The faculty met in called session in the President's room at 8:00 am. Prof. Shackelford Chairman.

All present except President Patterson Prof. White, Pryor, and Capt Swigert.

The Classical faculty submitted the following which was approved.

Resolved: That no course in the College, the completion of which is required for the Bachelor's Degree, shall consist (exclusive of Military Science) of less than thirty two full half year studies, reckoning each full year study as the equivalent of two half year studies.

Prof Miller offered the following as a test of the opinion of the faculty.

Resolved:- That it be the sense of this Faculty that it is desirable some knowledge of Latin and one other foreign language (preferably Greek) be possessed by students before they enter the Freshman Class, whether they intend to matriculate in the Classical or some one of the Scientific Courses, and in order to carry out the spirit of this resolution it is desirable that both in the Academy and in the schools the College accredits there be but one course arranged as preparatory to the various Courses in the College; and that this Course include at least two years of Preparatory Latin, one of Preparatory Greek, (or its equivalent in a modern language), and one year in elementary science.
Carried as follows:

Profs Neville and W.K. Patterson voted aye
^{expressly} as a mere matter of opinion,
but stated that they opposed the resolution
as a matter of expediency.
