BANDINEL, BULKELEY, D.D., keeper of I ley's library at Oxford, was born in that city 21 Feb., 1781. From Dr. Valpy's school at Reading he proceeded to the foundation at Winchester, and thence, in 1800, as a scholar to New College (B.A. 1805; M.A. 1807). He was appointed sublibrarian of the Bodleian 1810, and three years afterwards succeeded to the office of head librarian, which he retained till within about twelve months of his death. In 1823 he obtained the rectory of Haughton-le-Skerne, in the county of Durham, and proceeded B.D. and D.D. Died 6 Feb., His administration of the Bodleian was characterized by zeal, energy, courtesy, and discretion. For many years he was one of the delegates of the University press, and took a prominent part in editing Dugdale's 'Monasticon,' Clarendon's 'History of the Rebellion,' and other works of mark.
