My dear Madam

I hope the letter which had the honour to address to you in the last days of December on occasion of the new year, may have happily come to your hands as the other one, which I posted here on the same day together with yours, for my friend Mr. Tommaso Anselmi's letter in Liverpool and which was miraculously received by that gentleman although compelled to make a most interesting visit to King Neptune in the four days' Spanish steamer Volpe, and after having remained for not less than 24 hours in His Majesty's submarine Louisbourg.

I beg now with the greatest pleasure to inform you that I took the liberty to send you under the address "J. C. White Esquire London 32 Mortimer Street" and





through M<sup>rs</sup>. The Mostarda of Milano or rather of Cremona, as the latter town is the true place of its first rate fabrication, - is composed of all kinds of fruits preserved in sweet mustard and is eaten in our country as well alone as with all those dishes for which in England is used current jelly.

My health, in the whole, is now satisfactory. I attribute that happy effect mainly to the purity and elasticity of
