vocabulary for is for the assistance which they will get from it in this business of editing. I hope, therefore, your mother will feel like depositing it in their hands.

I do not like to beg; but I could wish that eventually this dictionary might be preserved in our library at the Antiquarian.

I know I could have read your writing, but it does not follow that you could read mine.
