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
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
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# JERRY CLAIBORNE



### **Back at his Old Kentucky Home**

When the head football coach's job became vacant for the first time in 10 years last December, a blue-ribbon committee was assembled to find a man who would bring a positive, new outlook to the University of Kentucky.

The group poured over resumes and interviewed a number of candidates in order to come up with the ideal man.

Their overwhelming choice: home-grown Jerry Claiborne.


Claiborne not only brought along a ledger gushing with wins and bowl invites, included in his baggage was a reputation cleaner than clean.

A devout churchman, the 54year-old product of Hopkinsville



impresses everyone as just what he is: solid as a rock.

It made the transition much



easier that Claiborne was a son of the Commonwealth and a successful alumnus of the University.

Claiborne was a multi-sport standout at Hopkinsville and went on to UK to play for Paul "Bear" Bryant, playing end on offense and safety on defense. He set a school record with nine pass interceptions on the 1949 Orange Bowl team.

He served his coaching apprenticeship at Augusta Military Academy, UK, Texas A&M, Missouri and Alabama before landing his first head coaching job in 1961 at Virginia Tech.

All he did at VPI in 10 seasons was compile a won-lost record of 61-39-2 and give the Gobblers their first Southern Conference championship in the history of the school.

He spent one year as an assistant at Colorado before tackling another delicate operation at Maryland, victim of seven straight losing campaigns when Claiborne arrived in 1972.

His first Terrapin squad finished square (5-5-1) and then the fun began. At the end of the Claiborne decade at College Park, the tally read 77-37-3 and three Atlantic Coast Conference trophies had been added to the shelf.

Three times Claiborne was named ACC Coach of the Year at Maryland and in 1974, the Sporting News honored him as National Coach of the Year.

He had 38 players named allconference in his 10 seasons and developed All-America selections Paul Vellano, Randy White, Joe Campbell, Steve Mike-Mayer and Dale Castro.


In addition to serving as president of the Football Coaches Association (1980), Claiborne found time to participate in coaching activities from Ramstein, Germany to Tokyo, Japan, conducting various clinics and coaching in all-star games.

He has contributed his support to many charity drives, serving in Maryland as Chairman of the Prince George's County Cancer Crusade and while at VPI he was state chairman of the Virginia Cancer Crusade. He is an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and has served as a deacon in the Baptist

Mrs. Claiborne, the former Faye Hooks of Hopkinsville, is also a UK grad. The Claibornes have two sons, David and Jonathan, and two daughters, Katie and Eileen. Claiborne was born August 26, 1928.

CLIFF HAGAN **Athletics Director** 

The University of Kentucky has made great strides toward academic excellence since Dr. Otis A. Singletary assumed the office of president in August, 1969.

Two professional schools—dentistry and pharmacy—have been ranked among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history and mathematics have gained national attention. The UK library now ranks among the best in the Southeast and a large portion of the worldwide research related to tobacco and health is now done at UK.

Dr. Singletary had previously served as chancellor at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, executive vice chancellor for academic affairs in the University of Texas system and director for the Job Corps for the Office of Economic Opportunity. He holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State Uni-

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land-grant in-stitution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 12 years he has been president, the University has grown to more than 23,400 students on the Lexington campus and about 21,000 students in UK's 13 community colleges, and the University has become one of the major research institutions in the

country

A native of Gulfport, Miss., Dr. Singletary is the author of two books and several monographs. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa

He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot and Ken-

He also enjoyed a fine pro basketball career, playing with the St. Louis Hawks for 10 years and then the Dallas Chapparals.

He is married to the former Martha Milton. They have four children: Mrs. Barry "Lisa" Thaxton of Lexington, Mrs. Jim "Laurie" Hill of West Liberty, and Amy and Kip, both of Lexington. Hagan and his wife are natives of Owensboro.



of a record budget of \$6,397,685 to the UK Athletics Association Board of Directors are two of the most recent developments in the career of Cliff Hagan, now in his eighth year as Wildcat athletics director.

Continued growth in practically all phases of UK athletics has been a hallmark of Hagan's seven-year reign as UK's athletics director, with outstanding attendance at football and basketball games, increased attendance at Lady Kat basketball and men's baseball, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

Hagan, one of the great basketball players in UK history, joined the athletics staff in 1972 as an assistant to Harry C. Lancaster and became heavily involved in raising funds for Commonwealth Stadium and later for Rupp Arena. Hagan replaced Lancaster in July, 1975 as athletics director.

