

**WORKING TICKETS**—Address requests to Sports Information Office as far in advance as possible. Tickets will not be mailed unless requested and will be held at the Information Window at the main entrance of Memorial Coliseum for pickup on game night.

#### KENTUCKY BASKETBALL OUTLOOK 1970-71

Despite the loss of All-American Dan Issel, who set or tied 23 individual season records and 18 individual career records, and Mike Pratt, a two-time All-Southeastern Conference forward, Coach Adolph Rupp's Wildcats still are favorites to capture their fourth consecutive Southeastern Conference Championship.

Giving the nation's winningest coach (836 victories, 177 losses) reason to smile is a returning corps of lettermen, who last year helped set or tie 17 team season records, and some fine prospects from the '70 freshman team.

Since the guard corps of Terry Mills, Jim Dinwiddie, Kent Hollenbeck and Stan Key returns intact, the big job is to fill the vacancies left by Issel and Pratt.

A prime candidate for the center position is Mark Soderberg, a 6-8 letterman who played in relief of Issel last season. When Issel fouled out with over 10 minutes left against Jacksonville in the final of the NCAA Mid-East regional, Soderberg came in and gave a fine performance to lead the Wildcats from an 11-point deficit to a chance to win before Jacksonville iced it in the last 30 seconds.

Challenging the big Californian will be Jim Andrews, 6-11, who averaged 28.4 points and 13.8 rebounds per game for last year's freshman team. The big native of Lima, Ohio, hit 55.5 per cent of his field goal attempts.

Also eligible for competition is Tom Payne, a 7-foot high school All-American who averaged 22 points and 15 rebounds for the Lexington AAU team last season and was selected the league's most valuable player.

Lexington Coach Scotty Baesler, a former UK captain, said, "Tom is the greatest clutch performer I have seen on the basketball court and he's only 19."

The center position is apparently a three-way battle. So is the forward post vacated by Pratt, who averaged 19.3 points and 9.4 rebounds. Returning after being named SEC "Sophomore of the Year" is Tom Parker, a 6-6 southpaw who came off the bench in early February and started against Mississippi after roommate Larry Steele received a wrist injury in practice. Parker, who had played sparingly to that point, averaged 18 points and 10 rebounds in a starting role, averaged 50.4 per cent from the field and finished as the team's third high scorer with 260 points, an average of 10.4 points and 7.2 rebounds per game.

Steele never regained his starting berth, but recovered from the injury and played well in the NCAA. He finished with 9.8 points and 6.3 rebounds a game and won the team free throw trophy, hitting 45 of 49 for 91.8 per cent, a UK record.

The squad also will be strengthened by the return of Mike Casey, a two-time AII-SEC performer who missed last season after receiving a broken leg in an auto accident in the summer of 1969. Casey, starting guard on the 1968-69 Wildcat NCAA squads, is 16th on the list of top all-time Kentucky scorers with an average of 19.9 points a game. He also holds the UK assists record of 129 in a single season.

Moving into the varsity ranks with Andrews are two other Lima natives—Steve Penhorwood, a 6-4 guard, and Dan Perry, a 6-8 forward—and Larry Stamper, a 6-5 forward from Beattyville, Ky.

Stamper was the second leading scorer (15.2) and rebounder (12.0) on the 1969-70 Frosh squad. Perry averaged 9.7 points and 6.0 rebounds. Penhorwood 9.2 points and 4.9 rebounds.

The 1968-69 and 1969-70 squads were the highest scoring combinations ever at UK and left a big challenge for the 1970-71 squad. Records set last season included most points (2709), highest scoring average (96.8), most field goals made (1099), highest field goal percentage (49.8) and most conference victories (17).



## THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY . . . The State Is Our Campus

Located in Lexington, an urban community of over 155,000 population in the heart of Kentucky's famed Blue Grass region, University of Kentucky is a state-supported, land-grant institution which celebrated its centennial year in 1965.

The present school, which this fall enrolled 27,740 students and now offers instruction in 10 academic colleges plus a Graduate School and a Community College system of 13 centers, had its beginnings in 1865 when it was established as a part of old Kentucky University. This action by the State Legislature united sectarian and public education under one organization for the first time. Federal funds authorized under the Morrill Act were used to develop agriculture and mechanical arts within KU and, in 1878, A&M College was separated from KU to become a separate state institution on the general site of what is now the 706 acre main campus. Name changes in 1908 and 1916 resulted in the title by which the school is now known.

It is fully accredited in its respective colleges and departments by all of the

major professional societies and educational organizations.

President of the University is Dr. Otis A. Singletary, 48, who came to Lexington in 1969 from the University of Texas, Austin, where he was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs.

Dr. Singletary, who is eighth president of the University, served a total of eight years at Texas, progressing during seven (1954-61) of those years from instructor to professor, associate dean of Arts and Sciences and assistant to the president. Then for five years (1961-66), he was chancellor of the University of North Carolina, although he was on leave from October 1964 to January 1966 to serve as director of the Job Corps, Office of Economic Opportunity.

