

GILLY, WILLIAM STEPHEN, D.D., was educated at Christ's Hospital, and at St. Catharine's Hall, Cambridge. He was collated to the rectory of North Cambridge, Essex, 1817; obtained a canonry of Durham, and the living of St. Margaret's in that city 1825; was presented in 1851 to the vicarage of Norham, Northumberland; and died 10 Sept., 1855, aged 66. His works are—‘The Spirit of the Gospel; or the Four Evangelists elucidated by explanatory observations, historical references, and miscellaneous illustrations;’ ‘Narrative of an Excursion to the Mountains of Piedmont in the year 1823, and Researches among the Vaudois or Waldenses, Protestant inhabitants of the Cottian Alps;’ ‘Horæ Caticheticæ;’ ‘Waldensian Researches;’ a ‘Second Visit to the Vaudois,’ 1831; Memoir of Felix Neff; ‘Our Protestant Forefathers;’ ‘Vigilantius and his Times;’ ‘The Romaunt Version of the Gospel according to St. John.’
