Duke snears at threats that he will be banned from GOP

NEW ORLEANS — Newly elected state Rep. David Duke, a former Ku Klux Klan leader, said yesterday that blacks and Jews have nothing to fear from him and scoffed at the notion he would be banned from the GOP and not be seated by the state Legislature.

"I repudiate any racial or religious intolerance," Duke said at a news conference.
"Any group — racial or religious — has nothing to fear from David Duke."

Duke, 38, squeezed out a 227-vote victory over homebuilder John Treen, 63, to rep-resent a nearly all-white House district in Metairie, a suburb of New Orleans. Duke received 8,459 votes, or 50.7 percent, to

Treen's 8,232, or 49.3 percent, in Saturday's election.

Duke registered as a Republican two days before qualifying for the race. After Duke's stunning success in the Jan. 21 primary, the national party sent three advisers to help his mild-mannered opponent and persuaded President Bush and former President Reagant to endorse Treen.

Duke became an international spokesman for the Klan in the 1976s as grand wizard of the Knights of the Ku Ku Ku Ka as a teen-ager he was photographed in a Nazi uniform.

U.S. senators, the governor and other community leaders of both parties warred that a Duke victory would ruin the state's reputation and harm already tenuous race relations.

Embattled coach remains steadfast despite adversity

While in the midst of one of the worst seasons in the history of UK basketball, UK coach Eddie Sutton is still able to deliver a spirited and optimistic message to fans.

But Saturday, after UK's 71-67 loss to the University of Alabama, the Cats' fifth consecutive loss, Sutton's message sounded somewhat hollow.

"I gave a little speech to our players a little while ago," the coach said. "You just have to reach down there and regroup. Who said life was going to be easy?"

UK is now 11-15 overall, 6-8 in the Southeastern Conference. They are in sixth place in the league. "The effort on the part of our ballclub was outstanding," Sutton said. "I thought our players played extremely hard. But we just didn't do as good a job as we needed to in order to win."

Moslems see disputed book differently

'Satanic Verses' controversy based on interpretation

Although the Western media have reported an uproar over the book The Satanic Versos, a UK professor of sociology from Iran says not all Moslems are upset over the work.

"This is an issue of interpretation," said Hamid R. Kusha, an instructor of sociology at UK and a native of Iran. Kusha said he recently talked to some friends living in Iran sho weren't disturbed by the book, and the work of the same than the same

outraged the way it is being portrayed in this country, "he said.

The book prompted frain's leader, the Ayatollah Rubindah Khomeim, to threaten the life of its author, Salman Russhdie, and ofter a \$52 million bounty for Russhdies. "A number of Islamie scholars are say-ing this kind of Iderature is a conspiracy against Islamic religion." Kusha said. "This is an attack on their tradition, on their belief system, on what they hold very dear."

Kusha offered a comparison between the recent movie, "The Last Templation of Christ' and Stornie Verses to show the effect of the controversy.

Some fundamentalist Christians were offended by the move "The Last Templation or generated," which included a dream sequences, which included a dream sequences in which Christ had sexual intercourse. But as all Christians were not offended by that portrayal of Christ, not all Moslems are angered over The Satanie Verses, Kusha said.

"Tim not offended," he said. "I look at it as a form of expression, as an art. I do not find it a suitable medium for dialogue about Islam."

looking elsewhere for employment
— preferably at a place where
higher education is considered

that since the white, American,
heterosexual population has so far
gone mostly unscatthed by AIDS
that we ought to relegate the commotion to the category he calls the
"mythical AIDS crisis?"

Bonifer simplistically cites

"moral decadence" and "carelessness" as the causes of sexual,
transmission of AIDS. What is
more morally decadent or irresponsible than to cast off as unimportant the thousands of people
worldwide who have been victimized by AIDS.

How can anyone degrade in this
way the lives, the contributions,
the futures of these men and
women, and the thousands more
who have not yet been diagnossed?
Who and how many must die before a "war on AIDS" becomes
validated for Bonifer?

At this point in our knowledge of
the disease it is fair to agree with

2000. Is far too early to assume that




