UK student body seems to be rather indifferent about the whole thing, the fact remains that the proposed Student Government budget for the year calls for the expenditure of an astoundment of money—some of it, as we see it, in the

a pretty frivolous manner.

At this writing the pending bill is still in the hands of Acting President Cooper, who has the power to slash any appropriation which seems to him unwarranted. Because one proposal in particular is—or so it seems to us—unwise, we hope he slashes it to the bone. We refer to the \$1500 carmarked for the Social com-

This amount, we are informed by various members of the Finance group, which authorized the appropriation, will in all probability be distributed thus: for committee operating exuses and minor functions, \$100; for Junior om, \$700; for the Senior Ball, \$700.

Even if the proposed budget would permit the student body to spend this money and still run in the black, we would be against such an appropriation. The fact is, however, that it is taking the \$GA\$ into the at least theoretical red. But that is not our immediate point, so

red. But that is not our immediate point, so we will take it up later.

The point we do want to make is this; that \$700 which will be spent on the Senior Ball will be wasted-both literally and figuratively. Anyone who has ever been to one of these so-called "traditional" affairs—which really are, it seems to us, nothing more than anti-climaxes to the abeays ardnoss examgraduation vecks—will know whereof we speak. They are as a rule so tiresome, so atmospherically stuffy, so sparsely artended by those whom they supposedly are to honor, that they would be better off not given at all.

at all.

Therefore we maintain that as long as this 5700 seems destined to be spent anyway, that some worthy, progressive SGA project (such as underclassmen scholarships or Mr. Burrus medical aid fund or some sound, practicable loan fund) should be established with the appropriated amount. In the long run, it seems to us, sfore good would come from it, dollar for dollar, than could come from the best Senior Ball imagrinable.

The appropriation for the Junior Prom. consistently the best dance of the year, should, we think, be left as it is. It will be recalled that last year's Prom cost the students only \$556 and they had Andy Kirk's orchestra at that. Cerainly then, if expenditures have anything to do with the success or failure of a college dance, an allowance increase of \$150 would more than insure the success of the 1941 affair.

Mose Than A QUESTION or DANCES However, there now arises a question as to whether the SGA can afford to spend what is being appropriated—even when the Senior Ball is sticken from the list—and still establish loan funds. The budget for 1940-11 calls for the expenditure of approximately \$4,100, which is admost \$650 more than the prospective income will provide for.

In receives, theoretically, about \$900 per year from a fund—originally \$3,620—which was carried over from the old class system of government. (This amount, now sliced by withdrawals to approximately \$2,300, constitutes the governments) ernment "surplus" which various agencies— among them The Kernel—advocated earlier in the semester be converted into a scholarship or loan fund). However, this was advocated only "noan tundy. However, this was advocated only with the understanding that the remaining SCA activities could be financed by the annual in-come from student fees, a thing which now ap-pears almost impossible. As the budget stands now, the SGA will go almost \$1,600-or about \$700 in excess of the theoretical limit—into the "surplus" fund.

But there are other reasons, even bevo gigantic dance-band appropriation, why the SGA is going to have to run in the red in the future unless either: 1) the demands on it and lessened, or 2) its income is upped. This sit-uation has been brought about because the SGA has been forced to accept not only the finan-cial burden of the old class officers system and the added expenses of the new expanded sys-tem, but also those of the Association of Wo-men Students. In other words, it has had thrust upon it an expense increase of approximately \$1,500 over the old system of government, with an increased income of only about \$725. In a few years at this rate (i.e., as soon as the "surplus" is used up), the SGA will be in the red for

Judging from these figures (which were ob-ained from the Finance committee and which have been confirmed by the SGA President), we must conclude that if the Student Governwhich it is capable, one of three things must be done: 1) The Senior Ball must be abolished and the Social committee appropriation sliced to the neighborhood of \$800, or 2) seniors must berships in the Alumni association, or 3) there must be an increase in the amount of SGA fees collected at each registration

In our opinion, the best solution to the impending dilemma would be to slash off the in nocuous Senior Ball. This would balance the budget. Next, there are a few additional item in the budget (namely, the "class reunion," "printing," "miscellaneous expenses," "vocation printing insequaneous expenses, vocation in al guidance conference, 'etc.' which can and studies should be cut considerably.
