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#### FOREWORD

The Inventory of the County Archives of Tennessee is one of a number of guides to historical materials prepared throughout the United States by workers on the Historical Records Survey Program of the Work Projects Administration. The publication herewith presented, an inventory of the archives of Cheatham County, is number 11 of the Tennessee series.

The Historical Records Survey Program was undertaken in the winter of 1935-36 for the purpose of providing useful employment to needy unemployed historians, lawyers, teachers, and research and clerical workers. In carrying out this objective, the project was organized to compile inventories of historical materials, particularly the unpublished government documents and records which are basic in the administration of local government, and which provide invaluable data for students of political, economic, and social history. Up to the present time, the Survey Program has issued approximately 1,300 publications throughout the country. The archival guide herewith presented is intended to meet the requirements of day-to-day administration by the officials of the county, and also the needs of lawyers, businessmen and other citizens who require facts from the public records for the proper conduct of their affairs. The volume is so designed that it can be used by the historian in his research in unprinted sources in the same way he uses the library card catalog for printed sources.

The inventories produced by the Historical Records Survey Program attempt to do more than give merely a list of records—they attempt further to sketch in the historical background of the county or other unit of government, and to describe precisely and in detail the organization and functions of the government agencies whose records they list. The county, town, and other local inventories for the entire country will, when completed, constitute an encyclopedia of local government as well as a bibliography of local archives.

The successful conclusion of the work of the Historical Records Survey Program, even in a single county, would not be possible without the support of public officials, historical and legal specialists, and many other groups in the community. Their cooperation is gratefully acknowledged.

The Survey Program was organized by Luther H. Evans who served as Director until March 1, 1940, when he was succeeded by Sargent B. Child, who had been National Field Supervisor since the inauguration of the Survey. The Survey Program operates as a Nation-wide series of locally sponsored projects in the Division of Professional and Service Projects, of which Mrs. Florence Kerr, Assistant Commissioner, is in charge.

#### PREFACE

The Federal Historical Records Survey was inaugurated in Tennessee early in 1936; it expired, pursuant to an act of Congress, on August 31, 1939. By the provisions of the Emergency Relief Act of 1939, it became necessary for the project to become locally sponsored. The present project, the Tennessee Historical Records Survey, succeeded the Federal Survey on September 1, 1939. It is sponsored by the Tennessee State Planning Commission and cosponsored by the counties and municipalities of the State and several libraries. The Tennessee Survey is engaged not only in surveying county archives, but also municipal archives, church archives, manuscript depositories and collections, and imprints; and preparing transcriptions of selected early county court minutes. A list of the Tennessee Survey's publications follows the indexes to this Inventory.

While the new order has in no way brought about a change in the standards of the Federal Survey, it has been partially responsible for certain revisions of editorial concepts. The Tennessee Survey, for example, has instituted a series of special publications to make available certain materials accumulated in the State Office editorial procedures which may be of general interest.

The Tennessee Survey is now engaged in preparing a comprehensive statement of the general law regulating county government in the State. It is expected that this book, to be entitled "County Government in Tennessee," will serve as a handbook on the organization, structure, and evolution of county government in Tennessee, and will make it unnecessary to repeat certain items of general information in the various inventories. The essays in this Inventory are, therefore, limited to special legislation concerning Cheatham County or an exposition of the manner in which the general law has been, in effect, altered, and only such considerations of the general law as are necessary to state the facts of existence of the offices, the dates of their creation, their present status, the manner in which filled, and the terms. The complexities of the school laws, however, have made it necessary for the sake of continuity that the discussion of education be more detailed. This treatment has also been followed, but not as fully, with regard to highway legislation.

The arrangement of offices and entries in this Inventory is a result of a process of trial and error, and the pattern followed is one settled upon in earlier publications; however, the complex nature of some offices, particularly those with divergent functions, precludes an absolutely logical arrangement. In general, the arrangement of offices consists of grouping those of a similar nature. For example, the quarterly county court, the governing body, is followed by the county judge, the chief executive officer; the courts are placed together, followed by the jury commission and the law enforcement offices. Within the offices, related and similar records are grouped under appropriate subject headings. The records entries indicate the title, dates, quantity, labeling, variant titles, contents, arrangement, indexing, method of recordation, size, location, and condition of the record if it is not in good condition.

The original field inventory in Cheatham County was completed by workers of the Federal Historical Records Survey in Tennessee in February 1939. The inventory was rechecked in the fall of 1940. The archives listed in this book are those available on October 10, 1940.

The field inventory in Cheatham County was made by James B. Hallums and rechecked by Ballard O. Donnell under the supervision of Mary Alice Burke. The record entries were prepared under the supervision of Vylva Holland; the legal sections, Henry Hight; the historical sketch and alphabetical index, Ruth Winton, assisted by Ruth Foster; the housing and care essay, floor plans, and chart, Charles G. Kimbrough and William H. Etter; the typing and stencil cutting were done by Gladys Brane, Lois B. Winters, Patsy R. Floyd, and Helen P. Allen. The draft was reviewed and approved for publication by Robert Cassell.

The Tennessee Survey gratefully acknowledges the help and cooperation of all the officials of Cheatham County under whose administrations the inventory and recheck were conducted, and without whose assistance this inventory would never have been made. Particularly helpful were County Judge J. M. Smith, County Court Clerk J. W. Caughron, Clerk and Master W. B. Adkisson, and Register T. A. Turner.

The Tennessee Survey staff has profited in all phases of its work by the constructive advice and criticism of the Washington staff. The Cheatham County field inventory was made during the administration of T. Marshall Jones as State Supervisor of the Survey before he became State Supervisor of the Research and Records Programs and while Dan Lacy, Assistant to the Director of the Historical Records Survey Program, served as Regional Supervisor.

The <u>Inventory of the Gounty Archives of Tennessee</u> will, when completed, consist of a set of 95 volumes with a separate number for each county in the State. The number assigned this Inventory, 11, merely indicates the alphabetical position of Cheatham among the counties of the State. The publications of the Historical Records Survey Projects in all states are limited in number and consequently are placed in designated centrally located depositories. Inquiries requesting the location of the nearest depository should be addressed to the State Supervisors or to the Division of Community Service Programs, Work Projects Administration, Washington, D. C., for the attention of the Director of the Historical Records Survey Program.

#### Explanatory Notes

In this book the arrangement of entries, each entry representing a record or records series, is by offices and other units of the county organization and by subjects within each of these divisions. The agencies themselves are arranged in related groups, judicial agencies, for example, being grouped together. A similar arrangement is followed for the administrative offices and the so-called public service group, including the highway, education, and agricultural departments. Within each agency related entries are grouped under subject headings and frequently thereunder by subheadings.

The actual record title as it appears on the outside of the volume or container is given in the entry in upper case letters, but if this exact title is vague, misleading, or otherwise inadequate, an assigned explanatory title is inserted in lower case letters enclosed in parentheses. If a record has no title and it has thus been necessary to assign one, the assigned title is in upper case letters and is enclosed in parentheses. The current or most recent title of a record is used as the entry title and title variations are indicated.

The years for which a record is available are shown immediately following the title. The use of a hyphen between two dates indicates the inclusive years for which a record is available. A single date followed by two hyphens indicates that the record is current and dates from the year given. Dates are broken to indicate years for which a record was not made or could not be located. If it was not conclusively established that a record was actually discontinued at the last date shown in the entry, no statement of discontinuance is made. The absence of comment on missing prior or subsequent records means that definite information could not be obtained.

When two or more types of containers are considered in a single entry, the quantity is shown in chronological order insofar as possible.

The labeling of a record is described or shown by figures or letters in parentheses immediately following the number of volumes, file boxes, or other type of container. If no labeling is indicated it may be assumed that there is none.

The description of the contents of a record applies only to the current or most recent record unless change in contents is actually shown in a record entry.

All indexes to records, unless otherwise stated, are self-contained.

Since the vast majority of the records in Cheatham County is housed in the courthouse, only the name of the office or room in which a record may be found is given. However, if all the records of an office, which are listed under that office, are in one place, that place being the office or vault of the officer having custody of the records, the location reference has been omitted. In all other cases, the exact location of each record is given. The location of each office and department is set out in the section entitled "Housing, Care, and Accessibility of the Records."

