copy a very interesting
one, but it would not
be easy to assign a
market value for it. Per-
haps the present Lord
Coleridge, who has, I
believe, a considerable
number of books with
Coleridge's M. notes,
might be disposed to
purchase it. The Cale-
piamus is not of much
