's time to look inward and begin cleaning house.

Tipper Gore in favor of controlling choices

In Jimmy Gish's column in the Dec. 2 edition of the Kentucky Kernel, he made many mundane assumptions and failed to recognize many important points in the Tipper Gore/Parent Music Resource Center controversy.

First of all, Gish said that the PMRC puts the "Parental Advisory" labels on themselves, which is wrong. The industry must decide which albums get these labels.

Webster's Ninth New Collegiate Dictionary defines tolerance as the "capacity to endure pain or hard-ship" or "the act of allowing something."

I have never met a person, nor do I anticipate meeting anyone,

I have never met a person, nor do I anticipale meeting anyone, who wants only that others endure his presence or permit him to live peacefully and happilly. Most of the men and women with whom I have had associations couldn't care less wheether main-stream society is up for an endurance test. What they are looking for is an appreciation that comes only from knowledge and understanding. Herein lies the discrepancy be-

for is an appreciation that comes only from knowledge and understanding.

Herein lies the discrepancy between the intent and actuality of the tolerance phenomenon.

Placed within the context of hared and discrimination, tolerance has no true function. It is a catchword, a smokescreen and a con.

Now that tolerance of social outcasts has come into vogue, many people have given over to false complacency. By making the conscious decision to tolerate alienated groups, they have wrongfully absolved themselves of the guilt that goes along with harboring prejudices.

However, consciousness is only half the problem.

The roots of people's bigotry are buried within the subconscious. Repairing these splintered roots takes quite a bit of effort and will-power. The great majority of peo-



ple are not ready to begin reparations of this type.

And fast-food terms like "tolerance" keep them from having to.

What patronizing words and
phrases don't do is spark action.
They merely provide nontreatening, high-gloss alternatives
to the status quo.

Embracing this concept is another
way for the guilty to set themselves
free. The only problem is they built
the prison and equipped it with a
magician's handbook of secret
hatches and optical illusions, One of
which is the mirage of social harmony we call tolerance.

It reeks of the same superficial
thinking that produced the term
"color blind."

Somebody somewhere figured it

thinking that produced the term "color bilind."

Somebody somewhere figured it would be a good idea to pretend that racial differences do not exist, that a perfect society consists of individuals who find peace in transparency. This is a foolish notion.

No matter how color bilind people by to be, no matter how much tolerance a society can muster up, the results will always be the same — bitterness and division.

A white friend in high school often told me that I wasn't like other black students she knew; I was better. At the time, I was too Tattered and naive to realize that I had been insulted. My friend, for some reason, liked me but tolerated everyone else who was black.

On several occasions, she made

No matter how color blind people try to be, no matter how much tolerance a society can

muster up, the results will always be the same - bitterness and division.

negative comments about blacks and coupled those remarks with a sneer that has become so familiar to me. If ever there were a while person who could do no more than tolerate the presence of black people, it was this one.

Soon I concluded that she liked me because I never make an issue of my race, never showed my coffer. I was a safe Negro. And as long as 4-did not make her view me as a black person, I was OK. She saw me through color-blind eyes which was, in essence, her way of denying the obvious.

That's where her tolerance got me — separated from the very people I should have been defend-

She (it could just as well have been "he," for I had plenty of preji-diced white male friends) repre-sents the danger hidden in the word loterance. Anyone can subscribe to this way of thinking without chang-ing a single stereotype or resolving a bit of harted. An easily acceptable term, toler-ance can deceive the most militant of oppressed people if they are not careful. It is a philosophy that promises





Commedition and the struggle is a continuing one and that each step helps you see the next one."

He said that "each one of us is a soldier. From the cradle age to the graveyard age, we need to be trying to make life better for someone else.

else.

"We need to teach nonviolence and love as a better method of meeting and greeting each other and solving problems."

Shuttlesworth said nonviolence is more thinking than doing because acting correctly requires that a person be thinking correctly.

To further explain how nonviolence works, he told a story of seeing a young man ask to shake King's hand. But when King extended his hand the young man punched him in the face.

Shuttlesworth said King did not even frown but calmly asked, "Did it help you to hurt me?" and refused to press charges.

"You don't need to be had to be good, and you don't need to be mad. For who the gods will destroy, they first make mad," Shuttlesworth said.

"King) was real," he said. "It is better to be than to seem to be." He recalled his last conversation with King before his assassination in April 1968. He said King told him we just got to win Memphis. We will be the demphis make mitament and garbage out of garbage workers."

Shuttlesworth said he had no doubt that there was a conspiracy in the death of King and the Kennedys.

Yesterday's program included

UK's response to the criticism's stated that greater involvement of full-time faculty in introductory courses will be a priority, and that by 1994 the goal is to require all graduate teaching assistants have a master's degree in the discipline they are teaching assistants have a master's degree in the discipline they are teaching.

The committee called for more privileges for faculty members, saying UK should continue its efforts "to adjust faculty salaries to levels more competitive with those of the benchmark institutions and other peer universities" and to adopt a maternity, paternity and adoption leave policy.

Advising for undergraduates should be more consistent and co-ordinated, the committee also recommended.

The report said the University ad-Wethington will release the re-structuring report at today's Board of Trustess meeting. The committee recommended that students have an increased role in decision making. UK responded that students already have adequate means to impact decision making, but that the University will publicize those means more adequately in the future.

The report said the University advising is not as organized as it needs to be and is lacking in re-

UK replied that better advising will occur in stages and that a coordinated advising system will be in place by fall.

"The committee has particular concern about the heavy reliance across the University on teaching assistants in introductory courses," the report stated.


