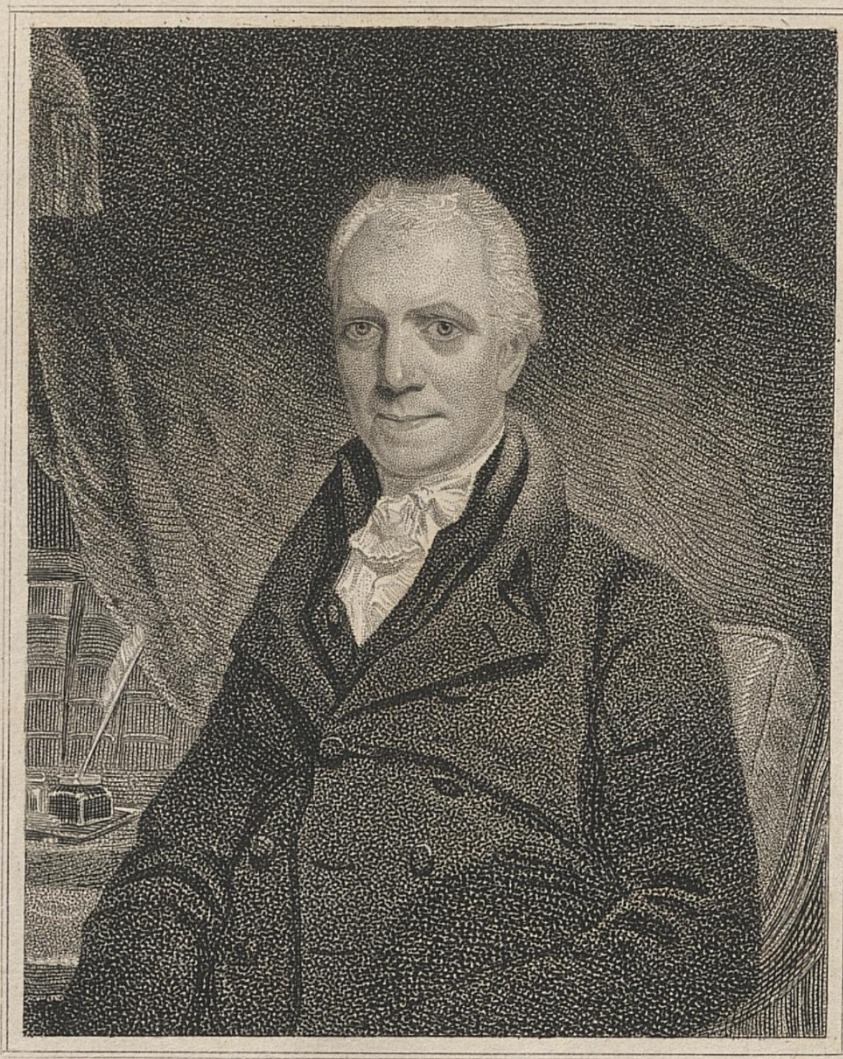

*He was born at Aldborough, in Suffolk, on the 24<sup>th</sup> of Dec. 1754. His father and grandfather were officers of the customs at that place. From early life he indulged in the composition of verses. He possessed the friendship and at length the parental kindness of Edmund Burke. He also acquired the friendship of Charles James Fox, and the Duke of Rutland made him his domestic Chaplain, but he was indebted to Lord Thurlow for his clerical preferments. His success as a poet, seems to have roused him to exertion, and his works have been stamped with the public approbation. He now ranks among our legitimate poets.*
