PRIDE PICNIC

The Pride Picnic, the largest queer pot luck in Kentucky and our best-attended pride event, will be Sunday, June 16 at Windy Knoll Farm, rain or shine. There is a large indoor arena in case it rains. Parking may be tight, so come with a friend. There is no charge (**Directions on page 14**)

The Picnic will have excellent entertainment including **Wishing Chair**, whose new CD **Crow** will be available and **The Queen City Rainbow Band**, a marching band and flag corp from Cincinnati, who will be making their Kentucky debut.

Everyone is asked to bring a dish to share using this last name division as a guide. We vary this each year but if you have a favorite dish that does not fit the list, bring it on.

Cold Drinks and water will be sold by GLSO to help cover the costs. There are lots of expenses involved in organizing the picnic, including renting sound equipment, tables, porta potties, and buying paper products and fried chicken. Selling drinks, raffle tickets and pride items help meet these costs and insure its continuation.

In addition to food, you might want to bring sunscreen, lawn chairs or a blanket to make yourself comfortable, and money to spend at the vendor tables. Please do not bring alcohol; we don't want to offend the horses.

Coronation XXI Fiesta Royale

The Imperial Court of Kentucky will present Coronation XXI, Fiesta Royale on Sunday, June 9th at the Radisson Plaza Hotel on Vine Street in Lexington. The ceremony will mark the climax of a weekend of events celebrating the spectacular success of Reign XX. Under the leadership of Empress Natalie Gaye and Emperor Chris Rhorer, the Imperial Court has raised more than \$35,000 for charities in the Bluegrass Region during the past year.

A highlight of the evening will be a command performance by former Empress of New York City, Fiona St. James, a member of the cast of HBO's landmark series Oz. Other features include election of the new Empress and Emperor for Reign XXI. Imperial Crown Princess XX J. D. Transgender Movies

At 2 pm on Sunday

June 23, at the Pride Center Diversity films presents the documentary **OUTLAW**, featuring Leslie Feinberg who self-identifies as a "gender outlaw." In this film, Feinberg presents hir (pronounced here) life experiences and encourages the audience to consider a different way of looking at gender. Feinberg is the author of *Stone Butch Blues, Transgender Warriors*, and *Trans Liberation*, *Beyond Pink and Blue*. S/he (or Sie) is considered to be one of the most influential activists in the movement for GLBT rights. Sie is also the winner of the Lambda Literary Award.

We will also show the feature film, Hedwig and the Angry Inch, an anatomically incorrect rock odyssey. (if we are able to hook a DVD player up to our TV.) Hedwig is a transgender glam-rocker who is leading her rock band on a tour of the U.S., telling her life story through a series of concerts at Bilgewater Inn seafood restaurants. Her tour dates coincide with those of arena-rock star Tommy Gnosis, a wide-eyed boy who once loved Hedwig... but then left with all her songs. Hedwig wears no less than 41 outfits during the film, contributing to the tendency of reviewers to refer to her as a drag queen. Hedwig is beyond that label-she transends gender. This movie should have received several Academy Award nominations. Join us for a fun afternoon.

Mammogram Project

As part of our continuing effort to improve the social, emotional and physical well being of the GLBT community, the GLSO Pride Center is developing a program to provide free screening mammograms to lesbian, bisexual and transgendered women who would not otherwise be able to obtain this necessary and potentially life saving test. The program will provide 15 free mammograms in central Kentucky and 15 free mammograms in 3 separate areas of eastern Kentucky for a total of 60 mammograms.

Workshops will also be held in each of the 4 areas of focus to provide instruction in the need for and the correct method of performing monthly breast self-exams for an additional 200 women.

We have sent a letter of inquiry to four foundations and have all ready received an application from two that are interested in funding our proposal. We need help writing grants for this mammogram project and general grants to fund the daily costs of keeping the Pride Center open. If you are interested in assisting with the grant writing process please call the center at 253-3233. Experience is helpful but certainly not necessary.

Turn left (south) onto Cleveland Rd (RT 1973). Down 1/2 mile on the left will be David's Fork Baptist Church. The Windy Knoll driveway is right next to the church property. A mailbox with the street number 3263 will be on your right, directly across from the driveway. Turn left into this driveway.





Coming Out To God

The phrase "coming out" is used to mean many different things. My "coming out" experience was a truth acknowledging process. God is the ultimate source and keeper of truth. God does not need us to reveal anything about ourselves for His benefit. He knows all things and sees all things. Coming out to God is about acknowledging to ourselves, as well as to God, our true nature.
