Professor recounts racism in legal system

Joseph H. McMillian, professor law at the University of puisville, calls himself "an eter-

of law at the University of Louisville, calls himself "an eternal optimist."

McMillian spoke to a crowd of about 100 UK law students and faculty members on "Racism in the Legal System" in the UK College of Law courtroom yesterday.

"I believe in the power of God," McMillian said. "He will change things."

As a former educator in Michigan, McMillian was the first black elementary school teacher and the first black principal in the Grand Rapids public school system.

Before beginning his speech McMillian saked the audience to move and fill-in the seats near the front of the courtroom so he could see their eyes. He then began an intimate discussion with the audience, even revealing his own experiences with racism and the law.

Calling racism a growth indus-

the law.

Calling racism a growth industry, McMillian said racism exploits blacks and other people of color by providing cheap labor and used NAFTA and GATT as examples.

McMillian also addressed laws in Kentucky and amendents to the Constitution that, he thinks,

still promote racism. He sited the "Compromise Amendment" to the Constitution that legally made blacks human and asked UK law students to work toward the elimination of these types of laws and attitudes that still exist in the legal system.

When asked about the O.J. Simpson trial, McMillian called the trial a great divider of the

Simpson traia, "Accumina caided the trial a great divider of the races.

"I didn't even follow it," he said. "I've already been through it.

McMillian's 34 year-olds on is serving a 15 year prison sentence in Michigan. During the Million Man March, McMillian's son organized his own version of the march in his Michigan prison. McMillian said his son and fellow prisoners stood four feet apart for three hours in support of the march on Washington, D.C.

Calling racism a psychopathic illness, McMillian urged the audience to "...step up out of ignorance and move toward improvement of all people."

Universities, he said, feed legal,

rance and move toward improve-ment of all people."
Universities, he said, feed legal, medical and economic systems that promote racism. He chal-lenged the audience to look beyond laws that are based on one group being better than another because of skin color.

To help race relations at UK, McMillian suggested students form study groups to help educate themselves on issues of racism. Sadiqa Moore, a second-year law student, said the support shown for McMillian was a great day for the Black Law Students Association. "I think it was wonderful. He-did a great job. I enjoyed the entire speech," Moore said.

Sexism lives in law schools

Sexism is alive and thriving in American law schools even though nearly half their students are women, an American Bar Association panel found.

After reading the ABA's report, UK College of Law Dean David Shipley noted that the findings were shocking.

Sexism faced by women law students at UK is "not any worse" than at other national institutions, Shipley said. "But the report confirms instances of what I hear is going on."

Shipley said the problems facing female law students are often "statements in class which show insensitivity to gender, or insensitivity to that it's like to be a woman in law school."

"Often, things are said unconsciously," he said. "But that's no excusse. Unconscious or not, part of me feels like it's time to fight back and say, 'That's not right.'

We need to discuss the issue much more."

Students spend time with Ky. legislators

Some UK students go that extra mile to learn and gain valuable experience for future careers. And during this year's meeting of the General Assembly, students are going about 25 extra miles to work as interns for legislators in Frankfort. This semester, about 30 UK interns are working inside the state Capitol.

Melissa Henke, a political science sophomore, works in the office of Rep. Joe Barrows (D-Versuilles). She said that while some of her duties include going to committee meetings and answering construents' questions via mail or telephone calls, much of her time is consumed by simple observation.

"A lot of it is about observing, and that's the way (Barrows) feels—it's supposed to be an educational experience that you learn a lot about how politics works by watching it," Henke said.

Henke added that she feels a lot more informed about different issues and has a new respect for legislators and their jobs.

