

GRAHAM (Gilbert-John), peintre écossais, né à Glasgow, en avril 1794, élève de l'Académie royale de Londres en 1818, obtint, en 1819, la première médaille d'argent pour le dessin d'après l'antique, et la médaille d'or, en 1821, au concours de peinture historique. Après deux années d'études en Italie, où il se passionna pour le style des anciens maîtres, il revint dans son pays et cultiva particulièrement le portrait. M. Graham se distingue par la pureté des lignes, l'expression noble et vraie, l'éclat de la couleur, une exécution large et finie. Peu de peintres ont, plus que lui, contribué à propager le goût des beaux-arts dans l'ouest de l'Écosse et parmi ses riches concitoyens de Glasgow, où il existe aujourd'hui, comme à Édimbourg, une exposition

annuelle de peinture et de sculpture, et une association destinée à encourager les artistes par l'acquisition de leurs meilleurs ouvrages. M. Graham est membre de l'Académie royale d'Écosse. On a aussi de cet habile portraitiste des tableaux de chevalet où l'on trouve à la fois de l'imagination et du goût.

My dear Sir

A good many years ago
Mr. Tho. Graham, the Master of
the Mint, induced me to allow