## HARRY C. LANCASTER Director of Athletics

Harry C. Lancaster has smoothly completed the transition from basketball coach to athletic director after one full year's departure from the basketball scene.

The veteran coach, who suffered an ailment earlier in the year which required a long hospital stay, bounced back quickly and picked up reins he has held since he

was named acting athletic director in September 1968 and permanent AD three months later.

After assuming full time duties as AD, the long time assistant to Coach Adolph Rupp relinquished his freshman coaching duties to Joe Hall and silently began giving up other coaching duties until season's end.

Basketball's loss was the University's gain over-all as Lancaster quickly moved to accept the position of leadership which had been relegated in an "acting" capacity first to Robert L. Johnson and then to Lancaster since the death of Bernie A. Shively Dec. 10, 1967.

The Rupp-Lancaster association, begun after the latter was discharged from the Navy as a lieutenant (s.g.) in 1946, has been one of mutual respect and harmony. Rupp, who always prides himself as one who "surrounds myself with the best people for the job at hand," made Lancaster a full assistant in 1948. During the two previous years, the youthful Navy veteran had busied himself by serving as part-time assistant while carrying on teaching duties and studying for a master's degree.

The dual duties, plus extra studies, were second nature to Lancaster, who had served as assistant football and basketball coach at Georgetown College (1932-33) and Paris High School (1933-34), head basketball coach at Bagdad High School (1934-36) and principal and coach at Gleneyrie High School (1936-42) and physical education instructor at UK in 1942. He was to continue that trend of carrying extra loads, serving as UK's baseball coach for 17 seasons prior to relinquishing the post following the 1965 campaign and teaching physical education for 18 years.

Basketball was his forte, however, and in addition to coaching Rupp's freshman teams, he was always at the side of the "baron" during the heat of battle. In his own right, Lancaster has traveled extensively and received a signal honor when he was invited to prepare the Greek National Basketball Team for the 1968 Olympics. A sixweek tour in Athens was cancelled when Lancaster was asked to stay home and serve as acting athletics chief of staff.


#### Traveled To Greece In 1951

Lancaster had traveled to Greece in the summer of 1951 on a special athletic assignment for the U.S. State Department. The mission called for him to act as an advisor to Greek Basketball Federation officials in Olympic procedures and other matters. He also conducted numerous clinics and coaching schools and gave public lectures on the cage sport. During the summer of 1962, he helped Coach Rupp conduct clinics for Army personnel in the Far East Theater and worked with Rupp on the team's Middle East Tour in 1966 and a clinic in Germany in the summer of 1967.

It is ironic that Lancaster gained greatest fame in basketball, since he always considered himself a better football player. He was an all-conference halfback for three straight years and captain during his last two seasons at Georgetown College and also played semi-pro ball in Louisville and Cincinnati. His success on the basketball court was equally great, however, as he earned three all-conference nominations and two team captaincies. As a coach, he guided Kentucky yearlings to 204 victories, against only 57 losses, against formidable competition that included the more elite junior college clubs and top-notch service teams. He posted respectable records as a baseball coach and gave the school its winningest seasons in history by registering identical 18-8 marks in 1959-1960.

A native of Paris, Ky., Lancaster attended Paris High School, where he lettered in football, basketball and baseball under Coach Blanton Collier. At Georgetown College, he was president of Kappa Alpha Social Fraternity and the Student Body during his senior year. He is one of four persons named honorary life members by the organization of sports letter winners at the University.

He was married to the late Mrs. Katherine Louise Wright of Christiansburg. A daughter, Mrs. Dan Spain Jr. and two grandchildren, Kevin, 7, and Dana, 5, live in Rockville, Md. His father, U. F. Lancaster, resides at Richmond, Ky.

#### ADOLPH FREDERICK RUPP

"World's Winningest Collegiate Basketball Coach"

40 Years - Won 836, Lost 177 - 82.5 %

Kentucky's legendary "Baron of Basketball" passed his 1,000th game as coach of the Wildcats during the middle of last season and the occasion was duly recorded and celebrated.

During the span which began with a 67-19 victory over Georgetown a week before Christmas in 1930, Rupp has garnered every major honor afforded his pro-

fession.

Entering the current season, he reigns as president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches and is a full-fledged member of the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame, having been inducted into that shrine at Springfield, Mass.,

in the spring of 1969.

It is fitting that Rupp should occupy a hallowed niche in the Hall of Fame. During his collegiate days as a guard on two national championship teams at the University of Kansas, he was personally acquainted with Dr. Naismith, inventor of basketball and a faculty member at Kansas. Rupp's coach was the veteran Forrest Claire (Phog) Allen, who is past 80 and today lives quietly in retirement among his friends, souvenirs and memories in Lawrence, Kansas.

Rupp visited Allen during a weekend stay in Lawrence last spring.

The occasion was Commencement exercises at the University, where alumnus Rupp received the Distinguished Service Citation, highest honor the University and Alumni Association bestow. The citation was presented before a packed house in Allen Field House by Chancellor E. Laurence Chalmers.

