PRINTING AUTHORITY TO LECTURE ON PRIVATE PRESSES

Roderick Cave, internationally famous authority on private press printing, will present a lecture, "The Private Press Revisited," in The Gallery of M.I. King Library - North, at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, March 9. The program, sponsored by the King Library Press and the U.K. Library Associates, is free and open to the public.

Cave is Foundation Professor of Librarianship at Victoria University, Wellington, New Zealand. He is author of the well-known historical survey, The Private Press, published in 1971, and the standard manual, Rare Book Librarianship, 1976. He is also a former editor of the annual bibliography Private Press Books.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF CHICAGO GRADUATE LIBRARY SCHOOL

The University of Chicago Graduate Library School will hold its forty-second Annual Conference, "The Publishing and Research Library Communities: Providing a Foundation for Dialogue," at the Conrad Hilton Hotel, Chicago, Illinois, on May 13-15, 1983.

This conference will bring scholarly, scientific, and literary publishers and editors from various sectors of publishing together with research library administrators, as well as scholar-observers who stand outside the publishing and library communities but take keen interest in them. Among the matters to be considered are the nature of, and changes in, scholarly investigation and the broader cultural climate; the current social, economic, and technological environments; and the implications of these for publishers and librarians--separately and in interaction--now and in the near future.

PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION FOR ACADEMIC RESEARCH LIBRARIANS

The University of Michigan School of Library Science offers a special program for persons preparing to be administrators in large university libraries. With financial assistance from the Council on Library Resources, the School will be awarding, for the third consecutive year, a limited number of fellowships to qualified applicants. These fellowships cover all tuition and fees and provide each student with a stipend of \$7,200 (\$360 per month for 20 months).
