### **WORLD President says** foreign policy unchanging

ACARTA, Indonesia — On his first overseas trip since the elections, President Clinton assured anxious Asian leaders yesterday that America's foreign policy will not be shaken by the Republican landslide in Congress.

"The position of the United States is certainly just as strong as it ever has been," Clinton said, setting the stage for a summit on expanding trade with Asia's booming economies.

Organizers hope leaders of 18 Pacific and Asian nations attending the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation forum will agree to free trude in the region by 2020, though China and Malaysia are resisting.

In advance of the summit, Clinton was holding one-on-one tilks today with the leaders of China, Japan, South Korea and Australia.

Disputes over human rights and trade barriers were expected to be high on the agenda for Clinton's second meeting with Chinese President Jiang Zemin in a year.

WASHINGTON — House Republicans are
promising quick action to reform the welfare system

Preparing to seize control of Congress, Republican lawmakers say they are willing to work with the
White House to overhala welfare by imposing strict
time limits on benefits, work requirements and
restrictions on aid to most immigrants.
But their legislation, included in the "Contract
With America" signed by more than 300 Republican
House candidates, may be too conservative for President Clinton, governors and moderate lawmakers.
Hearings on the bill could begin in early January
and the House is expected to vote on it within the
first 100 days of the session.



For the third time in 30 days, Clayton Sanford is filing a complant against the Student Government Association with the SGA Supreme Court.

Most recently, Sanford is disputing his disqualification from the Board of Trustees race. He failed to attend a mandatory meeting for candidates.

The homeless veteran, who has two sons, filed his first SGA complaint to try to get his S30 deposit fee back after the Freshmen Senate Elections. The fee was withheld because Sanford did not turn in his campaign expenditure form. The court denied Sanford's request.

His second claim to the court involved SGA child-care grants. He said the SGA committee that distincts the grants discriminated against him on the basis of his sex and because he is homeless and a veteran. The court said he was not discriminated against on those grounds. However, they ruled to have the SGA committee re-evaluate its process for choosing grant recipients.

In his newest complaint, Sanford alleges that committee re-evaluate its process for choosing grant recipients.

In his newest complaint, Sanford alleges that Amelia Perkins, chairwoman of the SGA Elections Board of Supervisions, and Matthew Thomas, chairman of the SGA Elections Board of Claims, are conspiring to keep him out of the trustee election.

"(Perkins and Thomas) had a secret, closed-door meeting of the election board and ruled that I was disqualified — all behind my back," Sanford said.

However, Thomas said the group never had a formal meeting to disqualify Sanford.
"It was a completely cut and dried, open and shut case," Thomas said. "If there was any question that Calyoton violated the law, we would have had a meeting. There was nothing for him to appeal."

nor attend the meeting will be automatically disqualified.
"It clearly states on the application that if you do not attend or send a representative in your place, then you are no longer a candidate," Perkins said.
Sanford signed the application, but he said he did not read it fully. He said it is not fair that the Elections Boards of Supervision and Claims have changed the rules for this election.

In the Freshmen Senate race.

In the Freshmen Senate race, candidates who did not attend the mandatory meeting had their deposits held, but in the special trustee election a lack of attendance equals disqualification.

Sanford said Perkins cannot change the rules of the elections. Perkins said that, according to the SGA Constitution, as the chairwoman of the Board of Supervisions she has the right to make "necessary changes for each election." However, Perkins said she also consulted other officials before changing the rules.

She said she spoke with SGA

Vice President Heather Hennel and SGA senators about the changes. Perkins also was required to have the changes approved by the Senate.

Hennel said the Senate approved two pages of short-order election rules about two weeks ago.

"The election changes were necessary because of the nature of the election," Hennel said. "The Senate looked over all of the new rules and agreed they were neces-

sary."
The student trustee seat was left empty after former president T.A. Jones resigned. Regulations require a special election to fill the

require a special election to fill the seat.

Sanford said he has grounds to file a claim against SGA because the Constitution does not clearly define "anything about elections."

He said during the fill elections. it was determined that only a candidate convicted of a felony could be disqualified.

The Constitution does not resemble the specifically define what constitutes resemble the specifically define what constitutes.

didate convicted of a felony could be disqualified.

The Constitution does not specifically define what constitutes a felony, but it defines a felony as something that severely changes the outcome of an election and a misdemeanor as anything that is not a felony. It does not say whether a candidate convicted of a felony must be disqualified.

