My dearest Mother

Paris Sept 9th 1821.

France

We have to thank you for all the kind letters
that we have received from you while at Paris - we have
greatly enjoyed them - that they have amused and interested
us I am sure, I hope and think they have benefitted us -
We were very glad to learn from Noddy's letter received
yesterday, that you had received our balance one, & I hope now
two or three Paris ones - We often think and talk of you
and we all greatly long to see you - This morning we
have heard Mark Wilks & liked him very much
His text was of Galat 17 v. and he endeavoured to impress
upon his auditors the necessity of prompt & full & open
decision in our religious concerns - I afterwards heard
the Alzmann priack at the protestant church, but I
could understand but very little of what he said - When you
had Mr. Newton today? we think you said he was to return
and go so you will have had him - We yesterday visited
the Jardin des Plantes & the Sapostry manufactory, we
were much gratified by the sight of those places - the morning
was however rather an unfavourable one for the former
sight. We intend St. leaving this city on Tuesday next at 4
o'clock P.M. by the Brattle and depuches - it only takes 4
persons to the conducteur, so we hope to go much faster
than the Diligence, it will take as far as Valenciennes - we
think of sleeping there that on Wednesday night & getting to
Brussels next day - & on Friday we hope to visit the
field of Waterloo. We long for the letter, we shall expect to
receive at Brussels from your dear mother - my kindest
love to dear son & I am so obliged to you for letting
me come, I send it very much love from fond &
an ever dutiful, affectionate & obliged Son & wife

My dear Sir

In the Postscript to the letter of our
conjoint exertions to your good brother of yesterday
I informed you that dear Jacob was not quite well
from the difference of diet and heat of the weather however
rather bilious - this yesterday, he was indifferent
from the effect of the medicine he had taken - but
he has had an excellent night and is charmingly
well this morning - Our places are taken, our packed
Turkies &c prepared and this afternoon at 4^o we
hope to bid farewell to this gay City, and bend our
steps towards Calenecin - from thence we shall
cross into the Kingdom of the Netherlands, and look
towards Antwerp - The day is unusually fine,
the dear companions of my way very happy, and as
our journey will now be progressing towards
you, the happiness will increase as the distance
diminishes - We shall fully expect to find your
letters at Ghent & Calais & from us you will
probably hear as often as the post bears the
posting places where we may abide - I know that
you would prefer knowing that this fact had been
intimated to Sir George Ryley and now you will
rejoice with us that he is quite up & also to
our enjoyment of Place & Objects - In this instance you
must act with the appearance in the journeying, as in
Council with Council, you shall think best &
rest to you my confidence for the welfare of the
Office is in Cutt^o, whom you will assure of my
full confidence in his dispatch ^{to} to your direction
at this distance seems not possible -

We have all enjoyed our visit to Paris - and I
desire of the pleasure of seeing you in company with
us going to Geneva - On our walk yesterday we
met Mr. Gladstone of Cambridge, whom we recognized &
who readily acknowledged him, & was glad to see
him - He has often been to Paris, & was now returning
from France to England - Ed Bain thought I like
Master like Master - if the latter returns, so much the
better - Should do you good to see how happy
we all are - Send this letter direct to Uncle
Howell that he may forward it to you by the
Copper-hall Coach - it may give you some hours of
satisfaction & comfort - Jacob will add his own
testimonial of health - Worn on Sunday putting
on a clean shirt. Found a kind note of remembrance
it cheer'd us all - We are all as well & happy
as we can be in absence, & we have no doubt that
we have often met in the presence of him who knows
all hearts, & who knows with what anxiety we
have been & are.