Except in the section entitled "Housing, Care, and Accessibility of the Records," in which measurements are given in feet, measurements are given in inches, unless otherwise indicated, and therefore the mathematical symbol for inches is omitted.

Unless otherwise indicated, the record is in good condition.

Title-line cross references are used to show the continuity of a record which has been kept as a separate series for a period of time and with other records for other periods; for example, in entry 9: "1856-99 in Quarterly Court (Original Papers), entry 1." They are also used in artificial entries set up to describe, in one entry, the component parts of a series when the record is never kept separately but is found in two or more records of other content, such as entry 8; or to show records under their proper office which have been kept in files or records listed elsewhere

in the inventory, as, for example, the title-line cross reference in entry 8: "In Quarterly Court (Original Papers), entry 1; also 1910—in Revenue Receipts, entry 88." In both cases, the description of the master entry gives a descriptive title and the entry number of the record from which the cross reference is made, as, for example, in entry 1: "Also contains: Bonds of county officials, entry 8". Dates shown in the master entry are only for the part or parts of the record contained therein, and are shown only when they vary from dates of the master entry.

Separate third-paragraph cross references from entry to entry, and <u>See also</u> references from subject headings or subheadings are used to show prior, subsequent, or closely related records which are not parts of the same series.

An effort has been made to keep terminology uniform. However, the term "justice of the peace" and "magistrate" are practically synonymous and in practice and throughout this book these terms are used interchangeably. The words "judge" or "clerk" refer to the judge or clerk under which the record is listed, or the judge or clerk named in the title of the section; exceptions to this are clearly indicated. If not otherwise indicated, the word "district" means civil district. As the function of the office of county judge is virtually identical with that of county chairman, there is no specific indication in the entries of the years each series was maintained by each officer.

Because so many justice of the peace records were, due to their location, virtually inaccessible to the field workers, the survey of these records is of necessity incomplete. Such information about most of the records as appears in this Inventory was obtained by mail through the cooperation and assistance of the justices themselves.

The purpose of the chronological index is to furnish the user a guide to the entries in which all records covering a particular decade or certain years thereof may be found. The closing date in the final decade corresponds with the date of the recheck.

The user's attention is directed particularly to the third paragraph of the Preface in which a forthcoming key volume on the evolution and structural development of county government of Tennessee is indicated, and in which the office and governmental organization essays, appearing in this Inventory, are dealt with. Only so much information is included in the essays as to show to what extent local legislation has altered the pattern of the general law, i.e., the structure of county government in Tennessee as contemplated by the Constitution, the Public Acts, and the Official Codes of 1858 and 1932, and, also, only so much information on the general law as is necessary to identify and state the facts of existence of the several offices, agencies, and departments of the county organization.

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The device (C 1932) immediately following a citation to a legislative act means that the substance of the legislative act is still in force and is reenacted in the Official Code of 1932. The numbers appearing immediately after C 1932, and separated from it by a comma, are the section numbers of the Code. A citation to the Code of 1932, placed in parentheses immediately following a citation to the Code of 1858, indicates that the provision first appeared in the earlier code and is reenacted in the Official Code of 1932. Individual citations within a footnote are unrelated if separated by a semicoln.

<u>Ibid</u>. meaning "in the same place" is used to duplicate the last single source cited and takes the place of all the preceding citation or as much of it as is identical in two or more consecutive references.

The name following a citation to a court case is that of the Attorney-General and Reporter under whose name a volume of Supreme Court reports containing the case was published. The number preceding the name is the volume number; that following, the page number.

Not all of the acts, codes, compilations, and Supreme Court reports listed in the Bibliography are cited in this Inventory, but all of them are used by the legal research unit of the Survey and are listed for the convenience and information of the users of this Inventory. For a complete listing of the titles of the acts and codes, see Tennessee Historical Records Survey, Check List of Acts and Codes of the State of Tennessee, 1792-1939 (mimeo.), Nashville, 1940.

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#### 1. HISTORICAL SKETCH

Cheatham County, situated on the Highland Rim in Middle Tennessee, is drained by the Cumberland and Harpeth Rivers. The eighty-third county created and one of the smallest, its 314 square miles give it rank as sixty-ninth among the State's 95 counties in area. The altitude varies from 380 to 550 feet, and the mean annual rainfall is 48 inches. Extending north and south, its length approximating three times its width, the county was created from parts of Davidson, Robertson, Montgomery, and Dickson Counties on February 28, 1856.

The original boundary line fixed in the creating act was to begin 11 miles north of the mouth of Harpeth River on the Robertson-Montgomery line, then run west and south, crossing the stage road from Nashville to Clarksville and the Cumberland River, up the river to the mouth of Barton's Creek and up the creek to the mouth of Barren Fork of the creek, 7 up the east fork of Barton's Creek 1 mile, then south so as not to approach Clarksville nearer than 12 miles, and 4 miles south to the Dickson line near the mouth of Mann's Creek, but not closer than 12 miles to Charlotte.8 From this point, the line was to run south 9 miles with the Davidson County line to the Charlotte pike and east with the pike ten and a half miles, north striking the lower point of Green's Island and then intersecting the original line of Cumberland County; turning north, the line was to cross Big Marrowbone Creek, run west across the stage road from Nashville to Clarksville, and the road by the bluff on Sycamore Creek, down the creek to the mouth of Hollis' Mill Creek, up that creek to the mouth of Jackson's Branch, and up the branch to the mouth of Edward Smith Church's spring branch, west to the Springfield road and east to the beginning point. The county is now delimited on its entire eastern boundary by Davidson County, on the northeast by Robertson County, on the northwest by Montgomery County, 12

on the west by Dickson County, 13 and on the south by Williamson County. 14

Attempts were made as early as 1837 to establish Cumberland County, comprising approximately the same territory as present Cheatham County.15 Petitions to the General Assembly in 1837 signed by citizens of Montgomery, Dickson, Humphreys, and Stewart Counties16 urged that a new county be organized since the petitioners lived a distance of 15 to 25 miles from their county court, many having to cross the Cumberland River to attend the court.17 A referendum in the parts of Davidson, Robertson, Montgomery, and Dickson Counties to be taken in the formation of Cumberland County was ordered to be held in January 1838, 18 but the vote was evidently insufficient for establishment of the new county.19

In September 1843, the General Assembly was again petitioned by citizens of Dickson, Montgomery, Robertson and Davidson Counties, "that has heretofore been stricken off the county" to form a new county. O As a consequence, the General Assembly attempted anew in 1844 to establish Cumberland County in the same region. Provision was made for the county court of Cumberland County to be held at the house of Littleton J. Perdue until the seat of justice was located and a suitable house erected. Samuel B. Davidson of Davidson County, James Darden and Henry Frey of Robertson County, Pleasant Bagwell of Montgomery County, and Benjamin C. Robertson of Dickson County were appointed commissioners to select the site of the county seat. An election of approval by the citizens of the

sections to be cut off was ordered for January 1844,24 and the vote again was evidently insufficient to establish the county.

The movement to establish the new county finally succeeded on the third attempt, when an affirmative vote in April 1856 assured the organization of the territory formerly designated as Cumberland County into Cheatham County. 25 The county was evidently named for Edward S. Cheatham, State Senator from Robertson, Dickson, and Montgomery counties and Speaker of the Senate at the time Cheatham County was created. 26 Frey, Bagwell, and Robertson, designated by the 1844 act 27 Wiley Woodward of Robertson County and B. F. Binkley of Davidson County were appointed commissioners to choose a site for the county seat within 3 miles of the center of the county. 28 They were to purchase 50 acres of land and convey it to 5 commissioners to be appointed by the county court to lay off the town, with a reservation of at least 3 acres for a public square and a lot sufficient for the jail. The town was to be named by the commissioners.

