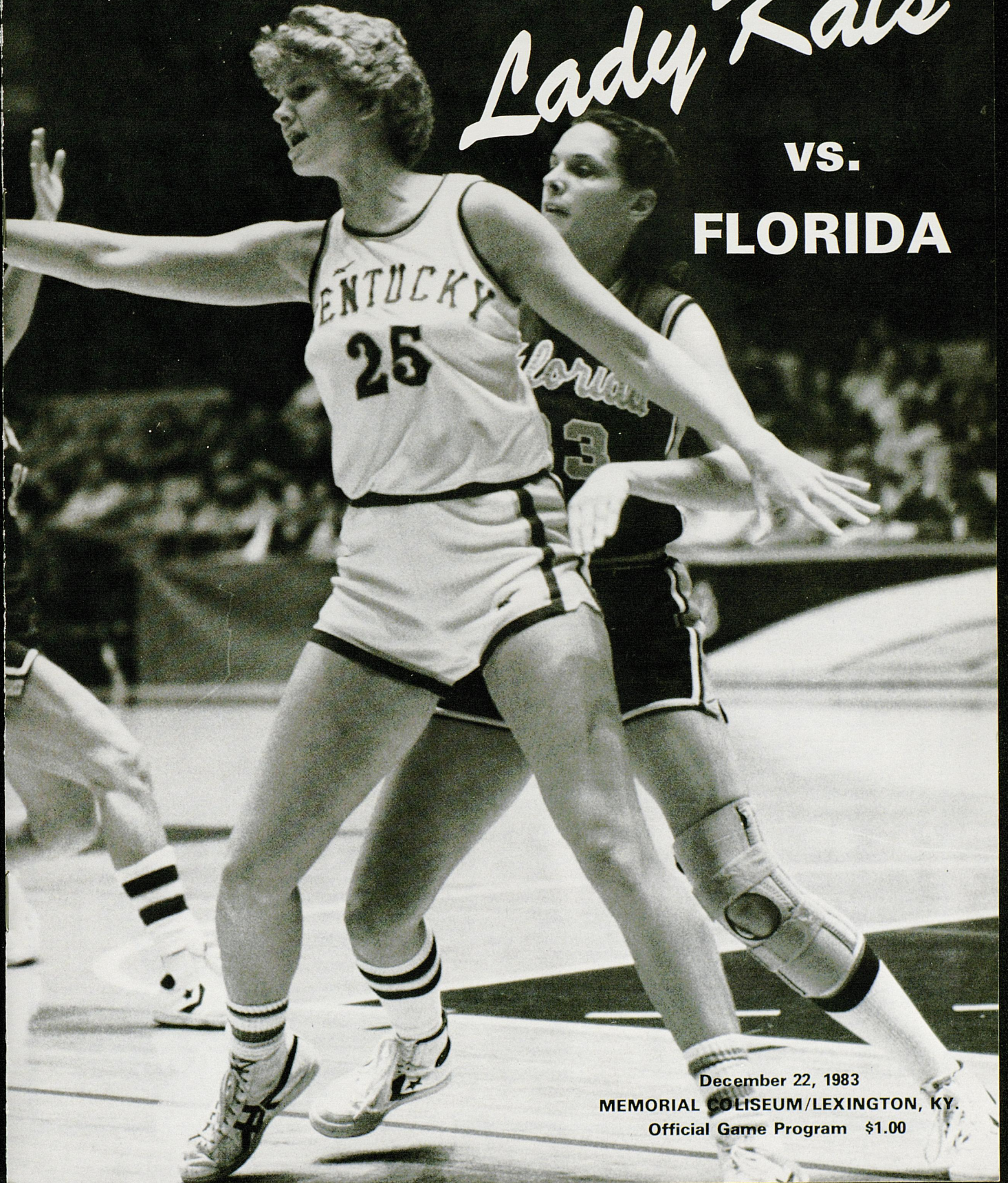

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DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY

President, University of Kentucky

Dr. Otis A. Singletary has maintained an active role both in academics and athletics since he became the University of Kentucky's eighth president in August 1969.

Great strides toward academic excellence have characterized Dr. Singletary's presidency at UK. The Schools of Dentistry and Pharmacy consistently rank among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history, and mathematics have also gained nationwide attention while the UK Library now rates among the best in the Southeast.

Under Singletary's leadership, the University of Kentucky has also become a major research institution. The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center is an established leader in research on cancer and the aging. UK's agricultural college

has provided important research in tobacco and equine diseases while other University research has focused on the field of coal and other energy sources.