The honor undoubtedly was a high point in a star-studded coaching, business and civic career which has elevated Rupp to the loftiest standing ever achieved by a col-

legiate basketball coach.

During the 1969-70 season, he overcame many unexpected and almost catastrophic setbacks to lead his team to the No. 1 rating in all national collegiate bas-

ketball polls.

The first blow came in the summer of 1969, when two-time All-SEC guard Mike Casey received a broken leg (in three places) in an automobile accident and was out for the season.

Rupp also had foot trouble aggravated by diabetes and was ordered to bed as pre-season practice got under way. He left the bed only to attend practice sessions

and utilized a foot rest during early season games.

Also during the season, All-SEC forward Mike Pratt received a broken nose, All-American center Dan Issel received a severe stone bruise which undoubtedly was a factor in the Wildcats' only regular season loss—to Vanderbilt—and two-year starter Larry Steele broke a wrist bone.

Despite the adversities, Rupp coached his team to its 25th SEC championship since the league was organized in 1933. En route to their record 18th appearance in the NCAA Tournament, the Wildcats set or tied 17 team records and went on the book as the most potent offensive unit in the school's fine basketball history.

The 26-2 record brought Rupp's score to 836 victories against only 177 losses, an amazing 82.5 winning percentage against the best opposition the nation could offer.

The magic of Rupp naturally has resulted in an increasing demand for that most scarce Kentucky product—a ticket to a University of Kentucky basketball game. For the past several years, there has been no public sale of the precious tickets; students, faculty, staff and holders of coveted season priorities are allotted the approximately 11,500 available seats and the waiting list grows longer and longer.

During the past spring and summer, a movement was instigated to determine the interest in a new "Rupp Arena" which would seat 28,000 for a basketball game. Thousands of computer cards, asking for pledges of so much money for the right to purchase tickets, were distributed throughout the state and the response was described as nothing short of tremendous, a fitting tribute to a coach, who, in addition to all the aforementioned honors, includes in his portfolio such credentials as:

- —An amazing 836 victories out of 1013 starts for an unparalleled winning percentage of 82.5 percent against major competition.
- —Certification by the NCAA Service Bureau as the nation's most successful collegiate basketball coach, both for the decade ending in 1961 and at the 20-year level.
- —Selection as the unanimous national "Coach of the Year" in 1966 for the fourth time in his career and runner-up for the 1957 and 1964 seasons.
- —Honored in 1967 by Columbus (Ohio) Touchdown Club as "Coach of the Century."
- —Four NCAA Tournament championships picked up by his Wildcats who hold the all-time record of 18 appearances in the national classic.
- -Coach of the International Universities Tournament champions in 1966.
- —A nominal world championship as co-coach of the successful USA entry in the 1948 Olympic Games which included members of Kentucky's NCAA champions.
- -Producer of more Olympic gold medallion winners (7) than any other cage coach.
- —An all-time record total of 25 Southeastern Conference titles since the league was organized in 1933.
- —Election to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 1959 and previous selection (in 1944) by Helms Athletic Foundation as a member of their exclusive Hall of Fame.
- —Trustee and member of selection and honors committees of Basketball Hall of Fame. Also chairman NABC Hall of Fame Committee and heads the group that selects players to appear in East-West All-Star Game benefitting the Hall of Fame.
- —Recipient of the Governor's Medallion in 1959 for meritorious service to the Commonwealth of Kentucky and plaques of appreciation from the U.S. Air Force (1959) and Sugar Bowl committee (1951).
- —Election to the Kentucky Hall of Fame (1945), outstanding citizen of Lexington (1949) and twice honorary citizen of the City of New Orleans. Enrolled in the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame in 1965.
- -SEC coach-of-the-year in 1964 and 1966.
- —Chosen "Deltasig of the Year" for 1966 by the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Phi, professional fraternity in commerce and business administration.
- —Development of more All-Americans (21 players honored 32 times) and more material for the pro ranks (28) than any other coach.
- —Five Sugar Bowl Tournament championships, a National Invitation Tournament title and 12 trophies from the 17 previous UK Invitational Tournaments.
- -Membership on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee.
- —More overseas clinic trips (seven to Europe, three to the Far East, and one to the Near East) for U.S. Government than any other coach. Also visited Alaska in 1968.
- —Selected as an official goodwill ambassador to the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City representing the National Association of Basketball Coaches.
- -Election to Kansas Hall of Fame.
- —SEC coach-of-the-year in 1968, '69 and '70.
- —Honored as Outstanding Kentuckian by Southeastern Kentucky Homecoming Committee at Booneville, Ky., in 1969.

#### Rupp's Teams Play In Most Tournaments

Tournament invitations in pre-Rupp years were almost unheard of—Kentucky played in only eight sectional eliminations. In contrast, the Rupp-led Wildcats have

the distinction of playing in more tournaments of all types than any other team. All told, his Blue Grass fives have achieved the unequalled feat of 152 victories against only 37 defeats, covering action in 37 national classics plus 21 conference meets, the '48 Olympics and the International Universities Tournament of 1966.

