POPULATION.

This issue contains eleven thousand four hundred and eighty-eight (11,488) names. Use the multiple $3\frac{1}{2}$ and it gives out city a population of 40,208. Use $3\frac{1}{3}$, the multiple used in 1888 by Prather & Snyder, and it would give us 38,293 $\frac{1}{3}$. The multiple 3 would give us 34464. As last issue the Directory contains a list of householders and business men arranged by streets and numbers. This arrangement has been greatly appreciated by the public. The publisher, however, has not been benefited by it pecuniarily to the extent that the feature deserved, considering the additional expense incurred and the time and labor required to produce it. The streets are given in alphabetical order and are described by giving the point of commencement and ending of each street and its general line of direction. The number on each building is given in numerical order, and opposite such number is placed the name of the occupant. Names of all intersecting and cross streets appear in the order of their occurrence, thus making an absolutely complete street directory. The Directories of the great Eastern Cities and those of Chicago, St. Louis and Cincinnati fail to present this excellent and most convenient feature.