Singletary's involvement in athletics is as impressive as his academic achievements. A former president of the Southeastern Conference, Dr. Singletary is a member of the NCAA Select Committee on Athletic Problems and Concerns in Higher Education. He is also chairman of the board of directors of the College Football Association.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 13 years Singletary has been president, the University of Kentucky has grown in enrollment to about 23,000

students on its Lexington campus and more than 22,000 students in the University's 13 community colleges.

Recognition of his service to the University of Kentucky was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award, an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

A native of Gulfport, Miss., Singletary holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University. An accomplished administrator, Dr. Singletary served as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs for the University of Texas system prior to coming to Kentucky.

He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot, and Kendall.

the 1984 NCAA Basketball Championships. In 1985, the prestigious NCAA "Final Four" basketball championships will be hosted by UK and held in Rupp Arena.

Having graduated from the University of Kentucky with high distinction in 1954, Hagan has been a long-time advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program.

Hagan, one of the greatest players in UK basketball history, received one of his highest individual honors in 1978 when he became the first University of Kentucky player to be inducted in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

An Owensboro, Ky. native, Hagan is married to the former Martha Milton,

also of Owensboro. They have four children: Mrs. Barry "Lisa" Thaxton of Lexington; Mrs. Jim "Laurie" Hill of West Liberty; Amy, a senior at the University of Alabama; and Kip, a sophomore member of the Transylvania University basketball and tennis teams.

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Continued growth in practically all phases of UK athletics has been the hallmark of Cliff Hagan's nine-year reign as athletics director with outstanding attendance at football and men's basketball games, increased attendance at Lady Kat basketball games, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

In the coming year, the University will host the 1984 NCAA Volleyball Championships and the Mideast Regional of

When Terry Hall arrived at Kentucky in 1980, the Lady Kats were coming off their most successful season ever and beginning to gain national respect. They had been ranked in the Top 20 throughout the 1979-80 season and had finished the year with a 24-5 record and a berth in the AIAW National playoffs.



But the season was just a hint of the great things to come under Hall's guidance. The Lady Kats have gone far beyond respectability and into the perennial role of national contender. They have been ranked in the Top 20 every week and averaged 24 wins per season since Hall's arrival.

In her first year at UK, Hall's Lady Kats went 25-6, winning the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference and reaching the final round of 16 in the AIAW National tournament. Hall was named the KWIC Coach of the Year that season.

In 1982 and again last season the Lady Kats were considered among the top contenders for the NCAA championship. The 1981-82 squad won the Southeastern Conference championship and reached the quarter-finals of NCAA play before losing to eventual national champion Louisiana Tech on the Lady Techsters' home floor. Last year's Lady Kats were ranked fourth

in the nation but fell to Indiana in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

Hall's record at Kentucky is 72-19, and considering Kentucky's tough scheduling habits (10 games with ranked opponents last season AND this season), a .791 winning percentage is outstanding. Her career record is 165-79. That mark includes one season at Eastern Kentucky, five at Louisville and three at Kentucky.

Hall began her coaching career in the high school ranks. Following her graduation from Indiana State in 1966, she was named head coach at Butler High School in Louisville. In five seasons at Butler, Hall coached her teams to two Jefferson County titles and an overall record of 69-33.

Then it was on to Eastern Kentucky University, where Hall earned her Master's Degree in 1974 and was immediately named head basketball coach. The Lady Colonels went 14-6 that season and won the KWIC title over Kentucky, Louisville, Western, Morehead, Murray and Northern Kentucky.

Hall then accepted the coaching job at Louisville, where she was faced with rebuilding a program. She succeeded, guiding the Lady Cards to a 79-54 record over five years. In 1979-80, her last season at U of L, the Lady Cards won their first Metro Conference championship. Hall also coached tennis and softball at U of L.

A native of Salem, Ind., Hall earned both her undergraduate and graduate degrees in Health and P.E. While attending Indiana State, she starred in basketball, field hockey and volleyball. She was honored with the "I" Woman Award in 1965, and received the prestigious Hillman Award in 1966 as the most outstanding female athlete at ISU.

Coach Hall on Kentucky's Style of Play:

"Our style of play, or trademark, is the fast break. We believe that applying immediate pressure on the defensive team is one of the best ways to win a basketball game. Kentucky is one of few teams in the country totally dedicated to fast break basketball. Defensively, we play whatever defense we feel will exploit our opponents' weaknesses. Our main concerns are controlling the tempo of the game, teamwork, and shot selection by our players."

Coach Hall on Working With the Players:

"I place a high premium on hard work and dedication to the task at hand. I want my players to feel the same way. I try to teach them that "doors of opportunity" open and close very quickly in life as well as on the basketball court. So always be prepared. In the span of a lifetime, their 4 years of college basketball is short, therefore they should work hard, be dedicated, excel, and enjoy the opportunity that exists."