Although the competition was nowhere near as rugged as the schedules played by today's nationally-recognized Wildcat brigades, Rupp's very first team compiled a highly-successful 15-3 record and Kentucky basketball has been on a winning plane ever since. The most games lost in a single season since Rupp added his touch were 13 in 1966-67. The remarkably low average number of losses per season in the Rupp Era is four and he can boast of never having a losing season.

Rupp's teams have finished as national champion in the press association polls seven times in the last 22 years. They were unranked in the top 20 only in the 1952-53 campaign, when they were idle, and in three other seasons. Possibly his greatest achievement came in the 1953-54 season when the Wildcats rolled unchecked through a 25-game schedule of top-flight opposition to become the biggest-winning, perfect-

record unit in all basketball history up to that time.

Rivaling that achievement, in the opinion of the sportswriters and broadcasters, is the tremendous coaching jobs turned in by the basketball miracle man in more recent seasons. In 1956, Rupp guided a moderately talented club to an eighteenth SEC title, third place in the polls and a ninth NCAA Tournament appearance while achieving a 23-5 record. The surprised experts, who had predicted UK would not win its own conference, voted Coach Rupp the runner-up spot as 1957 "Coach of the Year."

Even that effort went by the boards in 1958, however, as Kentucky's talentless wonders copped the NCAA title for an unprecedented fourth time. The Wildcats were unsung and almost unknown except by reputation and heritage. Not a single man had been honored on the All-Conference fives selected before tournament time and they had lost more games (6) in regular season play than any UK team in 17 years.

If the experts thought that was tops in miracles, they reckoned without the amazing drive of Rupp. With four-fifths of his starting lineup gone, he rebuilt shattered foundations in such an astonishing fashion that the Wildcats rolled through the 1959 season almost unchecked. Although they failed to win the title in their increasingly-tough Southeastern Conference for only the third time since 1943, UK was generally conceded to be the nation's top team. Most experts agreed that the Kentuckians, who finished with a 24-3 record and ranked second nationally, missed a golden opportunity to pick up a fifth NCAA crown as they were upset by Louisville in the tourney opener. This feeling was given meaning as Rupp was accorded "Coach of the Year" honor by United Press International.

The 1959-60 season admittedly was not a great one as the UKats chalked up only an 18-7 mark—second worst season of the Rupp Era. However, many experts considered the outcome to be a tribute to one of the greatest coaching efforts ever turned in. Plagued from the beginning of the season to the end by adversity (sickness, injuries, eligibility difficulties and personnel problems), complete disaster was always imminent and avoided only by masterful juggling (16 different starting combos) and

artful strategy moves.

It was a similar story of great coaching technique against the heavy odds of personnel and schedule in 1960-61. Although the final record read only 19-9, a closer look reveals the touch of Rupp was there for the Wildcats were regrouped into a fear-some outfit after early troubles and rolled to 11 wins in their last 12 starts. En route they conquered eventual SEC champ Mississippi State on the road and demolished Vanderbilt in an SEC Playoff for an NCAA berth. They never ran out of gas until stopped by Ohio State in regional finals.

#### Tremendous Season Envolves In 1961-62

There was no way of anticipating the tremendous season that evolved in 1961-62 except to depend on the proven touch of master rebuilder Rupp. Minus four starters off the 19-9 outfit of the year before, Rupp guided his "Fearless Five" to

victory in the UK Invitational and cornered a share of the league title for the 20th time. Finally, lack of bench strength and superior height caused the UKats' downfall in the NCAA regional finals and they stowed away their gear with a surprising 23-3 mark.

Not much could be said for 1962-63, which resulted in the posting of the poorest record (16-9) of the Rupp Era up to that time. except that it easily could have been worse without a dedicated coaching effort. Although their surge fell disappointedly short in quest for a fifth NCAA title, the 1963-64 Ruppmen blazed a torrid path that led to high national ranking all season long. Before a critical lack of height and too demanding a schedule caught up with them, the Wildcats waltzed to titles in two major seasonal tournaments (UKIT and Sugar Bowl) and copped an unprecedented 21st SEC Championship. Again lacking the vital height to control the boards and missing bench strength, the 1964-65 Kentuckians suffered through the worst season in Rupp's 35 years of coaching—a 15-10 mark. The record failed to reflect that the Cats threw scares into a lot of good outfits and wound up strong, taking decisions in seven of their last 10 starts.

The 1965-66 season demanded that Rupp pull more miracles out of his seemingly bottomless "bag of tricks" and he did just that—guiding a rebound from the worst season of his career (15-10 in '65) to the second best. Without a starter taller than 6-5, Rupp's Runts astounded the cage world by rolling to a near-perfect season. En route to attaining runaway recognition by both polls as regular season National Champions, the Ruppmen were edged only once in 25 tests. Only the strain of battling a height disadvantage and sickness prevented a successful claim to a fifth NCAA title—which escaped them in the championship game.