After examining several sites, the commissioners selected 50 acres belonging to James Lenox on the north side of the Cumberland River which was purchased for \$1,713. The county seat was named Ashland from the trees which predominated in nearby forests. The name was changed to Ashland City on April 5, 1858, 32 and it was incorporated in 1858. 33

The first county court met at Sycamore Mills on May 5, 1856, with B. F. Binkley, A. J. Bright, W. Crocket, W. L. Gower, R. T. Gupton, E. L. Hooper, Jess Hooper, J. N. Lee, J. S. Major, J. Perdue, R. H. Weakley, and W. W. Williams qualifying as justices of the peace. 34 W. L. Gower was appointed chairman and F. A. Harris elected county court clerk

pro tempore. William Gatewood was appointed sheriff pro tempore  $^{35}$  to hold the election for county officials on May 15. $^{36}$  Samuel Watson, M. G. Shelton, R. T. Gupton, E. G. Hudgens, and Joseph Hudson were appointed commissioners by the quarterly court to lay off the county seat. $^{37}$ 

The county officials elected on May 15, 1856, were Samuel Watson, county judge; W. W. Williams, county court clerk; George W. Harris, register; F. S. Evans, trustee; and E. G. Murphey, sheriff. 38 G. W. Mc-Quary was later elected surveyor by the court. 39 After holding two sessions of the county court at Sycamore Mills on May 5 and June 2, 1856, 40 the court met at Forest Hill, a short distance south of Ashland City between July 7, 1856, and October 5, 1857. 41 The seventh session of the court on November 2, 1857, 42 marked the first time it met at Ashland City, where all subsequent sessions have been held.

The quarterly court ordered the commissioners appointed to lay off the county seat to procure plans and determine the cost of building a courthouse and jail at Ashland City. 43 The court appropriated \$2,000 for erection of the courthouse in 1857, the total cost not to exceed \$6,000.44 The county was to be reimbursed from the sale of town lots in Ashland City. 45 A two-story frame building was erected in 1858 on the corner of Main and Cumberland Streets and used as a courthouse until 186946 when it was sold by the county to Mrs. E. M. Hooper for \$1,926.47 A brick courthouse was completed in 1869 at a cost of \$12,000.48 In 1915, a bond issue

of \$25,000 was authorized by the legislature to enable the courthouse committee to proceed with rebuilding, repairing, and refitting of the courthouse. 49

Soon after the organization of the county, a small substantial log jail was erected. A brick jail replacing it was completed in the eighteen eighties for \$2,114.70.50 It burned in 1935,51 a fire breaking out in a restaurant on Main Street and wiping out the north section of the public square, with the destruction of 12 buildings, at a loss estimated between \$35,000 and \$39,000, including the jail valued at \$2,000, and the jail dwelling valued at \$3,500.52 A bond issue of \$10,000 was authorized in 1935 to provide funds for constructing a jail and jailer's residence and equipping the jail.53

In 1780, three quarters of a century prior to the establishment of Cheatham County, the first settlement in the region was made on Sycamore Creek<sup>54</sup> by Adam Binkley, his wife, and six sons near Sycamore Mills. Two of Binkley's sons, Christopher and James, were the first born in this section. Other early settlers included Benjamin Darrow who located near Sycamore Mills, and John Hyde and Howard Alley who settled near Pleasant View about 1790. At about the same time, a blockhouse was erected at Half Pone for the protection of the settlers against the Indians. 7

A tract of land along the Cumberland river, comprising 3,840 acres, was granted one Joseph Turner of North Carolina for Revolutionary service and purchased by James Wilson in 1800. Marvel Lowe and his family settled 3 miles north of Sycamore Mills, and Thomas Williams, Asa Bryant, David and Daniel Mosie settled near Sycamore Mills about the same time. In 1807, Peter Woodson and his family settled on a large tract of land near the present site of Pleasant View. About 1808, Abner Gupton settled in what is known as the Gupton community. James Mallow and his family settled near Thomasville and Michael Hale settled on Sam's Creek. In 1810, William Lenox, father of James Lenox, from whom the site of Ashland City was purchased, settled on Sycamore Creek near the site the powder mills were later built. 58

The Baptists and Methodists were pioneers in church work; the pioneer ministers came into the region with the early settlers. Early campgrounds were established at Mallory's, Hickory Point, Shaw's and Forest Hill. In 1820 a union church was established at Forest Hill and used as such until after the Civil War. <sup>59</sup> A Free Will Baptist Church was established near Sycamore Mills in 1820. In 1859, the Methodists withdrew from the Forest Hill Church and, with the Masons, built the first church in Ashland City. A Christian Church was founded in Ashland City in 1878. <sup>60</sup>

Cheatham County had its share of early schools. Millwood Institute located near Sycamore Mills was organized about 1852.61 Joseph Rains, later a Confederate officer, 62 was head of the institution before the Civil War; 63 after the war, Prof. James Brewer taught about 1 year and the doors of the institution were then closed.64 To Prof. A. S. Link, who founded Ashland Institute at Ashland City in 1880, is due much credit for the interest taken in education.65 Prof. Link established the Link School at Thomasville in 1902. In 1884, Pleasant View School was opened by Prof. W. I. Harper.66

The first newspaper in the county was The <u>Cheatham County Plain Dealer</u> which made its initial appearance in November 1877, <sup>67</sup> and suspended in 1879. It was succeeded in 1882 by <u>The New Era</u>, published by the New Era Publishing Company, and issued only a few months before it was discontinued. <sup>68</sup> The <u>Reporter</u>, a six-column weekly newspaper, was established in 1883. <sup>69</sup> The Ashland City <u>Times</u> is now published weekly.

As the Civil War approached, the secession element gained strength throughout Middle Tennessee. In the June referendum on secession, Cheatham County voted heavily for such action, with 702 in favor of separation, and 55 opposed. <sup>70</sup> Before this vote was taken, the county court on June 3, 1861, under authority of an act of the General Assembly <sup>71</sup> had appointed a home

guard for Cheatham County in each of the 12 districts, with W. W. Felts as commander. 72 W. W. Stuart was later elected commander of the militia. 73 The court also levied a tax of 3 cents on each hundred dollars worth of property for the benefit of the families of volunteers in the service of the Confederacy. 74 At the July term of court, John S. Major, W. G. Shelton, and James Lenox were appointed commissioners to employ gunsmiths to repair all guns in the county at the expense of the county. 75 In August, the militia was organized into the 160th Regiment and divided into battalions and companies according to the civil districts of the county. 76

In the various skirmishes which ensued, two companies of the Eighteenth Tennessee Infantry including Lowe's, composed of Cheatham County troops, were engaged in the Battle of Dover. 77 Many of the troops from Cheatham County were captured at the fall of Fort Donelson and imprisoned in Illinois. They were later exchanged and reorganized into various companies. 78

Cheatham County today is primarily an agricultural county. In 1860, there were 38,758 acres of improved farm land and 110,855 acres of unimproved farm land compared with 143,093 acres of farm land in 1900, of which 60,842 acres were improved, 80 and 62,539 acres of improved land out of 200,960 acres in 1935. 81 The cash value of the farms in 1860 was \$1,587,45182 while the value of farms in 1930 including land and buildings was \$4,151,448.83 Tobacco, corn, and wheat are staple products. In 1860, there were 386,178 pounds of tobacco, 349,792 bushels of corn, 13,386 bushels of wheat, 18,204 bushels of sweet potatoes, 9,916 bushels of Irish potatoes, 9 bales of ginned cotton, 84 and 6,466 pounds of wool produced;

the value of livestock was \$343,012.85 Livestock has continued to be an inventant element in farm life, with a value of \$361,139 in 1900, 86 which important element in farm life, with a value of \$361,139 in 1900, 86 whi increased to \$454,004 by 1930.87 In 1900, of 1,562 farms, 88 1,001 reported dairy products.89 In 1935 there were 1,753 farms consisting of 137,851 acres, 68.6 percent of the land in the county. The average size of the farms was 78.6 acres and there were only 118 colored operators compared with 1,635 white farm operators. 90 There were 667 farm operators who were full owners, 249 part owners, 4 managers, and 833 tenants. 91

Cheatham County is in the heart of the dark-fired tobacco district and largely a one-crop county. It produced 3,995,418 pounds of tobacco from 4,377 acres in 1935.92 Among other crops, it produced 393,332 bushels of corn, 93 a decrease from 476,230 bushels in 1900,94 and 46,189 bushels of wheat, 95 an increase over the 44,370 bushels in 1900.96 The yield of sweet potatoes in 1935 rose to 21,476 bushels and that of Irish potatoes to 15,509 bushels. 97 There were 8,666 acres in hay, in 1935. 98 There were 543 horses, 2,056 mules, 3,850 cattle, 1,072 sheep and 5,980 swine in the county in 1935.99

The area of Cheatham County has varied considerably since its creation in 1856. The act creating the county specified there were to be at least

350 square miles in the county, 1 but by 1860 the area was reported as 434.7 square miles. 2 This was reduced to 416.3 in 1870, 3 and further reduced to 370 in 1880, 4 increased to 400 in 1890, 5 and again decreased in 1900 to 347, 6 and further in 1910 to 314, 7 the present area.

