

Harriet Lee (1757-1851) daughter of John Lee (d 1781), actor and theatrical manager. She was born in London, as was her sister Sophia. From the proceeds of a play written by Sophia the sisters established a school at Bath. They both wrote. Harriet's principal work was the one mentioned in the letter, Canterbury Tales, to which Sophia contributed. They came out between 1797 and 1805, a series of twelve stories which became very popular. Lord Byron dramatized one of the tales, "Kruitzner", as Werner, or the Inheritance. Both sisters died at Clifton. Harriet is supposed to have been much admired by William Godwin, but she rejected his offer of marriage.