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

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The University of Kentucky now has three chancellors—the result of a major reorganization of the University.

They are:
—Art Gallaher, former UK vice president for academic affairs, is the new chancellor for the Lexington campus;

-Peter Bosomworth, former vice president for the Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, is the new chancellor of the Medical Center; and

—Charles Wethington, former vice president of the UK Community College System, is the new chancellor of the system.

The three chancellors report to UK President Otis Singletary.

"Our basic objective in this reorganization is to focus more clearly the responsibility and authority for the day-to-day administration of the three academic sectors on the chancellors," said Singletary.

The UK chancellors' responsibilities in their areas will include planning, program academic budgeting, student policies, business services and personnel program administration.

After holding tenured teaching posts at the universities of Houston and Nebraska, Gallaher came to UK in 1963. He has been chair-man of the UK anthroplogy department and acting director and deputy director of the UK Center for Developmental Change.

In 1972, Dr. Gallaher was named dean of the UK College of Arts and Sciences, a post he held until 1980 when he was appointed UK vice president for academic affairs.

Dr. Bosomworth came to UK in 1962 as professor and chairman of the new department of anesthesiology in the UK College of Medicine. He has served on numerous medical boards and councils throughout Kentucky and the U. S. He was named vice president of the UK Medical Center in 1970.

Dr. Wethington began his career at UK in 1964 as an instructor of educational psychology. He was acting director of UK's Lexington Technical Institute in 1966-67 and was named the first director of the Maysville Commun-


ity College in 1967.
In 1971, Dr. Wethington began a nine-year term as assistant vice president for the UK Community College System and was promoted to vice president in 1980.



Win-hungry Kentucky plays its third Big Eight conference opponent in as many weeks this afternoon and Wildcat fans are hopeful the offense gets points on the board earlier than in losses to Kansas State and Oklahoma.

The 'Cats have scored all of their 17 points in the fourth quarter and have been outscored 35-0 in the first three stanzas.

Tailback George Adams came off the bench to run for 87 yards last week against Oklahoma, including a 55-yard run that led to Kentucky's only TD. Adams and John Gay will carry the load at tailback now that Pete Venable has been suspended for the season.

Wildcat QB Randy Jenkins has completed 67% of his passes for 381 yards in two games, but has thrown four interceptions and only one touchdown. Jenkins had a tough day against an aggressive Oklahoma secondary a week

ago.

Kentucky's defense will face a more balanced attack in Kansas. The Jayhawks have rushed for 331 yards and passed for 335 in two games. Kansas was upset in its opener with Wichita State, 13-10, but bounced back to defeat Texas Christian last week, 30-19.

Jayhawk coach **Don Fambrough** discounts the fact UK has already lost to two Big Eight schools.

"Whenever you have a coaching change, it takes time to make adjustments," Fambrough said this week. "Kentucky is the type of team that will improve with each game.

"I'm very impressed with their quarterback, Randy Jenkins. He is a fine leader. This is basically the same team that gave us all we wanted at our place last year," Fambrough added.

"They went to a bowl last year and most of their people are back," surmises UK head coach Jerry Claiborne. "They have one of the best kicking games in the country."

Quarterback Frank Seurer will direct the KU offense. He has completed 56% of his passes for 335 yards. Tailback Dino Bell leads Kansas with 117 yards in two games, a 3.8 average per carry.

Kentucky's main task is to keep a mental sharpness despite two disappointing losses.


"You can get used to losing and you can get used to winning," says Claiborne. "We've got to get in that winning track. Our players cannot get their heads down.

"We've just got to work hard and eliminate our mistakes. Our fans deserve a winner and I hope we can give them a win against Kansas."

The Wildcats lost defensive guard **Dave Thompson** for the season last week via a knee injury. **Don Roe** suffered a hyper-

extended elbow against OU but might return today at defensive end. Defensive tackle Jeff Smith and tailback Lawrence "Choo Choo" Lee have yet to see action this season.

SERIES HISTORY: Kansas has won all three meetings with Kentucky, 14-10 in 1975, 37-6 in 1976 and 21-16 last year. Quarterback Nolan Cromwell and running back Laverne Smith starred as the Jayhawks won the first meeting in 1975 at Lexington, 14-10.