Mike Kindred

**Assistant Coach
Eastern Kentucky University, 1980**

Mike was hired as a part-time assistant at UK in July, and then was elevated to full-time assistant in late September following the resignation of assistant coach Dottie Berry. A 1980 graduate of Eastern Kentucky, Mike served for two seasons as assistant girls' basketball coach at Estill County High School in Irvine, Ky., before coming to UK.

A native of Winchester, Ky., Mike graduated from Clark County High School in 1975. He then attended Morehead State University for one year before transferring to Eastern. He received a degree in Industrial Education, and then taught at Clark County for one year before accepting a job at Estill County.

In his first season at Estill, Mike helped direct the varsity squad to its first-ever winning season in 1982. The following year, the Lady Engineers won their first district championship. Mike's junior varsity squad, meanwhile, was doing even better, finishing with a 15-4 record in 1982 and a 19-4 record in 1983.

Mike is very active in the Big Brothers-Big Sisters program, and currently sits on the organization's Advisory Board in Winchester. He is also an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and was the FCA's 10th Region representative last year while coaching at Estill County.

Joining the coaching staff at UK fulfills a life-time dream for Mike, a 26-year old bachelor who has always been a "Big Blue" fan.

A former player for Coach Terry Hall at Louisville, Robin joined the Lady Kat staff in September. While at Louisville, Robin lettered in basketball four consecutive years, two of those seasons with Coach Hall at the helm. She was a member of the Lady Card teams that won Metro Conference titles in 1979 and 1981 and is in the record book for best free throw percentage in a season, which she set in 1979. Robin was also an outstanding high school player at Louisville Butler High. She helped her team to the Girls' State Tournament in 1976 and 1978. She was All-State honorable mention for three straight years and played in the East-West All-Star game in 1978. She also played tennis for three seasons and ran track one year at Butler.

Robin is pursuing a Masters Degree in Recreational Therapy at UK. She has a great interest in young people and has participated as a volunteer for Special Olympics for five straight years. She also is credited with starting two Youth Basketball Camps in 1981 and 1982 at the St. Matthews YMCA in Louisville.

A former collegiate softball player at U of L, Robin has umpired softball and officiated basketball and volleyball. She is 23 years old and single.

