TERRY HALL

After two outstanding seasons at Kentucky and possessing a career winning percentage of .657 in eight years as a collegiate coach, Terry Hall is now regarded as one of the top coaches in the women's collegiate ranks.

Hall guided the 1981-82 edition of the Lady Kats to their finest season ever, a 24-8 campaign that ended in the Midwest Regional championship, where Kentucky fell to No. 1-ranked and eventual National Champion Louisiana Tech on the Lady Techsters' home floor.

By the end of the season, the Lady Kats were playing so well that Hall proclaimed, "If we had been in any other region, we would have been in the Final Four."

That Kentucky performed so well is largely credited to Hall, who at the start of the season was faced with the task of rebuilding a team that lost two starters off the front line while adding only one player—a guard—to the roster. But somehow Kentucky improved. The Midwest Regional final was one step farther than the Lady Kats had advanced the previous year, in Hall's rookie season at Kentucky. That year UK finished with a 25-6 record after losing at Maryland in the AlAW's round of 16 finalists. Following that season, Hall was honored as the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference Coach of the Year.

Hall now has a 49-14 record at UK for a winning percentage of .777. Her career record is 142-74 over 8 years. The highlight of her career at Kentucky came toward the end of last season, when the Lady Kats defeated favored Tennessee 80-74 to capture the Southeastern Conference championship on their home floor.

Before coming to Kentucky, Hall coached for five seasons at Louisville, where her teams compiled a 79-54 record. In her final season at U of L, she guided the Lady Cardinals to their first Metro Conference title as they defeated a tough Memphis State team in the tournament finale. Hall also coached tennis and softball while at U of L.

Hall's initial coaching job was a one-year assignment at Eastern Kentucky University, where the Lady Colonels produced a 14-6 record and a KWIC title for the rookie coach. Her experience up to that point had been in the high school ranks, where she coached Louisville Butler to a 69-33 record and two Jefferson County titles in five seasons.

A native of Salem, Ind., Hall attended Indiana State University, where she starred in basketball, field hockey and volleyball before graduating in 1966. She was honored with the "I" Woman Award in 1965, and received the prestigious Hillman Award in 1966 as the most outstanding female athlete at ISU.

Also an outstanding softball player, Hall enjoys competing in a fast-pitch league in Louisville. She has been named to several softball all-star teams and is an exceptional pitcher.

Hall earned a degree in Health and P.E. from ISU in 1966, and received a Master's Degree in P.E. from Eastern Kentucky University in 1974.

As a player at William and Mary, Lynn is ranked No. 1 on the school's all-time scoring list with 1,504 career points. She averaged 18.3 points over four seasons with a 56.2 field goal percentage.




JOAN FRY

DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY President, University of Kentucky

Dr. Otis A. Singletary, the eighth president of the University of Kentucky, assumed that office in August 1969. He had previously served as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, executive vice chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas System and director of the Job Corps for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Dr. Singletary, a native of Gulfport, Miss., holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 12 years he has been president, the University has grown to where there are now more than 23,400 students on the Lexington campus and about 21,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the country.

Great strides toward academic excellence have been made during Dr. Singletary's presidency at UK. Two professional schools—dentistry and pharmacy—have been ranked among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history and mathematics have gained national attention. The UK Library now ranks among the best in the Southeast, and a large portion of the world-wide research related to tobacco and health is now done at UK.

Under Dr. Singletary's guidance, strong efforts have been made to meet the needs of minority groups including the establishment of an office of vice president for minority affairs.

Recognition of his service to the University was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award—an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

Dr. Singletary has been actively involved in a number of professional organizations and has served as president of the Southern Association of Landgrant Colleges and State Universities,



vice president of the American Council on Education and vice chairman of the Southern Regional Education Board.

Among his many awards and honors, he most recently received the Department of Army's Outstanding Service Medal

He entered higher education in 1954 as a member of the history faculty at the University of Texas and twice was awarded the University Student Association's Teaching Excellence Award.

Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa Senate.

A Navy veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, he is a commander in the U.S. Navy Reserve. He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Kendall.

Athletics At Kentucky

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring intercollegiate competition in 20 different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletics Association.

A board of directors, headed by the President of the University in the capacity of chairman, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program.

In addition to the UK President, board officers include the Vice-President for Student Affairs as vice-chairman and Dr. W. L. Matthews in the capacity of secretary. Seventeen other members, drawn from the University faculty and the general public, also serve on the board as appointees of the president as do two student representatives.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of the athletic program is Director of Athletics Cliff Hagan. The Association's Board of Directors is composed of the following:

CLIFFORD O. HAGAN Athletics Director

The hiring of new football coach Jerry Claiborne and presentation of a record budget of \$6,397,685 to the UK Athletics Association Board of Directors are two more recent developments in the career of Cliff Hagan, now in his eighth year as Wildcat athletics director and 11th year with the Athletics Department.

Accompanying Hagan's budget report was a statement by UK president Dr. Otis A. Singletary stressing the need for a first-rage swimming facility and a fieldhouse, which were long-range goals for the department.