LAST MEETING: Sept. 26, 1981 at Lawrence, Kan.—Kansas won 21-16 on a furious fourth-quarter comeback but lost running back Kerwin Bell in the second quarter with a season-ending knee injury.

Trailing 16-8, the Jayhawks recovered a Wildcat fumble on the KU 31 and seven plays later, Garfield Taylor scored a three-yard TD run. The Jayhawks drove 65 yards for the winning score with Walter Mack diving in from two yards out. Kentucky got field goals from Tom Griggs and Rick Strein and Randy Jenkins threw an 18-yard scoring pass to Jim Campbell in the second quarter.

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# THE PRIDE OF STICKLEYVILLE, VA.

Let's be polite about this because Randy Jenkins is such a nice guy, but Randy DOES come from a small town.

How small is it?, you ask.

The UK media guide lists Jenkins' hometown as Stickleyville, Va. If there is a Stickleyville, nobody has bothered to tell Rand-McNally. You just plain can't find it in the atlas.

"There's nothing there but a grade school and two stores," says Jenkins, cracking a smile.

We'll take Jenkins' word that Stickleyville is in the southwest corner of Virginia, just a fly pattern away from the Kentucky and Tennessee state boundaries.

The college recruiters didn't exactly trip over themselves to watch the standout quarterback for tiny Pennington Gap High. Randy remembers about 600 kids went to school there. He was class president and everything.

This is not to suggest Jenkins was ignored. It's just that single-A football in Virginia is not the highest-regarded level of play in the nation.

A college coach holds his breath when he signs a prospect from an obscure high school playing against poor competition. Of course, we also need to remind ourselves Herschel Walker came from a Class A high school in Wrightsville, Ga.

A number of second tier schools were very interested in Jenkins and Kentucky had shown more than a "passing" interest all along. Tennessee got involved during his senior season and even North Carolina got around to talking to him after it was too late.

"Kentucky was the first to contact me during my junior year and Tennessee and North Carolina talked to me when I was a senior," Jenkins remembers.

In fact, UK almost lost out to the arch-rival Vols on the multisport prep star.

"I almost went to Tennessee,"
Jenkins admits. "It's about an hour closer to Knoxville from Stickleyville."

Credit Cawood Ledford with an assist at this point. Jenkins ex-

plains:

"I had always been a Kentucky fan as long as I could remember. There was always Kentucky Basketball on the radio and that swayed me. I came up for a couple of football games when I was younger and I came here a couple of times my senior year. "I like the people, the com-

munity and the program."

It's been a long road to where Randy Jenkins is now-UK's starting quarterback, period.

A broken ankle against Maryland ended his first freshman season in 1979 after only three games. He was granted hardship status and got to be a freshman all over again in 1980, splitting playing time with QBs Larry Mc-

Crimmon and Terry Henry.

Last year, Jenkins shared the job with Henry and threw for 1,079 yards, even though opposing defenses had a pretty good idea he was putting it up.

"It was tough with that system," Jenkins recalls. "Terry was the runner and I was the passer. Teams would bring in an extra defensive back when I came in because they knew I was throwing."

Jenkins has seen good times and bad times in his career.

"Beating Tennessee last year was my biggest thrill. There's a lot of Tennessee fans in my hometown. I'd probably say losing to Alabama last year was the lowest moment. We were ahead of them and we played so well, especially in the second half. They scored, we lost that kickoff, and it was




Jenkins says even though the Wildcats have had a rough start,


the attitude is definitely upbeat.
"We know we've got talent,"
says Jenkins. "It's just a matter
of eliminating mistakes. Our offense is better."


At 6-1, 195 pounds, Jenkins has enough height to pass from the pocket and is strong enough to play when the action gets a little close. His speed is a little better than average, probably a consistent 4.65 or 4.7 in the 40-yard dash.

He has started about a dozen games for UK and he's only a junior. Although Babe Parilli's career record of 4,669 yards passing looks safe, Jenkins will stack up some impressive stats before his career is finished. The record he would like most to achieve is a winning record.




### George Adams Tailback

### Kevin McClelland Linebacker







KU students come from every county in Kansas, every state in the Union, and from more than 100 foreign countries. Fall enrollment in 1981 was 26,367. There were 22,105 students enrolled on the Lawrence campus, 1,885 enrolled off campus and 2,377 enrolled at the College of Health Sciences in Kansas City and

During his first year as chan-cellor of the University of Kansas, Gene A. Budig has been very involved in the athletics department. He has personally visited with football players, selected a new athletics director, and thrown out the first pitch to open the KU baseball season.

