Dear Mr. North:-

I thank you for the clipping concerning Carter. I fully agree with its adverse judgment of him. I have been saying much more than this. His head has been turned by a spectacular but much overestimated discovery, and he has been so silly as to lecture a government and ask an apology from it. In this he may have been influenced by the hot-headed Brewster whom I know only too well. He has been putting on airs for years. I have known many great scholars in these closely related fields; perhaps no American has personally known more. I have found them usually quiet men, unobtrusive, speaking commonly in rather low tones and willing to be conciliatory. I am, however, sorry for Carter. He has behaved ill and must suffer sorely for it. We make or break ourselves. Others do not do it.
