

FOREWORD

The <u>Inventory of the County Archives of Mississippi</u> is one of a number of guides to historical materials prepared throughout the United States by workers on Historical Records Survey projects of the Work Projects Administration. The publication herewith presented, an inventory of the archives of Humphreys County, is number 27 of the Mississippi series.

The Historical Records Survey program was undertaken in the winter of 1935-36 for the purpose of providing useful employment to needy unemployed historians, lawyers, teachers, and research and clerical workers. In carrying out this objective, the project was organized to compile inventories of historical materials, particularly the unpublished government documents and records which are basic in the administration of local government, and which provide invaluable data for students of political, economic, and social history. Approximately 1,400 publications have been issued by the Survey in the country as a whole at this time. The archival guide herewith presented is intended to meet the requirements of day-to-day administration by the officials of the county, and also the needs of lawyers, businessmen and other citizens who require facts from the public records for the proper conduct of their affairs. The volume is so designed that it can be used by the historian in his research in unprinted sources in the same way he uses the library card catalog for printed sources.

The inventories produced by Historical Records Survey projects attempt to do more than give merely a list of records - they attempt further to sketch in the historical background of the county or other unit of government, and to describe precisely and in detail the organization and functions of the government agencies whose records they list. The county, town, and other local inventories for the entire country will, when completed, constitute an encyclopedia of local government as well as a bibliography of local archives.

The successful conclusion of the work of Historical Records Survey projects, even in a single county, would not be possible without the support of public officials, historical and logal specialists, and many other groups in the community. Their cooperation is gratefully acknowledged.

The Survey program was organized by Luther H. Evans, who served as Director until March 1, 1940, when he was succeeded by Sargent B. Child. The Survey operates as a Nation-wide series of locally sponsored projects in the Division of Community Service Programs, of which Mrs. Florence Kerr, Assistant Commissioner, is in charge.

HOWARD O. HUNTER Commissioner of Work Projects Work on the Historical Records Survey began in Mississippi in February 1936 as a part of the program of the Federal Writers' Project and under the supervision of William B. Haynie. In November 1936 the Mississippi Survey became a separate unit of Federal Project No. 1 with Mr. Haynie as State Director. In July 1937 Charles C. Fisher, editor-in-chief, was made State Director and in July 1938, Dr. Percy L. Rainwater, for 11 years in the department of history at the University of Mississippi, was appointed head of the Survey. In August 1939 Dr. Rainwater resigned and Miss Moina Evans was named State Supervisor. Miss Evans resigned July 8, 1940 and Robert E. Strong, Assistant State Supervisor, was designated as her successor.

By an act of Congress, Federal Project No. 1 was abolished on August 31, 1939 and the Historical Records Survey was made a Statewide project to be maintained under the official sponsorship of the Mississippi Department of Archives and History, of which Dr. William D. McCain is Director, and under the cooperative sponsorship of local governmental agencies.

On February 15, 1941, in order to utilize the administrative and technical facilities of the Survey, a Statewide Records Project was established, with the Survey becoming a part of this project. The project is a unit of the Division of Community Service Programs of the Work Projects Administration, of which Miss Ethel Payne is Director. It is in the Research and Records Programs section of this division under the supervision of Felix J. Underwood Jr.

The Survey plans to publish the Inventory of the County Archives of Mississippi in 82 units, one for each county in the State. Each unit will be numbered separately from 1 to 82, its number depending on the relative position of the county in an alphabetical list of all counties. Thus, the inventory of the records of Humphreys County, herewith presented, is number 27. The inventories of State archives and of municipal, church and other local records will be published separately.

The inventory of the records of Humphreys County is the sixth county inventory prepared for publication. It is arranged so that the records of the administrative functions of county government come first, followed by those of the recording, judicial, law enforcement, fiscal, election; education, health, and miscellaneous agencies. Included also is a short essay on each agency of county government including organization of the agency in Humphreys County, its present status, the method of filling the office, and the term of office. Since these essays are limited it is suggested that the reader consult the Inventory of the County Archives of Mississippi, No. 18, Forrest County and No. 37, Iamar County, for more detailed essays than those found in the Humphreys County inventory.

Records are described in entries whose style is formalized to give information concerning the title of records, dates for which available, quantity, labeling of volumes or containers, variant titles, description of record contents, manner of arrangement, indexing, nature of recording, size of volumes or containers, and location.

The survey of the records of Humphreys County was started in March 1938 and was completed in November 1938. The field inventory was rechecked between February 10 and March 1, 1939. The preliminary draft received a final recheck in July 1940.

The State office has profited in all phases of its work by the constructive advice and criticism of the national office and its representatives.

John C. L. Andreassen, Regional Supervisor, has rendered invaluable assistance during his visits to the office. This inventory in manuscript form was edited by Mabel S. Brodie, assistant archivist in charge of public records inventories, of the Washington, D. C., office.

This unit of the Inventory of the County Archives of Mississippi is being issued in mimeographed form by the Survey for free distribution to State and local public officials and libraries in Mississippi and to a limited number of libraries and governmental agencies outside the State. The inventory was prepared in the State office of the Survey by an editorial staff composed of Elmise Fant, Bessic Kate Bradford, Zelma Ruth Jolley, Fred Beacham, and William M. Price under the supervision of Nash K. Burger, Project Technician, and Andrew Brown, Assistant Project Technician.

2. HISTORICAL SKETCH

Humphreys County, the last created county in Mississippi, is situated in the southeastern portion of the Mississippi-Yazoo Flood Plain, colloquially known as the Delta, which covers a large eliptical area in the northwestern part of the State. The county consists of 408 square miles or 261,120 acresl of extremely fertile Delta soil, is irregular in shape, and is bounded on the north by Sunflower and Leflore Counties; on the east by Holmes and Yazoo Counties; on the south by Yazoo County, and on the west by Sharkey and Washington Counties.

In detail the boundaries of Humphreys County, which have not been changed since its establishment are: "Beginning at the intersection of the center line of Sunflower river with the boundary line between Washington and Sunflower Counties; thence in a southerly direction with the meanders of Sunflower river and along its center line to its intersection with the north boundary line of Sharkey County; thence east along said county line to the northeast corner of township fourteen (14) north, range five (5) west; thence south along the east boundary lines of township fourteen (14) north, range five (5) west and township thirteen (13) north, range five (5) west, to the southwest corner of township thirteen (13) north, range four (4) west; thence east along the south boundary line of township thirteen (13) north, range four (4) west and township thirteen (13) north, range three (3) west to the south east corner of township thirteen (13) north, range three (3) west; thence north along the east line of said township thirteen (13) north, range three (3) west to the north east corner of the same; thence east along the south line of township fourteen (14) north, range two (2) west to the southwest corner of section thirty-six (36), township fourteen (14) north, range two (2) west; thence north along the line between sections thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36), township fourteen (14) north, range two (2) west to the center line of the Yazoo river; thence in a northwosterly direction with the meanders of the Yazoo river and along its center line to its intersection with the center line of Tchula lake; thence with the meanders of Tchula lake and along its center line to its intersection with the line between sections nineteen (19) and twenty (20), and township fifteen (15) north, range one (1) west; thence north along the section lines to the center line of the Yazoo river; thence is a southwesterly direction with the meanders of the Yazoo river and along its conter line to the Chectaw boundary line; thence in a northwesterly direction along the Choctaw boundary line to its intersection with the east line of township sixteen (16) north, range three (3) west; thence north along said township line and along the east line of township seventeen (17) north, range three (3) west, to the north east corner of section thirteen (13), township seventeen (17) north range three (3) west; thence west along the section lines to the north west corner of section eighteen (18), township seventeen (17) north, range three (3) west; thence south along the west boundary line of town-ship (17) north, range three (3) west to the boundary line between Sunflower and Washington Counties; thence west along said boundary line to the point of beginning. Said description above embraces portions of Washington, Yazoo, Holmes, Sharkoy and Sunflower Counties."2

Two navigable streams, the Sunflower and Yazoo Rivers, and Tehula Lake, form several miles of the boundaries and there are numerous smaller streams and lakes within the county. The land included in this county, for the most part, was at first a low, flat, marshy, swamp covered with a dense growth of hardwood forests. It has been cleared, drained and generally made suitable for excellent farming. The climate is mild in winter, but the summers are het and sultry. The rainfall is usually heavy in the winter and early spring months. Until the completion of a levee system, devastating overflows were not uncommon.4 The soils of Humphreys County are the rich alluvial deposits of the Mississippi River and its tributaries. A light loam is found near the streams, and heavy bluish clay soil predominates between the waterways. 5 This region was pro-eminently one of hardwood growth, originally covored with oak, gum, hickory, cottonwood, cypress, and ash.

