Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, May 6, 1969

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in a statutory regular session at 2:00 p.m., Eastern Daylight Time, May 6, 1969, in the Board Room of the Administration Building. The following members of the Board were present: Governor Louie B. Nunn, Mr. William R. Black, Mrs. Rexford S. Blazer, Mr. Wendell P. Butler, Mr. A. B. Chandler, Mr. Albert G. Clay, Mr. Richard E. Cooper, Dr. Harry Denham, Mr. George W. Griffin, Mr. Robert H. Hillenmeyer, Mr. B. Hudson Milner, Dr. N. N. Nicholas, Mr. James H. Pence, Mr. Floyd H. Wright, non-voting faculty member Professor Paul Oberst and non-voting student member Tim Futrell. Absent from the meeting were Mr. J. Robert Miller and non-voting faculty member Professor Robert W. Rudd. Acting President A. D. Kirwan and Vice Presidents A. D. Albright, Robert F. Kerley, Glenwood L. Creech, Lewis W. Cochran, Stuart Forth, William R. Willard and Assistant Vice President Alvin L. Morris represented the administration. Members of the various news media were also present.

#### A. Meeting Opened

Governor Nunn called the meeting to order at 2:05 p.m. Following the invocation Lucile T. Blazer, the Secretary, reported a quorum present and the meeting was declared officially open for the conduct of business.

#### B. Oath of Office Administered to Non-Voting Student Member

Governor Nunn administered the oath of office to the non-voting student member, Mr. Tim Futrell, the duly elected and qualified President of Student Government. It was noted that Mr. Futrell was the third student to serve on the Board of Trustees.

#### C. Minutes Approved

On motion by Governor Chandler, seconded by Mr. Wright, and passed without dissent, the reading of the Minutes of the April 1 meeting, which was recessed to April 8 because of the lack of a quorum, and the April 8 recessed Minutes of the Board of Trustees, was dispensed with and the Minutes of the two meetings were approved as published.

#### D. President's Report to the Trustees

Dr. Kirwan called attention to certain items of interest to the Trustees which appeared in PR 1, President's Report to the Trustees, calling particular

attention to Item 20 which noted that Mr. Albert G. Clay had been named on April 29 "Man of the Year in Kentucky Agriculture" by the Farm Press and Radio Association of Kentucky.

Governor Nunn thanked Dr. Kirwan for his informative presentation and, without dissent, ordered the report accepted and filed.

# E. Recommendations of the President (PR 2)

Dr. Kirwan indicated that PR 2, as usual, contained items of importance but of a routine nature. Contained in the report were the names of the approximately 1,000 persons receiving degrees and certificates from the community colleges which required approval by the Board of Trustees before the degrees or certificates might be awarded. In addition, he called particular attention to the department chairmen being named, the list of promotions recommended and the list of persons recommended for tenure, all of which required Board approval.

On motion by Governor Chandler, seconded by Mr. Clay, and passed without dissent, PR 2 was approved as a whole and ordered made an official part of the Minutes of the May 6 meeting of the Board of Trustees. (See PR 2 at the end of the Minutes.)

## F. Approval of Candidates for Degrees (PR 4)

Dr. Kirwan reminded the Board that under the statutes the meeting in May is set for the Tuesday preceding commencement in order that approval may be given to candidates for degrees from the University of Kentucky. He then called attention to the list of persons recommended, pointing out that a total of 2,165 individuals would be granted degrees of which 369 were graduate degrees, 265 prefessional degrees, and 1,531 undergraduate degrees.

On motion duly made, seconded, and passed, the President was authorized to confer upon each individual whose name appeared on the list presented the degree to which he is entitled upon certification by the Dean of Admissions and Registrar that said individual has satisfactorily completed all requirements for the degree for which he has made application and been approved by the University Senate. (See PR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

# G. Budget Revisions for 1968-69 Approved (PR 5)

Without discussion, on motion duly made, seconded, and carried, the revisions in the 1968-69 budget as set forth in PR 5 were authorized and approved. (See PR 5 at the end of the Minutes.)

# H. Dean of College of Agriculture and Director of the Cooperative Extension Service Named (PR 6A)

Dr. Kirwan said it gave him much pleasure to recommend to the Board of Trustees the appointment of Dr. Charles E. Barnhart to succeed Dr. William A. Seay as Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Cooperative Extension Service. He indicated that the nomination of Dr. Barnhart was made upon the recommendation of a search committee which had been appointed to seek a Dean of the College of Agriculture. After screening both on-campus and off-campus candidates, the committee came to the conclusion that both from qualifications and from availability Dr. Barnhart was the best possible person to succeed Dr. Seay.

Members of the Board of Trustees indicated wholehearted enthusiasm of the recommendation and on motion by Mr. Clay, seconded by Governor Chandler, and approved unanimously, Dr. Charles E. Barnhart, presently Associate Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station, was appointed Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Cooperative Extension Service, effective immediately. Dr. Barnhart is to continue as Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station. (See PR 6A at the end of the Minutes.)

# I. Dean of College of Arts and Sciences Named (PR 6B)

Following the same procedure used in selecting the Dean of the College of Agriculture, a screening committee was appointed to seek a replacement for Dr. Paul C. Nagel who resigned as Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, effective July 1, 1969. This committee also set up qualifications and interviewed candidates from both off-campus and on-campus and Dr. Kirwan reported that it was the unanimous recommendation of this committee that Dr. Wimberly C. Royster, currently Associate Dean of Arts and Sciences and Director of the School of Mathematical Sciences, be named Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. Dr. Kirwan said he concurred wholeheartedly in the nomination of Dr. Royster and recommended that he be named Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences to succeed Dean Nagel.

Again the Board of Trustees expressed its enthusiasm of the recommendation and on motion by Governor Chandler, seconded by Dr. Denham, and passed unanimously, Dr. Wimberly C. Royster was named Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, effective July 1, 1969. (See PR 6B at the end of the Minutes.)