For his obviously amazing coaching job, Rupp was chosen as national "Coach of the Year." The vote was a rare unanimous choice of the man whose critics only

a year before had decided the "old man" was finally slipping.

The season of 1966-67 goes into the record books as the poorest in Coach Rupp's great career. Despite the presence of two returning All-Americans (one with an ailing back), some vital ingredients were missing and the 'Cats floundered to a 13-13 record.

Not one to be kept down, Coach Rupp molded a predominantly sophomore group in 1967-68 into a big winner which copped the SEC crown and advanced to the finals of the NCAA Mideast Regional. The Wildcats repeated as conference champions in 1968-69 as Rupp's bombers almost completely rewrote the record books.

Rupp is recognized by sports authorities with doing more than any other modern tutor to make basketball a national spectator sport. From the very outset of his career at Kentucky, which began in 1930, he has introduced or popularized many new and revised trends in the game that have aided materially in making the country basketball-minded. One such innovation was the controlled fast break offensive pattern that has since become the crowd-pleasing trademark of Wildcat cage teams.

In the summer of 1966, Rupp took his Wildcats on a five-week tour of the Middle East (Greece, Israel and Iran) at the request of the U.S. State Department. The Kentucky good will ambassadors won the International Universities Tournament in Tel Aviv.

Internationally recognized for his avocation as a registered Hereford breederenthusiast, Rupp owns and operates a Blue Grass farm and serves as a director of the Central District Warehousing Corp., world's largest tobacco marketing organization. The coach in 1962 was named to a five-year term on the Board of Governors of the Agricultural Hall of Fame and National Agricultural Center.

Coach Rupp is active in Shrine affairs, being chosen in 1950 as one of the 10 outstanding Shriners of the nation and holding honorary memberships in temples throughout the country. He is a Past Potentate of the Oleika (Lexington) Temple and serves as vice-chairman of the board for the Shrine Crippled Children's Hospital in Lexington.

He has his own television and radio shows during the season, has produced two film shorts ("Basketball: Individual Offense" for Coca-Cola Co. and "Parade to National Championship") and written books on virtually every phase of the game.

Born in Halstead, Kansas, Sept. 2, 1901, Rupp graduated in 1923 from the University of Kansas and coached high school ball one year at Marshalltown, lowa, and then at Freeport, III., four seasons before coming to Kentucky in 1930. His fame as "The Man in the Brown Suit" stems from his superstitious preference of brown as the color of his game-night wardrobe.

The masterful story-teller is equally renowned on the banquet and coaching clinic circuit and is in constant demand as a speaker in the off season. He annually appears in more than a dozen states to make speaking engagements. In 1968, he appeared in Alaska for the Army and went to Mexico City for the Olympics. Rupp undoubtedly has conducted more coaching clinics than any other tutor. Overseas assignments for the Army and Air Force have taken him in recent years to Europe seven times (last, Germany 1967) and three times to Hawaii and the Far East. Several foreign olympic coaches have studied under Rupp at UK.

#### Assistant Coach

Joe B. Hall moved up as No. 1 varsity assistant to Coach Adolph Rupp after Harry C. Lancaster was named permanent athletic director Feb. 1, 1969.



Additional duties for the versatile Coach Hall include coaching the Wildcat freshman team, composed of players he came to know quite well during the recruiting season.

Coach Hall returned "home" to the University July 1, 1965, with a winning background, 126 victories against 75 losses

He posted a 19-6 record at Central Missouri in the 1964-65 season and guided the Mules to their first MIAA Conference championship since 1951 and to their first conference Christmas Tournament title in history.

His first full year at the helm of the Kittens produced the third highest scoring freshman team in UK history. The Kittens scored 1,975 points in compiling a 16-6 ledger against top competition and finished with an 11-3 SEC record.

Hall, who was a 6-foot-1 guard on the 1949 Wildcat team, entered the coaching profession after graduation from UK in 1955. He spent two years at Shepherdsville High School, achieving Coach of the Year honor in the Mid-Kentucky Conference in 1958 as Shepherdsville finished 12th in the state.

Moving into the collegiate field, he served one season as freshman coach and then five years as head coach at Regis College in Denver, Colo., where he posted a 57-49 record.

In addition to his duties at Regis, Hall in 1964 coached the Capital Federal Denver post team in the AAU Tournament and was honored by selection as head coach of the AAU Stripes in the Olympic Trials at Jamaica, N. Y.

He is married to the former Katharine Dennis of Harrison County. They have three children—Judy, Kathy and Stephen.

#### T. L. PLAIN Assistant Coach

The newest member of the Wildcat staff, Plain joined Coach Rupp in July 1969 and is no stranger to the UK scene, having served as a graduate assistant for Rupp after



leaving Kentucky Wesleyan College to work on an advance Jegree here in 1963-64. At Wesleyan, the 44-year-old Navy veteran compiled a 63-34 won-loss record while serving as athletic director, coach and associate professor of physical education from 1959-63.