In other related news, Hagan said the University is free to televise all its December basketball games on a live basis and that the possibility exists to televise UK's road conference football games provided the telecasts don't do "appreciable damage" to other games within a 125-mile limit.

Continued growth in practically all phases of UK athletics has been a hallmark of Hagan's seven-year reign as Wildcat athletics director, with fine attendance at football and basketball games, increased attendance at Lady Kat basketball and men's baseball, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

Recent physical improvements include a new baseball grandstand behind home plate, a new office area for the academic advisory staff, new locker rooms in the football dressing rooms and construction of a new equipment shed for track.

On the institutional side of the ledger, the University was host to both the men's and women's Southeastern Conference basketball tournaments earlier this year and will host the NCAA Championship Finals in 1985, along with renewal of the UK Relays in 1980.

Hagan, who has seen and overseen vast improvements in all phases of the UK athletics program since returning to his alma mater as assistant athletics director in 1972, has under his command a total of 20 sports ranging from football and men's basketball in Level I, to women's basketball in Level II, and a baker's dozen sports in Level III.

A few of the recent improvements that signify the continuing progress of UK athletics under Hagan include:

• Expansion of the football training room and addition of a beautiful players' lounge at Shively Sports Center.

 New food service equipment in the press box at Commonwealth Stadium.

• New basketball offices in Memorial Coliseum for both the men and women.

• Re-arrangement of the baseball fences and a complete revamping of the track facilities at Shively Sports Center.

The indoctrination of Hagan into the UK athletics administrative structure came in 1972, when he was named assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and given the task of implementing the Blue & White Fund for 57,600-seat Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena.

Hagan replaced Lancaster as athletics

director in July, 1975; during the ensuing school year, Wildcat teams compiled one of the best records in the school's history, with the basketball Wildcats winning the National Invitational Tournament, the wrestling and rifle teams winning SEC titles and the baseball team winning the SEC Eastern Division.

The wrestling team repeated as conference champion the following year, the basketball team finished with a 26-4 record and the football team won seven of 11 regular season games and defeated North Carolina in the Peach Bowl. It was the best UK football record in 23 years and the Wildcats first post-season appearance since the 1952 Cotton Bowl. The next year, the football team finished 10-1 (6-0 in the Southeastern Conference) and the basketball team won the NCAA championship.

With both the football and basketball teams playing to sellout crowds and drawing a big on-the-road following, Hagan has not been content, but has made Wildcat games even more enjoyable by personally designing and selecting the Wildcat Mascot, which has captured the fancy of UK fans everywhere, and by granting permission for publication of "The Cats' Pause," a unique weekly tabloid devoted strictly to UK sports.

Physical improvements during Hagan's regime as athletics director include a 110-yard Astro-Turf football practice field, modern equipment in both the Shively Sports Center and Memorial Coliseum weight rooms, open-type lockers, a new pressbox and new dugouts at the baseball field, and a revamped tennis complex with additional seating and modernized offices. He has also added a strength coach to work with all sports and funds for the popular Parcourse Fitness Trail.

Offices in Memorial Coliseum have been modernized and Hagan is looking forward to the day when he can put on the drawing board an Olympic swimming pool, and plans for the expansion of Commonwealth Statistics

Hagan also has been an advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program, feeling "a genuine commitment to provide all the academic support and encouragement we can to help our athletes leave our campus with a college education and a degree."

On the personal side, Hagan received one of his highest individual honors in 1978 when he became the first University of Kentucky basketball player to be installed in the Naismith Memorial National Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

The road to that honor began at Owensboro, Kentucky, where he established a then state high school tournament record of 41 points, which was recently voted the greatest individual performance by anyone in the history of that tournament, in leading the Red Devils to victory over Lafayette in the 1949 championship game.

At UK, he played on teams that won 86 of 91 games and an NCAA championship (1951). The 1954 team, undefeated in 25 games, elected not to participate in the national tournament.

Hagan set a dozen Southeastern Conference records and an NCAA record of 528 rebounds as a junior. He averaged 24 points a game, led the nation in rebounding, and



scored a UK record of 51 points against femple in 1954.

He was a member of Sigma Nu Fraternity, Student Government, Baptist Student Union, Fellowship of Christian Athletes and twice was selected among the top ten students in the College of Education.

After graduating from UK in 1954, Hagan served two years at Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D. C., as a commissioned officer. He led the base to two World Wide Air Force championships and won All-Service honors both years.

During ten years with the St. Louis Hawks, he ranked high among 11 players on the league scoring charts with 12,433 points in 672 games for an 18.5 mark and was selected to play in five East-West All-Star games and was named to the NBA second All-League team twice. He hit over .790 from the free throw line seven years in a row and held the NBA record for most field goals scored in a single quarter (12).

The Hawks won the Western Division six times during Hagan's playing career there and defeated the Boston Celtics in 1958 for the world championship. Hagan was All-Pro in the NBA in 1957-62, inclusive.

He received his M.S. in education from Washington University in 1958.