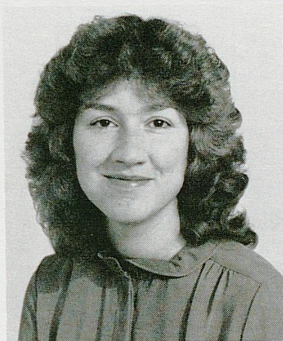

LISA NEAL

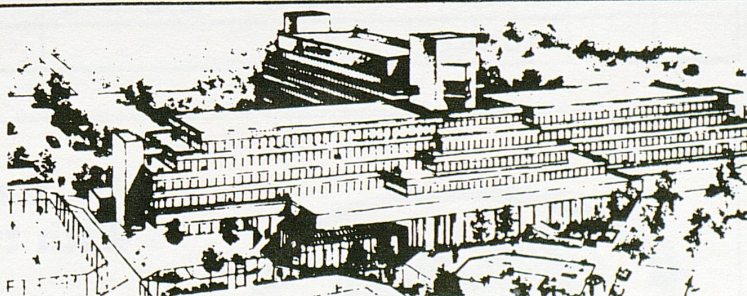
Manager

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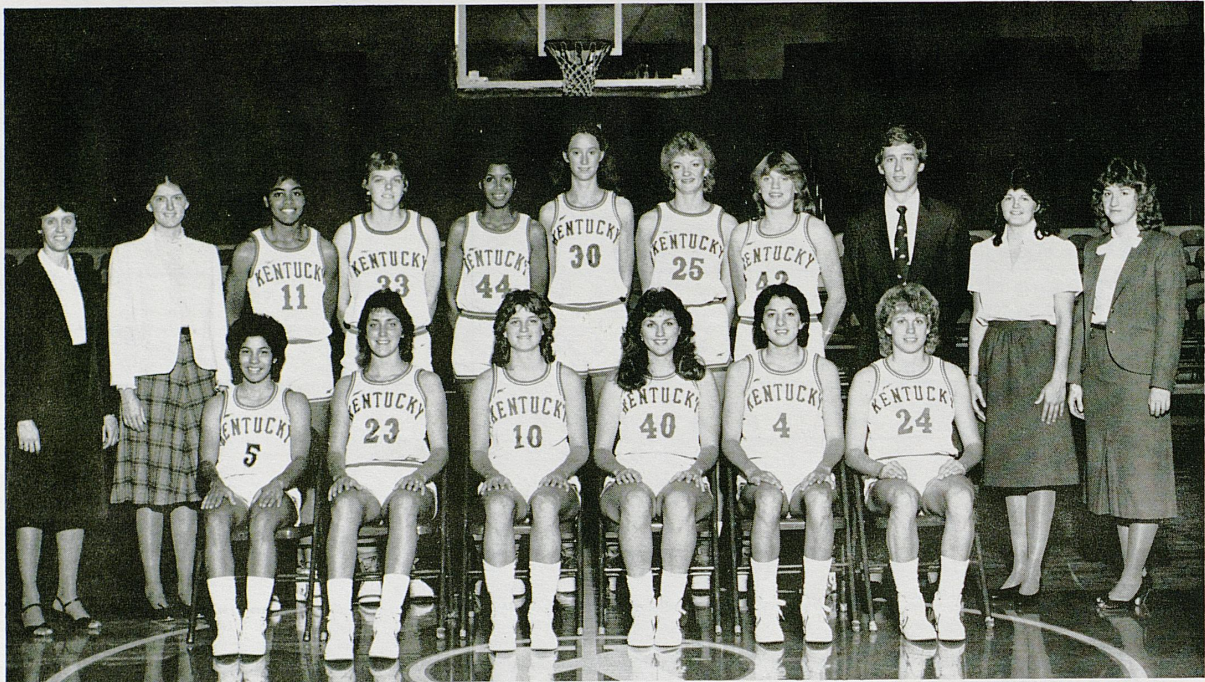

LADY KATS, FLORIDA FIND THINGS HAVE CHANGED

RECORDS: Kentucky 5-1 (Before playing Alabama Tuesday)
Florida 8-0

Series Record: Kentucky leads, 5-0

When Florida came to Lexington a year ago, there was little excitement surrounding the game except for the Sports Illustrated photographers who were here for pictures to accompany the magazine's feature on Valerie Still. As usual, Kentucky was a big favorite, and Florida was expected to be just another victim in the Lady Kats' finest season ever.

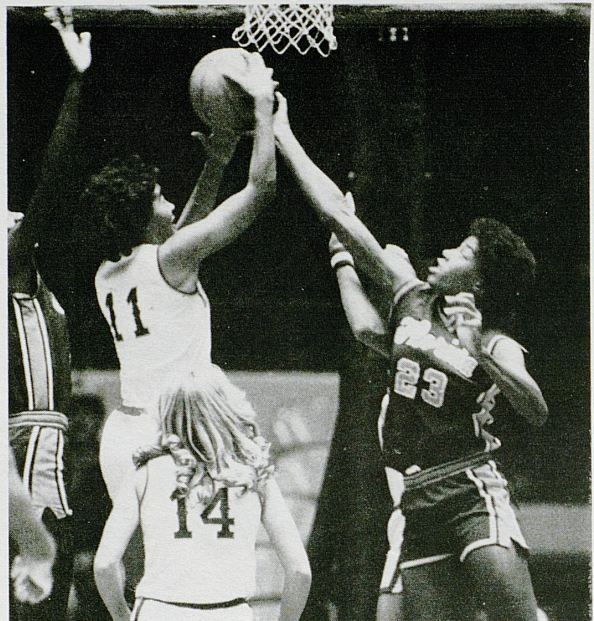
A year has brought many changes. Valerie Still is gone, and the Lady Kats are a different team entirely. While Terry Hall's team is still highly-regarded, it is no longer considered the favorite in most games. And Florida has changed, too. Formerly the team that everyone could expect to defeat (11-16 overall last year), they now are the proud owners of an 8-0 record, and seek national recognition of their own.

Florida's invasion of Memorial Coliseum also means the return of former Lady Kat Coach Debbie Yow, who coached Lady Kat teams to a 79-40 record from 1976 through 1980. After she resigned from Kentucky, Yow left coaching for a year, and then had two fine seasons at Oral Roberts before taking the job at Florida this year.

The game will be the first SEC East Division contest for both squads. Also in the East Division are top 10 teams Georgia and Tennessee, and Vanderbilt.