"You realize that there's a lot to being a legislator," she said. "It's a really time-consuming job to find out what your constituents want, and then to be informed on the

different issues that come up."
Barrows has given an intern the opportunity to work in his office for about the past 10 years.
"It's a good program," he said.
"If I hadn't thought there some value to it I would have cased to participate in it."
Barrows, who estimates that he's about 20-25 years removed from college, thinks the program should not be narrowed down to specific duties. He freely admits that he's not too good about delegating responsibilities.
"What I think is most beneficial to students is to see as many different aspects of the way the legislature operates," said Barrows, who adds he tries not to use the interns like "cheap labor."
Students working as interns take a three-hour course called Legislative Process, in addition to working in Frankfort all day Tuesday, Thursday and half a day on Wednesday.
Stephanie Baker, a political cance and journalism junior, said her experience working in the General Assembly has been useful.
"You can make contacts, and Tm learning lots of little things (about politics)," she said. Baker, who works for Rep. Joe Clarke (D-Danville), said working as an intern gives her a hands-on look at how government works.



"It's a good experience, and (interns) get to learn things that you read about in books." Baker said. "I don't really fully understand something until I can see it happening, and really go in and be kind of a part of everything."

Miller said that students benefit from the program in many ways.

"They gain experience by working with individual legislators and researching bills, communicating with constituents, dealing with special interests...," she said.

The chairman of the surgery department at the UK College of Medicine resigned yesterday.

Dr. Byron Young, a neurosurgeon, will remain on the faculty but no longer will be chairman of surgery, a joint statement from Young and the UK Medical Center said. He will continue as director of UK's Neurosciences Institute and to head UK's neurosurgery division, the statement said.

The statement did not address recent turmoil in the surgery department. More than a dozen UK surgeons have left since 1994, including last month's resignation of Dr. Michael Sekela, who was director of the medical center's heart-lung transplant program.

Patterson, the former two-time heavyweight champion and chairman of the commission since last summer, was appointed to a full term last week by the state legislature.

He said testing would begin as soon as possible.

"There was no proof before,"

Patterson said. "Now you have proof."

"People often assume that the younger men in law school act in a less sexist manner than senior male attorneys, but the evidence indicates just the opposite," the report said. "Those who look to our newest generation of attorneys to shape a gender-fair environment may be disappointed."

If law school enrollment of women continues at the current rate, they will comprise 40 percent of the legal profession by the year 2010, the report said.

But only 14 of the 178 law schools accredited by ABA have women as deans, and the percentage of female-tenured faculty is markedly low.

Most people never expect to meet the people they read about in textbooks. When Afshin Safavi presents his work at the Young Investigator Symposium in June, he will get to do just that.

Six people have been chosen nationwide to present their research at the symposium and compete for the Young Investigator Award. Only two are graduate students, while the others have doctoral degrees.

Safavi's research involves bêtaendorphins, which are involved in the degradation of insulin. Scientists previously believed that this

was their only function, but Safavi has evidence that the beta-endorphins also play a role in the immune system.

Safavi said that his main concern was not winning, but meeting people and having the opportunity to present his work.

'The audience will consist of many well-respected scientists, some of whose names appear in textbooks.

"Four years ago I was reading about these guys in textbooks, and now I get to go present in front of them," he said.

overview of his or her research,
followed by a discussion period.

toral work at a company or in an academic setting. He is also open to other possibilities that might arise, such as collaborating with other biochemists.

While Safavi has spent two years researching beta-endorphins, he stressed that the work is far from done.

"This is just the beginning of this project," he said.

He said that it is too early to tell exactly what practical applications his work might have, but that ultimately it might be used for therapy.

Safavi said people have been working on this protein for 40 years and that a great deal of research still needs to be done.

"Hopefully in another 40 years I can tell you the answer to what it does," he said.

North Carolina school limits World Wide Web access

N.C. State computer science freshman Scott Barbee got an unexpected response when he tried to access his World-Wide Web site last week. Instead of displaying his tantalizing collection of supermodel photographs, the screen replied with an ominous "403 Forbidden" heading on a dull gray background.