The region from which Humphreys County evolved was owned originally by the Chectaw Indians who used it chiefly as a hunting ground. Several mounds, one in Belzoni, the county seat, remain as evidence of the occupancy of the Indians. This region from 1541 to 1802 was involved in the conflicting claims of Spain, France, England, and the State of Georgia, but no settlements were established and no governmental organizations were effected by reason of these claims.7

In 1802 this portion of present-day Mississippi was coded to the United States by Georgia and added to the Mississippi Territory8 and in 1817 it became a part of the newly-created State of Mississippi.9

The Indian title to this region was extinguished by the Treaty of Doak's Stand concluded on October 18, 1820, the Choctaw coding 5,447,267 acres of land to the United States: 10 This entire tract was included in the formation of Hinds County in 1821, 11 which has since been subdivided into 11 counties, the last of which was Humphreys County in 1918, created from the converging corners of Holmes, Sharkey, Sunflower, and Washington Counties. 12

Agitation for the establishment of a new county in this vicinity began as early as 1870, when James R. Powell voiced the idea of creating a county

where Holmes, Sunflower, Washington, and Yazoo Counties cornered. Although he worked toward this goal for 12 years, he was unsuccessful.13 Upon his death Col. R. V. Powers took up the fight, suggesting the name of Alluvia for the new county and proposing Palmetto Home (now Silver City) for the seat of justice. In 1908, the establishment of a new county was still being advocated, and the proposed name was Dolta with Belzoni as the county seat. 14

After the act authorizing the new county was finally passed by the Legislature and approved March 28, 1918, an election required by the Constitution15 was held in May to determine whether or not the people really wanted the new county. On April 17, 1918, Governor Bilbo appointed, as required by the authorization act, 15 commissioners, 3 from each of the counties relinquishing territory for the new county, who would also be residents of the new county, to hold the election. 16 Commissioners selected were: Sunflower, W. D. Richards, Abe Huffstickler, and W. C. Galaspy; Washington, T. E. Mortimer, F. M. Popper, and Louis Hullum; Holmes, J. C. Hargravos, C. M. McMaster, and T. C. Jones; Yazoo, W. H. Carroll, A. R. Hutchens, and L. M. Smith; Sharkoy, W. H. Ellis, Sr., W. H. Ellis, Jr. and W. F. Sandling. 17

The Yazoo City Horald reported the results of the election as follows: "The vote in the territory effected in Yazoo and 50 for and 26 against it. In Washington County only one vote was east against the forming of the new county; Sunflower, 12 to 9, Holmes 40 to 0, and Sharkey 6 to 3."18 This overwhelming majority, however, did not insure the establishment of the county. In an attempt to prevent the taking of territory from the established counties, Yazoo filed suit against the newly created county in circuit court in July, 1918 but the suit was transferred to the chancery court. 19 From an adverse ruling Yazoo County appealed to the State Supreme Court, 20 which upheld the decision of the lower court in 1919, in the following decision: "The creation of new counties is a matter within the powers of the legislature, subject only to the restrictions imposed by the Constitution. Within these limitations the Legislature may make whatever regulation it will as to the division of property and the payment of existing debts, and the terms prescribed by it must prevail. Courts cannot supplement Legislation by assuming to adjust equities which have been ignored by the Legislature."21

Humphreys County was attached to the first Supreme Court district, the ninth chancery court district, the fourth circuit court district, the twentyminth senatorial district, the third Congressional district, the first district

for election commissioners, and the first district for the election of penitentiary trustec. 22 The boundaries of the Yazoo-Mississippi Delta Leveć district were not to be affected by the creation of the new county, however, that part of Humphreys embraced in the levee district was entitled to one representative on the board of directors. 23

The first meeting of the board of supervisors was held June 3, 1918, at the City Hall24 in Bolzoni, which had been named the temporary county seat in the creating act. 25 First officers of Humphreys County, appointed by the Governor, wore: O. J. Turner, sheriff; W. P. Shackleford, circuit clerk; A. R. Hutchins, chancery clerk; T. D. Rice, superintendent of education; N. W. Sumrall, county attorney; William H. Day, tax assessor; R. N. Sandling, treasurer; M. H. Brower, surveyor; Watt H. Turner, coroner and ranger; W. A. Carpenter, county demonstrator; and Dr. J. S. Slaughter, health officer. 26 Election commissioners appointed August 1, 1918, included: W. D. Knotts, L. W. Smith, and B. C. Moroland. 27 Members of the first beard of supervisors were: Dr. J. S. Jackson, president, J. G. Hargrave, B. A. Holliday, E. E. Barr, and William D. Richardson. 28 The first probation officer, R. H. Nason, was appointed October 6, 1924.29 The hoalth department was established as a full time organization on August 1.

At the first meeting of the board of supervisors an election to determine the location for the permanent scat of justice was ordered. On June 27, 1918, Belzoni was selected over Silver City by a vote of 204 to 68.31 The City Hall and the second story of the postoffice housed the county offices until 1921, when the present courthouse was completed. 32

A Legislative act, approved March 25, 1920, gave Humphreys County permission to issue bonds "For the purpose of building a courthouse and jail, and for building bridges and constructing public roads".33

The creating act of 1918 stated that the public schools were not to be affected but were to remain as located. Public school funds were to be properly prorated and distributed. 34 In 1918, there were 14 white schools and 37 negro schools in the county, employing 30 white teachers and 41 negro teachers.

Five of the white schools were in consolidated districts. 35 At the present time Humphreys has reduced the number of white to 7, and increased the negro schools to 57, employing 60 white teachers and 100 negro teachers respectively. Thirtyone school buses are used to transport the 2,568 white and 5,946 negro educable children in Humphreys County to the schools. 36 Of this number, however, there were in the 1936-37 session only 1,970 white and 4,807 negro children actually in attendance. 37 Three of the 7 white schools, Belzoni, Isola, and Silver City, are on the State affiliated list, and one, Louise, is on the probationary list. 38 A negro vocational school is located at Louise.

Church services in Humphreys County date from the earliest years of settlement. Although occasional Methodist services were held in the county from these times, the eldest organized church is the Methodist Church of Belzoni, organized in 1882, holding their first services in a small frame building situated on the present site of the Belzoni postoffice. 39 The present brick church was begun in 1926, replacing an earlier frame structure built in 1895.40 Other Methodist Churches in the county are at Isola, Silver City, Lamkin, and Louise. The line of demarcation of the Mississippi and North Mississippi Methodist Conferences runs through the county from east to west. Silver City and the territory to the south are in the Mississippi Conference, while those churches north of Silver City, including Bolzoni, fall within the jurisdiction of the North Mississippi Conference. Early Baptist services in Bolzoni were in the home of J. S. Bowles and later in a union church. 41 Regular services date from 1885, when the Rev. William T. McMurtrey officiated once each month. Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Bowles, in 1897, donated land and money which made possible the first Baptist building.42 The present classic, brick structure was first used in 1923.45 There are also Baptist churches today at Gooden, Isola, Lake, Louise, Silver City, Straight Bayou. One of the oldest churches in the county is the Negro Belzoni Green Grove Baptist Church, dating from 1869.44 White Missionary Baptist Churches in Humphreys County belong to the Deer Creek Association, set-up in 1887, from the Sunflower Association, which had been organized in 1870.45

The present organization of the Belzoni Presbyterian Church dates from 1910, 46 although services had been conducted in the county for a number of years. 47 The present brick-venoered building was crected during the tenure of the Rev. E. Z. Brown, 1918-20.48 A Presbyterian church was organized at Isola in 1926 and a building erected in 1928.49 These Humphreys County Presbyterian Churches are in the Presbytery of Central Mississippi. Occasional Episcopal services have been held in Belzoni since at least 1912. The Rev. William DuBose Bratton completed organization of the St. Thomas' Church. In 1932 a church building was consecrated on Jackson Street. The church is served today by the Rev. Edward R. Jones, of Trinity Church, Yazoo City. (See also Historical Records Survey Project, Inventory of the Church Archives of Mississippi: Protestant Episcopal Church (entry 114). The only Roman Catholic Church in the county, All Saints' Church, Belzoni, is a mission of the Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, Groonwood, and is served by the Rev. John Clerico. Fr. Clerico has been at work in this section of the Delta since 1907 and under his leadership, a building was erected in 1917. Services are held monthly and on certain holy days.53

Humphreys County has never issued bonds for the support of the Agricultural High School and Junior College at Moorhead, 54 although it is included in the Sunflower zone of public junior colleges. 55 On October 5, 1936, a tax levy of 1/5 of a mill, or an annual donation of about \$1,100 was given the college.56

The first railroad built into the vicinity of Humphreys County was a logging road 4 miles long, constructed by the pond-McGonegal lumber interests in 1892.57 From this beginning the Yazoo Delta Railway received its start and was incorporated April 27, 1895, with a capital stock of \$375,000.58 This road was also the beginning of the Sunflower district of the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley Railroad extending from Tutwiler to the Yazoo junction, 59 Train

service was inaugurated March 27, 1899, between Moorhead and Tutwiler. 60 In 1900. the Belzoni extension was completed and a depot built at Belzoni. The Yazoo City-Belzoni link was completed in 1904, 4 years after the road was sold to the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley Railroad Company. 61

During this same year the Vicksburg Board of Trade succeeded in interesting Stuyvesant Fish, president of the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley Road, in the construction of a road through the unsettled section northeast of Vicksburg for the purpose of opening up this fortile company and of affording a more direct route from Vicksburg to central and northeast Mississippi.62 The road was built from Kelso on the main line of the Louisville, New Orleans, and Texas Railroad, to Silver City, on the Yazoo and Mississippi Valley road. Construction was begun in 1905, and the road was completed in April 1908.63

Two other railroads stimulated the development of Humphreys County. The Dolta Southern, incorporated August 26, 1904, with a capital stock of \$50,000 touched the southern part of the county, 64 and the Itta Bena and Belzoni Railroad, incorporated April 21, 1922, with a capital stock of \$60,000, passed through the northeastern portion of the county. 65 These roads, however, are no longer operated.

