UT scores with 38 seconds left to win

No Hudson, no problem

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — With less than 10 minutes left in the game. UK had the ball and a 31:29 lead at Tennessee.

That fact itself is worth repeating, but what happened next was even more surprising. As everyone knows, UK doesn't beat UT. Not at home, not on the road, not in rain, not in snow. Not in a box, not with a fox.

So, with UK clinging to a slim lead in the fourth quarter, the Cats should play it safe—that's what they had done all season, just try to hang around and hope they fall into a win. They didn't. Instead, they played aggressively and took a shot at the Vols.

Saturday's game against Tennessee was no different as the Cats were clinging to a 31-29 lead with 3:31 left. UT's Gerald Riggs scored on a 12-yard run with 38 seconds left to put the Volunteers up for good.

# Iran to suspend nuclear program

WASHINGTON — Dropping a last minute demand yesterday, Iran agreed to fully suspend its nuclear programs and won some additional concessions from Europe for a resolution that excludes many of the Bush administration's proposals for increasing pressure on the Islamic republic.

The resolution — drafted by Britain, France and Germany — is the mildest of the seven previous resolutions against Iran and does not include the explicit threat the White House had sought for reporting Tehran to the U.N. Security Council if it breaks the latest suspension.

Instead, the resolution, which The Washington Post obtained yesterday, calls on the director of the International Atomic Energy Agency to inform countries if Iran does not adhere to its pledges. But the weaker language makes clear the IAEA's verification is "essential" for knowing whether the commitment is being kept, and US. Officials said that wording at least made clear it was up to the agency, not Iran, to determine whether the agreement was being honored.



Iran has been under IAEA investigation

Iran has been under IAEA investigation for two years, and inspectors frequently visit the country. But under international treaty laws, Iran is not obligated to provide access to military sites and has been cooperating voluntarily with the investigation.

Iran's commitment to halt its nuclear programs was part of an agreement it reached with Britain, France and Germany two weeks ago. In exchange for the suspension, the European trio promised Iran they wouldn't support Washington's attempts to refer the case to the Security Council as long as

# AIDS crosses encourage action

A student organization hopes that 8,000 one-foot-high wood crosses blanketing the grass in front of WT Young Library will serve as a reminder of the deadly nature of acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

The UK chapter of the Student Global AIDS campaign set up the crosses — one for every person in the world who dies from the disease each day — late last night in an effort or raise awareness about AIDS and educate UK's campus, said Griffin VanMeter, the group's vice president.

"It's going to be an annual thing — it should be a daily thing, really — until we start addressing the problem," said VanMeter, an agricultural economics and political science sophomore.

The group, which is comprised of undergraduates mostly tied to the medical school, formed last semester

A couple hundred people subscribe to the group's e-mail listsery, he said.

"We are trying to fight AIDS by putting political pressure on our politicians to change our nation's AIDS policies," vamMeter said.

For developing and Third World countries, the disease is "a death sentere" because funding that could go toward buying medicine is instead paying off foreign-aid debts that should be erased, VanMeter said.

"It's ironic because they've paid back billions in principle, but now they've stude with
the interest in foreign aid." he said. "AIDS is a
problem everywhere."

He said the UK group — along with about
70 other college chapters — also hopes to convince US, politicians to allocate more money
to the global fund, an initiative to combat discases like AIDS and malaria while educating
people about them as well.

## UK participates in joint-grant roadway study

UK participates in joint-grant rodway study.

The Kentucky Transportation Center—part of the UK College of Engineering—will work with the Asphalt Institute to conduct roadway research as part of a \$500,000 federal grant, UK announced Wednesday.

U.S. Sens. Jim Bunning and Mitch McConnell, both Kentucky Republicans, worked to secure the grant for UK earlier in the year.

The money is allocated in the 2005 federal Transportation Appropriations Bill, which is still waiting for President Bush's approval.

In the project, the Kentucky Transportation Center and the Asphalt Institute will examine the effects of pavement construction practices and the durability of asphalt pavements.

Most American roads today are paved with asphalt.



Otto declined to give a reason as to why he was leaving the force, but a UK press release said he resigned to pursue "educational opportunities." There was no immediate word as to who would be Otto's permanent replacement.

Under Hudson, UK ranked 115th out of 117 NCAA Division 1-A teams in scoring this year, and the coach consistently drew criticism from fans angry with the way he was managing the offense. The Cats showed how much Hudson really meant to the team when they put up 31 points in the season finale against 15th-ranked Tennessee. Maybe if he had resigned before the season, UK would have been looking at a bowl game. Or at least beaten Ohio.

• UK's NCAA self-study steering committee put forth a • UK s NCAA self-study steering committee put forth a plan last week to try to increase graduation rates of student-athletes to 51 percent by 2009. The most recent NCAA statis-tics have UK's student-athlete graduation rate at 46 percent, which is the second-lowest percentage of the 12 Southeastern Conference institutions. By contrast, the average graduate rate for UK students is 61 percent. UK Athletic Director Mitch Barnhart wants athletes' graduations to mirror the universi-ty's rate. Athletes who actually graduate — now there's a novel idea.


