The enigmatic Muhammad reacted to the decision
with the same flinty look he
had through most of the trial.

al. The jury deliberated for more than five hours over two days before deciding the fate of Muhammad, a 42-year-old Gulf War veteran who masterminded the attacks and asked police to "Call me God" during his reign of terror.

The jury's recommenda-

Some jurors said the lack of any emotion or remorse from Muhammad, combined with the broad scope and violence of the shootings, convinced them that the death penalty was the only option.

When he and 18-year-old Malvo were arrested on Oct. 24, 2002, various jurisdictions scrambled to prosecute them. Ultimately, Attorney General John Ashcroft sent the two to Virginia, citing the state's ability to impose "the ultimate's asarction."

Greenspun indicated he sees several major issues for appeal, including whether Virginia's post-Sept. 11 terrorism law applied in the sniper case. Muhammad became the first person convicted under the law Greenspun also argued that Virginia law does not allow the death penalty for Muhammad became there was no evidence he was the triggerman.

Prosecutors said the killings were in part a plot to extort \$10 million from the government. 

Proposed benefits policy could send off good profs

Retirement is something that every person should be able to look forward to. Even as college students, many of us look forward to the days when we will no longer have to work and can live off the money we have saved up over years and years of running in the rat race. RV-ing out West, catching rays in Florida, no kids or bills to worry about. Good times — that is, until old age begins to call, and medical care becomes increasingly important. Admittedly, it costs a lot of money for doctors and pills, but no problem. As retirees, healthcare benefits from the businesses we've retired from will take care of the bill.

Unless we retire from UK.

A proposal is on the table to create a cap on health benefits received by future UK retirees. The proposal, if accepted, would take effect in 2005. It would cap UK's contributions to \$7,500 a year, or \$625 a month. The argument is that this cap would save UK roughly \$95 million over what would be necessary without the cap. The key word here is not "\$95 million," but it is "necessary." If a certain amount of money is projected as what

will be needed for UK retirees to get adequate healthcare, then UK should not try to get by with less, especially \$95 million less.

If UK doesn't provide its retirees with enough health benefits, guess who picks up the tab? That's right, the retirees. One problem with the retirement benefits cap is that it could inspire a number of good, qualified professors to retire early so that they can slide under the wire and avoid the change in 2005. This would be a real shame.

Does UK really want to lose dedicated professors simply because it's not willing to shell out a couple extra bucks for health care when these teachers do finally decide to retire?

The sad part is, if UK puts a cap on retirement benefits, then there will be more professors teaching for longer, but many of them won't be here because they want to be here, they'll be here because they can't afford to retire. And that will make for bitter teachers who don't really care anymore, and are just here to collect a check. If UK wants to be a Top-20 Research Institution, this is not the way to do it.



Jury drops UK officer's sexual abuse charges

A grand jury dismissed three first-degree sexual abuse charges against a UK Police officer Monday.

Officer Hugh "Donny" Turner, 34, will not stand trial for allegations made against him that said he subjected a male minor to sexual contact during the summers of 2001, 2002 and 2003, according to court documents.

Lexington Police arrested Turner Sept. 8 in a south Lexington neighborhood.

Root said that during the first incident, Turner put his arm around the boy while they were watching television and then led him to the bathroom, where he touched his genitals. The following incidents were similar in nature, he said.

Mattone said grand jury proceedings are secret, so he could not say what evidence was presented. He did say Turner testified during the proceedings.

"It's no secret Turner obviously de-nied (the charges)," Mattone said. "Gen-erally, whenever a defendant testifies on



Right move to scrap keno after Fletcher's criticism

On Monday, Arch Gleason, chairman of the Kentucky Lottery Board, abruptly reversed course by scrapping plans to develop a keno game to supplement lost revenue. Keno is a game where contestants guess numbers and try to match them with numbers randomly selected by a computer. Opponents of the game claim that it's highly addictive and will cause many players to waste excessive amounts of money.

Previously, Gleason had pushed the keno game based on a recommendation from Gov. Paul Paton. However, legislators criticized the plan, saying that such a move would require a constitutional amendment. The debate reached its peak when Gov-elect Ernie Fletcher voiced his disapproval of the game's implementation earlier this On Monday, Arch Gleason, chairman of the

when Gov-elect Ernie Fletcher voiced his disapproval of the game's implementation earlier this week. In his campaign, Fletcher said that he is personally opposed to expanded gambling, but would not stand in the way if the legislature passed such a bill. Since Gleason did not seek approval of the legislature, Fletcher maintained his campaign pledge and was right in doing so.

The Kentucky Lottery seems to be in dire straits these days. The state projects to lose \$30

million per year after the Tennessee Lottery begins. Higher education funding could be in danger as a result. Gleason and other Kentucky Lottery officials should be commended for trying to find a solution to a growing fiscal problem. However, their methods were improper:

Instead of pushing keno through by themselves, they should have sought out a sponsor in the legislature that would propose a constitutional amendment. Then the keno game, if passed, would at least be legitimized by General Assembly action. bly action.