#### J. Engineering Facilities Named (PR 7A)

Dr. Kirwan said that he had received a recommendation from the faculty of the College of Engineering, conveyed to him through Dean Drake and endorsed

by the Building and Campus Development Committee, that two former deans of the College of Engineering be honored through the naming of two of the engineering facilities for them. He, therefore, recommended to the Board that the Civil Engineering Materials Laboratory be named the Daniel V. Terrell Civil Engineering Materials Laboratory, and that the library of the College of Engineering be named the Robert E. Shaver Library of Engineering.

Noting that both of these men deserved such recognition for the contributions they made to the College of Engineering and the University during their respective tenures as dean, Governor Chandler moved, seconded by Mr. Butler, and passed that Dr. Kirwan's recommendation relative to the naming of the two engineering facilities be approved. (See PR 7A at the end of the Minutes.)

#### K. Agricultural Sciences Center Auditorium Named (PR 7B)

With the unanimous concurrence of students, faculty, and administration, Dr. Kirwan presented a recommendation made to him by the Building and Campus Development Committee that the auditorium element of the Agricultural Sciences Center be named the William A. Seay Auditorium.

On motion by Mr. Clay, seconded by Mrs. Blazer, and unanimously passed, Dr. Kirwan's recommendation was approved. (See PR 7B at the end of the Minutes.)

# L. Committee Appointed to Study Senate Recommendation to Change Student Code (PR 8)

Dr. Kirwan indicated that each member of the Board had before him a copy of a letter he had received from Dr. Elbert Ockerman, Secretary of the University Senate, transmitting to the Board of Trustees, through the President, certain changes in the Student Code approved by the University Senate at a meeting on April 28, 1969.

Governor Chandler moved that the Board of Trustees receive the change in the Student Code approved by the University Senate at its meeting on April 28, 1969, and that a committee be appointed to study the proposed change and report its findings and recommendations to the Board of Trustees prior to the opening of the Fall Semester in August 1969. The motion was seconded by Mr. Wright and passed without dissent. (See PR 8 at the end of the Minutes.)

Governor Nunn appointed the following committee to study the changes and report its findings and recommendations to the Board of Trustees: Mr. Albert G. Clay, Chairman, Mr. Richard E. Cooper, Dr. N. N. Nicholas, Dr. Robert W. Rudd and Mr. Tim Futrell. In his charge to the committee, Governor Nunn said they should spend as much time as needed reviewing all the rules and regulations

and should report back as promptly as possible so the Board might act on the committee's recommendations before the beginning of the Fall Semester so that the students entering the University may know whether they want to attend this University or some other university.

#### M. Financial Report Accepted (FCR 1)

Mr. Kerley reported that realized income was as expected and expenditures were as estimated. The Board members, having had the opportunity to study the report in advance of the meeting, indicated they had no questions and on motion duly made, seconded, and carried, the two financial reports covering the periods ending February 28, 1969 and March 31, 1969 were accepted and ordered filed. (See FCR 1 at the end of the Minutes.)

#### N. Community Colleges Financing, Bend Anticipation Notes

Governor Nunn thereupon requested the Finance Committee to make its report with reference to Community College Financing and Bond Anticipation Notes. The Finance Committee in turn requested Mr. Kerley to make the presentation. Mr. Kerley stated that in connection with the authorization of revenue bonds to finance capital improvements for the Community Colleges it had become necessary to escrow sufficient moneys to retire the outstanding Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A, dated May 1, 1964, and Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series B, dated May 1, 1964, at the first respective dates May 1, 1973, and May 1, 1974, when such bonds will be subject to prior redemption in order to release the property being used at Covington, Kentucky, in the operation of the Community College there. It is desired to transfer such facilities at Covington, Kentucky, to the Board of Regents of Northern Kentucky State College. He further stated that in order to accomplish the foregoing it was considered advisable for an Escrow Agreement to be entered into between the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, First Security National Bank and Trust Company of Lexington, Kentucky, Trustee as to such outstanding bonds, the Board of Regents of Northern Kentucky State College and the State Property and Buildings Commission of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and that it was in order for a resolution to be adopted authorizing the execution of such Escrow Agreement.

Thereupon, a motion was made by Dr. Denham, which was seconded by Dr. Nicholas, that the following resolution be adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Chairman of the Board of Trustees and the Secretary are hereby authorized and directed to execute upon behalf of the Board of Trustees the Escrow Agreement between the Board of Trustees, First Security National Bank & Trust Company, Lexington, Kentucky, the Board of Regents of Northern Kentucky State College and the State Property and Buildings Commission of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, with reference to the retirement of the outstanding Community

Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A, dated May 1, 1963, and the Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series B, dated May 1, 1964, the transfer of certain properties by the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky to Northern Kentucky State College and other matters, a true copy of which instrument was presented to the meeting at which this resolution was proposed.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that such officials of the Board of Trustees are authorized and directed to take such further action as may be necessary to accomplish the intent of such Escrow Agreement.

The Chairman of the Board of Trustees put the question, and the following voted AYE: Governor Louie B. Nunn, Mr. William R. Black, Mrs. Rexford S. Blazer, Mr. Wendell P. Butler, Mr. A. B. Chandler, Mr. Albert G. Clay, Mr. Richard E. Cooper, Dr. Harry Denham, Mr. George W. Griffin, Mr. Robert H. Hillenmeyer, Mr. B. Hudson Milner, Dr. N. N. Nicholas, Mr. James H. Pence and Mr. Floyd H. Wright. NAY: None.

Thereupon, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees declared that such resolution had been duly adopted.

Thereupon, Mr. Kerley stated that it was considered desirable to authorize new Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A, dated May 1, 1969, in the amount of \$12,200,000, which it is contemplated will be sold to the public, and new Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series B, dated May 1, 1969, in the amount of \$4,489,000, with respect to which the University has Loan Agreements with the United States Department of Health, Education, and Welfare of the Office of Education. However, in order to do this it is necessary that the new basic resolution to be adopted authorize generally new Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds and then adopt a Series A and Series B bond resolution setting out the specific details concerning such two bond issues, and that it was in order for someone to make a motion to adopt such basic resolution.