A native of Sacramento, Ky., he received his B.S. at Western Kentucky University in 1950 and later attended Murray State, Indiana University and UK. He was athletic director, teacher and coach at Breckinridge County High from 1949-53; teacher, athletic director and coach at Henderson City High from 1953-57, and teacher and coach at Lincoln High in Vincennes, Ind., from 1957-59.

Plain returned to Vincennes in 1964 as director of physical education for the Community School Corp. and

basketball coach at Lincoln High. He left there in 1967 to become assistant basketball coach and assistant coordinator of the student teaching program at the University of Louisville. He is married to the former Ann Blalock of Murray. They have three children, Tom, 17, Bob, 13, and Patrick, 10.

RICHARD PARSONS, Assistant Coach—A former Wildcat baseball All-America, Parsons had the distinction of serving as captain of both the UK basketball and baseball teams in 1961. He returned for post-graduate studies in 1968 and helped scout basketball foes. He joined UK as baseball coach in the summer of '69 and was added to Rupp's basketball staff with recruiting and scouting duties.

DR. CLAUDE VAUGHAN, Trainer and Academic Supervisor—Named three years ago to the Wildcat staff was 36-year-old native Kentuckian Claude Vaughan, who took on the vital responsibilities of caring for the mental and physical health of UK players. Dr. Vaughan teaches economics, was born in Paris, Ky., and received all of his academic degrees from University of Kentucky.

JANE ROLLINS, Secretary—A native Lexingtonian, Jane Rollins attended Sacred Heart Academy, Atherton High School and Bryan-Stratton Business College in Louisville and the University of Kentucky. Described by Coach Adolph Rupp as "one of the most loyal employees of our department . . . she's always willing to do her share to make our program successful," she has been secretary to UK basketball since 1955.

**GEORGE HUKLE, Basketball Equip. Mgr. and Statistician**—An invaluable aide to the Kentucky basketball team for longer than most people can remember, George Hukle has served as official statistician for the Wildcats for a great many years and is in his sixth year as cage equipment manager . . . Regarded as the dean of Southeastern Conference statisticians and one of the nation's veterans, Hukle has been keeping charts for Coach Rupp since 1933 . . . He is credited with popularizing the statistic of field goal attempts in collegiate basketball.

RUSSELL RICE, Sports Information Director—Russell Rice was named sports information director at UK in May, 1969, after serving two years as assistant to Ken Kuhn,



who retired after more than two decades of service with the University. Rice came to the Wildcats from The Lexington Leader, where he was a general reporter eight years and sports editor five years. A native of Paintsville, Ky., he won letters in football, basketball and baseball at Van Lear High. After serving with the U.S. Marines in World War II, he attended Kentucky Wesleyan College and received his bachelor's at the University of Kentucky in 1951. Last January he was elected president of the Southeastern Conference Sports Publicity Directors Association. He is married to the former Miss Doris Thacker of Knott County. They have four children—Mrs. Rodney Morris of Louisville, Russell James, 19, Judy, 16, and Kim, 5.

JACK PERRY, Asst. Sports Information Director—Jack Perry came to the University in March as assistant SID after 15 years service in the library of The Lexington



Herald-Leader. A native Lexingtonian, Jack attended the University in 1949-50 before entering the U.S. Air Force, where he served during the Korean War as an airborne radio operator aboard B-29's. He joined The Herald-Leader as assistant librarian in March 1955 and was named head librarian in the spring of 1960. Jack is married to the former Miss Barbara Sanders of Lexington. They have four children—Patti, 17, Debbie, 16, Jack David, 12, and Todd, 10.

#### ATHLETICS AT KENTUCKY

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring intercollegiate competition in ten different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletics Association.

A board of directors, headed by the President of the University in the capacity of chairman, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program.

In addition to the UK President, board officers include the Vice-President for Student Affairs as vice-chairman and Dr. W. L. Matthews in the capacity of secretary. Fourteen other men, drawn from the University faculty and the general public, also serve on the board as appointees of the president as does a student representative.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of the athletic program is Athletic Director Harry C. Lancaster.

The University of Kentucky, again, heads the number of appearances in the Southeastern Conference television "Game of the Week" series. The Wildcats of Adolph Rupp will be featured four times this season.

The nine-week series over a regional network has been set up by TV Sports, Inc., of Paterson, N. J. Producer Eddie Einhorn announced that all games to be televised will be played on Saturday afternoons to avoid interference with non-televised conference games.

Kentucky's appearances before the live television cameras will come against three different opponents this year, with two of the four meetings taking place on the road. In order, the TV opponents will be Tennessee, Louisiana State, Vanderbilt and Tennessee.

The Wildcats, who have been particularly adept in winning before the TV cameras, won all four TV games in 1965-66, two out of four in both 1966-67 and 1967-68, three out of five in 1968-69 and all four in 1969-70.