Clearly, state and lottery officials must find new and innovative ways to supplement income that may cross over the Tennessee border. Doing so will ensure that programs that benefit students, such as KEES, will continue to be available year after year. But the state legislature must be



Having a blast: Target practice at shooting range

A man a few feet away raised his A man a few feet away raised his pistol and fired — the noise, filtering through ear protectors, pulled somewhere in my stomach, a visceral response reverberating through my organs, giving me goosebumps and making the hair on the back of my neck stand on end.

pistol, a Ruger .45-caliber, in response. With one thumb she flicked off the safety; with the other, she cocked the

weapon.

One eye squinted through her safety goggles, she held the gun an arm's length away. And fired.

As she pulled the tigger, the gun kicked back and up, the shell casing flew out of the gun and behind her. And she screamed.

On my turn, I firmly gripped the Ruger 9-millimeter with both hands. Smaller than Moira's 145, the gun didn't kick as badly when I pulled the trigger. But the bullet didn't hit the target, either.

I have never owned a gun, nor

target, either.

I have never owned a gun, nor have my parents ever owned a gun. The last time I shot a gun was at camp in the fifth grade, an ancient riffe that I used to hit a target I think exactly four times out of many more shots. It was enough to get my gun patch that week, but I have never been declared a sharpshooter.

So when I found myself shooting pistols last week with Dialogue Editor Josh Sullivan, columnist Wes Blevins and Moira, it seemed a little bit like an episode of "The Twilight Zone."

With small stature, big heart, ensemble acting to be admired

The Station Agent combines big laughs with substance

"I'm a dwarf," explains Finbar McBride, played by Peter Dinklage, a man more justified in his disconnect from society than anyone in history. Tom McCarthy, writer and director of The Station Agent, had two choices

after casting Dinklage: use the actor as a prop that pounces on all that is large, or let the actor actually act. As the mo-rose McBride, Dinklage deservedly gets to do the latter.

Fin, a stern and stoic train afi-cionado, works in what amounts to his dream job (not that he'd ever admit it) in a rustic model train store. The stone-jawed Fin relentlessly operates on the models like any dutiful handyman.

When the store's owner collapses and dies, all within earshot of his em-ployee, Fin's world collapses too. He in-herits an abandoned depot near Newfoundland, N.J., that appropriately be-

comes his home.

In Newfoundland, he finds Joe
Aromas (Bobby Canavale), a lonely man stuck running an isolated hot dog/coffee stand near the empty sta-tion when his father falls ill. Joe clings to the last thread of his bashful youth because he has nothing else to call his

The 20-something man, who drives Frank's Gorgeous Hot Dog truck while wearing shirt from Carl's Flooring that once belonged to someone named Eddie, desperately ingratiates himself to anyone or anything he can latch onto. He's outwardly obnoxious, but

inwardly insecure.

Despite Joe's repeated overtures Despite joes repeated overtures, Fin remains a recluse, only occasionally venturing out to walk into town. It is on one of these walks that the third dy-namic personality in The Station Agent nearly kills Fin with her SUV (twice, ac-

tually).
Olivia Harris (Patricia Clarkson) is Olivia Harris (Patitude Charles) enduring an imminent divorce while still mourning the loss of her son two years ago. She's embarrassed by her erratic, sometimes paranoid behavior but her frankness opens up Fin and the movie's next chapter

movie's next chapter.

The troubled trio comes together, forming a band of outsiders and taking comfort, though not necessarily pleasure, in each other's company. They are united by their loneliness, but as in the real world, friendship doesn't automatically exceeding the properties.

Occasionally, peripheral charac-pop up to diversify the trio's other-

wise sparse social network. Cleo (Raven Goodwin), a curious young girl, also has an affinity for trains. Fin lets her ask the questions he otherwise wouldn't dignify with a response.

Old wounds heal slowly and writer/director Tom McCarthy allows the characters' pain to simmer until the audience is ready to identify with them. The protagonists speak and act out much of the story, but The Station Agent is an engrossing visual experience.

For most of the movie, we peer in on Fin with a degree of detachment, much as we might in real life. He's in the train, on top of the train, under the train. Later, we see his diminutive figure perfectly framed by rails that seem

ure perfectly framed by rails that seem a mile apart.

After Olivia gives Fin a camcorder so he can take up "train chasing," the silent figure suddenly explodes with life. Of course he has somber relapses as future events dictate, but McCarthy has already sucked us into Fin's world.

The camera cranes closer and closer. Before long, we're at Fin's level, physically and emotionally following

his every restrained movement. By the film's climax, we see the world and its dangers from his point of view for the

Through this lens, we see parts of ourselves. The movie's strength lies in its equal treatment of the humane (Fin's muted compassion and dignity) and the inhumane (the cackling voyeurs). Our ideal and real selves are

both in plain sight.

Emily (Michelle Williams), the local library clerk, personifies our disso-nance. When Fin comes to check out a book, she instinctively screams in

book, she instinctively screams in shock. Her awkwardness gradually turns to admiration and she too opens up, revealing her character.
With its dearth of sight gags, short jokes and peppy dialogue, The Station Agent isn't for everybody. If you want to laugh at Dinklage, go see him scratch, bite and claw in Elf. But for a chilled restorance, chosen the Station. skilled performance, choose The Station