Construction of public roads and highways in the county has made rapid headway in the last few years. 66 Humphreys County now has approximately 54 miles of roads in the State highway system. 67 U.S. Highway 49 runs through the county from north to south; state highway 12 passes through the center of the county from cast to west; and state highway 14 joins U. S. Highway 49 at Louise in the southern end of the county. The supervisors maintain a network of local roads which criss-cross the county, of which 75 miles are gravel or improved dirt roads.68

Although it is one of the 10 smallest counties in the State, Humphreys was in a rather thickly settled section when it was organized. Two years after the county was established the population was 19,192.69 Ten years later, 1930, it had increased 28.9 per cent70 or to 24,729 persons, of whom 7,436 were native born whites. 71 Of this number, 68.9 percent were negroes, 72 and per square mile

the density of population is 60.6,73 which is well above the State average of 43.4.74 Humphreys County has four incorporated towns, with populations in 1930 as follows: Belzoni, 2,735; Isola, 519; Louise, 514; and Silver City, 361.75

Cotton, the predominating crop, is produced, contrary to the general idea, on small farms. The average size of farms was but 23.3 acres in 1930.76 That same year Humphreys County had 132,828 acres 77 under the management of 5,689 familios.78 Of this farm land, 92,708 acres were planted in cotton and produced 51,140 balos.79 The amount of foodstuff produced in the county was very small showing only 276,113 bushels of corn, 591 tons of hay; 14,558 bushels of sweet-potatoes, 1,874 bushels of Irish potatoes, and a few other similar crops.80 In 1930, the land was valued at \$9,105,386;81 the buildings thereon at \$2,174,744.82 Farm figures released for 1936 revealed fewer farms than in 1930, showing in 1936 only 4,638.83 The cotton crop for that year was valued at \$5,015,410, while all other crops including livestock reached only \$1,210,373.84 The gross income of \$1,344.50 per farm for 1936 was higher than the State average of \$963.99;85 thus Humphreys County was among the 10 counties having the highest farm income and being outranked only by Washington and Sharkey Counties.86 Sales of manufactured products for the year amounted to but \$494,305.87

The total assessment for 1938, in Humphreys County, amounted to \$6,424,401, of which \$5,502,166 was realty, \$655,259 was personal, and \$266,976 was utility.88 Homestead exemptions amounted to \$1,152,033 on 442 rural homes totaling \$810,063, and on 346 urban homes totaling \$341,970.89





GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATION AND RECORDS SYSTEM

Legal Status of the County

The county in Mississippi, as in other commonwealths, is a territorial area established by the State government for convenience of administration. 1 The State Supreme Court has ruled that a "county is a governmental agency, created for local purposes" by the State. 2 According to the court, "The counties of this State are in certain respects municipal corporations, charged with the duty of making provisions for the building of bridges and the making of roads, and this duty is committed to the boards of supervisors of the respective counties, and their duties in this respect are defined by statute." The county is mentioned many times in the Constitution of 1890 and its existence is clearly taken for granted, yet counties are not created by the constitution nor given any powers by it. This fact has led the Supreme Court to say that the "powers of . . . the county are statutory But the county is not a municipal corporation in all respects; it is really a quasi-municipal corporation for in regard to its liability to be sued it partakes of the immunity of the State itself. A county, with us, has certain prerogatives and judicial powers, and with respect to the exercise of such powers it may not ordinarily be sued. But a county is also, for many purposes, a corporation Our laws provide that a county may hold property, may sue and be sued, etc.; and in these respects it is a corporation, or at least is clothed with corporate functions in relation to such subjects."3

The county may sue and be sued, 4 but the Supreme Court has ruled that a county is immune from liability to the same extent that the State is, and unless statute authorizes a suit the county cannot be held liable. 5 The Legislature has authorized suits against the county by providing that when a person having a just claim against the county has presented it to the board of supervisors and the board has refused to allow it, the claimant may appeal from the judgment of the board to the circuit court, or may bring suit against the county.6

With respect to the creation of counties, the Constitution of 1890 provides that "No county shall be formed unless a majority of the qualified electors voting in each part of the county or counties proposed to be dismembered and embraced in the new county, shall separately vote therefor The

elections shall not be held in any county oftener than once in four years. No new county shall contain less than four hundred square miles; nor shall any existing county be reduced below that size. "7 The Constitution also permits the Legislature to provide for the consolidation of existing counties if a majority of the qualified electors of the counties to be consolidated vote in favor of the consolidation. 8 Apparently the Legislature cannot abolish a county without the consent of a majority of the qualified electors in the area concerned, but it may, however, change the boundaries of any county without the consent of the local electorate.9

Registration of Title to Property

Every conveyance of real or personal property, to be valid and to serve as constructive notice to all subsequent purchasers, must be lodged for recording with the clerk of the chancery court as recorder and must be acknowledged as his voluntary act by the person who executed it, or proved by one or more of the subscribing witnesses to the instrument. The acknowledgment or proof must be in writing on the instrument and must be signed by the officer before whom it was made. 10 The sheriff's certified lists of lands sold to individuals or struck off to the State for taxes must be recorded by the clerk of the chancery court as recorder, 11 as must lis pendens notices of suits begun to enforce a lien, right, interest in, or easement in any real estate when the claim is not based on any judgment or decree previously entered or recorded. 12

To insure adequate descriptions of boundaries, the board of supervisors must furnish the office of the clerk of the chancery court as recorder with a copy of the field notes of the original United States Survey, transcriptions of the records of other counties which affect titles to land in Humphreys County, transcriptions of original entries of land, and all necessary township plats and surveys. 13 Since 1920 it has been the duty of the board to furnish the office of the clerk of the chancery court as recorder with a sectional index to all land conveyances and other instruments touching or concerning title to land in the county. 14 However, the board may provide a complete abstract of title to land in the county. 15 In Humphreys County this has been done. 16

Judiciary

Civil and common law jurisdiction is vested in the circuit court and in the justice of peace courts. The circuit court has civil jurisdiction in all actions in which the amount in controversy exceeds \$200 and in all other causes not exclusively cognizable in some other court. 17 It also has jurisdiction in cases transferred to it by the chancery court and remanded to it by the Supreme Court, and appealed to it from justice of peace courts. 18 Justice of the peace courts are given civil jurisdiction in all actions in which the amount in controversy is \$200 or less, 19 in matters of unlawful entry and detainer, 20 and in the partition of personal property when the appraised value of the property involved does not exceed \$200.21 A justice of the peace is chosen by the clerk of the circuit court to conduct hearings in eminent domain proceedings. 22

The circuit court has power to hear and determine all prosecutions in the name of the State for treason, felonies, crimes and misdemeaners, except such as may be exclusively cognizable before some other court; and it has all the powers of a court of over and terminer and general jail delivery. 23 Justice of the peace courts have jurisdiction concurrent with the circuit court over all crimes occurring in their districts in which the punishment prescribed does not exceed a fine and imprisonment in the county jail. 24 In addition, justices of peace have power to conduct preliminary hearings in cases of felonics committed within their respective districts, to bind the accused over to await the action of the grand jury, and to fix the amount of the appearance bond. 25

The chancery court has both chancery and probate jurisdiction and it is given power to try and determine all matters of equity, divorce and alimony, matters testamentary and of administration, minors' business, and cases of idicey, lunacy, and persons of unsound mind. 26 It has jurisdiction in all causes transferred to it by the circuit court and remanded to it by the Supreme Court. 27

The circuit court and the chancery court have concurrent jurisdiction in cases of juvenile delinquency, 28 and in Humphreys County this function is exercised by the chancery court.

Appeals from the judgments and decrées rendered in justice of the peace courts may be taken to the circuit court, 29 and appeals from the judgments and decrees of the circuit and chancery courts may be made to the Supreme Court. 30

Law Enforcement

The sheriff is the principal officer charged with the preservation of the peaco. 31 However, constables have the same duty, 32 and if there is a vacancy in the office of sheriff, for any reason, and there is no deputy to act, the coroner performs all the duties of the sheriff except that of collecting taxes. 33 In the event the office of sheriff is vacant for any reason, and there is no deputy to act, and there is no coroner, the circuit judge or the chancellor may appoint some qualified elector of the county to perform the duty of coroner in this regard. 34. All members of the board of supervisors, 35 the circuit judge, the chancellor, and all justices of the peace of the county are conservators of the peace.36

The coreñer is required to hold inquests of all violent and sudden deaths in the county, 37 but if there is no corener or the corener is unable to act, any justice of the peace may hold an inquest and perform all the duties of the coronor.38

The power and duty of returning indictments and presentments is given to the grand jury. 39

Arrests for crimes and offenses may be made by the sheriff, his deputies, or by any constable or conservator of the peace within his county. Private persons may also make arrests. All persons, when commanded to do so by an officer socking to arrest an offender, must aid and assist in making the arrest and must obey the commands of the arrosting officer. Arrosts for criminal offenses and to prevent a breach of the peace may be made at any time and at any place. An officer or private person may make arrests without warrant for an indictable offense committed, a breach of the peace threatened or attempted in his presence, and for a felony committed. An arresting officer or private person may, after giving notice of his object, and admittance is refused, break into any dwelling or house in which he has reason to believe the offender may be found. Escaped offenders may be retaken by the person from whose custody they escaped, at any time and in any county without warrant. All offenders apprehended must be taken before the proper officer without unnecessary delay by the person making

the arrest. All officers and others who make arrests legally as authorized and required by law are not liable to a civil or criminal action although it may appear that the person arrested was immocent of any offense. Warrants issued by justices of the peace extend to other counties, and justices of the peace may issue warrants for the arrest and return of any escaped offender to the county in which his offense is cognizable. The sheriff and constables may pursue offendors into other counties and in returning prisoners may place them in any jail for safekeeping.40

The sheriff is the county jailor and has custody of all prisoners.41 He is required to receive and keep any prisoner committed by any justice of the peace, 42 and he must receive and keep prisoners committed under legal process from officers of the courts of the United States, if the subsistence of such prisoners is secured by the officers delivering the prisoners to him. 43 The sheriff must see that prisoners have medical attention and he must protect them from mob violence.44

The district attorney must appear in circuit court, and in the name of the State prosecute all criminal prosecutions, and all persons or corporations for any violation of the Constitution or State laws; and he must attend grand jury deliberations when required to do so by the jury to give necessary information as to the law.45 The county prosecuting attorney represents the State in the justice of the peace courts, assists the district attorney in all criminal cases, and represents the State before the grand jury. 46

The sheriff as the executive officer of the court is required to execute all sentences imposed by the court.47