Thereupon, it was moved by Dr. Denham, which motion was seconded by Mr. Clay, that there be adopted a resolution entitled

"A RESOLUTION creating and establishing a Community Colleges Educational Buildings Project of the University of Kentucky; creating and establishing a new issue of Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky; providing for the issuance from time to time of said bonds; providing for the payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds and repealing all resolutions or parts of resolutions in conflict with this resolution,"

a true copy of which was presented to the meeting at which such resolution was proposed, and a true copy of which is attached to these Minutes. Upon the Chairman putting the question, the following voted AYE: Governor Louie B. Nunn, Mr. William R. Black, Mrs. Rexford S. Blazer, Mr. Wendell P. Butler, Mr. A. B. Chandler, Mr. Albert G. Clay, Mr. Richard E. Cooper, Dr. Harry Denham, Mr. George W. Griffin, Mr. Robert H. Hillenmeyer, Mr. B. Hudson Milner, Dr. N. N. Nicholas, Mr. James H. Pence and Mr. Floyd H. Wright. NAY: None.

Thereupon, the Chairman declared that such resolution had been adopted.

Then Mr. Kerley stated that it was in order for someone to make a motion to adopt the resolution authorizing such Series A and such Series B bonds. Thereupon, a motion was made by Dr. Denham, which was seconded by Mr. Clay, that the resolution entitled

"A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$12,200,000 COMMUNITY COLLEGES EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS REVENUE BONDS, SERIES A, AND \$4,489,000 COMMUNITY COLLEGES EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS REVENUE BONDS, SERIES B, OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY AND

IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF SAID BONDS, AUTHOR-IZING THE ISSUANCE, JOINTLY WITH THE STATE PROPERTY AND BUILDINGS COMMISSION OF KENTUCKY, AND SUBJECT TO THE APPROVAL AND CONCURRENCE OF SAID COMMISSION, OF REVENUE BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN THE MANNER AUTHOR-IZED BY KRS 56.513, THE SAME TO BE PAYABLE (A) AS TO PRINCIPAL SOLELY FROM THE PROCEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY COLLEGES EDUCATIONAL BUILDINGS REVENUE BONDS, SERIES A AND SERIES B, HEREIN AUTHORIZED, WHEN SAID BONDS ARE SOLD AND DELIVERED (OR FROM THE PROCEEDS OF RENEWAL NOTES OR IN PART FROM THE SOURCE HEREIN PROVIDED THERE-FOR), AND (B) AS TO INTEREST FROM THE SOURCES HEREIN PROVIDED THEREFOR; AND REQUESTING APPROVAL AND CONCURRENCE OF SAID COMMISSION,"

be adopted, a true copy of which was presented to the meeting at which such resolution was proposed and a true copy of which is attached to these Minutes. The Chairman put the question and the following voted AYE: Governor Louie B. Nunn, Mr. William R. Black, Mrs. Rexford S. Blazer, Mr. Wendell P. Butler, Mr. A. B. Chandler, Mr. Albert G. Clay, Mr. Richard E. Cooper, Dr. Harry Denham, Mr. George W. Griffin, Mr. Robert H. Hillenmeyer, Mr. B. Hudson Milner, Dr. N. Nicholas, Mr. James H. Pence and Mr. Floyd H. Wright. NAY: None.

Thereupon, the Chairman declared that such resolution had been adopted.

Then Mr. Kerley stated that due to the high interest rates at the present time it would be preferable to authorize Notes pursuant to Kentucky Statutes which would have a maturity date of April 14, 1970, in an amount not exceeding \$16,300,000, and which would be sold to financial institutions awaiting a more opportune time during which to sell such bonds. The proceeds of such bonds would be used to retire such Notes. He stated that it would be in order for a resolution to be adopted approving the use of a form of Invitation to Submit Proposal and Official Statements with reference to such bonds and such Notes, the forms to be used in connection with soliciting proposals to purchase such Notes to be substantially in the forms which were presented to the meeting.

Thereupon, Dr. Denham moved, which was seconded by Mr. Black, that the following resolution be adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the form of Invitation to Submit Proposal and the forms of the Official Statements with reference to \$12,200,000 of Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series A, dated May 1, 1969, and \$4,489,000 of Community Colleges Educational Buildings Revenue Bonds, Series B, dated May 1, 1969, and Notes to not exceed \$16,300,000 are hereby approved on the basis that the forms of such instruments used in soliciting bids for such Notes and in authorizing and selling such bonds will be substantially in the forms presented at the meeting at which this resolution was proposed.

Upon the Chairman putting the question, the following voted AYE: Governor Louie B. Nunn, Mr. William R. Black, Mrs. Rexford S. Blazer, Mr. Wendell P. Butler, Mr. A. B. Chandler, Mr. Albert G. Clay, Mr. Richard E. Cooper, Dr. Harry Denham, Mr. George W. Griffin, Mr. Robert H. Hillenmeyer, Mr. B. Hudson Milner, Dr. N. N. Nicholas, Mr. James H. Pence and Mr. Floyd H. Wright. NAY: None.

Thereupon, the Chairman declared that such resolution had been adopted.

#### O. Appropriation From Auxiliary Enterprise Account (FCR 3)

Having already considered the recommendation relative to the appropriation of \$75,000 from fund balances in the Auxiliary Enterprise Account for the renovation of Housing and Dining facilities from materials sent them in advance of the meeting and there being no questions, on motion by Mr. Milner, seconded by Mr. Cooper, the recommendation for the appropriation as contained in FCR 3 was approved. (See FCR 3 at the end of the Minutes.)

# P. Appropriation From General Obligation Bonds of 1965 (FCR 4)

The Board being familiar with the recommendation that the sum of \$2,300,000 from the General Obligation Bonds allotted to the University be appropriated for the purpose of campus development from a preliminary mailing

on the matter, on motion by Dr. Denham, seconded by Mr. Milner, and passed, approval was given to the appropriation as recommended in FCR 4. (See FCR 4 at the end of the Minutes.)

#### Q. Medical Center Committee Report

Governor Chandler, Chairman of the Medical Center Committee, reported that the committee had met on the morning of May 7, prior to the meeting of the Board of Trustees. He said that the committee reviewed the whole Medical Center program and indicated to Governor Nunn that the committee might want some financial help from him. He commended Dr. Willard and his staff for the many "missions of mercy which are performed by this great institution."

