

1831.

We got home safely after parting from you yesterday, and
in the evening, as you know, went to Miss Wilson's; there
I danced with the brother of the Mr. Chapman who
married Miss Kuslope, and as you may suppose felt
him inclined to make myself less indifferent or
at least, to him than to any one else, not because
I was particularly attracted in himself, but why
I leave you to imagine. Of course he applied my
inclination to talk of Mrs. Chapman & her family to
his own powers of fascination (though I had no such
thought) for he asked me to dance twice with him.
After the quiet feelings of Tuesday & yesterday and last
night's eating I am not so brisk today as I hope to
be tomorrow, or Saturday especially after 3 o'clock.
Sunday, I hope will make me happier than I shall have
been this week. In one of your walks to the Athenaeum
will you be so kind as to enquire at Keynes' for the
boy & Thomas's clock which they had to repair, as they
did not return it with the clock as they ought to have
done. Perhaps you will have the goodness to put it
in your pocket, & either give it to me on Saturday or
when you come on Sunday. The Miss Tristons came
with Mama unexpectedly yesterday. Now really I do
not know whether all these trifles will not appear
very trifling to you, as I saw you only yesterday, but