Finance

It was not until 1926, according to the records of the clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor, 48 that the first real offert at budgetary control was made in Humphreys County. The law of 1922 made it mandatory on the board of supervisors at its September meeting to prepare and adopt a budget of county expenses estimated for the next year, and to prepare a statement showing the aggregate revenue by sources collected during the current year. 49 In 1924 the State Auditor of Public Accounts was directed to prescribe a uniform system of accounts for State and county offices and he was required to inspect their accounts regularly. Further, the law made it mandatory that all counties adopt the prescribed system of accounting. 50 Accordingly, in 1928, a uniform system

of accounting for counties, including a detailed outline for the county budget, was prescribed by the State Auditor of Public Accounts. 51 The expenditures of all county offices and departments are subject to budgetary control, 52 Since 1936 the superintendent of education has been required to prepare and file with the State Superintendent of Education a budget of the expenditures for the support, maintenance, and operation of the public schools of the county for each fiscal year, and a statement of all available revenues. Likewise, the trustees of the consolidated school districts, special consolidated school districts, and all other school districts maintaining a special tax levy must prepare and file with the county superintendend of education a budget of estimated expenditures and a statement of estimated revenues for each fiscal year. The superintendent must attach copies of these budgets to the county school budget which he submits to the State Superintendent of Public Education, 53

The revenue of the county is derived mainly from ad valorem taxes levied on all real and personal property and from license taxes. All classes of property are liable to taxation unless specifically exempt. The following classes are exempt: Public property, privately owned property devoted to educational purposes, privately owned property devoted to religious and charitable purposes, household equipment and personal effects, agricultural property, intangible personal property; lands and other property situated between the Mississippi River and the levees, and land classified for referestation.54

The board of supervisors may exempt, for 5-years, subject to popular referendum, hotels and many specified new factories and industries of public utility from county ad valorem taxes, 55 In 1934 the Legislature exempted homesteads and 40 acres of land from State ad valoren taxes to the extent of \$1,000 and the law of 1935 increased the exemption from State ad valorem taxes to \$2,500 and 160 acres of land. 56 The Home Exemption Act of 1938 exempted, to the extent of \$5,000 and 160 acres of land, all bona fide homos owned and actually lived in, from all State ad valorem taxes and from all county, road district, and school district ad valorem taxes. 57 Each of the acts directed that all claims for exemption be made to the board of supervisors through the tax assessor, and the board is empowered and required to adjudicate all claims. 58

The board of supervisors fixes the general tax levy annually. 59 In addition,

it imposes a number of separate property taxes, some mandatory, others optional. It may levy a special tax for erecting, enlarging, repairing, or remodeling county buildings, and it has power to impose a special tax for maintaining the county public schools outside separate school districts. The board must levy taxes in the various school and road districts of the county for supplementing the county general funds, and for other purposes, if petitioned to do so by a majority of the qualified electors of any district. The board must also levy special taxes to pay the interest on county or county-district bonds and provide sinking funds for their redemption. It must also levy a special tax to meet loans made in anticipation of taxes.60

After the tax levy has been made, the clerk of the board of supervisors certifies it to the sheriff as tax collector, to the State Auditor of Public Accounts, to the State Land Commissioner, and to the State Tax Commission. 61

The tax assessor is required to make an annual assessment of the polls and of all personal property in the county subject to taxation, and a biemnial assessment of all real property subject to taxation. 62 The real and personal rolls must be completed and delivered to the board of supervisors on or before the first Monday in July. 63 The board of supervisors is required to equalize and review the tax assessments at its July meeting and within 10 days of its August meeting, and on completing the equalization, must approve the assessments subject to the rights of persons in interest to be heard on objections. The August meeting of the board must be devoted to hearing and determining all objections and exceptions filed by persons dissatisfied with the assessments. It is the duty of the board to send the rolls to the State Tax Commission for final correction and equalization. The Commission equalizes the assessments as between counties with regard to the different classes of property and returns the rolls to the board subject to hearing objections from that body. 64

After the assessment rolls have been accepted and corrected by the board, the clork of the board must make two copies, deliver one copy to the sheriff as tax collector, another to the State Tax Commission, and keep the original in his office as a permanent record. 55 The real and personal property of public service corporations in the county is assessed by the State Tax Commission, and after the assessments are equalized and reviewed, the Commission forwards a copy of the rolls to the clerk of the board of supervisors who makes a copy

and delivers it to the sheriff as tax collector, retaining the original as a permanent record of his office. 66

The sheriff as tax collector, after receiving the tax rolls from the clerk of the board of supervisors, collects both State and county taxes. 67 He is required to make monthly reports of collections to the clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor and to the State Auditor of Public Accounts and at the same time he must pay over State taxes collected to the State Treasurer and county taxes collected to the county depository.68

It is the duty of the sheriff as tax collector to sell both real and personal property on which taxes are delinquent. 69 Redemption of land sold for taxes must be made through the clerk of the chancery court as recorder, who remits redemption monies to the proper officials. 70

License taxes are imposed by the State and county on practically every occupation and profession, and are collected for the State by the sheriff as tax collector. 71 The county is authorized and required to collect through the shoriff as tax collector and for its own uso, an annual license fee from all owners of motor vehicles in the county. 72 The sheriff as tax collector remits occupational license fees collected to the State Treasurer, and the motor vehicle or road and bridge privilege taxes to the county depository. 73

The county has several sources of miscellaneous revonue. The board of supervisors has control of sixtoenth section lands and lieu lands reserved for the support of the township schools and of all funds obtained from those lands. 74 Another source of revenue is the mency derived from fines, penalties, and forfeitures imposed in the courts of the county. The clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor debits the sheriff with all jury taxes, fines, penalties, and forfeitures reported to him by the clerks of the courts, and the shoriff is required to collect and pay the amounts charged to him into the county treasury. 75 The county highway fund is supplemented by a substantial share of the State tax levied on gasoline sold in the county. 76 The poll taxes

collected in the county are retained for the benefit of the common school fund, 77 and the county receives a portion of the State equalization fund for the use of the county schools. 78 Federal aid is received to carry on a program of agricultural and home demonstration work. 79

All claims, accounts, and demands against the county must be presented to the board of supervisors. The board, together with the clerk of the board as auditor, audits the claims and the clerk, on the order of the board, issues warrants on the county depository in payment of all claims which are approved by the board. 80 It is the duty of the county depository to make quarterly reports of all receipts and dispursements and to return with the reports all canceled warrants which the clerk of the board as auditor must file and preserve as a public record.81

The clork of the board as auditor must audit county officers' accounts regularly. 82 In addition the State Auditor of Public Accounts is empowered to audit and examine the accounts of all county officers at least once a year. He is particularly charged with auditing the allowances and expenditures made by the board of supervisors.83

The board of supervisors has power and authority to issue bonds for general county purposes, for erecting and maintaining schools, for refunding outstanding bond issues, for constructing and maintaining roads and bridges, for meeting outstanding warrants and other legal obligations, for establishing and maintaining a county convict farm, and for erecting and maintaining a courthouse and a jail.84

Elections

A person to qualify as an elector must be a citizen of the United States; at least 21 years of age; a resident of the State for 2 years, and of the district in which he is offering to vote for 1 year; must be able to read any section of the Constitution of the United States, or if he cannot read, understand and give a reasonable interpretation of it; must never have been convicted of bribery, burglarly, theft, arson, obtaining money or goods under false pretenses, perjury, forgery, embezzlement, or bigamy; must have paid all taxes

legally required of him, and be able to produce satisfactory evidence (poll tax receipts for two consecutive years) of such payment to the officers holding an clection; and must be registered as prescribed by law. 85

Prospective electors must register with the clerk of the circuit court as registrar who examines them as to their qualifications and requires them to swear or affirm allegiance to the United States and to the State of Mississippi, that they possess the necessary qualifications to vote, and that they are not disqualified because of conviction for any crime.86

The county board of election commissioners is required, before every election, to revise or purge the registration books and poll books kept by the clork of the circuit court as registrar, 87

A candidate for public office must be a qualified elector, and in addition, must not dony the existence of a Supreme Being, although he is not required to meet any religious test as a qualification for office; must not have been convieted of bribery, perjury, or any other infamous crime, or of giving or offering directly or indirectly any bribe to procure the election of appointment of a person to office; and must not have participated in a duel or served as a second to a duolist.88

The Corrupt Practices Act of 1935 requires that candidates for State, district, county, and county-district offices make affidavit that they have read the Corrupt Practices Act and that they will not violate it. The act also requiros candidates for county and county-district offices to file with the clerk of the circuit court itemized statements of their campaign expenses, and it prohibits candidates from promising appointments to office or their influence in other ways, and sets up rigid restrictions against verbal or printed attacks on opponents during the campaign.89

All officers elected or appointed to office in the county must take the following oath before entering upon the duties of their offices: "I do solomnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Mississippi and obey the laws thereof that I am not disqualified from holding office; and I will faithfully discharge the duties of the office upon which I am about to enter. So help me God."90

The county board of election commissioners is charged with the preparation of ballots for elections.91

General elections for State, district, county, and county-district officors are held every fourth year on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in

November 92 Primary elections for party nominations of officers are held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August preceding the general elections, and are governed and regulated by the election laws in force at the time the elections are held, with the county executive committee discharging the duties of the county board of election commissioners, except revising the registration and poll books. 93 As only one major party functions in Mississippi, the Democratic, nomination at primary elections is tantamount to election. When no candidate receives a majority of the votes east, second primaries or runn-off elections are held 3 weeks after the first primary, between the two candidates who receive the highest number of votes. 94 Special elections for unexpired terms are called by the county board of election commissioners on order of the board of supervisors, if the unexpired term is for more than 6 months. 95 With the advice and consent of the Senate, the Governor shall file by appointment all offices subject to appointment when the term of the incumbent will expire within 9 months after the meeting of the Legislature. 96