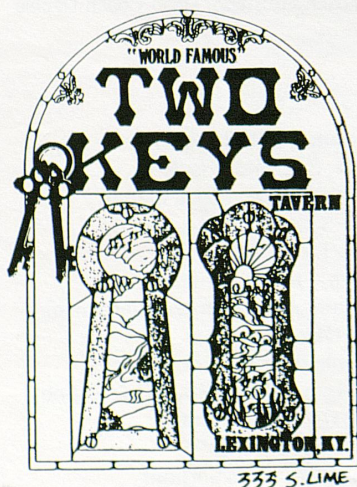

Florida is led in scoring by junior college transfer Margaret Peters, a 6-1 forward who contributes 16.8 points a game on 53.3 percent shooting. Next is Tammy Jackson, a 6-3 junior who averages 15.6 points and a team-leading 10.8 rebounds. Jackson averaged 20.7 points and 12.7 rebounds as a sophomore and is considered one of the best centers in the league.

Kentucky will counter with "super-sophomores" Leslie Nichols and Karen Mosley, who each average 19 points a game. Mosley, a 6-3 forward, is shooting 58.6 percent and leads the team with a 9.7 rebounding average. Nichols, a 6-0 forward, fires in 60 percent of her shots and averages 6.8 rebounds.

COACH HALL, PLAYERS GIVE EACH OTHER CREDIT

The final horn sounded and Terry Hall shot onto the court with her arms raised high. One by one, she hugged her players. Then she walked off the court with senior captain Lisa Collins, their arms draped around each other in mutual joy.

It was 20 days ago, December 2, and the Lady Kats had just surprised No. 16 Ohio State 73-68 on the Lady Buckeyes' home court. Well, it was a surprise to a lot of people, but not to Terry Hall. She had simply smiled when she realized no one was picking her team as a preseason Top 20 selection.

"We don't deserve it right now," she had said. "If we're a Top 20 team, we'll get there soon enough."

The win over Ohio State didn't vault her team into the poll, but two victories later—on Monday of this week to be exact—Coach Hall's squad had reached the Top 20. They had played their way into national recognition.

"That speaks well of the coach," said sophomore forward Leslie Nichols. "People didn't think we had the talent to be in the Top 20 . . . I guess they weren't giving Coach Hall enough credit."

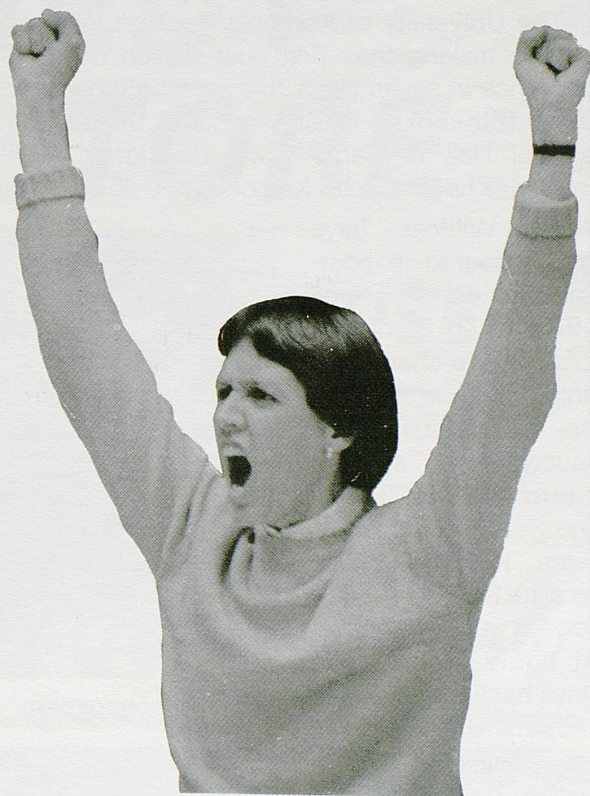
Credit has not come in abundance to Coach Hall, but time and success is changing that. This is her fourth season at Kentucky, and she has compiled a sparkling 77-20 record here. In five years at Louisville, she was 79-54, and she had a 14-6 record in her only season at Eastern Kentucky.

Her first season at UK brought some recognition as she coached the Lady Kats to their best record ever at 23-5. She was named Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference Coach of the Year. The next year, UK moved into the more competitive Southeastern Conference. Although the SEC has yet to pick a Coach of the Year, Coach Hall certainly would have received that honor in 1982 as she guided her team to a 24-8 record that included the Southeastern Conference Championship title.

Last season Kentucky had a 25-6 record that ended the careers of four-year starters Valerie Still, Lea Wise and Patty Jo Hedges. That group played their first season under current Florida coach Debbie Yow. This team is all Hall's, though, and there is a certain closeness among the current squad that other Lady Kat teams have lacked in the past.

So says Collins, who was recruited by Yow, but played only for Hall after Yow resigned in September of Collins' freshman year.