But the chancellor's real love is teaching. Voted the most outstanding teacher at West Virginia University in the spring of 1981, he has taught every semester for the past 16 years. A professor of higher education and journalism, he has authored more than 50 articles for scholarly publications. The 42-year-old Nebraska native will begin his second year of teaching a graduate seminar at

KU this fall.

Budig has impressive credentials as an administrator, once heading Illinois State University and later West Virginia University. Each of these major universities has enrollments of more than 21,000 students. During the past 10 years, Dr. Budig has been responsible for the administration of

about \$1.3 billion of public funds. Jim Lessig, the tenth athletics director in the history of the University, arrived at Kansas with a unique variety of experience.

His successes range from alumni activities and fund raising to coaching to radio and television announcing.

Lessig was named athletics director on February 12, 1981, fol-

lowing a three-year tenure as AD at Bowling Green State University. At Bowling Green, he was responsible for a program governing 24 sports and involving 750 athletes.

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### DON FAMBROUGH

There can be no reservations concerning the success the University of Kansas experienced in 1981. Nor can there be any qualms that Don Fambrough was the inspiration and driving force behind the Jayhawks' prosperous season.

An 8-4 regular season mark—best in 13 years—a 4-3 Big Eight record—tops since 1973 and a Hall of Fame Bowl appearance highlighted the Fambrough-led Jayhawks in '81.

Both wire services selected Fambrough Big Eight Coach of the Year. Fambrough never received the award in either his first or second tenure as KU's head coach.

Fambrough, who is in his 31st year on the Kansas staff, was first



appointed head man in 1971 succeeding Pepper Rodgers. Before that he served 19 years as an assistant at KU. Fambrough's first tenure lasted four seasons and included a 1973 Liberty Bowl appearance and 7-4-1 record. Fambrough stepped down after the 1974 season but returned to the head coaching job in 1979.

Fambrough grew up in Longview, Texas and played football at the University of Texas before World War II and transferred to Kansas in 1946 to finish his career.

The 59-year-old Fambrough began his eighth season with an overall record of 34-42-3. His

non-conference mark is 16-13-1 while in the Big Eight he stands 18-29-2. During his stay at KU, he's recruited more than 20 players who are currently active in the National Football League.

It doesn't help head coach Don Fambrough to have tailback Kerwin Bell on the sideline today because of an NCAA eligibility ruling that forced KU to hold Bell out of the first three games of the '82 season.

Bell, who gained 1,114 yards in a superlative freshman season in 1980, suffered a knee injury against Kentucky last season and missed the remaining nine games of the '81 campaign.

His replacement, **Garfield Tay- lor**, netted 728 yards to lead his team and place sixth in the Big Eight last season. Taylor has been slowed by injuries this season, making way for Kerwin's brother, **Dino Bell**.

At fullback is **E. J. Jones**, a 6-0, 210-pound junior who is a former linebacker.

The showpiece of the Jayhawk offense is quarterback **Frank Seurer** (SIGH-er), one of seven KU players from Huntington Beach, Calif.

Seurer passed for 1,199 yards and four TDs last season.

"There is no question Frank is the finest quarterback in the conference and I feel one of the top quarterbacks in the entire coun-

try," says Fambrough.

The Jayhawks have a typically huge Big Eight offensive line, led by 6-6, 260-pound guard K. C. Brown, only a junior.

From tackle to tackle, the KU offensive front averages 6-4½,

261 pounds.

Seurer has All-Big Eight flanker

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Wayne Capers to depend on for big catches. Capers caught 36 passes for 629 yards last season and scored all four of Kansas' passing touchdowns.


Kansas' kicking game rates among the best anywhere. Punter Bucky Scribner is a two-time All-Big Eight pick, averaging 43.9 yards per try over two years. Junior placekicker Bruce Kallmeyer set a league record by hitting 12 of 14 field goal attempts last season, including five against Nebraska.

The Jayhawk defense was tough enough to give KU a third place finish in the Big Eight last year (4-3 record), and the KU secondary ranked second in the league in pass defense.