It is the duty of the sheriff to provide equipment for polling places and he must furnish a sufficient number of voting compartments, shelves, and tables, so that there shall be not less than 1 of each for each 100 electors in the district.97

The county board of election commissioners, appointed by the State Board of Election Commissioners, is required to appoint the managers of elections.98 It is also the duty of the county commissioners to appoint bailiffs to preserve order at the polls.99

The votes cast in primary elections are counted and tallied at each polling place by the election managers who certify the results and seal all ballots and a certified copy of the result in the boxes. The boxes are delivered to the county executive committee. This committee canvasses and reviews all boxes and deposits the boxes with the clerk of the circuit court as registrar.100 The votes cast in general elections are delivered in the same manner by the election managers to the county board of election commissioners which canvasses and reviews the boxes and delivers them to the clerk of the circuit court as registrar.101

With respect to party nominations of presidential electors, each political party102 in Humphreys County is entitled to two delegates to its State Convention held every 4 years to select the electors. These delegates are chosen by

county delegate conventions held every 4 years. Delegates to the county convention are elected at precinct elections called by the county executive committee, and are apportioned equally among the supervisors districts or among the precincts of the county in proportion to the number of votes east by the party at the preceding presidential election. 103

Education

County agencies which participate in the administration of the school program are the superintendent of education, the county school board, and the board of supervisors. Three types of subdivisions of the county, called districts, have been established in Humphreys as authorized by law: Common school districts, consolidated school districts, and special consolidated school districts, with boards of trustees for each, 104

Separate schools are maintained for children of the white and colored races.105

The schools in the county are supported by county taxes, by poll taxes collected and retained in the county, by the State per capita fund, by the State equalizing fund, and by local district taxes which the people impose on themselves.106

The superintendent, whose duties are administrative rather than supervisory, controls the county school fund composed of State money, county school taxes, and poll taxes; fixes the salaries of teachers; appoints teachers when the local trustees do not select and recommend them by June 15th; and enters into the only contracts made for teaching services.107

The main functions of the county school board are to organize and fix the boundaries of the school districts; to designate the location of the school house in any district when it has not already been located; to set the date for the opening of the county schools or give assent to the date proposed by the superintendent of education; 108 and, together with the superintendent, lay out all routes for the transportation of school children and let all contracts for such transportation. 109

The board of supervisors, as a direct function in the conduct of the county schools, may lovy an annual tax of not more than 1 mill on all property

in the county outside of separate school districts for a fund to be used for building school houses. 110 All other school taxes are levied after action of some other agency. County taxes outside of separate districts are imposed only after the lovy has been approved by a majority of the qualified electors voting in an election, 111 and district taxes are levied on the petition of a majority of the qualified electors in the district. 112 The board may issue county and district bonds on the approval of three-fifths of the qualified electors of the county voting in an election, or on the approval of a majority of the qualified electors residing in the district. 113

District school trustees have general local supervision of the school or schools in their respective districts, 114 may borrow money in anticipation of taxes, 115 and must prepare and file with the superintendent of education a budget of estimated expenses and a statement of estimated revenues for each fiscal year. 116 The trustees of all county district schools elect the members to the county school board. 117

Public Health

The public health program in the county is conducted by the county department of health, established by the board of supervisors in 1927.118

This department is composed of a director, two public health nurses, a sanitation supervisor, and a sceretary.119

The director, who is required to be a graduate physician and well trained in health work, is appointed by the board of supervisors on the recommendation of the State Board of Health. 120

The director of the county department of health has power to enforce all health laws of the county under the supervision and direction of the State Board of Health; to make investigations of health problems; and to recommend and to institute, under the supervision, direction, and jurisdiction of the State Board of Health, measures necessary to promote health welfare. He is required to report to the State Board of Health all matters concerning the sanitary conditions of the district in the manner prescribed by the board; he is further required to keep an accurate record of activities of the department for public use and for information to the State Board of Health and to make reports required by it. 121

In general, the work of the department falls into the following main divisions: Preventable disease control, maternal health, infant and preschool health, school health, sanitation and milk control, and vital statistics. 122

Births and deaths in the county are reported to the Division of Vital Statistics of the State Board of Health by the county registrar of births and deaths, 123 marriage statistics are reported by the clerk of the circuit court, 124 and diverce statistics are reported by the clerk of the chancery court. 125

Welfare

The board of supervisors has jurisdiction over the relief and support of the poor in the county. 126 The board also has jurisdiction over poor orphan children, 127 and it must advance money for the investigation and removal of insane persons. 128 It must also provide for the care and maintenance of paupers alleged to be insane, pending investigation, and provide permanent care for such persons after they have been legally adjudged insane if there is no place for them in one of the State insane hospitals. 129 In addition, the board appoints the members of the county board of public welfare. 130 The State department of Public Welfare has power and authority to cooperate with the Federal relief program. 131

The pension board of inquiry, appointed by the board of supervisors, adjudicates all claims for State-paid pensions made by Confederate veterans, and their widows, and their servants. 132

Public Works

Full jurisdiction over roads, ferries, and bridges is exercised by the board of supervisors in accordance with such regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. 133 The board must provide and maintain a courthouse and a jail, and if there is not a courthouse in the county or if it is undergoing repairs or it is not fit for use, the board must provide a building in which the courts and the meetings of the board may be held. 134

This body is given the exclusive power to make and authorize all contracts in the name of the county. 135

Miscellaneous Functions

Activities in agricultural demonstration and home economies are carried on in the county with the aid of Fodoral funds, by the county extension department in agriculture and home economics. 136 The county agents and home demonstration agents in charge of this program are appointed by the board of supervisors on the recommendation of the Extension Department of Mississippi State College and with the approval of the United States Department of Agriculture. 137

Provisions are made for the recording with the clerk of the chancery court as recorder of charters of incorporation, \$138\$ marks and brands of livestock, \$139\$ as recorder of charters of incorporation, --- harks that the declarations of homesteads to obtain exemption from seizure or sale under execution or attachment for debt, 140 discharges and all military records and documents of waterans of the Spanish-American War and the World War, 141 and all surveys of voterans of the Spanish-American War and the World War, 140 of land made by the county surveyors or other surveyors. 142

Records System

The records of Humphreys County are in excellent condition and have been standarized to the extent that all land conveyance records and court dockets are

kept in heavy, leather-bound, insertable loose-leaf volumes. Ledgers and journals are kept in leather and canvass-bound, insertable, loose-leaf volumes and conform to the standard accounting system prescribed by the State Auditor of Public Accounts. At present, many unbound obsolute records are deposited in the old records vault, some in containers that vary in size and composition and include wooden and cardboard file boxes, and corrugated cardboard storage boxes. All case papers of the chancery and circuit courts are kept in steel file boxes.

The vaults of the clork of the circuit court and the clerk of the chancery court are spacious and large enough to contain all current and noncurrent records of these courts. 143 Other offices without vaults have adequate space for current and noncurrent records.


The lighting conditions throughout the courthouse are good, having an adequate number of windows and artificial light. The vault of the clerk of the chancery court is equipped with fluorescent light.

Practically all permanent records have been typewritten, or handwritten on printed forms with manufactured brands of permanent, nonfading ink. A good quality of ledger paper has been purchased for the record books, but less durable paper has been used in the documents kept permanently on file, especially those documents inscribed on printed forms and furnished by others than county officials.

County officers are authorized and empowered to deposit for permanent preservation with the Mississippi Department of Archives and History any official books, records, documents, original papers, newspaper files, and printed books not in current use in their offices. 144

3. HOUSING, CARE, AND ACCESSIBILITY OF THE RECORDS

For 3 years after the organization of Humphreys County, the judicial and administrative offices of the county were housed on the top floor of the city hall of Belzoni. In 1920 the Logislature authorized the board of supervisors of the county to issue bonds for the purpose of building a courthouse and a jail.2

The board of supervisors on October 8, 1920 voted a bond issue for the purchase of land in Belzoni from S. Castleman and Pauline Castleman. The purchase price was \$25,954.85 and the land was deeded to the county on October 9.4 Additional land, bringing the total to 5 acres, was obtained May 19, 1921 from Pauline and S. Castleman for \$1,344,5 and from Mrs. Hannah Goldberg for \$4,800.6

On April 4, 1921, J. V. and R. T. Burkes, building contractors of New Orleans, were awarded the contract to construct the courthouse and the jail for \$174,014.27. Subcontracts for heating, lighting, plumbing, and for jail cells Subcontracts for heating, lighting, plumbing, and for jail cells were let for a total of \$48,592.50, making the entire construction costs \$222,606.77.8 First to be completed, the jail was accepted by the board on November 21, 1921.9 Two weeks later, on December 5, 8 months after constructions. tion was started, the courthouse, designed by Kramer and Lindsey, architects, 10 was accepted by Gardner and Howe, engineers employed by the board, 11

The 3-story, yellow brick and stone trin building, with a raised basement, has exterior measurements of 125' x 101' x 55' and contains 694,395 cubic feet of space. It is approximately 98 percent fireproof, having Terazzo tile floors and plastored walls and coilings throughout. The structure is designed in the Greek Ionic order of architecture with eight fluted columns 24 feet high in the front, approached by stone steps 40 feet wide. Three sets of copperfaced, double entrance doors open out upon the steps.

The building is heated by a modern steam heating system. Well ventilated, it has exceptionally good natural and artificial lighting, uniform in all offices. Approximately 95 percent of the records are kept in the fireproof vaults of the clerks of the chancery and circuit courts.