The population of the county in 1860 was 5,376 whites and 1,882 slaves; 8 the white population decreased after the Civil War to 5,208 in 1870 and the Negro to 1,470.9 From 1880 to 1910, the white population increased slightly. In 1880 there were 6,295 whites, 7,316 in 1890, 8,450 in 1900<sup>10</sup> and 8,947 in 1910.11 The white population decreased in 1920 to 8,912, 12 and further to 8,208 in 1930.13 The Negro population was relatively stable until 1910 but

has declined steadily since that time. In 1880 there were 1,661 negroes,14 1,528 in 1890,  $^{15}$  1,662 in 1900,  $^{16}$  and 1,593 in 1910.  $^{17}$  It decreased greatly to 1,127 in 1920 and further to 817 in 1930.  $^{19}$  The total population in 1940 was 9,928.  $^{20}$ 

Nearly all the population of Cheatham County is of native origin. 1870, there were only 26 foreign-born persons, 17 of Irish nativity. 21 This group decreased to 16 in 1900, 22 18 in 1910, 23 and dropped to 1 in 1920. 24 In 1930, there were only 5 persons of foreign origin in the county. 25

Manufacturing in Cheatham County antedates by many years the organization of the county. Cumberland Furnace, reputedly the earliest furnace in the West, was begun by General James Robertson in February 1793, and sold to Montgomery Bell, 26 in 1810.27 Located at the narrows of the Harpeth River, near the present Dickson-Cheatham line, the furnace was improved by Bell by tunneling the narrow neck of rock where the Harpeth made an extensive bend enclosing a large peninsula. A powerful current was obtained and power developed to operate several large manufacturing establishments. 28 These works were later abandoned by Bell.29 The present Cumberland Furnace

was erected northwest of this site in Dickson County, and the production of iron ore was carried on for a number of years. 30

The largest manufacturing establishment in the county was the Sycamore Manufacturing Company, 31 first known as Sycamore Mills, 32 situated in the valley of Sycamore Creek, 33 4 miles north of Ashland City. The Mills developed from the multiple interests of Seay and Shepard who erected a dam and mills about 1835 on the creek. They were operating a gristmill, sawmill, flour mill, cotton factory, and the first powder mills, 34 when in 1844 Samuel Watson, later the first county judge, secured an interest in the business. The firm later became Cheatham, Watson and Company. Cotton yarn and domestics were produced until 1858, when the company ceased the manufacture of cotton goods because of the increased price of raw materials. The manufacture of powder was suspended after the fall of Fort Donelson in 1862, and the gristmill was leased to David Nichol, who continued to operate it until the close of the Civil War. 36

Sycamore Manufacturing Company was incorporated by the General Assembly in 1865, with a capital of \$100,000, and authority to increase it to \$300,000.37 About 1868, the company purchased the entire machinery of the Confederate Powder Works at Augusta, Georgia, and moved it to Sycamore Mills.38 In the following year, Cheatham, Watson and Company conveyed their property to the Sycamore Manufacturing Company.39 In 1893, E. I. Dupont de Nemours and Company bought the company.40 The capacity of the powder mills was 400 kegs a day,41 and it operated until 1904.42

Cheatham County's recent history has been highlighted by the so-called "Cabin Fire Murders" in 1938 and the ensuing trial for the crime. Two men were convicted of the murder of four youths and burning of their bodies in a log cabin on Marrowbone Ridge in the eastern portion of the county.

A recent decision by the State has taken advantage of Cheatham County's bountiful natural resources. The Tennessee Department of Conservation has established an 18,000 acre game preserve in the county south of the Cumberland River opposite Ashland City. 44 Known as the Cheatham County Game Farm, the preserve is being stocked with deer and turkeys, later to be transferred to game areas. 45

Like other Middle Tennessee counties, Cheatham County is heavily  ${\tt Demo-cratic}$  in political affiliations. ${\tt 46}$ 

The latest available information on education discloses that during the scholastic year 1939-40, there were 40 elementary schools in the county, of which 9 one-teacher schools were for colored children. There were two high schools, one two-year and one four-year, for white pupils, but none for colored pupils. 48

Ashland City, the county seat, is on the Cumberland River 20 miles northwest of Nashville. It has a population of  $957^{49}$  and is the only incorporated town in the county. Other towns are Chapmansboro, Pegram, and Pleasant View.  $^{51}$ 

The county is served by the main line of the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railroad which passes through Kingston Springs and Pegram in the southern part of the county, <sup>52</sup> and parallels U. S. Highway 70 connecting Memphis and Nashville. <sup>53</sup> U. S. Highway 41W running from Hopkinsville to Nashville crosses the northernmost part of the county. <sup>54</sup> The Tennessee Central Railroad passes through Ashland City. <sup>55</sup> State Highway 12 from Nashville to Clarksville also passes through the city, and State Highway 49 connects Charlotte, Ashland City, and Springfield. <sup>56</sup>



#### 2. THE PRESENT GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATION OF CHEATHAM COUNTY

Cheatham County, a political corporation of the State of Tennessee, performs either itself or in cooperation with State and Federal agencies, the functions assigned to it or permitted by the statutes and the Constitution of Tennessee, such as the registration of property titles and the recordation of liens and leases, the registration and licensing of marriages, motor vehicles, and the participation in trades declared by law to be privileges, the maintenance of the peace, the administration of justice, the probation of wills and the administration of estates, the promotion of education, the provision for certain types of poor relief, the construction of roads and bridges, the assessment of property for State and county taxation, and the collection of county taxes and certain State taxes. To finance in whole or in part the activities of the county, the quarterly county court, composed of the justices of the peace assembled as the county's legislative body, may levy taxes upon property, privileges, and polls to create funds for specific purposes, such as for schools, highways, and debt service, or to maintain or add to the general county fund, out of which are paid a number of miscellaneous expenses, such as court costs and costs for the maintenance of the courthouse and jail, for which no taxes are specifically levied, and may, within limitations fixed by public and private laws, issue and sell bonds. To carry out some of the county functions, the quarterly county court of Cheatham County appoints certain officials, namely, the members of the board of education, the revenue commissioners, the county physician, the surveyor, the members of the agricultural extension committee, the board of equalization, and the poor commission. Other county officers are elected by popular vote or are appointed, as in the case of subordinate county employees, by persons designated by the quarterly court or the statutes. The quarterly county court is required to approve the bonds of most county officials. By receiving reports directly from county officials or through the county judge, the quarterly court is informed of receipts and disbursements and the needs of various county offices and agencies. In addition, the quarterly court may have the county records audited by private auditors. The quarterly court is empowered to divide the county into civil districts and to zone the county for the promotion of safety, health, and morals.