### R. Draft Copy of Governing Regulations Distributed

Professor Oberst, Chairman of the Joint Faculty-Board Committee to codify the Governing Regulations, called attention to the copy of the proposed revision of the Governing Regulations which was included in each member's folder. He asked the Board members to review this proposed revision and to raise any questions they might have with the committee. No action was requested at this time.

# S. Appointments Made to the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation

Dr. Kirwan stated that three vacancies existed on the Board of Directors of the University of Kentucky Research Foundation which must be approved by the Board of Trustees. The slate recommended included Professor Roger Eichorn, faculty member; Mr. Edward S. Dabney, citizen member; and Mr. Floyd Wright, Trustee member. On motion by Mr. Milner, duly seconded, and approved, the slate was approved by acclamation.

#### T. Meeting Adjourned

The Governor, having first determined there was no further business to come before the meeting, called for a motion for adjournment which was made, seconded, and passed, and the meeting adjourned at 2:25 p.m.

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES

May 6, 1969

#### 1. DR. PELLEGRINO RETURNS FOR MUNICH LECTURE

The annual Munich Memorial Lecture and awards program, conducted on April 25 at the Medical Center, featured as speaker Dr. Edmund D. Pellegrino, founding chairman of the Department of Medicine of the College of Medicine. Dr. Pellegrino now is vice president for Health Sciences, dean of the College of Medicine and director of the Center Health Sciences Center, State University of New York at Stony Brook. He cautioned his colleagues and the graduating medical students to be on guard against dangers to competence in medicine. He urged more absolute communication between the doctor physician and his patient. In the future it will be desirable to have physicians regularly take refresher courses, Dr. Pellegrino stated.

"The essence of the professional aspect of medicine is the declaration of profession, of a special knowledge. This 'profession' is open to special dangers today and may deteriorate into pretension if not carefully nurtured. In medical schools we must concentrate on education for competence in specific fields of medical practice. This competence must be sustained by a process of recertification via continuing education and reinforced daily by institutionalization of the quality controls for medical care," he asserted.

#### 2. DIAGNOSTIC LAB TO BE BUILT AT COLDSTREAM

A \$1 million animal diagnostic laboratory will be built on a 14-acre site on Coldstream Farm. The governor announced last week that the lab, as a service facility for Kentucky's farmers, will have a meat-quality control testing section and a complete toxicology section to determine the presence of poison in animals as well as feeds. The facility is being designed by Chrisman and Miller, Lexington architects, and construction will begin this year.

#### 3. COMMUNITY COLLEGES CONCENTRATING ON MORE COUNSELING

Counseling for college freshmen is getting increased attention these days from many persons in higher education although most agree that counseling lags behind other phases of the educational experience for new students in a college or university. Dr. Stanley Wall, associate dean of the Community College System, believes counseling will be emphasized more and more in the years ahead. Dr. Wall says one of the problems is being able to provide an effective program of counseling and guidance in relation to budget limitations. Counseling in the community colleges is varied. It ranges from one faculty member or advisor in the individual college serving as parttime counselor to as many as two full-time counselors in the larger colleges. Admittance to the community colleges presently is standard, primarily begun by the student taking the American College Scoring Tests during the senior high school year. This is followed by guidance and counseling, which is left to the community college faculty members who regularly perform that function. Some counselors make use of occupational inventories to determine where the student's interests lie.

Dr. Wall believes the best means of finding out what a student wants to do in life is "to sit down and talk with him." Tests sometimes show one's interest to be in a given area, when the truth is that the student may not really be interested. One case recalled by Dr. Wall dealt with a student who scored high in a given field which would indicate his aptitude for it. The fact was that the student was not interested. He was knowledgeable only because his father was a specialist in the field. Thus, testing exclusively on areas in which a student shows a knowledge can be misleading, Dr. Wall notes. "Sometimes a student's desire may far outreach his ability," he continues. "It is not unusual for a student to decide he wants to be an engineer solely because he has made good grades in algebra, or because he thinks the salary will be good. When it becomes obvious the student is not sufficiently trained, or that his scholastic ability is limited, it then becomes the counselor's job to advise the student that he may be better suited to some other vocation. In some instances this choice may require something less than the baccalaureate degree as an educational objective."

A seminar in career education was conducted last summer in the community college at Somerset, he stated. The training was designed for community college, vocational school, and secondary school counselors of education opportunities in careers provided by the Somerset vocational school and by the Somerset Community College. At Henderson Community College, counselors are finding that some incoming students aren't aware of the functions of the institution, according to Robert Parks, counselor at Henderson. Basic programs and the requirements of each sometimes must be explained, he said. Dan Tudor, coordinator of student affairs for the Community College System, shares the concern of counselors. He points out that a survey taken by the American College Testing program employees showed that about 75 per cent of students enrolling in community colleges intend to transfer to a four-year college and get a baccalaureate degree. The same report, however, shows that 25 per cent of that same group do not achieve an overall grade standing of C.

#### 4. SPONSOR SUMMER INSTITUTE FOR SCHOOL LIBRARIANS

The School of Library Science will sponsor a three-week institute for 30 school librarians, financed by the U.S. Office of Education, June 23-July 11. Dr. Nancy B. Pillon, assistant professor of library science, director of the institute, said "it is hoped this institute will prepare the librarians--selected on the basis of leadership potential--to act as catalysts in diffusing and bringing about understanding of the new media." Applicants must be practicing school librarians during the 1969-70 school year, with at least 18 hours of completed work in library science. They will be selected from throughout the state. Kentucky librarians will be given priority, although non-Kentucky applications also will be considered. Participants will receive a stipend of \$75 a week plus \$15 a week for each dependent. They must pay for their own textbook, travel costs, and living expenses during the workshop. Three hours of graduate credit may be earned by those who meet the requirements for admission to the Graduate School and who desire such credit.

#### 5. FORD GRANT HELPS BLACK STUDENT IN LAW SCHOOL

A student in the College of Law is completing his first year of study with the assistance of a program funded by the U.S. Office of Economic Opportunity and the Ford Foundation. Jesse Crenshaw, who grew up in Glasgow and graduated from Kentucky State College befor entering the law school, says the Council on Legal Education Opportunity (CLEO) program has been particularly significant in locating prospective law students. Crenshaw, 22, is a graduate of Ralph Bunche High School, Glasgow. He earned a BA degree in political science and history in 1968. Last summer he attended a special eight-week institute designed to help prospective law students among minority groups, held at Emory University in Atlanta.

