# **Election's status remains in limbo**

## Students vote to support online ticket lottery

Tickets: Twice as many students vote for online system

Now that students have given their approval for an online ticket lottery system, they're looking to adminis-trators to embrace their ad-

And an athletics official said the department would by to do just that.

"We wanted to get the student opinion (anyway)," said Joe Sharpe, UK Assis-

tant Athletic Director who directs ticket sales. "Defi-nitely, we want to help out the students as much as we can."

can."
Sharpe said he was
pleased that students have
voiced their opinions.
A referendum on the
Student Government election ballot last week surveyed whether students supported an online ticket lottery. 1,714 students voted
yes; 875 students voted no.

Currently, the ticket lottery is done at Memorial Coliseum, where students are given numbers and can get their tickets when their number is randomly called.

The process, which usually starts after 9 p.m., often lasts until after midnight. Often times students who wait for tickets go home empty-handed.

Most of the students who approved the method say that an online system would take less time.

Meanwhile, the students who opposed it say that the method isn't fair because it

is based on a loyalty system, not first come, first serve.

The loyalty system rewards students who have gained the most loyalty points, which they earn more of with every game they attend.

Sharpe said the loyalty system would be used if there weren't enough tickets to go around.

"For example, if we'd made it to the final four this year, we would want to reward the (tickets to the) students with the highest loyal-

RAGHDAD, Iraq — Saddam Hussein urged Iraqi trops separated from their combat squada to join other fighters to fend off the Americans, according to a statement read on TV that indicates disearray among the country's elite fighters.

The appeal came as Raghdad shook from continued allied bombing. At nightfall Sunday long bursts of heavy machine-gun fire and strong explosions rocked the capital in what appeared to be a battle not far from the city center.

The shriek of surface-to-surface missiles, the pounding of artillery and bursts of what sounded like heavy machine-gun grew in frequency and intensity Sunday evening in the city's southern approaches.

Just before 9 p.m., explosions and gunfire were heard downtown, not far from the Information Ministry and a hotel where many journalists are staying. Prayers broadcast from Baghdad's mosques filtered through the din of battle. "God is great and to him we owe thanks," eleris intoned every time the city came under attack.

Two hours later, Baghdad was quiet, with occasional light weapons and missile fire. Explosions could be heard in the distance.

The statement attributed to Saddam, read on Iraqi television and radio, also said that anyone who destroys an allied tank, armored personnel carrier or artillery would be awarded 15 million dinars, or about 15 millon d

A voice that millions of Americans wake up to each morning will speak to an audience at UK tomorrow.

Bob Edwards, the host of National Public Radio's "Morning Edition," will deliver the 26th annual Joe Creason Lecture at 6 nm. Tuesday at Memorial Hall.

Edwards, a Louisville native, will be inducted into the Kentucky Journalism Hall of Fame at a ceremony the same day. Five other journalists will also be inducted.

"I'm speechless," Edwards said, the laughed. "Well, I'd better not be—I have to give a speech."

Edwards said in a telephone interview that he would discuss negative changes in the media—consolidation and the increasing demand for high profits.

Edwards also plans to discuss coverage of the Iraqi war. He praised the live coverage provided by journalists embedded in military units but said journalists at home have failed to ask penetrating questions.

Edwards said journalists must ask — and keep asking — about the war's long-term effects. "Particularly the idea that the country got it alone." he said. "There's almost a contempt for the rest of the world. That bothers me ... I think it bothers a lot of people."

# **UK colleges garner high rankings**

Five UK programs are ranked among the top in the nation, according to the newest rankings by the US.

"Rankings are a part of life, and we're not driven by them." he said. "We know where we need to be going." Vestal said the ranking's don't always show the college's strengths, such as a large number of competitive applications, small class sizes and talented faculty.
"It just doesn't tell much

about what we should be doing and where," he said.
Other UK colleges held steady in the magazine's rankings. The College of Pharmacy again ranked third in the nation, while the public finance and budget program in the Martin School of Public Policy and Administration again ranked fifth.





# **Embedded issues**

Have you seen enough sleeping bags yet? The notion of embedding reporters among the troops in Iraq is a notion both novel and full of

troops in Iraq is a notion both novel and full of promise. So it's with some disappointment that we view the actual practice of frontline journalism in the current conflict.

Those seeking significant news from the front are likely to be strung along by hours of commercial-peppered coverage. The reason why so little information exists in so much coverage—the source of the low signal/noise ratio, that is to say—probably has less to do with the fact the reporters are embedded than it does with the simple need to fill hours upon hours of air time.

And it's clear that such coverage is meant to take advantage of the public's intense desire to know what's happening in Iraq right this minute. People will watch for news on the war; as long as you can provide something, their eyes

as long as you can provide something, their eyes will be glued to the set, and they will catch whatever commercials you might show.

It's with some cynical interest we note that it's this same audience that has compelled most

newscasts and news stations to dumb down their coverage with human-interest stories and celebrity pundits. The same audience without the patience to sit through nuanced reporting on world affairs is strangely more than willing to world affairs is strangely more than a see a sit through hours of mundane non-news to see a few informative graphics now and then

Certainly, the conflict in Iraq is newsworthy and deserves our attention. Still, we can just as easily be informed of the relevant details in shorter bursts of time, freeing up airtime so we might see more well-rounded news

Another problem with embedded journalists Another problem with embedded journalists has to do with the nature of their embedding. The very fact they spend their time with the troops raises the possibility they might, with time, identify with them and lose their relatively objective viewpoint.

It's already known that sometimes a journal-It's already known that sometimes a journalist might step over the edge of true objectivity and help the American troops to locate and neutralize threats. This is only natural; the journalists fear for their lives as much as anyone else would. But it also indicates that empathy with the troops might eventually develop into comthe troops might eventually develop into complete identification, in which case our embedded journalists become little more than publicly accepted voices of the government.

As of yet, the coverage seems fair and not unduly influenced, for which the embedded jour-nalists should be given credit. But the true mea-sure of their coverage won't be available until peacetime, when any past atrocities will be put to light by independent journalists.


