

The Graduate School

The mass meeting last Thursday night was a disappointment insofar as numbers were concerned, but the interest shown in the proposed constitution was a revelation.

For too many years, some of us have been stituing back decrying the student apathy on really vital questions, but now we can no longer use that excuse. Criticism, protest, questions, applause and abuse may prove to be disheartening at times but they will always be stimulating.

Now that an interest has been shown in self-government, we can settle down to an actual discussion and analyzation of the plan. Principally for the sake of convenience, suggestions for changes in the constitution are to be sent to the KERNET. As the student paper, the KERNET, will do its utmost to see that each of these suggestions is accorded full and serious consideration at the committee meetings, but it can not promise a revision. For that reason, those students interested in seeing that changes are made in the document will best serve their interests by attending the meetings to present their reasons forcefully.

First objection received concerned the Graduate School. As the original constitution now

stands, graduate students are not allowed to hold office not to vote on officers for the student government. They are not represented in the legislature, consequently may not vote on members of the legislature. (Note: To conform with the constitution, the circular distributed on the campus should have read—section three, article one, part three—"Having fulfilled the foregoing requirements, the candidates will run in a general election in which any undergraduate student of the University of Kentucky may vote.")

Graduate students were eliminated because, as a rule, they are not interested in strictly student affairs. Usually, they are too busy to be interested. Secondly, scholastic requirements for these students are so high that in most cases they would be unable to give sufficient time to a student office. Furthermore, many of them are graduate assistants and as such can not properly be classed as students.

However, it seems reasonable that if they are to have no voice in student government, they should not come under the jurisdiction of that student government. Although probably implied in the present constitution, some definite statement to that effect should be included. Or, if a majority of graduate students feel that they could find time to run for office and adequately administer the duties of that office, then some plan should be formulated whereby they are given representation. The second objection received was that concerning Law School representation in the legislature. This, along with individual college representation, will be discussed in Friday's issue.
