SGA to hold budget hearing

'Most rational argument will prevail': Senator files complaint against SGA President Jimmy Glenn regarding budget proposal

A preliminary hearing will take place today regarding the absence of this year's Student Government Association budget. Senate Chairman Edwin Orange, a political science senior, filed a complaint to the SGA Supreme Court against SGA President Jimmy Glenn.

Orange is asking the court to make Glenn immediately file the executive budget proposal with the SGA Senate Commit-

tee on Committees.

Orange said he filed the complaint so the court can clarify what the SGA constitution says about passing the budget. Glenn and Orange have different interpretations of what the constitution says about the budget procedure.

Orange believes the budget should go through two committees and then to the full Senate; Glenn believes one questionand-answer session about the budget would suffice before presenting it to the full Senate for approval.

A question-and-answer session took place last nighet.

ABC, CBS deny NBC, CNN debates

NEW YORK — Executives at ABC and CBS said they would not broadcast presidential debates organized by rival networks CNN and NBC, as proposed by Republican candidate George W. Bush. Instead of agreeing to three 90-dinute, nationally televised debates in October as proposed by the Commission on Presidential Debates, Bush has said the would participate in one of those debates and two others suggested by MBC and CNN. The Gore campaign has said it would not agree to Bush's plan unless Bush also committed to all three commission debates with their potentially wide viewership.

Lieberman: Gore tax plan is better

PEORIA, III. — Vice presidential candidate Joseph Lieberman sought yesterday to reassure middle class taxpayers that Democrat Al Gore's plans for targeted tax relief would help them more than an ecross-the-board tax cut proposed by Republican rival George W. Bush. Bush's \$1.3 tillion tax cut plan would reduce all income tax rates, with the lowest rate dropping to 10 percent and the highest to 33 percent. Lieberman said such a cut would give the top 1 percent of the population a reduction of about \$46,000 annually, while the middle class would get a cut of about \$450. "The wealthy don't need this tax cut," Lieberman said.

Bush unveils new prescription plan

ALLENTOWN, Pa. — George W. Bush yesterday announced a \$158 billion plan to help seniors pay for prescription drugs and to improve benefits in the health program that ensures millions of elderly Americans. The Republican presidential nominees' plan would pay at least one-fourth of the cost of prescription drug coverage, whether seniors choose the optional new Medicare benefit Bush proposes or a private plan. The elderly poor would get drug plans for free.

PHILADELPHIA — Thousands of teachers in the nation's sixth-largest school district voted yesterday to authorize their first strike since 1981, following a Labor Day breakdown in contract negotiations. Members of the Philadelphia Federation of Teachers voted unanimously in favor of the walkout during a morning executive meeting, union officials said. However, classes

World leaders assemble at U.N.

TOKYO — The leaders of Russia and Japan pledged yesterday to press on toward a peace treaty, despite falling to resolve a territorial dispute that has blocked a pact for more than five decades. Russian President Vladimir Putin and Prime Minister Yoshiro Mori ended two days of talks without progress over claims to four islands off northern Japan that Russia seized at the end of World War II. The islands have stood in the way of a peace treaty that would formally end more than 50 years of hostility.

NEW YORK — With Dennis Miller and a game featuring the past two Super Bowl champions, preliminary ratings for the "Monday Night Football" regular-season opener were encouraging for ABC. The St. Louis Rams' 41-36 victory over the Denver Broncos drew a bigmarket overnight Nielsen rating of 15.9 with a 26 share down just slightly from last year's 16.12-7 for the opener, which didn't fall on Labor Day. More impressively, Monday's preliminary rating was 9 percent higher than what "Monday Night Football" got the last time the NFL opened on the holiday weekend, in 1998.



Bush caught 'badmouthing' **Times reporter**

NAPERVILLE, Ill. — George W. Bush made a disparaging remark about a reporter from The New York Times that was picked up by a live mi-rophone.

As Bush stood on the podium Monday waiting for music to finish, he turned to running mate Dick Cheney and used an obscenity to describe reporter Adam Chymer in the nearby press area. Cheney agreed with Bush's assessment. Both men thought their remarks were off-mike.

Karen Hughes, Bush's spokeswoman, said the remarks were "a whispered aside to his running mate. It was not intended as a public comment."

Clymer said, 'I'm disappointed in the gover-

ment."

Clymer said. "I'm disappointed in the governor's language."

Cheney refused to discuss it. "The governor made a private comment to me. It was a private comment, and I don't plan to say anything about it." he fold reported after the Democratic vice presidential candidate, called Bush's remark a mistake that "reminds us of the reality of public life."

"You'd better be real careful what you do or say at any moment because it could be globally televised, or known rapidly." Lieberman said Tuesday on CBS. "The Early Show."

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

During the Super Bowl-champion St. Louis Rams' 41.36 victory over the Denver Broncos in the regular-season opener for both the teams and ABC's program, Miller refrained from too much over-the-top esoterica, picking his spots to go for laughs.

The network could not have asked for a better contest and the ratings brought good news for ABC, considering the game was played on Labor Day.

The overnight Nielsen rating for the broadcast was a 15.9 with a 26 share, down just slightly from last year's 16.1/27 for the opener.

The wacky nature of NFL tracts has hit a new high. Running back Stephen

The UK women's soccer team is ranked light by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America, moving up from 19th in the preseason, 18th by Soccer Buzz and remains at second in the Great Lakes Region. This marks the second week that the Cats (34, 1, 10 SEC) have been the highest ranked Southeastern Conference team in the Soccer Buzz poll. UK has been ranked in the Top-25 for 10 consecutive weeks and remains on top in the SEC East.

Sophomore Keri Boyce

leads the team in goals (3), assists (3), and points (9), while junior Annie Gage leads the team in shots (19). Next up for the Cats is Utah State on Friday, Sept. 8 at 5:30 p.m. at the UK Soccer Complex.

Attendance at the new \$27.8 million Slugger Field, home to the Louisville Riverbats, topped the International League with 685 561 fane.

Over the 72-game home schedule, the team brought in an average of 9,522 fans per game, or about 73 percent of the new stadium's capacity. Attendance at the next stadium nearly doubled last year's 381,484 mark at Cardinal Stadium.