SGA Supreme Court Chief Justice Jay Ingle said the Constitution is "vague and can be interpreted

two ways."
He cited an earlier case in the fall when the court ruled a felony equalled immediate disqualifica-

Perkins said Sanford does not recognize the "huge difference in importance between a Freshman and Board of Trustees election."

Thomas said he does not understand why Sanford is making "such a big deal of this." He said Sanford is going get his deposit back and he is allowed to be a write-in candidate.

Thomas said he does not understand why Sanford does not comprehend the reason he was disqualified.

"He did not show up at a required meeting that all of the other candidates showed for," Thomas said. "You speed. You break the law. You get caught." After Sanford's disqualification, he went to the SGA office to protest the ruling.

Sanford said he had a meeting with Hennel, Perkins and Thomas to "tell them why they were wrong."

Thomas said Sanford "went on a rampage" and yelled and cursed at him and Hennel. Hennel side Sanford threatened to "disband SGA."

# **UK bumbles, stumbles, falls to Indians 21-14**



A VIEW FOR A FEW Only 32,000 fans showed up for UK's 21-14 loss to Northeast Louisiana on Saturday. The fans who did show up got to see this 96-yard kickoff return for a touchdown by the Cats' Kio Sanford.

The UK football team was "one stumble away from a victory," head coach Bill Curry said after his team fell to Northeast Louisiana 21-14 'at Commonwealth Stadium on Saturday.

Actually, it was a stumble, two yards and a two-point conversion that never happened that kept the Wildcast (1-9), 0-7 Southeastern Conference) from snapping an nine-game losing streak dating back to Sept. 3.

After taking over on its own 30 with 4-44 left in the game, UK drove all the way down to the Indian 10-yard line.

The final play of the game was a wide receiver screen to flanker Clyde Rudolph, who took the pass from quarterback Antonio O'Ferral and slipped at about the five before being hit at the Indian 2 as time ran out.

UK played musical quarter-backs Saturday as both O'Ferral and regular starter Jeff Speedy saw significant action. O'Ferral failed to complete a pass in two attempts, while Speedy was 4-9 for only 22 yards.





# Role of Bronco chase in case questioned

Legal experts say flight 'ambiguous'

By Linda Deutsch Associated Press

LOS ANGELES — What role the pursuit of the white Bronco will play at O.J. Simpson's trial remains in question since prosecutors decided against charging his best friend with helping him flee.

Legal experts say it's unlikely Al "A.C."
Cowlings will testify for the prosecution. But they said that doesn't mean Simpson's flight from justice with Cowlings at the wheel will be abandoned as a feature of the murder case against him.

"The flight has always been fairly ambiguous," said Loyola University law professor Laurie Levenson. "The defense can say it was an act of panic by a man

whose world was collapsing around him....
The prosecution can still argue he was thinking of fleeing.
"But they would have had a stronger argument if Cowlings had been charged."
The quirky nature of the pursuit across Los Angeles diminished its impact as an indication of consciousness of guilt, said UCLA law professor Peter Arenella.
"The slowness of this chase makes it hard for people to treat this as a deliberate flight from justice," Arenella said.
"It's a piece of circumstantial evidence,

That climate of fear could overload emergency rooms as illegal immigrants wait until they are desperately ill to seek treatment, opponents said.

### **Gingrich sets confrontational tone**

WASHINGTON — Rep. Newt Gingrich, the prospective new House speaker, is warning President Clinton that while the two parties may cooperate, Republicans who will run the next Congress won't budge on many

congress won't budge on many issues.

"On those things where we believe we represent the vast majority of Americans, there will be no compromise," the Georgia Republican said Friday in his first speech since Election Day, "So let me draw the distinction. Cooperation, yes compromise, no. 1994. The cooperation, yes compromise, no. 1995. The compress for the first time since 1954, the combative Gingrich broadly sketched the new, conversative direction in which he will try to steer the House. The 104th Congress, which convene Jan. 4, presents Clinton with a hostile majority and questions about the prospects for legislation.

In a dramatic swipe at Democratic orthodoxy, Gingrich said many federal anti-powerty programs are not helping the poor and need to be replaced.

"We simply need to reach out, trast the slate and start over," he said in a luncheon address to financial investors that drew a

crowd of about 50 reporters.

In remarks later, he said Medicaid, Head Start and Job Corps were among the programs that need to be scrutinized, adding that re-examining a program "doesn't mean it has to be abolished."