The courthouse is situated on the corner of Main and Church Streets. offices of the department of health, county agent, Red Cross, the WPA library, an old records vault and four WPA offices are on the basement floor. On the first floor are the offices of the clerk of the circuit court, superintendent of education, board of supervisors, clork of the chancery court, tax assessor,

Housing, Care, and Accessibility (First entry, P. 44) of the Records sheriff and tax collector. The courtroom and grand and petit jury rooms, witness and judge's rooms, the county attorney's office, home demonstration agent's office, and the public welfare office occupy the second floor. On the third floor are the offices and banquet hall of the American Legion. All offices on the first floor can be entered from the north or main entrance of the courthouse which opens into the lobby and two corridors. Board of Supervisors: The offices of the board of supervisors are in the southwest section of the building on the first floor. The rooms are not crowded and the space is adequate for the needs of the supervisors and the public. No permanent records are kept in this office, the current records of the board being kept in the office and vault of the clerk of the chancery court who is the ex officio clerk of the board. The storage vault houses all the old records of the office. Clerk of the Chancery Court as Recorder: For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the clerk of the chancery court as recorder, see Clork of the Chancery Court, bolow. Chancery Court: For the housing, care and accessibility of the records of the chancery court, see Clerk of the Chancery Court, below. Clerk of the Chancery Court: The clerk of the chancery court keeps the records of the board of supervisors, of the recorder, of the chancery court, of the treasurer, of the auditor, of the pension board of inquiry, of the surveyor, ranger, and 2 volumes of non current justice of the peace records. The office and vault of the clerk of the chancery court are situated on the first floor and occupy the southeast section of the building. In the office there are 121 linear feet of steel shelving under 2 steel counters, 15' 11" x 2: 10" x 2: 6", and 4: 10" x 2: 10" x 2: 6". There are 3 shelving lockers, 30 file drawers, $10\frac{1}{2}$ " x 5" x 13", and 1 iron safe. Approximately 3 percent of the records are kept here. There is sufficient space, and the accommodations for the public are adequate. The clerk's vault is adjacent to and just north of his office. The vault contains 2,232 linear feet of steel shelving, 1,000 linear feet of bound volumos, 268 linear feet of umbound material, 35 linear feet of bound newspapers, and 100 linear feet of miscellaneous material. There are 622 file boxes $10\frac{1}{2}$ x 5" x 13", 1 steel cabinet 6' x 3' x $1\frac{1}{2}$ ' with 3 shelves, and 2 map closets 1' 10" x 12: 5". The vault, equipped with fluorescent light, is not crowded and there is ample room for expansion. Approximately 95 percent of the records for which the clerk of the chancery court is responsible are kept here, as are 3 percent of the records of the tax assessor, 2 percent of the records of the sheriff as tax collector, and 8 percent of noncurrent records of the justices of the peace. The remaining 2 percent of the records of the clerk of the chancery court are stored in the old records storage vault on the ground floor. Circuit Court: For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the circuit court, see Clerk of the Circuit Court, below. Clerk of the Circuit Court: The clerk of the circuit court has his offices in the northwest section of the first floor of the building. Running the length

of the room is a counter 16'x 2'x 21' providing 37' linear feet of stool shelving, 9 file boxes 122" x 15" x 242", and 21 file drawers 102" x 5" x 13". Approx imately 5 percent of the clerk's records are kept in this office.

Immediately adjoining the office of the circuit clerk and on the west, is the vault with 1 steel door and 1 window. On the north, west, and south sides of the room there are 1,148 linear foet of steel shelving, holding 326 linear feet of bound volumes and 70 linear feet of unbound materials. There are 292 file boxes 10^{11} x 5" x 13", and 13 file boxes 12^{11} x 15" x 24^{11} . In the vault also are 2 counters containing 129 feet of steel shelving, an iron safe, and 1 map closet. Approximately 95 percent of all the records required to be kept by the clerk of the circuit court are in the vault, which includes the records of the clork of the circuit court as a recording and licensing official, as registrar of the voters, of the election commissioners, of the grand jury, and 7 noncurrent dockets of the justices of the peace.

Grand Jury: The grand jury holds its sessions in the grand jury room on the second floor of the courthouse. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the grand jury, see Clerk of the Circuit Court, above.

Justice of the Peace: District or Beat One, (W. B. Posey). The justice of the peace of this district holds court at his office in the McClintoel Building in Belzoni, where 122 percent of the records are kept in his office. Twelve and one-half percent of the records are kept in the vault of the clerk of the chancory court, and 75 percent of the records are kept in the vault of the clerk of the circuit court. District or Boat Two, (E. Livingston and C. E. Crawford). The justices of the peace in this district hold court in their office at Isola, where 50 percent of the records are kept. The remaining 50 percent of the records are in the wault of the clerk of the circuit court. District or Beat Three, (G. H. Hairston). The justice of peace of this district holds court in his office at the home of G. H. Hairston in Silver City, Mississippi. One hundred percent of the records are kept in his office. District or Beat Four, (S. E. Carson). The justice of peace of this district holds court in his office located in Pat Poll's store in Bolzoni, Mississippi. One hundred percent of the records are kept in his office. District or Boat Five, (R. O. Jones and R. E. McMurtray). The justices of peace of this district hold court in their homes. Twenty percent of the records are in the vault of the chancery court, 60 percent of the records are kept by R. O. Jones in his home at Louise, Mississippi; 20 percent of the records are kept bo R. E. McMurtray at his office in his home at Midnight.

District Attorney: The district attorney of the fourth circuit court district maintains his private office at Indianola, county seat of Sunflower County.

County Prosecuting Attorney: The county prosecuting attorney maintains a private office on the second floor of the courthouse.

Sheriff: The office and vault of the sheriff and tax collector are in the northeast corner of the first floor. In the office there are 105 linear feet of steel shelving, 21 linear feet of bound volumes, and 27 linear feet of unbound material. There is also I steel cabinet 6' x 3' x 12', containing 46 drawers. Approximately 50 percent of the shoriff's records are kept here.

Coroner: No records of the coroner were located.

Constables: Constables have no offices but are attached to the office of justice of the peace from whose district or beat they are elected.

in the chancery clerk's vault, and 6 percent are in the storage vault.

Tax Assessor: The office of the tax assessor occupies the central portion on the northeast side of the first floor of the courthouse. There are 157 linear feet of steel and wood shelving, I wooden file cabinet 6^{\dagger} x 1^{\dagger} , 2 steel filing cabinets 4^{\dagger} x 4^{\dagger} x 2^{\dagger} and 6^{\dagger} x 3^{\dagger} x $1\frac{1}{2}^{\dagger}$, and I steel card index system 1^{\dagger} \cdot 7" x 2^{\dagger} 8" x 1^{\dagger} 3". There are ample accommodations. Approximately 52 percent of the assessor's records are kept here; 2 percent are in the chancery clerk's wallt, and 45 percent are in the storage wallt.

Sheriff as Tax Collector: For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the sheriff as tax collector, see Sheriff, pp. 33-34.

Clork of the Chancery Court as Treasurer: For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the clerk of the chancery court as treasurer, see Clork of the Chancery Court, p. 32.

Clerk of the Board of Supervisors as Auditor: For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the clerk of the board of supervisors, see Clerk of the Chancery Court, p. 32.

Clerk of the Circuit Court as Registrar: For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the clerk of the circuit court as registrar, see Clerk of the Circuit Court, pp. 32-33.

County Board of Election Commissioners: The county board of election commissioners holds its meetings in the office of the clerk of the circuit court. For housing, care, and accessibility of the records of this body, see Clerk of the Circuit Court, pp. 32-33.

Superintendent of Education: The offices of the superintendent of education are in the west wing of the first floor and consist of a Work from and a private office. No records are kept in the work room.

The superintendent's private office adjoins this room on the south. On the north and east side of the room are 2 wooden book cases 2' 2" x 7' x 1½'; 2 steel cabinets 1' 7" x 4' 1" x 2' 4", with 12 file boxes each; 5 steel cabinets 1' 3" x 4' 4" x 2' 4", with 4 file drawers each; 1 steel cabinet 6' x 3' x 1½', with 5 shelves. Approximately 60 percent of the records of the superintendent of education are kept here, the other 40 percent being in the storage vault in the basement. All of the records of the county school board and of the school trustees are kept in this office. The room is not crowded and there is adequate space for expansion. Equipment for workers and public users is adequate.

35 -Housing, Care and Accessibility (First ontry, p. 44) of the Records County School Board: The county school board meets in the office of the' superintendent of education and in the homes of its members. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the school board, see Superintendent of Education, p. 34. School Trustees: The school trustees meet in their homes, in the school buildings in the various districts, and in the office of the superintendent of education. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the school trustees, see Superintendent of Education, p. 34. Department of Health: The offices of the department of health are situated in the northwest section of the ground floor of the courthouse. The reception room contains 1 stool filing cabinet, 1' 9" x 4' x 2'4", with 4 file drawers. Approximately 90 percent of the records of the county health department and of the registrar of vital statistics are kept here. The remaining 10 percent are kept in the private office of the director of the department. The director's private office adjoins the reception room and in it is 1 stool filing cabinet, 1'9" x 4' 4" x 2' 4", with 4 file drawers in which are kept the records of sanitary inspections. There is ample space for workers and pationts. Rogistrar of Births and Doaths: The registrar of births and deaths has her office with the health department on the basement floor of the courthouse. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of this official, see Department of Health, above.

Pension Board of Inquiry: The pension board of inquiry holds its meetings in the office of the clork of the chancery court who is its clork. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the pension board of inquiry, see Clork of the Chancery Court, p. 32.

County Extention Department in Agriculture and Home Economics: The 3 divisions of this department occupy separate offices. The 3 effices of the county agent, who is in charge of agricultural demonstration work, are situated in the west central section of the ground floor of the courthouse. In the county agent's private office is a wooden cabinet 4' x 10' x 1' on the west side of the room, containing 40 linear feet of unbound material. There are also 2 steel file cabinets $l\frac{1}{12}$ ' x 4' x 2' with 8 drawers in the county agent's secretary's office. On the south side of the work office are 5 steel file cabinets, 16 cabinets on the west side, and 6 on the north side, all $l\frac{1}{12}$ ' x 4' x 2' with 104 drawers. Eighty-five percent of the records of the county agent are kept here. There is adequate room for workers and public users.