"When I first signed with Kentucky, Coach Hall was nowhere in the plans," says Collins, a third-year starter. "But now that I can look back over my career

here, I feel really glad that I had the good fortune to play for her. I've made a lot of improvements in my game, and I credit her with that."

Collins feels she is speaking for the whole team when she says Hall has commanded the players' respect. "She really knows the game," says the senior guard. "Any player is going to respect their coach when they can put complete faith in her like we do Coach Hall."

Respect and faith work two ways, and Hall reciprocates her players' feelings. When her team was still ignored by the poll after they had defeated Ohio State, Indiana and South Carolina, she felt it was a personal insult to her players.

"People are underestimating our talent," she said with annoyance. "We have got some outstanding players, and we're going to surprise some people."

A good coach, talented players and mutual admiration . . . If the current trend continues, it won't be long before Lady Kat victories fail to surprise anyone.

CATS TAKE ON WVU IN HALL OF FAME

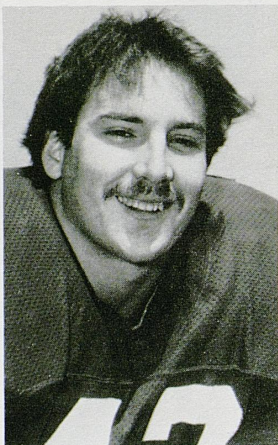

The University of Kentucky football Wildcats will be making their first post-season bowl appearance in seven years this evening when they meet 18th-ranked West Virginia in the seventh annual Hall of Fame Bowl Classic at Birmingham's Legion Field. Kickoff is at 8:05.

The Wildcats have not appeared in post-season action since 1976, when Fran Curci's SEC co-championship team, led by Rodney Stewart's three touchdowns, shutout North Carolina, 21-0 in the Peach Bowl in Atlanta. Kentucky rolled to a 10-1 record the following year, but stayed at home for the holidays because of NCAA probation. The 1977 team finished the season ranked sixth in the nation by the Associated Press. Since that time Kentucky football has fallen on hard times, posting six consecutive losing seasons. Included in that string was the school's first winless season in history in 1982 when the Wildcats, in their first season under Jerry Claiborne, compiled an 0-10-1 record against the sixth-toughest schedule in the country.

In 1983, playing against what the NCAA has determined to be the nation's 12th most difficult schedule, the Wildcats defied the odds and critics, shocking six foes in posting the second biggest turnaround in the history of college football. Only Florida, which won eight games after going 0-10-1 in 1979, has registered a more impressive come-back than Kentucky's 6-4-1 mark.

The Hall of Fame Bowl selection committee had been interested in the Wildcats ever since their season-opening victory over Central Michigan. According to publicist "Scoop" Hudgins, the selection committee was looking for a Cinderella team, much like Vanderbilt, which went 8-3 last season and made its first bowl

appearance since 1975. Hudgins also stated that the committee wanted a Southeastern Conference team. The third factor was the support of the Kentucky fans. The bowl people remember the 37,000 Wildcat fans from around the South who flocked to Atlanta in 1976 to help give the Peach Bowl its first sellout in history.

Kentucky received an allotment of 17,500 tickets, but the demand hasn't been nearly as great as for the Peach Bowl. However, after getting off to a slow start, sales have increased and a "better than average" contingent is expected from both Kentucky and West Virginia. Kentucky linebacker and senior co-captain, Scott Schroeder, attributed the lack of ticket sales to the bad timing of the bowl, which is three days before Christmas.

"The timing is bad," said Schroeder. "I don't feel that the lack of ticket sales shows a lack of support. It's simply a matter that people can't get off work and that's really a shame because there are a lot of disappointed people around the state who want to follow us to Birmingham."

Wildcat coach Jerry Claiborne feels that too much has been made out of the ticket sales by the media and that any lack of ticket sales is not indicative of the fan support of the two schools. "I feel that there has been too much made out of the ticket sales by the media," said Claiborne. "Regardless of what has been said by the media, we (our fans) are looking forward to going to the Hall of Fame Bowl, and West Virginia is looking forward to going as well."

West Virginia, led by quarterback Jeff Hostetler, has been rated an eight point favorite. Claiborne feels that one of the keys to his team upsetting the Mountaineers is to have consistency in its passing game, led by Randy Jenkins who passed for nearly 1300 yards and 10 touchdowns.

"We can't afford to have the dropped passes like we had late in the year," says Claiborne. "Our receivers need to have good concentration, and our team as a whole needs to play mistake-free football. We want to go out there and make something good happen in order to beat a team the caliber of West Virginia."

