My dear North,

Yours of March 1 + 3 received, also copy of your letter to Phœnix of Feb. 2^d, but not his letter to you. I am sending Phœnix & copy of V. letter, & he will doubtless write to you. The loss of slip. of communiques and correspondence now very uncertain, but at all times it has to be recognized that copyists etc. live very much from hand to mouth, & may (especially in later times) be reduced to great straits by the arrival of cash. I had two letters each in the

year from Chicago, asking me to put men on to jobs. I did so in one case, & no money has yet been received. In the other case, where the commission was vague & might have led to a big piece of work, I said I could not put a man in it until I had \$25 in hand to pay him. Since when I have heard no more. Perhaps the answer was lost in the Laconia. But anyway I have kept on the safe side. If you can make American engineers understand the situation, it will be a real service.

I am wondering if letters from you either to me or McKerrow were lost in the Laconia. I have been expecting all the mail to arrive (where but Graves has received) the

first draft for Bib. Soc. subscriptions
wh. you promised to send this year in
March. Also to hear from you
as to what you thought of the idea that
you might assume the title of Hon.
Treasurer & get what would work out
of worship ~~and~~ the title of Hon. Secy
might extract from him. But I
mention this again with the same
proviso as before, that the decision
in this matter rest with you and
that if you dislike a change of title
it would be very ungrateful for us to
press it on you & we have no intention
of doing so.

McKenna is expecting you soon

your corrections to the list of American
members.

The last 3 months have been a
great strain, as Joyce had blown
a double operation and my wife
had a very serious heart attack
as the result of the anxiety about her.

picked up as well as the still wintry
weather permits. I am rather fagged