Officials at the Computing Center had blocked access to his

files. His site was only one of several that Bill Willis, associate provest of academic computing, said were interfering with the performance of NCSU's "WWW4" server, the machine responsible for delivering thousands of NCSU students" pages to the Internet.

Willis issued a memo on Jan. 23 that blamed the server's poor performance on the "ton of requests" sent by Internet browsers from all over the world to view web pages.

To combat the problem, Willis


computer network, provoked an immediate law suit against the government by free-speech advocates claiming that it violates the First Amendment.

Bittersweet romance

Ballet brings new life to classic play

Need a belated Valentine's Day gift for Need a belated Valentine's Day gift for that someone special? Teen angst and passion mesh for the Lexington Ballet's production of Romeo and Juliet, which comes to the Opera House tomorrow.

Choreographer Alain Charron has transformed one of Shakespeare's most famous plays into a powerful one-act ballet, with an endearing score by Serge Prokovfiev.

Romeo and Tuliet is a timeless story of

Romeo and Juliet is a timeless story of lovers driven by passion and fated by destiny. The well-known Shakespearean tale is set in 14th century Italy. The young lovers prove that true love does conquer all, including death.

"The ballet is filled with high drama, high romance and exciting fights," Charron said.

ron said.

Charron choreographed Romeo and Juliet exclusively for the Lexington Ballet in 1994 which was met with an unprecedented audience response.

Charron opted to return to Lexington to help in casting and altering movements to suit the new dancers.

The company and Charron decided to bring the famous play to stage again this season with a condensed version.

"Only the key scenes are included,"

Charron said.

He thinks audiences are not quite ready to watch a three or four hour production of *Romeo and Juliet*. The ballet is about one hour 15 minutes.

Charron believes audiences will respond favorably to a Shakespearean play translated into a ballet. Just as hearing a play usually improves our understanding of the work, "the movement provides more of an insight into the words," he

The dancers agree that audiences will have no problem understanding the

"The ballet is not just dancing," said Fu Xijun, who plays Romeo on Friday night and Saturday afternoon. "It is a mix-ture. It involves real life emotions." The dramatic nature of the ballet chal-lenges the performers.

"She is innocent and naive," said Jennique Wolfe of her character, Juliet. "She has to grow up inside in such a short period of time."

Wolfe added that being a part of such an emotional ballet helped her learn a lot about herself.

Emily Pfarrer, who plays Juliet at the Saturday evening performance, agreed.

Stephen Root is one of the weirdest, funniest, most inscrutable human beings on television. He's the owner of the station, along with a number of other enter-

prises. He's rich enough that, when Foley complains that he has been a little unfair to the members of the staff, he goes out them expensive sports cars to patch things up. But he's not obsessed by mak-

But he's not obsessed by making money. He rejects an extremely generous offer to buy the station when the secretary offers him \$50 to not sell. His reasoning? She doesn't make that much money, and her \$50 sacrifice means more to him than a bloodless multi-million dollar transaction. He has chosen to transaction. He has chosen to not crack down on the relation-ship between Foley and Tierney. I like the modernness of this decision — workplace romance, while still a difficult situation to navigate, is no longer the taboo it once was.

it once was.

Root's quest for a wife has
been a memorable running joke.
In one episode, he excitedly
walks into Foley's office, telling
him of his intention to seek the

hand of that sexy chanteuse, Melissa Etheridge, only to be crushed when Foley informs him of her lesbianism.

In another, he and a business-woman he met only hours earlier agree to get married — if they can hash out a mutually suitable

marriage contract.





Even the Chicago-based Sears, Roebuck and Co. held a contest for "Best Quilt Maker" in the country. One of every 2,000 women entered the contest, vying for the \$1,200 prize. Nearly 25,000 quilts were produced for the contest.

Sixty-three years later, aside from faded health and failed marriages some things have remained stoic. The quilts have endured. Commemorating the traditional designs, the UK Art Museum will exhibit 30 of the prize-winning quilts from that famous contest.