At the end of his first semester at the University his standing was 54th, in a class of 170. The significance of that fact is that he performed much better than his Law School Admission Test (LSAT) score would have predicted. Based on his score, the prediction would have been a 62.0 standing. He said educators found that those who scored the lowest on LSAT exams were: 1) from the Southern region of the U.S., 2) from a gural area, and 3) were Negroes. People from the East and Mid-west scored consistently higher than those from the South.

### 6. LAW STUDENTS PLAN FUND TO HONOR DECEASED STUDENT

A student-faculty committee in the College of Law is seeking to establish a scholarship in memory of the late William Edward Mills. Mills, a law student, died recently. The student-faculty committee has set a goal of \$10,000 for the scholarship fund, from which annual awards will be made to law students "on the basis of need and academic merit." The student group on the joint committee is chaired by Robert Smith, a third-year law student from Charleston, West Virginia.

#### 7. UNDERSTANDING RESULTS FROM EDUCATION-GOVERNMENT SEMINAR

Gov. Louie B. Nunn's aides will not know for some time whether the recent "brainstorming" session with college educators was a full success. Most state officials and college professors and administrators left Rough River State Park indicating they had benefitted personally. The larger purpose for which the meeting was conceived was to begin a continuing dialogue between academic circles and state government, and the seminar's directors say that cannot be determined soon.

They believe that from such a discourse could come a steady flow of fresh, innovative ideas by which state government could improve its services—the ultimate goal of the conference. Fred Karem, one of the governor's liaison aides, said the first of the planned sessions was for college personnel, from both public and private schools, from the western half of the state. A similar gathering for the eastern half of the state is scheduled in May at Cumberland Falls. He believes the greatest immediate impact of the first stab at tapping top college talent was in informing the educators of some of the operations of state government.

Governor Nunn, opening the conference, called upon the educators as "talented, public spirited citizens"...to become a part of the growing segment of problems solvers who have stepped forward in Kentucky's behalf. He said "there are plenty of people who are blamers or criticizers. But we have too few problem-solvers." After the opening session, the educators and the government officials were divided into five sub-panels which discussed five specific areas: human resources, natural resources, state and area planning, general government, and education. Committee reports summarizing the session and further discussion by the entire group took place on the last day. The governor wrote the presidents of all public and private institutions in the state seeking participants for the seminars, and every president responded. One of the recommendations of the brainstorming session was the creation of a state agency to conduct research and provide all levels of education with information for planning purposes. The agency would, as proposed, have no policy-making or "control" function, but could funnel its research to the governor and the legislature to aid them in setting educational priorities for the allocation of funds.

Karem said the channels of communication opened by the brainstorming session will hopefully "signal the beginning of a new and deeper relationship between state government and our university and college personnel whose involvement and creativity we so critically need, if we are to actually reshape state government."

#### 8. HOSPITAL EMPLOYEES TRAINING TO DEAL WITH PUBLIC

A refresher course in dealing with the public is underway for employees of the University hospital. The program, "Human Relations Orientation", sponsored by the hospital administration, began last month with week-long courses covering topics ranging from the psychology of illness to telephone courtesy. Set up on a five-day basis, hour-long sessions are held each day. Twentyfive employees are schooled in a group. "Purpose of the program is to re-orient our employees in the techniques of dealing with the public," said John J. Laverty, hospital administrator. "The program has evolved through the ideas and needs of our staff and will be presented so that every employee can participate." With some 1,100 employees to be reached, it necessarily is a big effort, Laverty added. By taking 25 persons a week--to encourage smaller group discussion and interaction--and by offering the course only every other week, the program has a long life expectancy, he said. Initially, the course is aimed primarily at "employees with a high degree of public contact," Laverty said. Employees in the emergency room, outpatient clinics, treatment and diagnostic facilities, inpatient divisions and the admitting office have been selected as the first participants.

"The image you project of our Medical Center" is the second part of the course, presented by Fred Woodress, director of the Department of Public Relations. The next part of the course concerns telephone communication, and discusses use of the telephone from the instrument's technical aspects to proper phraseology in conversing. Mrs. Lucy Dean of General Telephone Company explains the operation of a large, complex telephone system such as that in the Medical Center. University Hospital Chaplain Ralph Carpenter leads the fourth session. Discussing "Human Dignity," he stresses the feelings of the person who is ill, and urges employees to "give a half-a-minute to answer a question." He says, "Don't wait to be asked--volunteer to help." In the final session, Judge Calton and James Staton of the hospital administration staff lead a discussion aimed at bringing the employee up to date on hospital plans and projects. Covered are subjects from employee benefits to construction and renovation of the physical plant of the hospital and what these changes mean in terms of service within the facility. The administrators talk about plans for new departments, the budget and the organizational setup of the hospital.

#### 9. UNIVERSITY WELL REPRESENTED AT KEA MEETING

All departments in the College of Education presented displays during the annual meeting of the Kentucky Education Association in Louisville. Displays included teaching materials in special education, audio-visual devices, and explanations of services performed by the various departments. James P. Alcorn, director of the Placement Service, also was headquartered in the Louisville hotel during the convention, to consult with teachers and school officials. The Department of Public Relations distributed academic and student life bulletins and provided information to visitors. All persons attending KEA were invited to a University reception on Thursday.

# 10. COMMUNITY COLLEGE SYSTEM AIRS MANAGEMENT TRAINING COURSES

The Community College System has teamed up with the state's ETV network to make available a state-wide, three-part management training program. On April 14 the network aired the first of the courses covering the how-to's of speed reading, plus basic, on-thejob supervisory and communications skills. M. L. Archer, community college curriculum specialist, said the schools are offering discussion group back-up services for each course, providing classroom facilities and discussion leaders. Discussion groups are set up at each college, depending upon local and area response, Archer said. E. J. Vairin, executive director of the recently-formed Kentucky Training and Development Foundation, underwriters of the televised courses, said the community colleges' participation represents a "consortium approach" to management training in Kentucky. "Never before have so many individuals and groups joined together at the state level to provide this type of adult education in Kentucky," Vairin said. He listed personnel and business associations, as key members of the "consortium." Personnel departments in both government and industry have been unstinting in their support of the program, he said.

