Letter from George W. Rogers to his father, Wm. B. Rogers, Barren County, Ky. Personal letter requesting news from home. No part of the south he has seen compares to Kentucky. Wants clothes from home. Rogers opposes cavalry raids in border states unless cavalry units plan to secure areas raided. Expresses dim view of so many Kentucky recruits joining horse mounted "Partisan Ranger" companies.

5/26/1862

A note by George W. Rogers, Camp Corinth [Mississippi?], to "friend" directing him to send a package according to the directions on the back of the package in case Rogers should fall in the coming battle.

5/31/1862

A note by George W. Rogers, Tuscumbia Swamps, [Alabama?], recording his battle fatigue and a dream he had during a short nap.
