

FRANKFORT — Franklin Circuit Judge William Graham said yesterday that the Popul-ist Party was too late to get its national party candidates on Kentucky's presidential election

According to documents filed in connection with the case, the Populist Party attempted to file its official petitions for presidential candidate Bob Richards and vice presidential candidate Maureen Kennedy Salaman on Sept. 12.

Officials with the Board of Elections, however, refused to accept the petitions because the filing deadline for the Nov. 6 general election was Aug. 28.

Attorney Julius Rather, representing the Populists, said the party officials were unaware that the filing deadline had been changed by the 1984 General Assembly.

WASHINGTON — The radical, anti-abortion group known as the Army of God has threatened the life of Supreme Court Justice Harry Blackmun, author of the court's decision legalizing abortion, a federal law enforcement source said Tuesday nijeon. 

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador — Calling it a "moment of great promise," Secretary of State George P. Shultz met with Jose Napoleon Duarte yesterday, four days before the Salvadoran president's first planned meeting with rebel leaders.
"We are here at a time of momentous events in the history of this republic," Shultz said at San Salvador's international airport.
"President Duarte has offered to meet without preconditions and without arms the guerrillas who have plagued this country," he added. "This is an act of great courage, taken in pursuit of peace and national reconciliation. His initiative has our unqualified support."

Astronaut prepares for historic walk as first U.S. woman to step in space

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Kathy Sullivan donned a helmet and breathed pure oxygen yesterday, preparing to become the first American woman to step into open space for a three-hour work stint today in Challenger's earge hav.