The office of the home demonstration agent is in the northeast section of the second floor of the courthouse. On the north side of the room is 1 steel filing cabinet 1: 3" x 4: 4" x 2: 4", with four file drawers. One hundred percent of the records of the home demonstration agent are kept here. The office is adequate for present needs, but there is no room for expansion.


The offices of the negro home demonstration and county agents are located in a newly constructed building south of the courthouse. 100 percent of the records of these departments are kept here.





Storage Vault: The storage vault in the east central section of the ground floor of the courthouse is a room 18' x 21' x 7', with 1 steel door 6' 42" x 2', and no windows. In this fireproof vault, with concrete floor and plastered walls, are 216 linear feet of steel shelving, 108 linear feet of noncurrent bound volumes, 72 linear feet of noncurrent unbound material, and 36 linear feet of noncurrent miscellaneous records. Approximately 2 percent of the noncurrent records of the chancery clerk, 45 percent of the noncurrent records of the superintendent of 6 ducation, 6 percent of the noncurrent records of the sheriff as tax collector, 5 percent of the noncurrent records of the sheriff as tax collector, 5 percent of the noncurrent niscellaneous records are stored here. Although the vault is in disorder, there is room for additional shelving on the south and north walls.

The descriptions of the records, referred to in this inventory as entries, are numbered consecutively from 1 to 269, and are composed of two parts, the title-line paragraph and the body-of-entry paragraph. However, a third paragraph is often added for the purpose of making cross references. Although a condensed form of entry is used, information is given as to the limiting dates of all extant records, the contents of the individual series, and the location of the records.

42 -(First ontry, p. 44) Abbreviations, Symbols, and Explanatory Notes The title-line paragraph is made up of the entry number, the title of the record, the first and last dates of the period covered by the record, the quantity, the labeling; information as to missing or discontinued records, when missing; variations in the title; and cross references. Titles are given in capital letters exactly as found on the records in the county archives. Titles are assigned to records having no title and are given in capital letters enclosed in brackets; (see entries 98, 156, 159, 182, 203, and 205). Titles are also assigned in order to explain and clarify records having titles which are misleading, incorrect, or nondescriptive. These assigned titles are given with initial capitals only, are enclosed in brackets, and are inserted as part of the exact but ambiguous title; (see entries 33, 173, 206). Continuous records are shown by a hyphon placed between the beginning and closing dates, as 1833-1918, in entry 15. Lapses in the records are indicated by a comma placed botween the groups of inclusive dates, as 1918-25, 1927-28,

Missing records are indicated by showing the dates of the records which are present. Where no comment is made on the absence of prior, intervening, or subsequent records, no definite information could be obtained as to why the records are missing. The reason for the discontinuance of a record is given if the reason could be obtained, (see entries 147, 166). Where no statement is made that the record was discontinued at the last date shown in the entry, it could not be determined definitely that such was the case.

1931, in entry 10. Current dates are indicated by two hyphens, as 1918 -- , entry

1; and 1920 -- , entry 61.

The body-of-entry paragraph sets out the purpose of keeping the record and gives a description of its contents. It further gives statements as to how the record is arranged, that is, numerically, alphabetically, or chronologically; and as to how it is indexed, if it is. The manner of recording is given as handwritten, handwritten on printed form or heading; typed, typed on printed form or heading; mimeographed; lithographed; or photostated. The condition of the record is given if the condition is not good, and when no statement is made as to the condition, it is to be assumed that the condition is good. The average number of pages and size of container of the records is cited next, followed by a statement as to where the record is located, if it is not kept in the office of the agency under which it is listed in the inventory.

To show the relation of the various records to each other and to complete a series of records, three types of cross references are used: The subject heading cross reference, the title-line and body-of-entry cross reference, and the third paragraph cross reference.

The cross reference placed under subject headings shows that the records referred to deal with the same subject although they are placed under a different heading of the same office or in another office (see the subject heading "Real Property," p.).

The title-line cross reference is used to integrate scattered parts of a record series (see entries 6, 7, 10, 12, 183, 184, 188, 198-201). This style of cross reference is also used to segregate logically different types of records which happen to have been recorded in the same book or kept in the same series of file boxes (see entries 2, 104, 109-113). The entry containing the

title-line reference is an artificial entry the title of which is enclosed in brackets (see entries 30, 250). The title-line cross reference is always complemented by the reference "Also contains:" placed in the body-of-entry paragraph of the entry referred to.

Third-paragraph cross references are utilized to show the relation between closely commected records as, for example, the record of the proceedings of the grand jury, the original indictments returned by the grand jury, and the records of the returned indictments (see entries 99, 100, 108, 139).

Volume, file box, and map dimensions are given in inches.

Citations to the acts of the Legislature of Mississippi refer to the year of the acts and to the page or pages of the published volume in which the acts appear.

I. BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

The board of supervisors was established as the general local authority of Humphreys County by the creating act of March 28, 1918, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1890. It was organized on June 3, 1918, and has functioned in the county continuously since that time.

The board is composed of five members, one from each supervisor's beat or district into which the county is divided. The Legislature, given constitutional power to determine the manner in which the supervisors should be chosen, directed that the qualified electors of each beat elect in and from their beat one member to the board for a 4 year term at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers. The clerk of the chancery court is the ex officio elerk of the board of supervisors, and the sheriff is its executive officer and must attend all its meetings in person or by deputy.

For the general structural and functional development of the board of supervisors and of the office of clark of the chancery court as clark of the board of supervisors, see Lamar County Inventory, pp. 41-70.

Unloss otherwise specified, the records of the board of supervisors are kept in the vault of the clerk of the chancery court, who as clerk of the board is the ex officio auditor. The financial records of the board have been placed arbitrarily under "Clerk of the Board of Supervisors as Auditor," pp. 109-115, entries 181-206.

II. CLERK OF THE CHANCERY COURT AS RECORDER

The clerk of the chancery court is the principal recording officer of Humphreys County. The office of recorder does not exist as such in Mississippi county government but constitutional and statute law provide that certain records must be recorded and preserved by the clerk. 1

The office of clerk of the chancery court was established in Humphreys County by the creating act of March 28, 1918, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1890. For the general structural and functional development of this office, see Lamar County Inventory, pp. 76-80.

III. CHANCERY COURT

The Constitution of 1890 directs the Legislature to divide the State into convenient chancery court districts and stipulates that chancery court shall be held in éach county at least twice each year. 1 On its establishment on March 28, 1918, Humphreys County was attached to the ninth chancery court district, 2 together with Washington, Sunflower, Issaquena, Sharkey, and Warren Counties, 3 and has remained in that district continuously since that time. The Legislature prescribes the time of holding court, and at present sessions are held for 6 days beginning the third Monday in January and for 6 days beginning the third Monday in June.4

The presiding officer of the chancery court of Humphreys County is the chancellor of the ninth chancery district. 5 County officers attached to the tion, the chancellor may appoint masters in chancery, special commissioners, receivers, 10 a court stemographer in the district, 11 and a county probation officer. 12

The chancellor is elected for a 4-year term by the qualified electors in the district. 13

The office of clerk of the chancery court was established in Humphreys County by the creating act of March 28, 1918, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1890.14 The first clork was appointed by the Governor June 1, 1918, 15 and sorved until a clerk was regularly elected at the general election of November 1919, and sworn into office in January 1920. 16 The office has functioned continuously since that time. The clerk is elected for a 4-year term by the qualified voters of the county at the general elections for State, county, and

IV. CIRCUIT COURT

The Constitution of 1890 prescribes that the Legislature shall divide the State into convenient circuit districts and that circuit court shall be held in each county at least twice each year, 1 Since its establishment on March 28, 1918, Humphreys County has been attached to the fourth circuit court district together with Holmes, Leflore, Sunflower, and Washington Counties.² The first session of court was held July 25, 1918,³ and the court has functioned continuously in the county since that time. The Legislature prescribed the times of holding court, 4 and, since 1922, sessions have been held for 24 days, beginning the third Monday in February and the fourth Monday in August. The first 12 days of each term are devoted to civil matters and the last 12 days to criminal business, and since 1934 criminal matters can be tried the first 12 days of each days of each session when there are no civil matters.5

The presiding officer of the circuit court is the judge of the circuit court district.6 Other county officers attached to the court are the clerk,7 the shoriff who is its executive officer, 8 and the county prosecuting attorney who assists the district attorney.9 A court reporter or stenographer in the district may be appointed by the judge. 10 Indictments and presentments are returned to the court by the grand jury, 11 and cases in issue are tried before the petit jury.12 The district attorney represents the State in all criminal prosecutions in the court and both the State and county in civil causes in which they are interested.13 He is assisted in these matters by the county prosecuting attorney.14

The circuit judge is elected for a 4-year term by the qualified voters of the district.15

The office of clerk of the circuit court was established in Humphreys County by the creating act of March 28, 1918, as prescribed by the Constitution

of 1890.16 The first clerk was appointed by the Governor June 1, 1918,17 and served until elected at the general election in November 1919, and sworn into office in January 1920,18 The office has functioned continuously since that time. The clerk is elected for a 4-year term by the qualified voters of the county at the general election for State, district, county, and county-district officers.19

The office of court reportor or stenographer, filled by appointment by the judge, has functioned in the district and in the circuit court of Humphreys County since 1918, the stenographer serving a 4-year term unless removed from office.20

The guarantee of the Constitution of the United States of trial by an impartial jury, 21 is provided for in Mississippi insofar as Humphreys County is affected, by the Constitution of 1890.22 The first jury panel was drawn April 18, 1919, 23 and juries have been impaneled continuously since that time.

