As you are aware No letters are private, but to you my  
dear husband I mean to communicate all every  
thing of on your part &  
I would like to say greatly trust

My dear Tom  
I am never sufficiently thank you for  
all your kindness to me, but I feel opened knowing  
the advice & kindness of your spirit notes has been  
most beneficial to me is a sweet reward that  
may thank I enclose one of No letters, the record is  
very respecting the same feeling & of apologizing for  
not writing more explicitly - but perhaps I shall put  
them both in this envelope - the truth is I often cheer  
my spirit by requesting them you will condescend  
please return them for I do feel every line of his  
writing may become invaluable to his poor Mother  
but I trust as I shall be spared the burden of her  
going far away - but I dare not follow that  
thought - On Friday 20. we dine at the paragon  
I then if you are there you can return the letters to

me or give them (sealed up) to my Uncle. I shall  
be in Lexington & if you could breakfast there I  
should much like to walk with you to hear  
remember I know all, at all events please let  
me know when you go to Milton for thro you may  
then I write with any freedom to Mrs M. in a letter  
of your Mother in the following exquisitely delicate  
sentence "Joy & Amelie who are both as good &  
sweet as possible take care" & I now say then how  
to your last note I am very sorry you have no receipt  
of Mr. Mearns a business with Dekey - who Mr B. put by  
Dekey will take 11% on Friday next he goes to  
Dekey to receive the money I am sorry I cannot  
fix the time he will be with you but as he has  
cannot exactly say when not till after eleven probably  
after 12 but if he does not see you then he will  
give you the money of Mr B. or give it over for you

I mean to return on Saturday by Southwark so I  
can leave by nine or as soon as you please should  
you breakfast in Lexington - yesterday G. B. suspected  
me by saying in answer to my enquiry if any thing  
was done that Humphrey has given up, all is settled