The county judge, aside from being the presiding officer of the quarterly court and ex officio probate judge and juvenile judge, is the county's chief executive officer and as such acts as general agent for the county. He draws all warrants upon the trustee, except highway and school warrants, which are drawn by the chairman of the highway commission and the superintendent of schools, directing the trustee to pay obligations of the county and its agencies; acts as ex officio chairman of the highway commission,

The chancery court, of which the chancellor and the clerk and master are the chief officers, is for the most part a court of equity, but also holds a considerable range of jurisdiction concurrently with the probate court, and con-'s ii 1 .70 current jurisdiction with the circuit court in all cases except certain unliquidated damages. The probate court has jurisdiction centering, by and large, in the probation of wills, in the appointment and supervision of personal representatives, and in the administration of estates. Both the chancery and circuit courts hold jurisdiction in certain probate matters. Probably because the county judge is probate judge, the probate court has jurisdiction over the establishment and operation of special drainage, levee, and road improvement districts. The juvenile court, held by the county judge, has jurisdiction over juvenile delinquents. . The justices of the peace are committing magistrates and have the authority to decide misdemeanor cases wherein the defendants plead guilty and in civil cases involving debts and demands of small amounts. The maintenance of the peace and the execution of court orders are duties of the sheriff, his deputies, and the several constables. The tax assessor evaluates property and lists privileges and polls for State and county taxation, except property of public utilities which is assessed by the State Railroad and Public Utilities Commission. The tax assessor's property assessments are subject to review and adjustment by the county and State boards of equalization.

Privilege taxes and license fees are collected by the county court clerk and turned over by him to the county trustee and the Comptroller of the Treasury. The trustee is the treasurer of the county as well as its chief tax collector. The board of education and the superintendent of schools are charged with the operation of the public elementary and high schools in the county not operated by municipalities and special independent school districts. The county school system is subject to considerable control by the State Department of Education. The county physician renders medical service to the inmates of the county jail and the poor home. The highway commission has general supervision over the maintenance of the county road system. The poor commission and the poor home superintendent operate the poor home, an institution for those who are not financially able to live 12.0 elsewhere. The county agent seeks to educate the farmers in better agricultural techniques and performs certain duties in connection with the crop control and soil conservation activities of the Federal Government. The home demonstration agent instructs the women in home economics.

#### 3. HOUSING, CARE AND ACCESSIBILITY OF THE RECORDS

The Cheatham County Courthouse, in Ashland City, is on the east side of the public square facing Main Street. The original building, measuring 45x50x30, was erected in 1869. In 1914 it was remodeled and an addition, 57x26x30, was annexed forming a T-shaped structure. The present courthouse, containing 102,600 cubic feet of space, is constructed of brick, concrete, plaster and wood. It is not fireproof.

The county court clerk, the board of equalization, the register, the clerk and master, and the trustee have offices on the first floor. The offices of the circuit court clerk and the superintendent of schools are on the second floor. The county court clerk's vault, the register's vault, two storage closets, and the W.P.A. office, which is also used for storing records of several bureaus, are on the first floor.

The county court clerk, the county judge, and members of the board of equalization, share an office on the first floor. It is in the northwest corner and measures 19x15x14. Wooden cabinets along the south wall and metal file drawers on the north wall allow 94 feet of filing space, all of which is filled with unbound material. There is very little space for additional equipment and no room for expansion. Accomodations for users are a desk, a table, and two chairs. The bureaus having records in the clerk's office, with their percentages, are county court clerk, 30 percent; county judge, 75 percent; board of equalization, 50 percent; and highway department, 10 percent. The clerk's vault. 8½x7x8½, adjoins the east side of the office. Along the north, east, and south walls are 84 linear feet of wooden shelving, inadequate for the proper care of the records that are stored here. Four feet of bound volumes are on top of the shelving in stacks 18 inches high. The 84 feet of bound volumes and 4 feet of unbound material in the vault comprise the following agencies' records: county court clerk, 50 percent; county judge, 20 percent; board of equalization, 50 percent; tax assessor, 15 percent; circuit court clerk, 1 percent; justices of the peace, 10 percent; and all the records of the ranger, poor commission, claims commission, and juvenile court. The room is very crowded and has no space for expansion, with or without new shelving. There are no accommodations for users. The remainder of the county court clerk's records are in closet A, closet B, and the W.P.A. office. The clerk is ex officio clerk of the quarterly, probate, and juvenile courts.

The office of the register, measuring 19x15x14, is in the southwest corner on the first floor. There is ample space for expansion but accommodations for users are poor. The adjoining vault, which measures  $8\frac{1}{2}x7x8\frac{1}{2}$ , houses all of the records of the register and the surveyor, 10 percent of those of circuit court, 20 percent of chancery court records, and 5 percent of those belonging to the justices of the peace. Along the north, south, and east walls are 80 linear feet of wooden shelving caring for 60 feet of bound volumes and 20 feet of unbound material. An additional 3 feet of unbound material is filed on top of the shelving. There is

no room for expansion, with or without new shelving. Twenty-five percent additional storage space is needed.

The trustee's office, 17x14x14, is on the south side of the first floor. The equipment is limited but there is room for expansion without additional shelving. Thirty feet of bound volumes and 10 feet of unbound material are housed on 67 linear feet of wooden shelving and metal file drawers on the north and east walls. Sixty-five percent of the trustee's records are in the office, 30 percent in closet B, and 5 percent in the office used by W.P.A.

The clerk and master's office, in the southeast corner on the first floor, measures 17x14x14. The room affords ample space for expansion, with or without new shelving. Eighty percent of the chancery court's records, consisting of 10 feet of bound volumes and 11.9 feet of unbound material are housed in wooden cabinets on the north wall and an iron safe on the west wall. Two desks, a table, and 6 chairs are the accommodations for users. Twenty percent of the chancery court's records are in the register's vault.

The circuit court clerk occupies an office on the second floor. It is in the northeast corner of the court room and measures 15x11x15. Wooden cabinets along the north and west walls are sufficient for housing 8 feet of bound volumes and 46 feet of unbound material. Two feet of bound volumes are on top of a desk in the center of the room. There is no space for expansion but new shelving can be installed on the east wall. Twenty-nine percent of the circuit court's records are here, 60 percent in the W.P.A. office, 10 percent in the register's vault, and 1 percent in the county court clerk's vault. Accommodations for users are meager.

The office of the superintendent of schools, measuring 20x14x15, is in the southwest corner on the second floor. Wooden shelving along the east wall houses 72 feet of bound volumes and metal filing cabinets on the west wall care for 12 feet of unbound material. Wooden shelving against the north wall is used for storing 64 feet of text books and 8 feet of miscellaneous publications. All of the department of education's records are kept here. Accommodations for users are a desk, a table, and 4 chairs. The room is crowded, allowing no space for expansion or shelving.

An office, 17x14x14, in the northeast corner on the first floor, is occupied by the Work Projects Administration. Also used as a records storage room, it contains records of the following bureaus with their percentages: circuit court, 60 percent; justices of the peace, 85 percent; county court clerk, county judge, highway department, and trustee, 5 percent each. Wooden cabinets and file boxes, constructed on the south and east walls, allow 155 linear feet for filing space for housing 17 feet of bound volumes and 136 feet of unbound material. An additional 10 feet of bound volumes are on top of the cabinets. No room for

expansion is available without new shelving. Three tables and 3 chairs are the accommodations for users.

Closet A, 8x3\frac{1}{2}x7, is on the north side of the first floor under the stairway. Along the east and west walls are 15 linear feet of wooden shelving, all of which is used for housing 12 feet of bound volumes and 3 feet of unbound material. The county court clerk stores 5 percent of his records here together with 85 percent of those of the tax assessor and 5 percent of the highway department. The room is crowded having no space for expansion with or without new shelving. There are no lighting facilities and no accommodations for users.

Closet B, on the south side of the first floor under the stairway, measures  $8x3\frac{1}{2}x7$ . Here is kept 10 percent of the county court clerk's records and 30 percent of the trustee's. Twenty feet of wooden shelving, on the east and west walls, is filled with 12 feet of bound volumes and 8 feet of unbound material. Six feet of unbound material and 8 feet of public and private acts of Tennessee are in stacks on the floor. There is no room for expansion and no space for additional shelving. Neither lights nor accommodations for users are available.

The highway department maintains an office in the county warehouse on Sycamore Street in Ashland City. The warehouse is a rectangular onestory, frame building, erected in 1923. Measuring 176x128x15, it contains 337,920 cubic feet of space. The highway office, 15x15x9½, is in the northeast corner. Along the south side of the room are 56 feet of shelving in a wooden cabinet, housing 1 foot of bound volumes and 9 feet of unbound material. It is also used for storing 30 feet of highway equipment. No additional space or shelving is needed. Eighty percent of the department's records is here, 10 percent is in the county court clerk's office, 5 percent in the W.P.A. office, and 5 percent in closet A in the courthouse.