#### ORIGIN OF "WILDCATS" NICKNAME

Kentucky's athletic teams are known to sports fans as the Wildcats. This first and only nickname borne by University varsities had its origin in 1909 in a speech made by Commandant Corbusier, then head of the military department of old State College. Speaking to a chapel audience of students on the showing of the Kentucky football team in defeating Illinois six to two, the Commandant declared "they fought like Wildcats." The tag was popularized by word of mouth and by the press with the result that it has since become synonymous with all major Kentucky athletic teams.

#### KENTUCKY IN THE SEC

Perhaps the greatest supremacy enjoyed by any team in any sport is reflected by Kentucky's basketball success in the Southeastern Conference since 1933. Against SEC teams in regular season, tournaments and playoffs, UK has annexed a record of 431 victories and lost only 72—a winning average of 85.7 percent. The 'Cats have won 25 league championships and own over 60 team and individual records from regular season and tournament play. Only Tennessee, Vanderbilt and Florida can boast of beating the Wildcats two in a row in the same season and only Mississippi State and Alabama are added to the exclusive club when the basis is widened to consecutive wins over two or more seasons. ## NATIONAL CHAMPIONS FOR SIXTH TIME IN WIRE SERVICE POLLS

The 1969-70 University of Kentucky Wildcats, in posting a 25-1 regular season record, captured the National Championship in both the Associated Press and United Press International wire service polls for the sixth time.

The Wildcats of Coach Adolph Rupp previously were top-ranked in 1949, 1951, 1952, 1954, and 1966.

Kentucky, without the services of two-time All-SEC guard Mike Casey, who was out for the season with injuries sustained in an auto accident, began the season ranked third, behind defending champion UCLA, and South Carolina.

The Wildcats wasted no time in setting their sights on the coveted No. 1 ranking.

They opened at home Dec. 1, by blitzing West Virginia, 106-87, and followed a week later with an even more impressive rout of nationally ranked Kansas, 115-85.

Kentucky then traveled to North Carolina, which had defeated the Wildcats three straight years. The last two Tar Heel victories were sparked by All-American Charlie Scott, a senior who was determined to make it four straight for the home team.

On the eve of the game, it became known that Kentucky had displaced UCLA from the No. 1 ranking. "Word was out there at North Carolina before our game, and they really put the pressure on," Coach Rupp said. "They always try to knock off the No. 1 team."

But the Wildcats, with magnificent performances from Dan Issel and Mike Pratt, beat the Tar Heels, 94-87, and warranted their position the following morning as tops in college basketball.

The No. 1 ranking was to change hands between Kentucky and UCLA three times during the season until the final week, which saw UCLA still at the top.

Kentucky traveled to Knoxville for its final game with Tennessee, Saturday, March 7. The game was spiced with the usual rivalry, but was seen as anti-climatic for Kentucky, which had nailed down its 25th SEC crown two weeks prior at Alabama.

However, Friday, UCLA was upset by cross-town rival Southern Cal., and the complexion and importance of the Tennessee game changed overnight.

The Wildcats knew they couldn't let the opportunity of taking over the No. 1 ranking in the final wire service polls slip away. And it did not slip away.

The next day, Kentucky played one of its most outstanding games on television, as they beat the Volunteers, 86-69. Even more enjoyable for Kentucky partisans was the fact the Wildcats beat Tennessee at their own deliberate game and committed only four floor errors.

The following Tuesday, Kentucky was crowned National Champion in both AP and UPI polls.

A wonderful capping to a truly great season.

#### UK RECORD 20-GAME WINNERS

Kentucky lives up completely to its billing as the all-time champion of major college basketball with its run of 14 straight 20-victory seasons beginning in 1945, according to Boston sports authority Bill Mokray. The Wildcats were not permitted to field a team in 1953, but made up for it with a perfect record (25-0) the following season and continued their streak through 1959. Baron Adolph Rupp's warriors also achieved the magic circle with a 20-3 record in 1933 and posted a 23-3 mark in 1962, 21-6 in 1964, 32-2 in 1966, 22-5 in 1968, 23-5 in 1969, and 26-2 in 1970.

Two-time runner-up Kansas State returns to the University of Kentucky Invitational Tournament Dec. 18-19 for the third time while De Paul and Purdue will make their first appearance in the event.



Coach Adolph Rupp's Wildcats will be seeking their 13th UKIT title and their sixth in a row.

Kansas State first appeared in the tournament in 1961, defeating Xavier, 75-67, in the first round and losing to Kentucky, 80-67, in the championship game. The Wildcats appeared again in 1966, defeating Penn State, 83-59, in the first round and losing to Kentucky, 83-79, in the championship game.

De Paul has played five times in the Coliseum, losing all five games. The Blue Demons have won three games and lost 16 in a series with Kentucky which began in 1943. The last game of the series in 1956 saw De Paul win at home, 81-79.

Purdue has met Kentucky only twice, losing both games. The Wildcats won the opener, 60-54, at Purdue in 1949. The Boilermakers were defeated by the Wildcats, 70-52, Dec. 2, 1950 in the historic Memorial Coliseum Dedication Game.

Kentucky has won 29 and lost five games in 17 previous tournaments.

