Representation In Student Government

Elsewhere in today's paper is a story of the positive action taken by the University Senate in regard to the new form of student government. If any of the students who "sat in" on the first part of the meeting were prepared for a Senatt yasen and shelvest motion, they were disappointed. The interest and spontaniety of response to the plea for a better form of student government was everything that could be asked, and the Ksavar, would like to take this opportunity to thank the faculty members for their active concern about student welfare.

Representation In The Legislatur

Representation In The Legislature
As announced in last issue, the Krassa plans to discuss from time to time different phases of the proposed student government constitution. Immediately following the mass meeting, a state-ment affixed with more than 50 signatures was received from the law college men. The state-ment asks for three representatives from this college rather than one as stipulated in the present constitution. Reasons given are that the Law group is a body definitely interested in affairs of government, and that whereas the senior class is allowed one representative on the legislature for every 89 students, the law college gets only one representative out of 125 students. It is also emphasized that men in that college are older and many have college degrees.

Another communication, which borders on the same subject, suggests that the system of proportional representation by colleges be used. The writer stresses the fact that under the present system of having only classes represented, it will be possible for one or two powerful colleges to control the election. Although that is a valid criticism in that it is a possibility, it doesn't seem very probable because the stringent requirements for candidates will necessarily narroot the field and make it difficult for any or or two colleges to onto the colled and make it difficult for any or or two colleges to have enough candidates running in the general election to make a general "hand."

On the other hand, the legislature must be kept small in number for greatest efficiency. The present number, including president and two vice-presidents, totals 21. Under the representation by colleges system, arts and sciences would rate 10. agriculture—4, engineering—5, one merce—4, education—1, and law—1. Adding the three efficiers, that would make a legislature of 25. Also, there would be a chance that aimost all of those elected would be seniors. That would kill one of the purposes of this government, namely, to keep it alive continually by training lower-classmen for the following year.

Arts and sciences might be divided into classes but it wouldn't be very feasible for the other colleges. There might be some sort of a happy compromise effected by including some provision for a member-at-large from each college, but that would necessitate additional elections and a large legislature.

In regard to the lawyers, the reason that college was given a special representative was that law students are so difficult to classify. Some of the first year men are juniors, others seniors, and still others are graduates. However, it seems just that they be given representation equal in proportion to that of the senior class if there are only a very few juniors in the alow college. The proportion would be figured on the basis of law college enrollment less the number of juniors in the college, or compared with the juniors can class average representation which would amount to about one out of 116. Of course, there are many graduates in the college who might be said to offset the number of juniors, yet graduate students as a rule are so busy that thes have even little time for courside activities.

It is superfluous to say that both the class and college representation systems have evils but with the information at hand, it seems that the better of the two is the present one, class representation. But the KERNEL would suggest these changes: two representatives from the Law school, if the number of juniors is low; and some stipulation requiring that of those elected, each college be represented by at least one student.