## 11. GEOLOGY STUDENT'S PAPER GETS NATIONAL RECOGNITION

Patrick S. Freeman, a participant in a National Science Foundation-supported undergraduate research program in the Department of Geology, is a co-winner in the 1968 Nininger Foundation Contest. The prize is given annually for the best previously unpublished paper pertaining to meteorites. Freeman's study, reporting the results of his research at the University, was supervised by Dr. John Thrailkill, and is concerned with the abundance of nickel in the very fragmented rock in the core of a suspected meteorite impact near Versailles. The researcher was able to show that the amount of nickel in the core was higher than in either the surrounding rock or other types of naturally fragmented rock material.

#### 12. SCHOLARSHIP FUND HONORS DEAN W. A. SEAY

About two dozen Kentucky farm leaders recently set up the William A. Seay Memorial Scholarship Fund, honoring the late dean of the College of Agriculture and director of the Extension Service, who was killed in an airplane crash Feb. l. Dr. Charles E. Barnhart, associate dean and director of the school and service, said about \$1,000 already has been received for the fund. He gave no estimate of the amount the organization expects to collect. The fund will be used for the benefit of students in the college, he said. Dr. Seay, dean and extension director since 1962, was killed when his plane crashed near Martinsburg, W. Va., as he was returning from a trip to Philadelphia. Hayden Timmons, Frankfort, an official of the Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative Association, was named organizational secretary for the fund committee.

# 13. DR. S. M. SHAH NAMED DISTINGUISHED PROFESSOR

A professor of mathematics, Dr. S. M. Shah, has been named by his fellow faculty members as the "Distinguished Professor of the Year" in the College of Arts and Sciences. A member of the faculty since 1966, Dr. Shah is the 26th winner of the award established in 1944 as a means of recognizing outstanding academic achievement. Announcement of his selection was made last week by Dr. Kenneth Vanlandingham, associate professor of political science and chairman of the election committee. As a result of his selection, Dr. Shah will be given a semester free of teaching duties to conduct a research project of his own choosing and to prepare the annual Arts and Sciences lecture. Dr. Shah said he probably would be given the spring semester of next year for the sabbatical and that he plans to do research in England. Born in India, the professor received a BA degree with honors from Fergusson College, Poona, India, and master's and Ph.D degrees from University College, London. He was professor and department chairman at the Muslim University in India, and a visiting professor at the universities of Wisconsin, Kansas, and Northwestern University, before joining the University faculty. Dr. Shah has published about 100 research papers and is the co-author of three textbooks, published in India. He is a specialist in the theory of functions in particular entire and meromorphic functions. He is a member of numerous professional societies and is a fellow of the Royal Society of Edinburgh and the New York Academy of Sciences.

#### 14. STUDENTS REFURBISH FRENCHBURG GYM, CITED BY BAR

University students last month continued to involve themselves in charitable and civic activities, many of them receiving honors for their participation. Two law students, Donnie Murray, Burkesville, and Larry Roberts, Lexington, received certificates from the Fayette County Bar Association for their "outstanding work as legal aides." A gymnasium at Frenchburg, used frequently by the community, particularly by retarded children, was refurbished over a previous weekend by members of the Phi Kappa Tau fraternity. The members had requested help from Gov. Nunn in finding a service project and he suggested the Frenchburg gym. Randy Owens was chairman of the project and he was assisted by 50 of his fellow fraternity members.

#### 13. TUTORING PROGRAM ESTABLISHED BY OEO GRANT

A summer tutoring and counseling program for 10th and 11th grade students preparing for college has been established at the University through a \$60,534 grant from the Office of Economic Opportunity. The grant will serve 70 students during a 12-month period and will provide full-time counseling and follow-up tutoring for the youths on campus and when they return to high school.

#### 16. STUDY BY JOKL, RUPP, SHOWS BIGGER TEAMS

A study of basketball players at the University since 1948 by Dr. Ernst Jokl, professor of physical education, and basketball Coach Adolph Rupp, has been published in the Journal of the American Association of Health, Physical Education and Recreation. The coauthors say that basketball players today are bigger and more accurate, that the 1968 team averages  $2\frac{1}{2}$  inches taller than the Fabulous Five of 1948, and that the present team is 18.2 pounds heavier a man. The 1948 team made 32.7 per cent of their field goal attempts and won an NCAA title. The 1968 team shot 46.5 per cent and lost in the NCAA Mid-East regional. The 1948 team made 63.6 per cent of its free throws, the 1968 team 71.6 per cent. The authors conclude that the main reason the 1968 team was taller and heavier is that selection of high school players was intensified and the effectiveness of training improved during the 20-year period.

#### 17. INFANT'S LIVER TRANSPLANTED INTO BOY HERE

University surgeons on April 7 transplanted the liver of a 3-week-old baby into the body of a 14-month-old Estill County boy in an effort to save his life. The operation was the first liver transplant in Kentucky and only about the 40th in the world. Most have been performed at Denver, Colo., and there are about six survivors. The recipient's defective liver was not removed. The surgeons removed his spleen, which is located on the left side opposite the liver, and inserted the new liver in its place.

The unidentified donor baby died of a congenital heart ailment, and the four-hour, 20-minute transplant operation began immediately. The baby's parents, realizing death was near, consented to the operation a few days earlier. Speed was important in the operation because the liver's cells begin to deteriorate with death. The organ was being placed in the boy's body only 17 minutes after death of the donor.

#### 18. UNIVERSITY RANKS 56TH IN FEDERAL SUPPORT

The University ranked 56th among the nation's colleges and universities in getting federal support during the fiscal year 1967. According to a survey just released by the National Science Foundation, the University received \$16,427,000, or one-half of one per cent of the total U.S. contribution to higher education of \$3.3 billion. U of L got \$14,993,000. Indiana University—which ranked 18th—got \$33,035,000. The perennial leader, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, received \$96 million. About three-fourths of the University total went to science activities.

