

Bishopthorpe, Augt 20. 1782

Dear Sir

I received the favour of your Letter
^{Lancaster}
at ~~Bishopthorpe~~, and wrote immediately
to the Clerk of the Crowe at Durham to
steep my Letter to the Secretary of State,
that I might insert the name of Samuel
James in it, as a person proper to receive
a free pardon - He sends me word that
he had dispatched it to his Agent in
London, but had wrote to him to prevent
the delivery of it; that he supposed his
Letter would be too late - If that should
be the case, which I will inform you of

business there was light.