Kansas lost both its linebackers and cornerbacks from last year's team but juniors **Mike Arbanas** and **Eddie Simmons** have assumed starting roles at linebacker.

Kansas has an experienced defensive front with size. Tackles **Broderick Thompson** (6-6, 275) and **Mark Wilbers** (6-4, 255) will be tough to move.

Roger Foote, a former prep All-American, is the Jayhawks' ace

When they decided to seek election as president and vice president of the student body, Dinkle and Bradford pledged to voice student needs.

To determine student feelings, they asked the students in a survey to name major issues and concerns.

"We found students wanted their government to be more accesible, more aware of immediate concerns," said Dinkle, who is student government president

is student government president.
Concerns they found included
the need for a speakers bureau,
more pep rallies, parking and less
restrictions on residence halls.
And then there are student concerns of an international nature.

"The growing number of UK students concerned with placing a freeze on the nuclear arms race makes this movement the fastest growing one on campus," Dinkle said

David Bradford, the vice president, is very much involved in a campaign to change visiting hours in the UK residence halls. And while Bradford has been meeting with UK students and administrators on that issue, Dinkle has been meeting with Lexington Mayor Scotty Baesler on the removal of parking meters around the campus to provide additional free parking.


In addition, Dinkle recently returned from a week in Washington, D. C., where he met with Kentucky congressmen and U. S. Department of Education officials concerning student financial aid.

The ever-increasing costs of higher education, coupled with the shortage of federal funding has led the UK Student Government Association to concern it-

self more and more with providing new job opportunities for students (such as the newly-formed UK Student Agencies Association) and to work with the UK Office of Continuing Education for Women to provide day-care facilities for non-traditional students.

"We also have been meeting with Dr. Peter Bosomworth, chancellor for the Medical Center, and Jean Cox of the Student Health Service, to consider a proposal that a mandatory fee be charged to each student for health service." Participation in the service is voluntary now.

"We will not as a governing body make the decision," Dinkle said. "Because it concerns each student, we will take it to the stu-

dents in the form of a special referendum."




The UK staff collects data on hundreds of high school football prospects each year and the work is steady year-round

The bands would like to invite you to sing along with us to make this the most special part of today's performance.




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
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### ASSISTANT COACHES

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
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#### DICK REDDING Administrative Asst. to Coach Claiborne

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### STADIUM INFORMATION



First Aid-The University of Kentucky provides, for your convenience and welfare, First Aid Stations on the ground level on both sides of the stadium. On the West side is Room 156, the East side, Room 172. An ambulance is available at each corner of the stadium. Twenty doctors on duty are spotted in each section and are easily accessible to Boy Scouts and ushers. Two golf cart ambulances are equipped for immediate aid and located on the second level on each side of the stadium. Persons with any type of chronic medical problem are requested to leave their name and seat location with the nurse on duty at either First Aid station. A person in need of assistance with a health emergency should report the situation immediately to the nearest Boy Scout or usher.

Cardiac Care—In cooperation with the University Medical Services, the University of Kentucky

provides a cardiac resuscitation program.

Crowd Noise Penalty—Uncontrolled crowd noise can result in a five-yard penalty against your team. Please observe quarterback and official's signals for quiet.

No Horns—Horns are not permitted in Commonwealth Stadium and will be picked up at the gates. Be considerate and allow your neighbor to enjoy the game. Keep portable radios at a low volume. Liquors—Alcoholic beverages are strictly prohibited within the stadium as are all food and drink containers including hard surfaced materials of any type—bottles, cans, thermos bottles, ice bags, ice chests and any object related to above. Gate personnel are instructed to enforce this rule in the interest of safety.

Signs—Signs and barriers are restricted for Commonwealth Stadium in accordance with University regulations and policies established by the Public Safety Division.

#### A HISTORY

Commonwealth Stadium, the University of Kentucky's football facility, is located on an 86-acre tract on the Kentucky Experimental Station Farm grounds south of the main campus.


Completed in 1973, the concrete and steel cantilevered structure replaced Stoll Field, where Wildcat football teams had played since their beginning.

Constructed by Huber, Hunt and Nichols, Inc., the facility has a capacity of 50,000 sideline seats, with end zone bleachers swelling the total to 58,000.

This is Kentucky's 10th season at Commonwealth. The Wildcats beat Virginia Tech 31-26 in the first game in their new facility on Sept. 15, 1973.

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