#### 19. DR. BLYTON STEPS DOWN AS DEBATE COACH

More than 700 trophies in 21 years is the record for the University Varsity Debate Team since Dr. Gifford Blyton began coaching the team in 1948. Dr. Blyton will give up his coaching duties at the end of the current semester to devote more time to teaching in the graduate program of the Department of Speech. His formal title has been director of forensics. The announcement was made last week at the annual Recognition Dinner of the debate team by Dr. Halbert Gulley, chairman of the Department of Speech. Receiving a special award was Joe Mainous, Lexington businessman, who has been an assistant to Dr. Blyton in debate activities for 20 years. Mainous was a member of Dr. Blyton's first team in 1948.

Dr. Blyton, national president of the American Forensics Association, said several years ago that "Kentucky (UK) does a lot more than play basketball. We now also are known as a debating school." He said "debating has done more than anything else" to build an undergraduate image of scholarship and research at UK. Dr. Blyton inaugurated the annual Kentucky Thoroughbred Debates in 1958, which has invited leading debate teams from throughout the country to the campus each fall. Dr. Blyton will be succeeded as debating director by Howell Brady, senior law student who has taught a basic speech course for several years. Brady will be a full-time lecturer in the Department of Speech, according to Dr. Gulley. Debaters John Nelson and Scott Wendelsdorf, both of Lexington, were presented awards at the dinner. The team earned 37 trophies this year, and 60 last year. One of the major ones was second place in the Delta Sigma Rho-Tau Kappa Alpha national championships.

#### 20. CLAY IS HONORED FOR FARM LEADERSHIP

Albert G. Clay, chairman of the executive committee, was named on April 29 the Farm Press and Radio Association of Kentucky's "Man of the Year in Kentucky Agriculture." He was presented the award at the association's annual banquet at the Helen G. King Alumni House on the University campus. Cited for his "unique" leadership in numerous fields, he is vice chairman of the Board of Trustees; retiring chairman of the board of Spindletop Research Institute; chairman of the Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland; chairman of the board of the Burley Auction Warehouse Association. He was a member of the committee that last year recommended the merger of the University of Louisville and UK as sister institutions under a single board of trustees, thus bringing U of L into the state educational system. Some of his other activities for which he was cited are his four-term membership on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Tobacco Industry Advisory Committee; service as a director and former president of the National Tobacco Tax Council; director of the Burley and Dark Leaf Tobacco Export Association; former chairman of the Eurley Sales Committee that each year establishes the rules and regulations for burley sales; a director of the Kentucky Burley Festival Committee. He also was credited with helping UK obtain the National Tobacco Research Laboratory at Lexington.

# 21. SIGNIFICANT ACTIVITIES OF FACULTY AND STAFF

- Dr. Hans Conrad, chairman of the Department of Metallurgical Engineering, has been invited to deliver a major address to the second general assembly of the Centro Nacional de Investigaciones Metalurgicas at Madrid, Spain. The meeting will be June 10-13.
- <u>Dr. Martin B. Solomon</u>, director of the Computing Center, has been named a member of the Committee on Higher Education Management Information Systems which advises the Southern Regional Education Board.
- <u>Dr. A. C. Glasser</u>, chairman of the Department of Pharmaceutical Chemistry, has been awarded a research grant of \$5,049 by the National Institute of Mental Health of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The grant is for one year.
- Dr. John M. Carpenter, professor of zoology, and Dr. Stephen M. Gittleson, associate professor, co-authored papers with graduate students James Ray, Richard Hoover and Barbara Woodruff, to be presented at meetings of the Association of Southeastern Biologists, in Memphis, Tenn. Two candidates for the doctoral degree in biology, Robert Moissend, Chicago, and Willard Jinks, Pikeville, presented papers on their doctoral research at the same meeting.
- Dr. Lawrence S. Thompson, professor of Germanic and classical languages, has been appointed to the advisory committee of the "Inter-American Review of Bibliography," published by the Organization of American States, Washington, D. C. A book by Dr. Thompson has been published by Archon Books, Hamden, Conn. Entitled "Bibliologia Comica: or Humorous Aspects of the Caparisoning and Conservation of Books," the volume contains a number of essays reprinted from the "Bulletin of the New York Public Library," and an introduction by William Katz, former faculty member of the Department of Library Science.

Bruce Poundstone, director of the Division of Regulatory Services in the Agricultural Experiment Station, was honored recently upon his retirement as scoutmaster for 25 years of a local Boy Scout troop.

Coach Adolph Rupp has been serving as chairman of the local Cancer Crusade. The campaign was conducted throughout the county during April. Coach Rupp has also been named to the Basketball Hall of Fame.

Dr. Thomas D. Clark, distinguished professor of history emeritus, was the Founder's Day speaker at Eastern Kentucky University in March.

Dr. Lewis Cochran, vice president for research, has been named by Gov. Louie Nunn to the Bluegrass regional White House Conference executive committee.

Dean Charles Haywood of the College of Business and Economics is new vice chairman of the board of Spindletop Research, Inc. He has served on the executive committee and is a member of the finance committee. William T. Young, a member of the Developmental Council, was named chairman, succeeding Albert D. Clay, chairman of the Trustees' executive committee.

Dr. Denver Sloan, director of the Independent Study Program and the Kentucky High School Speech League of the University Extension, attended the annual meeting of the Southeastern Regional Conference of NUEA at Gatlinburg. Prior to the general sessions of the conference, Dr. Sloan chaired a meeting of the Administrative Committee of the Independent Study Division of NUEA. Dr. Sloan will attend the International Council of Correspondence Education in Paris, France, May 19-23, as a representative of the Division and of the University. Headquarters will be the UNESCO House, Place de Fontenoy, Paris.

Dr. Grant R. Wilkinson, assistant professor of Materia Medica in the College of Pharmacy, will receive an annual Lederle Pharmacy Award, a cash sum given to encourage and enable youthful researchers to present their significant research findings at national meetings. He will present his paper, "Studies on the respiratory depressant potency and time course of action of heroin, MAM, and morphine," at the annual meeting of the Academy of Pharmaceutical Science at Montreal this month.