The Wildcats defeated Navy, 73-59,

in the first round and Duke, 98-76, in the championship game last year.

Wildcats Mike Pratt, Dan Issel and Bob McCowan made the All-UKIT team with Randy Denton of Duke and George Janky of Dayton. McCowan was named most valuable player.

One day back in the 1890's a group of Kentucky football stalwarts met to choose their school colors. Someone suggested blue and white—"blue like Dick Stoll's necktie"—and those colors were immediately adopted. "Dick" Stoll was to become Judge Richard C. Stoll, distinguished public servant and, for more than fifty years before his death, a member of the U.K. board of trustees.

### SUCCESSOR TO A 'WHITE ELEPHANT'

Only a little more than four decades ago, the University of Kentucky provided its basketball team with its second home—a magnificent new Alumni Gymnasium seating 2,800 spectators.

A great many persons freely suggested that the arena would prove to be a "white elephant" which would never be crowded to anywhere near capacity by the sport that then was considered little more than an innocuous winter-months' pastime.

But the hardwood game blitzed the nation and Kentucky's teams forged to the national forefront in such a crowd-pleasing manner that the "huge" hall soon could not begin to accommodate the large number of fans seeking to whet their new-found interest. In fact, the situation soon developed to the point where only the student body and faculty were admitted and for several years about all that Kentuckians at large knew of their state university's famed cage teams consisted of information gleaned from the radio and newspapers.


In 1941, when Dr. H. L. Donovan became president of the University, one of his first recommendations was for a building "that will properly take care of our athletics, our health service, physical education, and recreation." From this beginning came the plan that culminated in the construction of 11,500-seat Memorial Coliseum, an unparalleled edifice costing \$3,925,000 by the time it was completed in 1950.

The huge building, which serves as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentucky heroes who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict, covers an entire city block and contains as much space as a seven-story office building. Situated along Avenue of Champions, the Coliseum is used primarily for basketball games but also serves as the site of a sellout community concert and lecture series as well as numerous physical education classes and conventions.

In sharp contrast to the early days in Alumni Gym, the present hall plays host to approximately 150,000 Kentuckians annually for appearances of the famous Wildcat cage teams alone and interest is increasing with such strides, as evidenced by sellout crowds throughout the past several seasons, that even this splendid arena is rapidly becoming too small.

### THE NCAA IN MEMORIAL COLISEUM

University of Kentucky's spacious Memorial Coliseum has been the site of portions of the NCAA Tournament eight times since its completion in 1950. First round playoffs were staged in the UK Coliseum in 1955, 1959, 1960 and 1962 while regional tournaments were held in the building in 1957, 1958, 1965, and 1968. The Wildcats played in three regional eliminations, being eliminated by Michigan State in '57; defeating Miami (Ohio) and Notre Dame in '58 en route to their fourth and last National Championship, and dropping a one-point decision to Ohio State in 1968.



### THAT WAS NO ZONE DEFENSE!'-RUPP

Always ready with a colorful quip for doting members of the press-radio-TV corps, Kentucky Coach Adolph Rupp sent his listeners rushing to their dictionaries in 1963-64 when he came up with a colorful description of a new defense installed in early season. Sportswriters who witnessed the special 1-3-1 point defense for the first time against Tennessee in January were inclined to refer to it as a "zone." But Baron Rupp, to whom the term "zone defense" had long been one of the most abhorred in his vocabulary and a pattern never used by his Wildcats, cagily denied this. "We never have used the zone at Kentucky and never intend to," he declared with tongue in cheek. "That was no zone. It was simply a stratified, transitional, hyperbolic paraboloid." STHP carried the UKats to a successful quest of the conference title and an NCAA berth. They lost only once in regular season play using the special defense—that coming in the final game with St. Louis. In an earlier upset at the hands of Alabama, the UK defense had reverted to the familiar "Man-for-Man."

## WHO WERE THE 'FABULOUS FIVE'?

The most frequently asked question tossed at basketball historians and sports authorities is "Who were the 'Fabulous Five' of Kentucky?" The answer is Alex Groza (center), Ralph Beard and Kenny Rollins (guards), Wah Wah Jones and Cliff Barker (forwards). This famous 1948 team, captained by Rollins, won 36 and lost 3 while sweeping to Kentucky's first NCAA title and went on to participate as a unit in the Olympic Games—helping the USA team capture the world championship. Rollins graduated after the '48 season, but the remaining foursome continued to play havoc with collegiate basketball and copped another NCAA title for Kentucky in 1949 on a record of 36-2.

# WILDCAT MASCOTS HAD COLORFUL NAMES

Over the years, Kentucky athletic teams have been spurred on in efforts toward victory by numerous colorfully-named wildcat mascots. Records indicate the first animal was given to the University in 1921. Named "Tom," this live Kentucky wildcat died quickly from being in captivity and was replaced with "TNT." Other live mascots followed—including "Whiskers," "Hot Tamale," and "Colonel"—only to pass from the scene due to death or being turned loose in the mountains after they did not thrive out of their native habitat.