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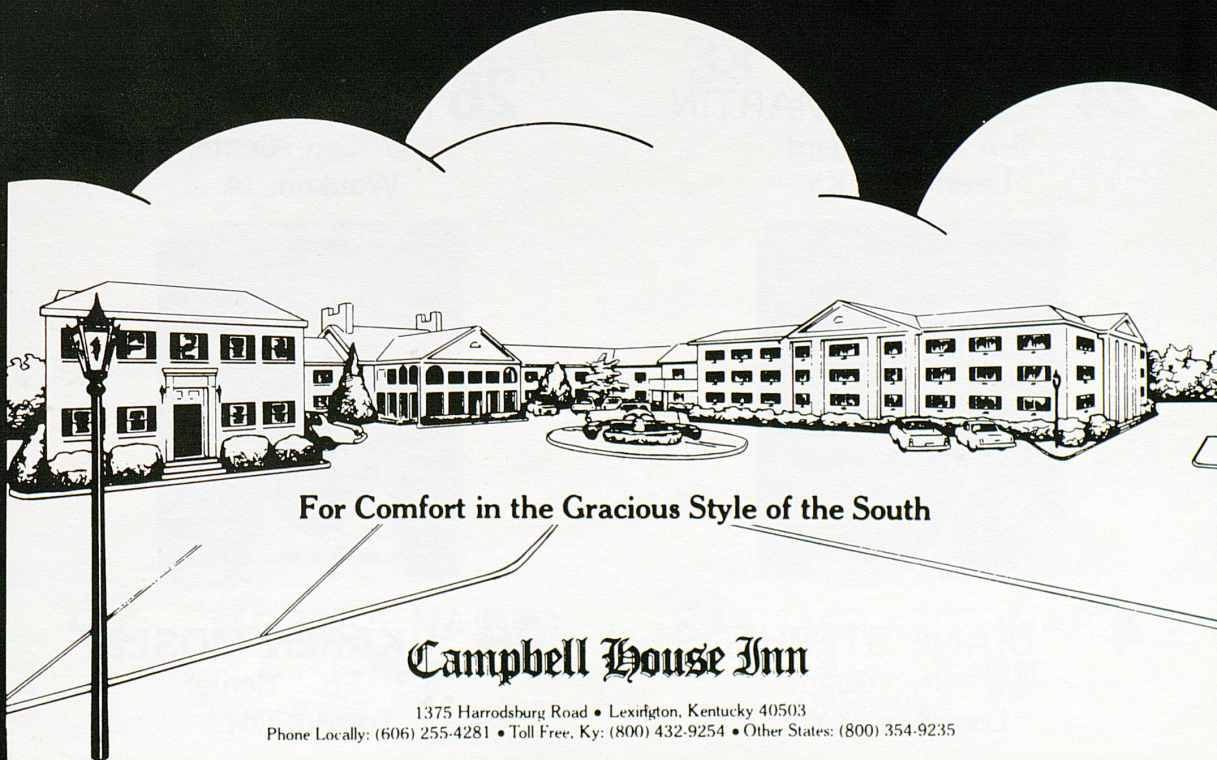
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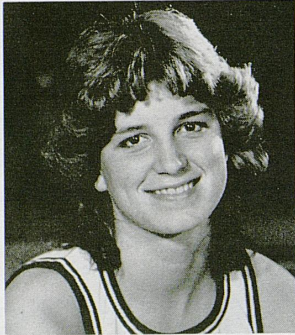

Social, Cultural and Recreational

Opportunities for UK students are not limited to the academic world. Involvement in the social and cultural aspects of University life also is important.

Recognizing this, the University provides the widest range of opportunities for personal and social development. If a student likes music, for instance, the Concert and Lecture Series brings outstanding soloists and symphonies on campus. There are chamber music concerts and hard rock concerts, impromptu bluegrass groups and flute recitals. If one likes to participate, opportunities abound—there are several choral groups, a marching band, the symphony orchestra, the symphonic band—or there is always the guitar with a few friends under the trees. Whichever one chooses, at UK it's available—and there's someone to share it.

There are 22 national fraternities and 16 national sororities on campus. "Rush," or member recruitment, takes place before classes begin, and informally throughout the year.

In addition to supporting the various Wildcat and Lady Kat teams, men and women students take part

as individuals or in groups in competitive sports and in intramural programs. The Seaton Center houses facilities in basketball, volleyball, badminton, squash, wrestling, and table tennis. An Olympic-size swimming pool, tennis courts, and several sports fields are available to students.

A similar variety of opportunities in drama, student government, athletics, service organizations, and recreation, is available.