VI. JUSTICES OF THE PEACE

Offices and courts of justice of the peace were established in Humphreys County by the creating act of March 28, 19181 as prescribed by the Constitution of 1890.2 The offices were first filled by appointment by the Governor until justices of the peace were regularly elected at the general elections of 1919 and sworn into office in January 1920.3

The Constitution of 1890 provides that a competent number of justices of the peace be chosen in each county by districts. 4 Until 1932 statute law required that 2 justices be selected from each of 5 districts, the boundaries of the districts being the same as the boundaries of the supervisors' beats or districts.5 Since 1932 only 1 justice of the peace is to be elected in and from each district, with the provision that the board of supervisors may provide for the election of an additional justice in any district. 6 At the present time 2 justices of the peace are elected in and from Beats 2 and 5 and 1 each from Beats 1, 3, and 4.7

The Constitution of 1890 provides that justices of the peace shall be chosen by districts for a term of 4 years, but gives the Legislature power to determine the method of selection. 8 The Legislature has prescribed that justices of the peace shall be elected by districts at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers.9

Justices of the peace must hold not less than 1 term of court each month, nor more than 2.10 Other county officers attached to the court are constables, who are the executive officers of the court, ll and the sheriff as executive officer in the event there is no constable. 12 A 6 member jury must be impanelled if any party to a cause demands a trial by jury.13

VII. GRAND JURY

The guarantee of the Constitution of the United States that no person shall be held to answer for a capitol or otherwise infamous crime, except on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, l is provided for in Mississippi insofar as Humphreys County is concerned, by the Constitution of 1890.2

The grand jury was first convened in Humphreys County in April 1919,3 and has functioned continuously since that time at each term of court devoted to criminal matters. It is composed of not less than 15 nor more than 20 jurors, the number being designated by the court, 4 one of whom is appointed foreman by the court.5 Grand jurors are selected from the first 62 jurors drawn from the general jury panel.6 Members of the grand jury serve for the duration of the court, unless dismissed sooner by the judge. 7

VIII. DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Humphreys County, on its establishment in 1918, was assigned to the fourth circuit court district,2 and the district attorney of the district assumed his duties in the county and in the circuit court of the county. The office has functioned continuously since that time in the county and in the circuit court district to which Humphreys County has been attached.3

The office is constitutional, 4 and the district attorney is elected for a 4-year term 5 by the qualified electors of the district at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers, 6

IX. COUNTY PROSECUTING ATTORNEY

The office of county prosecuting attorney was established in Humphreys County by the creating act of March 28, 1918, as prescribed by the Code of 1917. The first officer was appointed by the Governor June 1, 1918, and served until an attorney was elected at the general elections in November 1919, and sworn into office in January 1920. This officer is elected by the qualified voters of the county every 4 years at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers. The office of county prosecuting attorney has functioned continuously in the county since its establishment.

X. SHERIFF

The office of sheriff was established in Humphreys County by the creating act of March 28, 1918, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1890.1 The office was filled by appointment by the Governor2 until the general elections of 1919 when a sheriff was regularly elected and sworn into office in January 1920.3 The office has functioned continuously in the county since that time.

The Constitution of 1890 provides that he be elected for a 4-year term, prohibits him from immediately succeeding himself in office, but gives the Legislature authority to determine the manner of election. 4 The Legislature has proscribed that the sheriff be elected by the qualified electors of the State, district, county, and county-district officers.5

For the general structural and functional development of the office of sheriff, see Lamar County Inventory, pp. 162-164.

The office was filled by appointment by the Governor2 until the general elections of November 1919 when a coroner was regularly elected and sworn into office in January 1920.3 The office functioned continuously until 1928; but there were no candidates for the office in the general elections of 1927, 1931, 1935, and 1939.4

The Constitution of 1890 provides that the coroner be elected for a term of 4 years and gives the Logislature authority to determine the method of election; 6 The Legislature has prescribed that the coroner be elected by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers. 7

XII. CONSTABLES

The office of constable was established in each of the 5 supervisors' and justice of the peace districts of Humphreys County after the organization of the county, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1890. These offices have functioned continuously since that time except that since 1939 there has been no incumbent in beat or district 3.2

The Constitution of 1890 provides that constables shall be chosen by districts for a 4-year term, but gives the Legislature power to determine the method of selection. The Legislature has prescribed that constables shall be elected by districts at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district offices. 4

The Constitution of 1890 provides that a competent number of constables be chosen in each county by districts. Statute law requires that one constable be chosen in each district for the election of justices of the peace, and enpowers the board of supervisors to provide for the election of additional constables in any district not to exceed the number of justices of the peace provided for in the district.

XV. CLERK OF THE CHANCERY COURT AS TREASURER

The office of treasurer was established in Humphreys County by the creating act of 1918 as prescribed by the Constitution of 1890.1 It functioned until it was abolished by a constitutional amendment approved by popular vote in 1922 and made a part of the Constitution in 1924.2 The treasurer was elected for a 4-year term by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, county, and county-district officers, 3 and was prohibited by the Constitution from immediately succeeding himself or the sheriff in office.4 The amendment, in abolishing the office, specified that the duties formerly imposed upon the treasurer should be discharged by some person or persons selected as required by law.5 In 1932 the Legislature enacted a law requiring the clerk of the chancery court in his capacity of clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor in counties having county depositories to perform the former duties of the treasurer.6 As Humphreys County has had regularly designated depositories since its establishment in 1918, the clerk of the chancery court of the county has assumed the former duties of the treasurer.

Only the original reports of the treasurer were located, these being kept in the office of the clerk of the chancery court in his capacity as clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor, (see entry 4). The law of 1932 which gave this official the former duties of the treasurer, also requires him to be custodian of all books, records, and papers of the treasurer.7

XVIII. COUNTY BOARD OF ELECTION COMMISSIONERS

The county board of election commissioners, created by statute law in 1892, was established in Humphreys County June 3, 1918, and has functioned continuously since that time.1

This board consists of 3 members who are appointed by the State Board of Election Commissioners 2 months before every general election of representatives in Congress, to serve a 2-year term.2

XIX. SUPERINTENDENT OF EDUCATION

The constitutional office of superintendent of education was established in Humphreys County by the creating act of March 28, 1918. The first superintendent was appointed by the Governor June 1, 1918. The office has functioned continuously since that time.

The superintendent is elected by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers for a term of 4 years.4

This board consists of 5 members, 1 from each supervisor's beat or district, and the superintendent of education, 2 who is its president and secretary.3

Until 1930 the members of the board were appointed by the superintendent of education, subject to ratification by the board of supervisors, to serve a 4-year term. 4 Since 1930 they have been elected by the trustees of the county public schools other than the trustees of municipally operated districts, for a term of 5 years, lmember being chosen annually.5

The office functioned continuously until August 1, 1927, when a full-time department of health was organized.² The department has functioned continuously since that time and at present is composed of a director, 2 public health nurses, a sanitation supervisor and a socretary.³

The director is appointed for a 4-year term by the board of supervisors on the recommendation of the State Board of Health. 4

The board of supervisors has been required since 1924 to appoint a World War veteran to the board, and since 1924 recommendations for membership have been extended to include not only Confederate veterans, but other citizens who are qualified electors. 5 Since 1928 the county prosecuting attorney has been a member of the board. 6 The clerk of the chancery court is the clerk of this body, 7 and the sheriff is its executive officer.8

No definite term of office for the members of the pension board of inquiry has been prescribed.

XXV. CORONER AS RANGER

The office of ranger was created in Humphreys County in 1918 with the establishment of the office of coroner, 1 as the coroner is by law the exofficio ranger. 2 The office functioned until 1928, but since that time there has been no candidate for the office of coroner.3

When there is no coroner in the county, the exofficio duties of the coronor as ranger may be discharged by justices of the peace.4

XXVI. SURVEYOR

The office of surveyor was established in Humphreys County by the creating act of March 28, 1918, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1890. The surveyor was appointed by the Governor June 1, 1918 and served until a surveyor was elected at the general election in November 1919, and sworn into office in January 1920. The office functioned from 1918 through 1928 but from 1928 to date there has been no incumbent.4

The Constitution of 1890 provides that the surveyor shall be elected for a 4-year term but gives the Legislature power to determine the method of selection. 5 The Legislature has provided that the surveyor be elected by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county-district officers.6

XXVII. COUNTY EXTENSION DEPARTMENT IN AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS

Under the law which authorized the organization of a county department of agriculture to promote agricultural extension work the office of county farm agent was ostablished in Humphreys County by the board of supervisors July 9, 1918.2 A department of home economics was established at the same time, 3 as authorized by law.4

By the same authority a Negro home demonstration agent was appointed August 3, 19205 and a Negro farm demonstration agent was appointed July 2, 1928.

The offices functioned as interdependent but separate units until 1932 when statute law authorized counties to carry on agricultural demonstration and home economics programs through a single department to be known as the county extension department in agriculture and home economics.

Until 1932 the officials directing the activities of the department of agriculture and the department of home economics (the latter required by law to be a woman), were appointed by the board of supervisors, but since 1932 they have been appointed by the board of supervisors upon the recommendation of the Extension Department of Mississippi State College and with the approval of the United States Department of Agriculture.8

No specific term of office is prescribed.

XXVIII. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WELFARE

The county board of public welfare was created in Humphreys County April 6, 1936, 1 in accordance with an act of the Legislature of the same year. 2 This department has functioned continuously in the county since its creation. The county department of public welfare is composed of a county welfare board, appointed by the board of supervisors, which consists of 3 to 5 members representing 3 to 5 supervisors' districts with members appointed for a 1 year term as prescribed by the State Department of Public Welfare. 3 This board must meet at least once each month on call of the county welfare agent. 4 The county welfare agent and assistant county welfare agent, appointed by the commissioner, serves an indefinite term. 5 Clerical assistants, for administering the program may be employed. 6