The sheriff has his office at the county jail on Sycamore Street. Erected in 1935 of concrete and steel, it is a two-story building, 33x35x30. The jail is fireproof. The sheriff's office on the southwest corner of the first floor, measures 14x10x9. A wooden desk on the north wall is ample for housing 3 bound volumes which are all of his records. Accommodations for users are meager.

The Harris Building, on the corner of Main and Sycamore Street, houses the office of the county farm agent. Rebuilt in 1934, it is constructed of concrete, wood and plaster and is 75 percent fireproof. The county agent and home demonstration agent have an office in the southeast corner on the first floor which measures 28x18x9. On the east and west walls are 123 linear feet of shelving and metal file drawers sufficiently housing 1 foot of bound volumes and 29 feet of unbound material. Pamphlets and supplies are stored on 93 feet of shelving. All of the home demonstration agent's records and 50 percent of the county

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

agent's are kept in the office. The remaining 50 percent of the county agent's records are in an adjoining file room. Here, there are 40 feet of unbound material and 65 feet of blank forms housed in 125 feet of shelving and metal file drawers, along the north, west, and south walls. No additional space or equipment is needed. Accommodations for users are adequate.


The county poor home is located 2 miles southwest of Ashland City. The superintendent's home, a one-story, frame structure, measures 60x30x25. It was erected in 1890. The superintendent's living room, 14x16x12, serves as an office. It is the southeast corner room. All of his records, consisting of one bundle of unbound material, are kept in a wooden desk against the north wall. There is ample room and accommodations for users are good.

# I. QUARTERLY COUNTY COURT (County Court Clerk as Clerk)

The quarterly county court is the county's governing body, i.e., it appoints and approves the bonds of most county officials, levies property, privilege, and poll taxes; borrows money to finance county activities, receives reports from county officials, zones the county for the benefit of public safety, health and morals; divides the county into civil districts, and employs necessary auditors for the examination of county records.

This court, prior to 1836, known as the court of pleas and quarter sessions, dates from the establishment of the county in 1856. The court is composed of two justices of the peace from each civil district, except the district containing the county seat from which there are three, and of one justice from each incorporated town that chooses to elect one, all elected by popular vote for terms of 6 years. Cheatham County now has 34 justices of the peace or members of the quarterly county court. Although the court functions almost entirely by statutory powers delegated by the legislature, it is, nevertheless, a constitutional agency.

## II. COUNTY JUDGE (As Administrative and Financial Agent of the County)

The office of county judge combines the functions of the probate and juvenile judges, the presiding officer of the quarterly county court, and the general administrative, financial, and executive officer of the county.

Although the law of 1856 creating the office of county judge and abolishing the office of chairman of the county court was passed before Cheatham County was actually organized on May 5, 1856, a chairman pro tem was appointed until the office of county judge was filled by popular vote in June 1856.11 In 1858 the office of county judge was abolished and the powers and duties of this office were vested in a chairman of the county court, 12 until 1868, when the office of the county judge was restored.13 In 1870 the office of county judge was again abolished and the office of chairman of the county court revived.14

The present office of county judge is the creation of an act of 1939. The judge is elected by popular vote for a term of 8 years, 16 and has been declared by the Supreme Court to be an inferior judge within the meaning of the Constitution, which the chairman is not. 17 Although the office of county judge is created by special legislation, it is recognized by the Code and public acts and is considered as practically synonymous with the office of chairman. Normally the same functions are identified with either office. 18 By the act of 1939 the county judge receives an annual salary of \$1,200, and is required to give a \$2,500 bond. 19

#### III. PURCHASING COMMISSION

A purchasing commission was created for Cheatham County in 1933, consisting of one qualified citizen, appointed annually by the quarterly county court, the county judge, and the clerk and master. The judge and the clerk and master serve without compensation but the third member receives \$3 per day while engaged in the work of the commission, but not more than \$45 in a year. 23 The commission supervises the purchase of all supplies, materials and equipment needed for the county and controls the renting and sale of all lands. 24 The clerk and master serves as secretary of the commission and is required to keep a record of all transactions. 25 No records, however, have been kept by this commission.

### IV. CLAIMS COMMISSION

In an effort to compensate citizens of Tennessee for losses sustained to property (except slaves) during the Civil War, an act of 1868 authorized the creation of a county claims commission to hear and determine the validity of all claims submitted. 26 The commission was to be composed of three members appointed by the Governor at a per diem of \$3 for each day actually worked. 27 The act further provided for the appointment of a General Claim Commissioner for the entire State. 28 This commissioner was to be appointed by the General Assembly for a term of 2 years, at an annual salary of \$2000. 29 All claims presented to the county commission whether approved or rejected were to be filed with the General Claim Commissioner. 30 Approved claims were to be countersigned by the General Claim Commissioner and the Governor and presented to the Federal Government by the Senators or Representatives who were to seek an appropriation for their payment. 31

The county claims commission was to keep a record of all claimants showing the nature and class of the claim, as well as the witnesses presented. 32 These records were to be deposited in the county court clerk's office for future reference. 33 The act was repealed in 1869 and all claimants were allowed to withdraw their claims from the office of the Secretary of State. 34

### VII. ENTRY-TAKER

Under a public act of 1836, the quarterly county court of Cheatham County elected an entry-taker at its first meeting on May 5, 1856. This office continued as a separate office until 1870, when it was consolidated with the office of surveyor. In 1875 the office of entry-taker was specifically abolished, 45 but in 1879 the quarterly county court was authorized to revive the office and elect an entry-taker or impose the duties of this office upon the register or surveyor. 44 Since

The office of entry-taker and surveyor as a consolidated office was created by an act of 1870, 45 and existed as such until 1875 when the office of entry-taker was specifically abolished. 47

The office of surveyor, originally charged with the surveying and making of plats entered with the entry-taker dates from the organization of the county in 1856. 48 The surveyor in Cheatham County has always been appointed by the quarterly court for a term of 4 years. 49 At present the surveyor is not concerned with the disposal of the public domain, but is required to make such surveys as any court of record may demand, and upon receipt of his fees, to survey land at the request of any interested person. 50 All records which were in the hands of the present surveyor, who was elected on October 4, 1937, 51 were destroyed by fire.

#### X. CIRCUIT COURT

The circuit court and the offices of circuit judge and circuit court clerk are creations of the general law and all date from 1857.5% Since the organization of the county the circuit judge has been elected by popular vote for a term of 8 years. The clerk has, since the organization of the county, been elected by popular vote for a term of 4 years. 54 A private act of 1911 fixed the salary of the circuit court clerk at \$700 a year. 55 In 1919 his salary was increased to \$800 a year, 56 and in 1927 to \$1000 in addition to such fees in excess of this amount as he may collect. 57 Under the general law the circuit court of today is a court of general jurisdiction at law in civil and criminal cases, having exclusive jurisdiction over all actions triable before a jury and, also, holds certain probate jurisdiction and power to hear and determine any equity matter wherein the parties do not object to its jurisdiction. 58 At present Cheatham County constitutes part of the Seventeenth Judicial Circuit. 59

### XI. CHANCERY COURT

The chancery court is chiefly a court of equity, having considerable concurrent jurisdiction with the probate court and the circuit court over the appointment and supervision of personal representatives and the

partition and distribution of estates, and now has "exclusive original jurisdiction of all cases of an equitable nature, when the debt or demand exceeds fifty dollars, unless otherwise provided.  $^{60}$ 

Cheatham County had no chancery court of its own until 1858.61 Between the time of organization and 1858, equity cases arising in Cheatham County were tried in the chancery court at Clarksville, in Montgomery County, the chancery court at Charlotte, in Dickson County, or the chancery court at Nashville, in Davidson County.62 The first chancery court was held at Ashland City in 1858 with the circuit judge acting as chancellor and the circuit court clerk serving as clerk and master.63 At present Cheatham County constitutes part of the Sixth Chancery Division.64