The city of Lexington also offers UK students much in the way of entertainment. Lexington has a Philharmonic Orchestra, Chamber Music Society, the Lexington Singers, a Council of Arts, and a local Ballet Company. Movie theaters, international restaurants, coffee-houses, top-ranked acts of all types at fabulous Rupp Arena in the Lexington Center, historical landmarks, parks, and shopping centers, thoroughbred and harness

racing, fine fishing in lakes, ponds and streams . . . all in easy distance of the UK campus.

Tailgating at football games, lining up for tickets to see nationally famous Wildcat teams in Rupp Arena or Lady Kat games in Memorial Coliseum, participating in the "Little Kentucky Derby," attending concerts at the downtown arena or in the 11,500-seat Coliseum on the UK campus, visiting the internationally famous Kentucky Horse Park . . . all just a few of the many attractions of Lexington and the University of Kentucky.

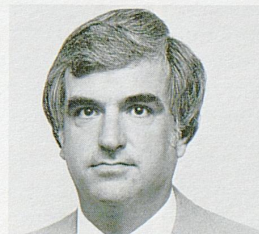

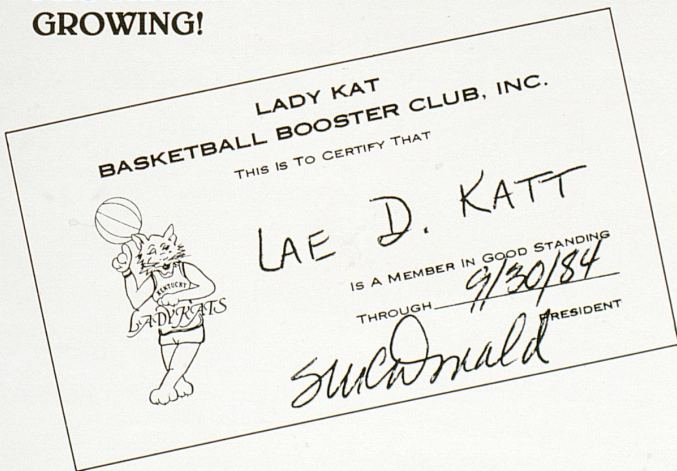
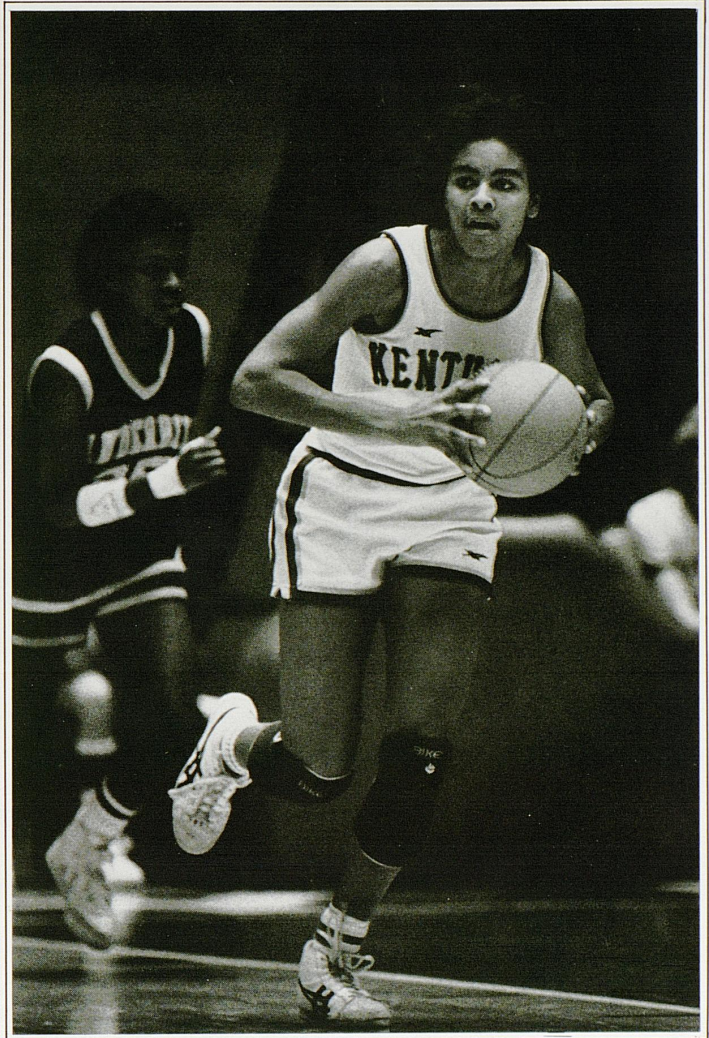
