

Kentucky is heavily favored to win its sixth consecutive game and fifth straight homecoming contest when a plays the Gobblers of Virginia Tech in tomorrow night's clash at Commonwealth Stadium. VPI's season has not gone as well as head coach Jimmy Sharpe expected Before the

siderable optimism at Tech. Sharpe, 37, had led the Gobblers to 8-3 and 6-5 records the last two years.

He also had 38 lettermen returning and called last year's spring practice, "The finest I've ever been around. Barring a catastrophe, we'll at least have a winning record," he said.

The Gobblers played well in their season opener, losing 27-6 to highly touted Texan

A&M. They have not stopped losing, however, climaxing the streak in an upset 17-14 loss at Richmond last week.

VPI, currently 1.4-1, uses a variable wishbone offense, which has produced only 298 total yards a game. VPI's Roscoe Cole, who gained1, 119 yards last year, has picked up only 428 yards in 88 carries throught the first six games this year.

VPI, played for and started his coaching career for Alabama head coach Bear Bryant when he beame one of the earliest and most enhusiastic exponents of the wishbone attack.

Defensively, the Gobblers are very thin at several positions. However, inebacker Jerry Sheehan was named national Lineman of the Week for his 1s tackles and to assists in VPI's only win, a 178 victory over William & Mary.





# Acting suffers little despite economical version of script in UK's 'Macbeth'

This is the age of the economy car. The little bugs roam the city streets giving maximum performance with roam the city streets giving maximum performance with the bare minimums of gasoline, time and energy. So it was with the UK Theatre's opening night performance of Macbeth. The characters roamed the stage giving generally excellent performances with only the

bare minimum Shakespeare script.

Director John B. Lynaugh took a pair of scissors to the classic tragedy before rehersals began and presented his cast with a scaled down adaption of the The director has play. The director has reduced the drama to a single story line, removing the sub-plots and minor stories that Shakespeare was so fond of including in his works.

The UK production's major problem is with the revised script. Although reworking Shakespeare with the idea of

therefore more understandable is noble, Lynaugh has not hit on the right formula.

The adaptation is The adaptation is too rushed and the audience is left grasping in its wake. The action flys by quickly and the audience is left struggling to grasp what has happened before thenext scene unfolds.

But the script was one of the very few trouble spots in the evening. Bob Brock and Locky Lambert gave ex-cellent performances as the tragic figures, Macbeth and Lady Macbeth. The pair moved easily as the characters and filled their speeches with deep emotions, overcoming the awkwardness of Shakespearian rhyme. of Shakespearian rhyme.

For the most part the pronounciation was clear and distinct with none of the cast members having any recognizable problems in throwing their voice to the back of the Guignol Theatre.

The dialogue has traditionally been a killer of actors and actresses at-tempting to perform the works of the Victorian

At times, especially when the show was taking a dramatic turn, the speakers tended to rush their lines tended to rush their lines— blurring their words for the crowd. It was especially true in the long soliloquies, but this can be dismissed as opening night jitters. Lambert was hardest hit by

Lambert was hardest hit by the problem during the scene in which Lady Macbeth goes crazy. But it really didn't matter as she twisted and flung herself around the stage, leaving no doubt as to what was happening. The dialogue ended up as an unneeded extra for her performance of the scene.

Chip Sanders as Banquo and Rob Moore as Macduff also lent good performances to the company as the chief threats to Macbeth's position, while the three witches (Lisa Sihanek, Mary Bruce Blackburn and Cindy Loy) provided a vivid introduction to the past, present and future throughout the production. throughout the production.

Technically, the production was like a dream. From the moment the audience entered intothe auditorium, they just knew it was a tragedy. Gvozden Kopani's setloomed on the stage, casting mysterious shadows and providing a gloomy. providing a gloomy background to the treacheries of Macbeth and

Add to this the eerie lighting also designed by

Kopani and the result puts every horror show ever made to shame.

to shame.

In sharp contrast to this gloomy background were the beautiful costumes designed by Mary Stephenson.
Brilliant splashes of red and orange and blue, mixed with subtle browns and blacks, brought the characters away from the background, focusing the audience's attention on them from the start.

It wasn't until 1971's Every Picture Tells A Story that Stewart's solo career made an amazing upswing. The album yielded an immediate hit "Maggie May" and the record buying public was left with their mouths open as to how the raspy throated singer became so big so quickly.

The following winter, Stewart scored again, this time with the Faces. Thehit, "Stay With Me," gave the needed national exposure that the group needed. Oddly enough, the group never had another success, but Stewart's individual career kept on booming.

1972 yielded another gold album, Never A Dull Moment and another hit single, "You Wear It Well." Contract

disputes between Warners Mercury followed. and causing a two-year delay before the release of Stewart's next album. This was the 1974 work Smiler, after which Stewart was free to record fulltime for War-

It has been with Warners Brothers that Stewart enjoyed even more success. After a fall tour with the After a fall tour with the Faces, the group finally disbanded with Ron Wood going to the Rolling Stones and Stewart releasing Atlantic Crossing, possibly his finest album.

While the album never yielded any hits, his next work, A Night on the Town, thrust Stewart back to the top of the charts.