Since the adoption of a constitutional amendment in 1854, the chancellor has been elected by popular vote for a term of 8 years. 65 The clerk and master has always been appointed by the chancellor, 66 and since 1836 has held office for a term of 6 years. 67

Private acts of 1911 and 1927 fixed the annual salary of the clerk and master at \$550 and \$1000 respectively, and allowed him to retain all fees in excess of these sums. 68 By an act of 1933 the clerk and master was made a member of the purchasing commission of the county. 69

#### XIV. JUSTICE OF THE PEACE

The office of justice of the peace is as old as the county, dating from May 5, 1856, when the commissioned justices met to organize the county. 77 Individually, the justices of the peace are minor judges and committing magistrates. Collectively, they make up the quarterly court, the county's governing body, but there is no relation in this duality of function. 78 The justices of the peace share with the coroner the power to conduct inquests over the bodies of persons meeting death "by unlawful violence at the hands of some other person." 79

There are two justices of the peace elected by popular vote in each civil district except the district containing the county seat, from which three may be elected.80 One additional justice may also be elected from

### XV. SHERIFF

The sheriff is the county's chief peace officer 83 and executive officer of its courts. 84 During the first 60 years of the last century he usually acted as collector of property and poll taxes, 85 and until 1897 as chief election officer. 86 The office in Cheatham County dates from June 2, 1856, when the first elected sheriff took the oath of office. 87 A sheriff pro tem was appointed by the quarterly county court on May 5, 1856, to serve until an election could be held and the elected sheriff inducted into office. 88 Since 1836 the sheriff has been elected by popular vote, 89 and has always served for a term of 2 years. 90

# XVI. CORONER

The coroner shares with the justices of the peace the power to conduct inquests over the bodies of persons meeting death "by unlawful violence at the hands of some other person." He acts as sheriff when the office is vacant or when the sheriff becomes incompetent. The office in Cheatham County probably dates from the organization of the county until 1884, when apparently the last elected coroner went out of office. 95

#### XVII. CONSTABLE

The constables are minor peace officers, <sup>94</sup> executive officers for justice of the peace courts, <sup>95</sup> and servers of certain processes for other courts. <sup>96</sup> The office should date from or soon after the organization of the county. <sup>97</sup> Since 1836 one constable can be elected for a term of 2 years, by popular vote, in each civil district except the county seat district, in which two can be elected. <sup>98</sup> Cheatham County now has 14 constables, who are not required to keep any records.

### XVIII. TAX ASSESSOR

From the organization of the county to date there has been either one tax assessor for the entire county, or an assessor for each civil district, sometimes appointed by the quarterly county court and at other times elected by popular vote, who served for a term of 1 year, until the late 1880's, when the term was increased to 4 years. Since 1909, when the first assessor elected under the general assessment law of 1907 was to take office, there has been a county tax assessor elected by popular vote for a term of 4 years. The tax assessor has always been charged with evaluating property, except public utilities which have been assessed by State officials since 1875, and listing polls for State and county taxation, and has, since 1873, been required to enumerate persons engaged in trades, professions, and businesses taxable as privileges.

The annual salary of the tax assessor in Cheatham County was fixed at \$1000 in 1927, and increased again to \$1000 in 1937.

## XIX. BOARD OF EQUALIZATION

The board of equalization's duties are to "examine, compare, and equalize the county assessments.... 16 The machinery for reviewing and equalizing tax assessments has, like the original assessment of taxes, been the subject of much general legislation. The present board of equalization consists of five members, appointed by the quarterly county court for terms of 2 years. Upon failure of the court to appoint these members, the judge or chairman of the county court is authorized to assume this power. 8 The records and papers of the board together with the assessment lists are turned over to the county court clerk for preservation. Gheatham County should have had a board of equalization of various compositions since the organization of the county in 1856.

#### XXII. REVENUE COMMISSION

The revenue commission is required by the general law to examine quarterly the records of the county collection and disbursement officers and compare these records with those of the various officials and to report the results of this investigation to the quarterly county court. 15 If the quarterly court so directs, the commission is required to conduct the sale of all bonds and invest the sinking fund. 16 The revenue commission probably dates, in much its present form, from shortly after the

organization of the county, except perhaps for a gap from 1858 to 1875.17 The present commission consists of three persons appointed by the quarterly county court for terms of 2 years. 18 The county court clerk and members of the quarterly county court are ineligible to serve on this commission. 19 No records for this office were found.

# XXIII. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

From its beginning the school system of Cheatham County has operated substantially under the general law, with the first county superintendent of education being elected in July 1873.20 Only two private acts have authorized any deviation from the general law; one in 1935 which provided that the superintendent of public instruction should be elected by the qualified voters at the regular election, 21 and another in 1931 which also provided for his election by popular vote for a term of 4 years.22

Although the General Assembly authorized the establishment of high schools in all counties by the quarterly county courts in 1899,23 no action was taken in Cheatham County until 1902, when by resolution the quarterly county court recognized the need for high schools and authorized the creation of such in the county. A high school board of education consisting of six members, was selected by the quarterly county court and charged with the management of these schools. This board continued until 1921, when a general board of education, was created and vested with control and management of both high and elementary schools of the county. The board of education consisted of seven members appointed by the quarterly county court for terms of 7 years. The general education bill of 1925 reorganized the school system but the number of members on the county board of education and their length of term was left unchanged. Except

for the mode of election and term of office, the superintendent of education in Cheatham County operates under the general law, being secretary of the county board of education with general supervision over all county schools.<sup>29</sup>

Only one special act has been passed authorizing Cheatham County to issue bonds for educational purposes. This was an act of 1917 which provided for the issuance and sale of not more than \$10,000 of coupon bonds, to bear interest at a rate not exceeding 6 percent a year and to mature in not less than 20 years. The proceeds derived from the sale of the bonds were to be used for the acquisition of land and the erection of a high school building thereon. The quarterly county court was authorized to levy a tax, the proceeds from which would be sufficient in amount to pay the interest and retire the principal as each became due. 33

### XXIV. COUNTY PHYSICIAN

Although several prior enactments looked to providing medical care for prisoners confined in the county jail, the office of county or jail physician was not definitely created until 1885. Under the general law the county physician is appointed by the quarterly county court for a term of 4 years. It is his duty to attend the inmates of the county jail and poor home, but no records are required to be kept. 36

The officer, in Cheatham County, is called the county health officer, <sup>37</sup> but there is no health department and his duties are identical with those described above.

### XXV. HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Except for a private act of 1860, the road system in Cheatham County functioned almost exclusively under the general law until 1917. By the act of 1860, the quarterly county court was authorized to appoint and fix the compensation of a road commissioner to assist in classifying the roads. The court was further authorized to contract for the construction and repair of the county roads. Subject to the consent of a majority vote of the people, the quarterly county court was authorized to levy a road tax for the upkeep and repair of all public roads in the

By an act approved April 5, 1917, the quarterly county court was authorized to appoint a board of public road commissioners, to be composed of three members appointed for terms of 2 years. 42 One member of the board was to be designated as the superintendent and another as the assistant superintendent. 45 The superintendent received \$800 a year, the assistant superintendent \$2 a day but not more than \$100 a year, and the associate member \$2 a day but not more than \$50 a year. 44 The commissioners were placed in charge of all public roads and bridges in the county. 45 All applications to open, change or close highways were to be made by written petition to the superintendent. 46 The commissioners were required to make a report, to each quarterly meeting of the county court, of all vouchers issued, giving the name of the payees and the purpose for which they were drawn. 47

The act required all able-bodied men between the ages of 21 and 50, except residents of incorporated towns, to work on the roads at least 6 days a year, or, in lieu of such work, to pay \$3 to the county trustee. 48 The quarterly county court was directed to levy an annual tax on all property, both real and personal, outside of incorporated towns, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining the roads in the county. 49

