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NEW SPEC KITS IN REFERENCE

Two new SPEC kits from ARL's Office of Management Services have been received in the Reference Department. Number 144, "Building Use Policies", deals with such issues as food-and-drink, smoking, aesthetics and general building use. A subsequent kit, to be issued later this year, will cover building security and personal safety issues, including disruptive behavior and emergencies.

Number 145, "Library Publications Programs", focuses on libraries which have centralized and formal programs with full of part-time staff or editorial boards or committees coordinating library-wide publishing activities. The kit examines program goals, advantages and disadvantages of such programs, staffing and organization, distribution and marketing, development of a program and other issues and needs.

MICROCON PROJECT NEWS

The Council on Higher Education has asked John Bryant to assist them in making their present library into an information center. Plans include electronically linking their library with the University of Kentucky; making them an associate library in OCLC; giving them access to LS2000 in both computers; converting their shelf list; participating in the intra-library loan activities, including telefax; mounting their database on the community college MV20 as a separate institution, and providing reference service from the Lexington campus.

NESTOR CREATIVITY AWARDS

October 1 is the deadline for nominations of regular, full-time Lexington Campus staff members for the fourth annual Paul A. Nestor Creativity Award.

The award recognizes the staff member who "best reflects honor upon the University through a combination of any of the following: job performance; exemplary attitude, initiative, creativity, improved productivity, more efficient or safer operations, cost savings, relationship with associates and student and the ability to relate their work to the mission of the University.

The first-place winner receives a \$400 cash award and a special plaque; second and third place recipients receive certificates.

Any staff or faculty member or student of the University may submit names for consideration.

NEH SUMMER STIPENDS

National Endowment for the Humanities summer stipends for 1989 will provide \$3,500 for two months support of full-time study and research in the humanities. The stipends are available to faculty members of universities and two- and four-year colleges as well as to other persons working in the humanities.

Faculty members must be nominated by their college or University; nonfaculty staff members may apply without nomination.

October 1, 1988 is the deadline for application. Awards will be announced in mid-March 1989.

OMS BASIC MANAGEMENT SKILLS INSTITUTE

ARL's Office of Management Studies will hold a Basic Skills Management Institute September 6-9, 1989 at the Cedar Creek Farm Conference Center in New Haven, Missouri, just outside St. Louis. The institute is devoted to advancing the supervisory and managerial skills of library staff.

The 3 1/2 day laboratory approach institute is geared for librarians and paraprofessionals who have some managerial, administrative or supervisory responsibilities. The sessions will include problem-solving, motivation of staff, decision-making, effective use of groups, supervisory leadership, performance appraisal and communication.

The fee for the institute is \$375 per person.

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CONFERENCES AND WORKSHOPS

UK's College of Business and Economics will offer five computer seminars September 26-30 at the Harley Hotel in Lexington. IBM Personal Computer Seminar will be taught September 26; Introduction to Lotus, September 27; Advanced Lotus, September 28; Introduction to dBASE III Plus, September 29, and Advanced dBASE III Plus on September 30. The cost of each one-day session is \$245 which includes instructional materials and lunch.

CareerTrack Seminars will offer a one-day seminar "How To Deal with Difficult People" on September 8 at the Lexington Hilton Inn. Cost of the seminar is \$39 per person. CEU credits are available.

The Library and Information Technology Association (LITA) will hold its second national conference in Boston October 2-6, 1988. The conference will feature technology seminars, technical sessions, new product reviews, showcases and visits to area libraries.

Cost of the conference is \$145 to LITA members; \$180 to non-members.

Phi Delta Kappa will sponsor four two-day conferences on public schools and the First Amendment, including on September 29-30 in St. Louis, Missouri. Issues to be discussed include religion in public education, school newspapers and student speech, secular humanism, the new age movement and related issues and the schoolbook protest movement, including library books, textbooks, courses and films.

Cost of the conference is \$125.

ACRL will hold its fifth national conference April 5-8, 1989 in Cincinnati, celebrating the 100th anniversary of the founding of the College Library Section of ALA. There will be additional pre-conference programs on April 3-4.

Cost of the conference will be \$95 for ACRL members, \$125 for ALA members, \$155 for non-members and \$35 for student members.