In 1965, a Herbert Hoover Boys Club of America was organized in Owensboro and named the Cliff Hagan Boys Club of America.

He then joined the Dallas Chapparals as player-coach and was selected as the 1958 Texas Professional Coach of the Year. When he left Dallas, he was only 92 points shy of a regular-season career total of 15,000 points.

In 1974, he was named to the Hall of Fame Magazine's All-America second-team for the 1951-1973 period, to the Orlando (Fla.) Sentinel Star's All-Time Southeastern Conference first team, and the All-Time top collegiate player in the State of Kentucky by Inside Kentucky Sports Magazine. In 1975, he was named to the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame, was inducted into the UK Alumni Association Hall of Distinguished Alumni and was a recipient of the University of Kentucky Centennial "K" Medallion tendered by the UKAA for past athletic accomplishments, during UK's Centennial Year observance.

He is married to the former Martha Milton of Owensboro. They have four children: Mrs. Barry "Lisa" Thaxton of Lexington, Mrs. Jim "Laurie" Hill of West Liberty, and Amy and Kip, both of Lexington.

TONIGHT'S GAME

Kentucky vs. Tennessee

RECORDS: Kentucky, 18-1 Tennessee, 17-4

SERIES RECORD: Tennessee leads, 12-2

LAST MEETING: Kentucky won, 80-74, in SEC Tournament Final last year

Just the mere mention of a Kentucky-Tennessee game and the blood begins to boil. The rivalry is so intense for Kentucky fans, that every time the Lady Kats fine record is mentioned, it is followed by, "Yeah, but we haven't played Tennessee yet."

The game is far more than just a battle between rivals, however. Kentucky is ranked fourth, Tennessee sixth. Both teams are 4-0 in the Southeastern Conference East Division. The winner of this game will be in sole possession of first place.

Tennessee is led in scoring by Tanya Haave, a junior forward who averages 17.3 points a game. Mary Ostrowski, another junior forward, contributes 14.1 points and 8.2 rebounds. Sophomore center Paula Towns adds 12.8 points and 7.6 rebounds.

Kentucky is led in scoring and rebounding by All-America center Valerie Still, with averages of 25.4 and 12.4. Guards Lea Wise and Patty Jo Hedges are next in scoring at 13.1 and 12.4. Freshman forward Leslie Nichols adds 10.9 points and 7.3 rebounds, while junior forward Lisa Collins, playing strong lately, adds 7 points and 4 rebounds.

Kentucky leads the Southeastern Conference in field goal percentage (53.1) and Tennessee is second (51.8). Tennessee is first in free throw percentage (75.7) and Kentucky is second (71.9).

Last year, Kentucky was favored in the teams' first meeting in Knoxville, but Tennessee won 81-76. In the second game in Lexington, Tennessee was favored and won 65-61. But in the finals of the SEC tournament, Kentucky avenged both losses with an 80-74 victory.

Leslie Nichols wasn't there, but she's excited about having a part in the rivalry now. "Everyone is excited," she said. "I've lived in Lexington all my life and all I've heard is 'Beat Tennessee.' We are all very fired up. Not only is this an important SEC game, but we also want to make our fans happy and gain some respect in this series."

LADY KAT FEATURE

Lea Wise: Finally, the Recognition Arrives

When Lea was named All-Southeastern Conference as a junior last season, Lady Kats fans felt it was recognition long overdue. For three seasons Lea and running mate Patty Jo Hedges had helped turn the Kentucky basketball program around. From a 13-16 record prior to their arrival at UK, Lea and PJ teammed with center Valerie Still to vault the Lady Kats into the top 20 during their freshman season. And that is where they have been ever since.

Each year Kentucky has improved, and this season, the Lady Kats have been in the top 10 all year. Currently they are fourth, and Lea is a major reason for their success.

"She has shown a lot of leadership and has been one or our most consistent players this season," said Kentucky Coach Terry Hall.

Lea is Kentucky's second leading scorer with a 13.1 average. She is hitting over 50 percent of her shots from the field, and was leading the Southeastern Conference in free throw percentage last week at 89.4.

And the recognition continues to come. She was named Most Valuable Player of the Lady Kat Invitational Tournament in January and is considered a candidate for All-SEC and All-America honors this year.

Patty Jo, who has teammed with Lea for what many consider the best back court in America the past four years, is glad her friend is making a name for herself.

"Lea is not only an outstanding shooter, but she's also been crucial to the team in her ability to settle us down when we need it," PJ said. "This year we've been less erratic than in the past, but always before when we got really wild, she did a great job in calming us down."

Lea has not only been an outstanding player for Kentucky, but she has also been good for the Lady Kats' image. Her wholesome good looks and long blonde hair have attracted admiring looks throughout the country, as evidenced by the fan mail that pours into the school Sports Information Office. Just as Lea is a factor in Kentucky's high national ranking, she also is a big reason for the Lady Kat's reputation as "the prettiest team in America."


A telecommunications major, Lea hopes to become a sportscaster after graduation. She is a native of Lexington and a graduate of Lafayette High School.