An act approved April 6, 1917, authorized the quarterly county court, by a majority vote to levy a tax of not less than 50 cents or more than \$1 on each \$100 of taxable property, for the purpose of hard-surfacing and maintaining the county roads. 50 In the event that the tax was levied the quarterly county court was authorized to appoint three persons, who, together with the judge or chairman of the county court and the county court clerk as ex officio members, were to constitute a board of commissioners with supervision over all county roads. 51 The members other than the county court clerk and the chairman of the county court were each to

receive a per diem of \$3.52 The commissioners were authorized to contract for all work to be done, using workhouse prisoners within their discretion. Any State and Federal aid for highway construction obtainable was to be secured by the board and a record of all transactions as well as all plats and specifications was to be maintained. 54

On April 7, 1917, another road law was enacted abolishing the office of district road commissioner and empowering the quarterly county court to appoint a board of road commissioners consisting of three members. 55 Members of the first commission were to serve for terms of 1, 2 and 3 years respectively with their successors appointed for terms of 3 years each. 56 Before entering upon the duties of his office, each commissioner was required to take an oath of office and give a bond in the sum of \$1000.57 A chairman and a secretary were to be elected by and from the board. 58 The commissioners were to meet monthly and the secretary was to keep a record of all transactions entered into by the board. 59 Each commissioner was to receive a per diem of \$1.50, except the secretary, who was allowed an additional \$50 per year. 60 The board was to have exclusive control of all public roads in the county and was made responsible for all tools and machinery used on the roads. El In order to carry out their duties the commissioners were authorized to appoint road overseers in each district to supervise the actual working of the roads 62 Overseers were to be paid \$1 per day while supervising the road work. 63 An amendatory act of 1921 authorized the board to appoint a general overseer in each district, who in turn was to appoint a local supervisor, both of whom were to receive \$1 per day while in the discharge of their duties. 64 If the board receive \$1 per day while in the discharge of their duties. chose not to use the overseer system, it was authorized to have construction and maintenance work done by contractors. The quarterly county court was directed to levy a tax of not less than 10 cents and not more than 60 cents on each \$100 of taxable property.66

The latter act of 1917 left unchanged the provisions of the general road law concerning road duty and the commutation tax. 67 However, an act of 1919 made the commutation tax not less than \$1 or more than \$2.50.68 By another act of this same year all wagons and teams in the county were made subject to 4 days road duty in each year or the owner was to pay \$2 for each day he failed to make them available. 69 The act further provided for the issuance of not more than \$40,000 of bonds for highway purposes, to mature within 20 years and to bear interest at not more than 6 percent a year. 70 Upon the issuance of such bonds, the quarterly county court was directed to levy a special tax to pay the interest and retire the principal as each became due.71

In 1927 the board of highway commissioners of the 1917 act was abolished and the highway department reorganized.  $^{72}$  A county supervisor of public roads was to be elected by the quarterly county court for a term of 2 years. 73 Before entering upon the duties of his office, the supervisor was required to subscribe to the oath of office and give a bond in the sum of \$3000.74 He was to receive \$1,200 a year, 75 and was to have general charge and control of all public roads and bridges in the county. 76 All work was to be done by road labor or contract, or both, and all accounts, petitions and other papers coming before the supervisor were required to be preserved as public records. 77 Upon the written request of the supervisor the county judge was authorized to issue road warrants, countersigned by the county court clerk, <sup>78</sup> and recorded by him in a special book for this purpose. <sup>79</sup> For this service the clerk was to receive an annual compensation of \$100.80 District commissioners and road overseers appointed at the discretion of the supervisor, were to be in direct charge of all road work and were to submit annual reports to the supervisor indicating the time, place, and amount of work done.81 As compensation the overseers were to receive \$2 for each day of service rendered under the direction of the supervisor. 82 All male citizens,

except residents of incorporated towns and those physically disabled, were required to work 5 days in each year on the county roads. 83 Persons wishing to commute their time on the roads were to pay the county trustee \$1.50 for each of the 5 days which they failed to work.84 All wagons and teams were subject to 4 days road duty in each year or the owner was to pay \$2 per day for each wagon or team.85 This section, however, was abolished by a private act of 1933.86 The 1927 act further provided for an annual privilege tax, except in incorporated towns, on all passenger automobiles and trucks.87 In 1931 another annual wheel tax was authorized; each automobile to be assessed \$4 and each truck \$4 for the first ton, and \$1 for each additional ton.88 All motorcycles were to be assessed \$2 each.89

By an act of 1939, presumably in force at the present time, the highway department was again reorganized and the act of 1927 repealed. 90 This reorganizing act provides for a county highway commission composed of seven members, two elected by popular vote in each of the three road districts, for terms of 2 years, and the county judge or chairman of the county court as ex officio chairman. 91 The commissioners are to be paid \$5 for each meeting of the commission, but no commissioner is to receive more than \$75 in one year. 92 The commissioners are empowered to open, close, change, restore, or widen the public roads of the county, 93 and to supervise the work of county and state prisoners on the roads. 94 They are further authorized to employ a road supervisor between the ages of 25 and 65, to serve for a term of not less than 2 years or more than 4 years. 95 The compensation of the supervisor is to be set by the commissioners, not to exceed \$125 a month. 96 He is to have charge of the construction and repair of all roads, levees, and bridges, and is to be responsible for all tools and machinery used on the roads. 97 Under the direction of the supervisor, all physically able male citizens, except residents of incorporated towns, are required to labor upon the roads not less than 4 days in each year, or pay \$3 in lieu of such work.

The supervisor is to make monthly reports to the highway commission giving a detailed account of all claims against the commission. 99 The commission in turn is to make reports to each meeting of the quarterly county court. The act authorized the appointment of a bridge and levee supervisor by the chairman of the commission, when such was deemed necessary. This supervisor is to receive an annual salary not in excess of \$125,3 and is to have control and management of all levees, as well as bridges over 10 feet in length. He is required to file with the county judge a report of all contracts made for labor and material, and upon receipt of this report the county judge is authorized to issue "Bridge and Levee Warrants" for the payment of these accounts.

Several acts have authorized bond issues for the construction and maintenance of the public roads in Cheatham County. The first of these in 1891, empowered the quarterly county court upon a three-fourths vote of its members to issue \$10,000 of bonds, to mature within 10 years and to bear interest at 6 percent. The court was directed to levy a tax upon all real and personal property for the purpose of creating a sinking fund to retire the bonds at or before maturity. 8 Upon the signing of a petition by 100 legal voters requesting a special election and the approval of a majority of the voters participating in the election, the quarterly county court was, by an act of 1907, authorized to issue not more than \$200,000 of bonds for the purpose of building and improving public highways. 9 The bonds were to bear interest of not more than 6 percent and mature within 30 years. 10 A commission composed of five members, appointed by the quarterly county court for terms of 2 years, was authorized to contract for the work to be done with the proceeds of the bond issue.11 The commissioners were required to make quarterly reports to the county court of their actions and recommendations. 12 The quarterly court in turn was directed to levy an annual tax on all taxable property and privileges in the county sufficient to pay the interest on the bonds and to create a sinking fund for their redemption as they matured. 13 An act of

The poor commission consists of three members appointed by the quarterly county court for terms of 3 years. The first commissioner of the poor in Cheatham County was appointed in January 1874. A superintendent of the poor home is appointed by and serves at the will of the commission. The poor commission and the superintendent of the poor home are charged with the operation and supervision of the poor home. The ordinary records required by the general law are not currently kept by the commission or the superintendent in Cheatham County.

### XXVII. RANGER

The office of ranger is constitutional, dating in Cheatham County from 185619 and lasting until 1877.20 The office was probably abandoned when there was no longer the need for an officer to receive and take up stray livestock. If there were a ranger, he would be appointed by the quarterly county court for a term of 2 years.21

# XVIII. AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT

Although a general law of 1913 authorized the quarterly county courts to appropriate money for "Farmers' Cooperative Demonstration Work," Cheatham County took no steps in this direction until 1915, when an appropriation of \$500 was made to employ a county agent. 23 No appropriation for a home demonstration agent was made until 1923.24

Under a general law of 1929, Cheatham County now has an agricultural extension committee consisting of five members appointed annually by the quarterly county court. 25 The committee recommends to the agricultural extension service, persons to be selected as the farm and home demonstration agents. 26 The county farm agent seeks to educate the farmers to better agricultural techniques and performs certain services in connection with the crop control and soil conservation programs of the Federal Govern-
