AUTOGRAPH LETTER TO REEVES (JOHN) LORD SYDNEY. 15 pp. 4to. My Lord, I find I was mistaken about the state of Elizabeth which I said had some provision of the kind you wanted; for it only relates to the King's forts garrisons, &c. So that it is, as you imagined, that there is no law on the subject of corresponding with foreign powers, when they are not the King's enemies, by being at war with us.