GOP efforts to dramatically revamp those programs would be sure to run into stiff Democratic opposition.

White House Gingrich Composition on PBS' "MacNeil-Lehren NewsHour" Friday night, said it's easy for Gingrich to say he wants to "start from scratch and build from the bottom up."

"The question you have to ask is what does that mean? ... Does that mean he wants to replace the lead Start program? ... He has to approach his members and try to develop the majorities to get these things done," said Panetta, a former House member.

"I think the reality is that if Mr. Gingrich is to be taken at his word and he does want to cooperate, that this hopefully will be a period in which we can work together," Panetta commented.

The address was typically Gingrich, a former history professor — at times a political stump speech, at other points a discourse on everything from World War II strategy to the books of his friend Alvin Toffler, who has written about society of the future.

Gingrich took swipes at the "counterculture" and the "Washington elite," whom he never identified but said were rejected by the voters on Tuesday.

### Study: Male athletes more likely to assault

BOSTON — A new study suggesting that male varsity athletes are more likely than other college students to commit sexual assaults on campus raises serious concerns, an NCAA spokeswoman says.

"I think we all recognize that there is some evidence that there's a problem involving male student athletes and sexual assault," Kathryn Reith said Friday from NCAA headquarters in Overland Park, Kan.
"It's an indication we need to take it seriously."
Todd Crosset, a University of Massachusetts sports management

professor, and Jeffrey Benedict, a Northeastern University graduate student, switchi (107 cases of rape, attempted rape and fondling at 30 schools in the National Collegiate Athletic Association Division I. Judicial affairs office records from 10 of the schools showed male student athletes were more likely to be perpetrators in on-campus sexual assault cases than non-athletes. Figures from 1990 to 1993

non-athletes.
Figures from 1990 to 1993
showed student athletes made up
3.3 percent of all male students,
but 19 percent of those who carried out assaults.
Campus police records from
the other 20 schools showed no

significant difference between the number of athletes and non-athletes involved in sexual assaults. Those figures, from the 1992-93 academic year, showed male student athletes made up 3.7 percent of male students and 5.3 percent of the perpetrators.

None of the schools was identified.

None of the schools was the couldn't explain the difference between the two sets of statistics, but when they were looked at together, "athletes appear to be disproportionately involved in sexual assaults on college campuses."

They said more study is needed to better define the problem.

### **Murder threatens Haitian democracy**

MIREBALAIS, Haiti — Someone chopped off the head of Deputy Mayor Cadet Damzal just over a week ago. The murder is sowing confusion and fear among those who would build democracy in Hairi

those who would build democracy in Haiti.

Damzal, like many other supporters of democracy in Haiti's 
central plateau, had only recently 
ventured out of hiding, encouraged by the presence of U.S. 
troops and the return from exile 
of President Jean-Bertrand Arisride.

News of the slaying spread a message across the country. Even the U.S. Special Forces can't guarantee safety in Haiti's remote rural communities, long dominated by military commanders and armed civilians known as "attaches."

Hundreds of townspeople turned out for Damzal's funeral yesterday. A school band played a drige as pall bearers carried the casket through the streets from the funeral home to the Bethel Haiti Church of God, and then to the city cemeters.

"We're here to salute a valiant man who was assassinated in cowman where the control of the comman who was assassinated in cowman who was assassinated in cow-

man who was assassinated in cow-ardly manner," said Lexander Dorilas, 30, a local Aristide

activist. Evangelical Pastor Pierre Jean-

Baptiste called for an end to political violence. "The time has come for leaders of the country to assume their responsibilities and take action so that henceforth these acts of violence and banditry stop," he said.

The Aristide government ordered an investigation into the killing.

"By killing Damzal, they want to kill what he represented," Mayor Paul Yvelt Millien said on the eve of the funeral.

Millien, who along with about 300,000 other pro-Aristide. Haitians had been in hiding during much of president's three-year exile, said the killers want to intimidate popular pro-democracy leaders who plan to seek public office in next year's elections.

Millien, 33, is certain his deputy was slain by the same paramilitary thugs who terrorized. Haiti after Aristide's democratically elected government was toppled in a September 1991 military coup. The thugs are blamed for at least 3,000 political murders.

Aristide, whose vast support comes from city slum dwellers and rural sharecroppers, returned to Haiti on Oct. 15, a month after U.S. troops landed and engineered the departure of the coup leaders. A U.N. peacekeping force eventually will take over from the Americans.




