I have your letter of the 18th making inquiry as to my possessions in connection with Charles Lamb.

I give below a brief memorandum which I have sketched off hastily:

First Edition of Elia

Bound in contemporary but unattractive stiff cover; covered with marble paper. Copy interesting because it is inscribed "To Rev. Dr. Cresswell with Elia's respects".

Note: Dr. Cresswell was the Vicar of Enfield, where Lamb and his sister resided at one time.

Last Essay of Essay of Elia

First edition in original boards, inscribed "To Rev. Dr. Cresswell with Elia's last respects".

In addition to the foregoing items, I have ordinary copies, not interesting, of, Mrs. Leicester's School, Tales of Shakespeare in two volumes, and Satan in Search of a Wife.
