I have very little for this summer and vey little planned for I do not know where I will be, whether here or at home. rrank is a casual now and may get ordered home any day, on the other hand he may be sent elsewhere. Seven of the officers who were sent to savenynwith him from the same hospital have gone already to Germany. So long as he is alive and well I do not care as that is the main thing. I would enjoy a summer here very much-- at least part of one. I tink if he sta y s long that I will reman here till about July or August, when it gets so hot here. I mm wild to get in some bathing but it is not warm enough for swrf bathing here, nor has it been since wovember and we were sick then. The sun shines most every day but not long nor hot enough for the sand to get hot. About the dress; I think it was I who misunderstood Mama for I read her letter just as I was starting to school and mislaid it so I never got to read it again. She probably said ayme had a dress and I took it for granted that it was a dress of Lucinda's. You know I just wish that "ame would design and make children's clothes for it is a good business. If she could make few good things entirely by hand and o fere to take ordes for a certain humber from the big stores, only one in a city, she could do it. A girl here is making a lot of money that way. I wanted her to give mayme some work and show d her the dresses of my girls but she said she did nothing oh the machine at all. "er things are exclusive and that is why she gets the prices. It is wo th trying. Of course, it wuld have to be a real business. She hires all the work done under her direction. Mayme will do well in any business and it would be a good thing for her as she has been ti d so close at home -- it would help her to lead a more complete lifeif she got out in some kind of business. I w uld not think office work the best for her. Give my special love to Will. I hate to thinkof him giving up his own hopes as he will have to do now but I know he has such a fine spirit of devotion that he will go ahead. I do hope he will keep well. Am glad Louise is transferred to a nearer school. She could have lengthened her life by doing it before. I wish they were all out here but do not see how it could be managed. w had a lovely drive up a canyon day before yesterday. This is great country for automobiling but it costs a lot of money.