Dr. Holman Hamilton, professor of history, inaugurated the Haynes Lecture Series at Marshall University in April. The lecture will be an annual event and will feature distinguished off-campus historians.

Dr. S. Sidney Ulmer, chairman of the Department of Political Science, delivered a paper on "Political Science: The Next Decade," at the Southwest Social Science Association annual meeting in Houston, Texas. The meetings were attended by social scientists from across the nation, but primarily from the Southwest region.

The Kentucky Speech and Hearing Association awarded <u>Dr. Charles F. Diehl</u>, professor in the Department of Special Education, Honors of the Association for his "outstanding service to the association." The award was presented at the Association's annual meeting in Louisville in April. Dr. Diehl was KSHA's first president when it was organized in 1957.

Dr. David E. Denton, associate professor of philosophy of education, recently presented two papers to professional organizations. His "Theoretical and Historical Backgrounds of T-Groups and Sensitivity Training" was for the Kentucky Psychological Association, and, in April, "Education's Egocentric Predicament" was given to the national meeting of the Philosophy of Education Society in Denver.

#### DEAN, COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE

Recommendation: That Dr. Charles E. Barnhart, presently Associate Dean, College of Agriculture, and Director, Agricultural Experiment Station, be appointed Dean of the College of Agriculture, and Director, Cooperative Extension Service, effective immediately; Dr. Barnhart will continue as Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station.

### Background

The tragic and untimely death of Dr. William A. Seay brought a grave loss in the deanship of the College of Agriculture. The University was compelled to seek a successor for this important post as rapidly as possible.

Accordingly, in late February a search committee was appointed, in keeping with customary practice, with a membership of six faculty and two students. Starting its work immediately following appointment, the committee first began the development of a set of qualifications considered essential in a person to meet the responsibilities of the deanship. For assistance in developing such a set of qualifications the committee sent letters soliciting suggested qualifications, as well as any names for consideration as candidates, to the College and Cooperative Extension faculty and staff. A similar solicitation was made of approximately 150 Kentucky leaders and officers of agriculturally-related organizations. The committee met with and was advised by department chairmen in the College and representatives of the Home Agents Association, the Youth Agents Association, the Extension Specialists Association, and the Agricultural Extension Agents Association also gave their counsel.

Using the qualifications thus established, the committee proceeded to screen eleven individuals within the University and twenty-six outside the University whose names had been proposed. The set of qualifications soon reduced the number under consideration to five; a further reduction then ensued. From this process, the above recommendation emanates and recognizes a most able man for a vital and significant position in the University and the Commonwealth at large.

The committee began its work vigorously on February 18, the first of twelve meetings. By letter, conferences, student newspaper notices, and memoranda to various individuals and bodies the committee solicited statements of qualifications for the position and names of persons to be considered. A list of desired qualifications was drawn by the committee and in terms of those qualifications 37 prospects were considered, 19 outside the University of Kentucky. A further screening was conducted and the final persons were interviewed.

The result of this careful search came in the form of a single unanimous recommendation from the committee that Professor Wimberly C. Royster be proposed by the President to the Board of Trustees as Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.

At its reconvened meeting of April 28, 1969 the University Senate approved the following changes in the Student Code as adopted by the Board of Trustees on May 2, 1967 and recommended that these changes be transmitted to you for presentation to the Board of Trustees.

that the last three paragraphs under Section II, C. The Punishment, at
the bottom of page 15 and the top of page 16 of the printed booklet
entitled "Non-academic Relationships Between Students and the University",
be deleted, and that the following section be substituted:

#### D. Safety Precautions

The Committee realizes that there may be occasions when a student's presence constitutes a serious threat to the University community. The Committee believes, therefore, that the Vice President for Student Affairs and the University Appeals Board should be given the power to take certain safety precautions. The Committee recommends that the following procedure be followed in such situations:

In the event that the Vice President for Student Affairs has reasonable cause to believe that a student's presence will probably result in injury to himself, others, or University property if he is not immediately restricted, the Vice President may take such precautionary actions for a maximum of 48 hours as he considers necessary to protect members of the University community or its property, including total exclusion from University property. Upon taking such action, the Vice President shall notify the University Appeals Board. This Board is empowered to change or to extend the action of the Vice President, but the Board shall not prohibit the student from attending class, using the library, or fulfilling any other responsibility that it may deem necessary for his academic work.

Such temporary precautions shall be enforced only for such time as the conditions requiring them exist. Accordingly, the circumstances shall be reviewed by the Board prior to every semester, and in addition, promptly after an appeal in writing from the student involved.

2. that the following sentences be inserted following the fifth sentence in the last paragraph on page 13 of the printed booklet entitled "Nonacademic Relationships Between Students and the University":

In addition, there shall be three student alternates and three faculty alternates, who shall be selected on the same basis and with the same requirements as the regular members. All members of the Appeals Board and their alternates shall be expected to meet within 48 hours" notice.

3. that the following sentence be <u>deleted</u> from this same last paragraph on page 13 of the printed booklet entitled "Non-academic Relationships Between Students and the University":

The Vice President for Student Affairs will be an ex officio member of the Appeals Board.

4. that the following sentence be added on to Offense No. 10, at the top of page 9 of the printed booklet entitled "Non-academic Relationships Between Students and the University":

However, a student shall not be subject to disciplinary action under this offense in cases where charges against him are being brought in local, state, or federal court.

Offense No. 10, with the inclusion of this sentence, would then read:

10) Any misuse by a student of his position as a student, or of his right to use University property, to commit, or induce another student to commit a serious violation of local, state or federal laws. However, a student shall not be subject to disciplinary action under this offense in cases where charges against him are being brought in local, state, or federal court.

Recommendation: that \$75,000.00 be appropriated from fund balances in the Auxiliary Enterprise Account for renovation of Housing and Dining facilities.

Background: These funds are necessary for the installation of telephone conduit to accommodate a Centrex System for buildings in the Housing and Dining system. Under the terms of our contract with General Telephone, the facilities must be ready for conversion to Centrex July 1, 1970. In order to meet the schedule, we must promptly proceed with the installation of conduit in the various residence halls while they are vacant this summer.
